Navigating Authority



What is Operating Authority?

Operating authority is your legal permission to operate as a for-hire motor carrier, granted by the FMCSA. Without it, you cannot legally haul cargo for compensation.



MC and DOT Numbers

Your MC number identifies you as a motor carrier authorized to transport goods. Your DOT number registers your company with the Department of Transportation for safety monitoring.



Leasing vs Owning Authority

Leasing authority lets you operate under another carrier's license quickly but limits control. Owning your authority provides independence, higher rates, and long-term business value.

Compliance Essentials

DOT Regulations Overview

Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations govern hours of service, vehicle inspections, driver qualifications, and record-keeping requirements for box truck operators.

2

Drug and Alcohol Testing

Mandatory testing programs include pre-employment, random, post-accident, and reasonable suspicion tests. You must maintain a testing consortium and proper documentation.

3

Insurance Requirements

Liability coverage protects against third-party claims. Cargo insurance covers goods in transit. Physical damage insurance protects your vehicle investment. Each has minimum requirements.
