#### Jon Sprunger, Varsity Head Coach



Coach Sprunger is in his 23rd year as Head Coach and his 35th season coaching. He has been an integral part of this program since its inception in the fall of 1991. He is a graduate of Worthington High School where he played soccer. He obtained a B.A. degree from Taylor University and his Master's from Ohio State University. Coach Sprunger played soccer while attending Taylor University, was a 4 year starter, and was captain his Junior and Senior years. He has extensive experience coaching youth soccer, including seasons with Crew Juniors, Classics Eagles, and Worthington United 94. He is in his 35th year as a teacher, and currently teaches American History, Behavioral Sciences, and teaches two International Baccalaureate courses: IB Psychology and IB Theory of Knowledge. He was named OCC Coach of the Year in 2003, 2004, 2007, 2008, and 2014; OCC Co-Coach of the Year in 2011, 2015, and 2018. He was recognized as Central District Coach of the Year in 2008. When Coach Sprunger is not involved with teaching or the soccer team, he spends time with his family. He and his wife Jacki have been married for 30 years and are the proud parents of Joseph, Jakob and daughter-in-law Alli.

Coach Patrick Fagan is a teacher who joined the WKHS program in 2016. This was his 10th season at Kilbourne and his 15th year of coaching. # Varsity Season In Review – 2025

The 2025 Worthington Kilbourne Men's Soccer season kicked off the evening of August 1st with the 2 mile run. Ryan Foisset set a blistering time of 10:52, which is THE fastest time we have on record. The pre-season began with scrimmages against three top teams. The first was Hilliard Bradley, where Cam Farris opened up the 2025 scoring with the first goal of the season. The winning goal came from Bowen Rick, known for his strong leg, who blasted a shot 60 yards from the goal which proceeded to bounce right in front Bradley's goalkeeper and over his head and directly into the goal for the 4-3 win.

The regular season began with eventual District Champion, Whetstone. Kilbourne thumped Whetstone 5-0. Sophomore Erkan Erciyas had an amazing first game, scoring 4 of the 5 goals that day, chipping the goalkeeper twice. Whetstone will long remember the name Erkan! Kellen Louk opened his season play in the midfield in prime form by providing 3 assists in this game. Kaiden Maloney was an instrumental figure in the midfield showing off his skills as he sliced and diced the Whetstone players. Anchoring the defense and giving the Wolves the first clean sheet of the season, was senior defensive standout and captain, Paul Sterenberg. Goalkeepers Brayden Houk and Dominic Viggiano recorded the first shut out of the season.

The season's second game saw the Wolves battle to a 1-1 tie with Regional Champion Westerville Central. In action similar to the Bradley scrimmage, Cam Farris scored his first goal for the regular season assisted by Kellen Louk. Both players were off to a great start. Next on the schedule was Lakota West, yet another District Champion. Although the Wolves played a great game, the Wolves fell just short. Grant Darner used his size and strength to defend and attack the right side of the midfield. Tyler Houk and Colin Beckstedt saw their first minutes on the varsity turf. The final game prior to the start of the OCC season was a new opponent, Northland. Senior, Esad Alpay scored a brilliant goal as did Ray Disalvo. Ian Varga recorded an assist and added his name to the season stats list.

The Wolves opened OCC play with a 6-2 victory over the Westland Cougars. Erkan Erciyas scored a hat trick, followed by Ray Disalvo who scored twice. Marcos Vicente and Quinn McGlone tallied their first assists of the season. Ryan Goleb earned his first minutes on the varsity field on the left side of the midfield. Seven days later, the Wolves traveled to Dublin Scioto. This game has often decided the OCC championship and this year brought in two OCC undefeated teams at the time. After 80 minutes of back and forth, the game ended 0-0. The defense needs to be praised for the second shut-out of the season. Brayden Houk had one of his best games between the pipes, making save after save. The line of defenders keeping the Irish subdued consisted of Caleb Kinderknecht, Michael Dolciato, Paul Sterenberg, and Bowen Rick. In the 2024 season Kilbourne shocked central Ohio by beating Olentangy Liberty. The 2025 season saw the same result with a 4-2 victory over the Patriots on their home field. Isaiah Kim found himself moving into a starting position as the left outside back. He was asked to step in for an injured player and earned the starting position for the remainder of the year. His defensive growth over the course of the year marks him as the most improved player. Dominic Viggiano played an amazing game preventing the Patriots from ever getting in the game. Cam Toops was able to control the flow of the game with his ball control skills and play in the middle of the field. Nick Nsibula and Ryan Miller, as our main strikers, worked Liberty's defensive line and gave them all kinds of trouble.

Big Walnut was the next OCC challenger, and the Wolves were able prevent a loss. Even though Bowen Rick tallied his first goal of the year the game ended in a 3-3 tie. The Wolf Pack was still in the hunt for an OCC title. The middle half of the season proved to be a difficult two weeks for the Wolves as they played last year's Division 1 state finalist followed by 2025 regional finalist Dublin Jerome. But the soccer Wolves bounced back in a celebratory win verses Canal Winchester. Team and fan favorite, Fredy Camara scored his first varsity goal and the entire team and stadium erupted in cheers. Quinn McGlone also scored his first goal of the season coming up the field from the defensive mid position and hammering a great shot into the goal. The final OCC game took place during senior night in Ron Hopper Memorial Stadium. The Wildcats of Westerville South were the opponents. The seniors were determined to end their careers with a strong win. Ryan Miller and Esad Alpay both scored goals. Esad, ripping off his shirt, cost him a yellow card, and as a reporter asked him after the game why he tore his shirt off, he replied, "I wanted to make the game epic." Ian Varga connected with 2 assists in this game adding to his totals for the year. Samba Barrie, who came to the team later in the season after transferring back to Kilbourne from a season in England, started to show his comfort level with the team and the American style of play. Oliver Kim saw his first minutes as a varsity player and was able to play alongside his brother on the varsity field for the first time.

The Wolves were seeded 9th in the Division 2 District Tournament and received a bye for the opening round of the sectional. In the District Semi-final the Wolves traveled to Watkins Memorial. The Hawks were ranked higher than Kilbourne and had a record of 9-5-2. This did not phase the Wolves at all as the Kilbourne schedule demands the best and prepares them for these moments. Kilbourne went in with an attitude and Erkan Erciyas scored his 3rd hat trick of the season. The 2025 season came to a crushing end against longtime foe, Westerville North. The game was tied at 1-1 with a late goal coming off the combined effort of Ryan Miller and Samba Barrie. Entering the overtime period the Wolves appeared to have momentum, but a shanked cross by a Westerville North player found its way into the upper corner of the net.

The coaches would like to thank the graduating seniors and wish them the best of luck. You will always be welcomed back, and you will always be part of the pack. For the returning players, take some time off and we will begin our 2026 season in January.

#### 5 August 2025 V Olentangy Berlin High School

Our season started with a scrimmage against Olentangy Berlin. Our first goal of the season was scored off a corner kick by Marcos Vicente, assisted by Kelvin Sam. The highlight of this game was the first action of our talented freshmen: Mason Lawrence, Leo Minadeo, Idir Ben Zaid, and Shane Louk. Collectively, these four gave us real hope for what the future has in store for WKHS Men's Soccer. Although we drew the game, we felt that good things were coming our way.

#### 8 August 2025 at Hilliard Bradley

After the draw in our first game, after we had played well, we followed it up with a dud. In a 1-3 loss where our collective defense was poor, the only bright spot was a goal by Mahmoud Belgasam- a very slow rolling ball that managed to have enough momentum to get over the line. A goal is a goal and it was the lone bright spot in an otherwise poor performance.

#### 13 August 2025 V Upper Arlington

Another loss, 0-3, showed that we had a lot of work to do, especially on defense.

#### 19 August 2025 V Whetstone (0-0)

Oliver Kim opened the scoring, but the game was abandoned shortly after because of lightning.

#### 21 August 2025 V Westerville Central (0-1)

Our unofficial opener to the season because of the abandoned game was against Westerville Central. For the most part, the boys played well. Two different defensive lapses allowed Westerville Central to score causing us to lose our first game of the season.

#### 23 August 2025 V Lakota West (1-1)

Lakota is always a difficult game, but the boys were up for it. We opened the scoring when Marcos Vicente took a pass from Shane Louk and neatly netted our first. After our first goal, we lost the momentum and allowed Lakota to put two past us. Drew Stoops leveled the score, being assisted by Oliver Kim. With time running out, Ali Yildiz scored off a corner to win us the game.

#### 26 August 2025 V Northland (2-1)

Northland was a game that was trickier than we had anticipated. They held us scoreless in the first half, but they could not keep Mason Lawrence off the scoreboard in the second. Mason scored the first of his brace off a corner kick taken by Colin Beckstedt. Mason's second goal was assisted by Drew Stoops. The clean sheet was kept by Brogan McGlone in the first half and Aiden Ziegenbusch in the second half.

#### 28 August 2025 V Westland (3-1)

Not all wins are worthy or celebration. In this game- a game that we could have won by 7 or 8 goals- the team was offside 18 times. They were offside so often, I made sure that I taught them the offside law in the next practice. Our first goal was a set piece goal by Ali Yildiz, assisted by Ryan Goleb. The second goal was Mason Lawrence from Oliver Kim. The third was Oliver Kim's second of the season, assisted by Kelvin Sam.

#### 4 September 2025 at Dublin Scioto (3-2)

Our Hard Road rivalry looked like it was going to go our way at halftime. Brogan McGlone had made some outstanding saves. Ali Yildiz scored another goal off a set piece- taken by Colin Beckstedt. We came off feeling that we were the better team and that we were unlucky not to have more goals. The second half, however, was a nightmare of mistakes. We lost the game 1-4. Some hard lessons were learned that day.

#### 6 September 2025 V Hilliard Darby (3-3)

Back at home, we started the game on fire. We took an early lead when Mahmoud Belgasam scored an opening goal assisted by Drew Stoops. Things got better when Mason Lawrence doubled our lead. We then proceeded to give up three straight goals (one PK) to lose the game 2-3.

# JVB Season Summary

The players on Kilbourne's 2024 JV-B Soccer team had a highly successful season. Finishing with a record of 9-5-1, ending the year with three straight wins. Although we were never a high scoring team, the defense carried us out of some close games. Out of our fifteen games (and three scrimmages), we only scored 3+ goals once.

Seven of our wins ended with a final score of 2-1. Is that a league record? The 2025 JV-B team was incredibly strong at finishing each game. Many of our 2-1 wins came with a goal in the last few minutes, and not once did they fall to a loss in the reverse situation. They fought to the end every game, which led to much success.

Each player played a pivotal role in our success. In the offense, 20 goals were scored in 15 games. Ali led the team with 6 goals, despite spending the first half of the season playing defense or midfield. It was well- deserved for Ali to get voted as Offensive Player of the Year. Hunter, who scored 2 critical goals this season, worked his way into the starting lineup due to his hard work and integrity. He made it impossible to start him off the field. Mohammed Belgasam was next in line as the scoring leader with 4 goals, proving his reliability on the wing. Jack, a captain of the team, led by example and supported his team in every way. He was voted Most Valuable Teammate, which resembles his character. Jack can play many positions, but he became the most effective in the midfield. If assists were tracked this year, I am sure that Jack had the most. Caleb scored 2 goals this year, and despite being a strong offensive player, he sat in the defensive midfield position.

Caleb's intelligence and work ethic made it clear that he could be trusted anywhere, even if he was most comfortable in the offense. Among him, Alex, Ruan and Aymen held down the defensive midfield position. Ruan, despite being smaller than his opponents, played physically and hard, never letting someone push him off the ball. Alex, a returning player, continued to be impressive in his knowledge of the position. Alex was always where he was supposed to be. Aymen proved that he was confident with the ball and could distribute great passes to the offensive players. Mohammed Elattar moved around throughout the year from the midfield to the offense, helping his team wherever he was needed. When the team needed a position to be covered, Mohammed was there to be a reliable player. Ezra, Derek and Josh played critical roles on the wing, each of them scoring a goal this year. Ezra began the year playing on the wing, but we learned about his strength in offensive runs as a striker, so he had to be moved where he would be most effective. Derek was fast and skilled on the wing and could be counted on for his impressive work ethic. Derek and Ezra both scored critical goals in 2-1 victories this year. Josh, unfortunately, missed part of the season due to an injury, but it was very obvious that we were missing his presence when he was on the sideline. He was an effective winger and played hard anytime he was on the field. Lastly, Alhadj played an important role in the offense at the attacking mid, striker and winger position. Alhadi has a strong left foot, making him dangerous in the attack. He was told all season to use his right foot more and always listened, proving how coachable and reliable Alhadj is.

Oftentimes, the offensive players get recognized for their awesome goals, but the defense should be praised just as much. As mentioned before, the team scored 20 goals in 15 games, averaging 1.33 goals per game. Our record was 9-5-1. This statistic alone should prove how incredible the defense was this season. Two of our captains, Luke and Teddy, held down the center back position. Teddy continued to be reliable in his positioning, always disrupting the opponents. At the beginning of the season, the players voted for Luke to be a captain. He is a natural leader. Luke never got upset at his teammates and always built them up, no matter how frustrating the situation. Kilbourne Soccer is lucky to have a leader like him in the future. Angel and Matthew played center back as well. Angel was a vocal leader and helped encourage the team. Matthew was known for his consistency; he never had a bad game. We knew that he was going to be a lock down defender each game. Sam played fullback this year and was talented in his ability to mark the back side. Chris played strong as a defender and was impressive in his distribution after winning the ball. Xavier continued to be a reliable defender because he hardly let players pass him and was always in the right position. Finally, Donavan was voted by his teammates as the Most Valuable Defender. This is well-deserved because Donavan always did what he was supposed to do. He was a great teammate, he worked hard and hardly made any mistakes. In my 5 years of coaching, Donavan is the smartest player I have coached.



Cole and Joao deserve praise as well, holding opponents to 19 goals in 15 games. Joao entered halfway through the season and will always be remembered for his last second PK save against Olentangy Liberty to keep the game 0-0. Joao made incredible saves and has a bright future here at Kilbourne. Cole was our solo goalie for the first half of the season and was always reliable. Cole cared about getti ng better and would talk to me about his performance, leading him to grow throughout the season. I can confidently say that Cole exited the season as a better goalie, due to his desire to improve. Every game, I knew that I could count on Cole to keep us in the game. I am excited to see his future as a player.

Overall, the 2025 JV-B Soccer season was a grand success. I was so impressed by the way the team united and fought hard every day. This group of players were so fun to be around and were so easy to coach. It was a pleasure watching them grow as players and as people. We are beyond proud of them and are excited to watch them progress for the remainder of their high school career, on and off the soccer field.
