SCRIPTURE FOCUS FOR NOVEMBER

"Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to Him; bless His name! For the LORD is good; His steadfast love endures forever, and His faithfulness to all generations."

November just feels like a month made for gratitude, doesn't it? The air gets cooler, the leaves crunch underfoot, and before long, we find ourselves gathered around tables with friends and family. Psalm 100 reminds me that thanksgiving isn't just something we do once a year. It's a way of living, a daily invitation to enter God's presence with a thankful heart. Even when life feels uncertain or busy, there's always something we can thank Him for, whether it's the big moments or the quiet, ordinary ones that often go unnoticed.

I've noticed gratitude has a funny way of changing how we see things. When we pause to notice God's goodness through answered prayers, the kindness of others, or just a quiet moment of peace, our focus shifts. Suddenly, we're not just seeing what's missing or stressful, but what's good and steady. And the truth is, there's a lot of good when we take time to look for it. Even small things, like a kind word from a friend, a sunny day, or a comforting cup of coffee, can remind us that God's love is all around us.

This is also a wonderful month to reflect on our community. Think about the people in your life who have lifted you up, encouraged you, or simply walked alongside you in faith. Sharing your gratitude with them through a note, a phone call, or a simple act of kindness, can make their day and deepen the connections that bring us joy and strength. Gratitude isn't just a feeling; it's something we can actively live out, and it spreads when we share it.

As Thanksgiving approaches, let's be intentional about slowing down and giving thanks. Look back on this past year and take note of the ways God has been faithful. Maybe He provided in ways you didn't expect. Maybe He brought encouragement just when you needed it most. Maybe He gave you patience for challenges or courage to take steps of faith. Reflecting on these blessings helps us to trust in His goodness, even when life doesn't go as planned.

And notice, God's goodness doesn't fade when the turkey leftovers are gone. Psalm 100:5 tells us His love endures forever. That means His faithfulness is steady through every season, not just the sunny ones. The same God who has walked with us this year will walk with us into the next. That is a reason not just to be thankful in November, but to carry gratitude into every day of our lives.

So as we gather this November, whether your table is full of people or just a few close friends, let's take a moment to truly give thanks. Not just for the blessings around us, but for the God who never stops giving. Let every prayer, every smile, every shared story of gratitude be an offering of praise. And let's remember to carry that thankfulness forward, letting it shape how we live, love, and encourage one another in the months to come.



This is my first year to serve on the FUMC United Women in Faith unit team, and I hope to hear from UWF members, potential members, and friends about the social action you think our UWF units (called "circles") could engage in. Nationally and in the Great Plains Conference (which includes KS and NE), social actions address:

- Maternal and Child Health
- Economic Inequality through the Della Lamb ministry in Kansas City
- Racial Justice
- Ministry to Incarcerated Families in the Topeka [Women's] Correctional Facility
- Climate Justice and Food Access through the Big Garden in Omaha, NE



YOUR FUMC OFFERINGS AT WORK


The graph below, which is updated monthly, provides a snapshot in time that compares First United Methodist Church's (FUMC) actual monthly Giving to actual monthly expenses. You will note that Receipts are slightly ahead of Expenses by \$4.3K dollars year-to-date. Applying a simple analysis using nine months of actual Receipts, coupled with three months of projected Receipts based upon a 2024 trend line, Receipts and Expenses are projected to break even at the end of the fiscal year. The major unknown remains the church's apportionment

obligation.

Apportionments are funds that local Methodist churches make to assist in funding wider ministry activities. To date, the church has paid \$54.3K toward its obligation of \$108K. This represents good faith and commitment that FUMC can and will stand behind its obligation in support of God's ministry. While this is a positive indicator, the church is still facing a shortfall of \$53.7K. With only two months remaining in the year, time is running out! If FUMC is to fulfill its apportionment obligation this year we need to take action now. Gifts to be applied toward the church's apportionment can be remitted in a number of convenient ways. All you have to do is indicate that your gift is for "Apportionment".

Your pastors, along with all committees within the Church, continue to focus on identifying ways to best use your Gifts to meet ministry and community needs. But it also needs a unified congregation focused on stewardship, prayer, and action.

To participate in Groceries for God:

- 1. Go to dillons.com/communityrewards.
- 2. Create an account including your e-mail address If you do not have an email address see instructions below
- 3. Enter your shopper card number or alternate ID# and last name
- 4. On the account summary screen scroll all the way down to Community Rewards click "en-roll"
- 5. Fill in personal information. Enter "MY114" you will then see First UMC Groceries for God.
- 6. Click in the circle as this is our Groceries for God program.
- 7. Click on save and you should get a note at the top of the page indicating that your sign up has been completed.

You will automatically start earning rewards for FUMC right away on qualifying purchases*, made using your Shopper's plus card!

*Things that do not qualify are fuel, postage, alcohol, tobacco, Kroger gift cards, variable load gift cards among other things, but can be found on the website.

If you DO NOT HAVE INTERNET, but use this program, you will need to call 1-800-576-4377 and it will be #3 on the recorded menu. They will walk you through the process. Or walk into one of the two stores in town.
