And may you have the heart to love God with your whole heart, mind, soul, and strength and every neighbor as yourself.

Scripture Focus for January

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week... Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." $J_0 \ln 20:19$

My very first email from Pastor Mike included his January newsletter article. I read it through and noticed he signed it, "Pax, Mike." Certain this was a typo, I did what I do best. I played dumb (please don't tell him). I replied, "Teach me, please. 'Pax' is new to me. Is it short for 'Pastor'?"

Friends, Pastor Mike wasted no time getting started educating me. He responded kindly, and thoroughly, with his first lesson of many lessons to be taught to acquired, nitwit staff member. But surely, I am not the only one who has not seen this sign-off though!

So, for the benefit of myself and anyone else who may have wondered, here's the scoop. "Pax" is the Latin word for peace, drawn from the ancient Christian greeting Pax vobiscum, which means "Peace be with you." (And no, it is not short for Pastor. I double checked.)

As it turns out, this greeting comes straight from Scripture. In John 20:19, the disciples are locked behind doors because they are afraid. Jesus has been crucified, and they fear they could be next. Their grief is mixed with anxiety, and they are unsure who can be trusted and unsure of what comes next.

They are afraid, confused, and probably replaying every decision they made over the last few days. Into that room, Jesus appears and says, "Peace be with you." Not, "Where were you?" Not, "Let's talk about this." Just peace. That detail matters. Jesus does not wait for the disciples to calm down, get organized, or fully understand what is happening. He meets them exactly as they are. Fearful. Tired. Locked in. And his first gift to them is peace.

If that sounds familiar, it might be because many of us live behind metaphorically locked doors


of our own. Busy schedules. Uncertain futures. Church calendars that fill up faster than we expect. Change can be exciting, but it can also be unsettling. Even good change can make us wonder what comes next.

Which is why this greeting feels especially appropriate as we welcome a new pastor. "Peace be with you" is not a promise that everything will be perfect or predictable. It is a promise that Christ is present, already standing among us, even when we are still figuring things out.

So when Pastor Mike signs his messages with Pax, he is offering more than a stylish signature or a fun vocabulary word. He is reminding us of a truth the Church has carried for centuries. Peace is not something we create by doing everything right. It is something we receive. May the peace of Christ be with us as we worship, serve, laugh, learn, and grow together in this new season.

May it follow us into meetings, rehearsals, and conversations. And may it gently remind us, especially on the days we feel a little unsure, that God is already here.
