ELMORE COUNTY FAIR GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS



1. The Elmore County Fair and Rodeo will not be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to any property, article, animal or person while the same is on the Fairgrounds.

- 2. NO DOGS ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS UNLESS ENTERED IN A COMPETITION OR SERVICE DOGS.
- 3. **ATV/GOLF CARTS are not allowed** on or about the Fairgrounds, with the exception of security and fair officials (unless handicap or prior approval by Fair Manager.
- 4. Campsites will be assigned in the following order: Fair Board Members, 4H/FFA, and Open Class, vendors until all campsites are filled.

YOUTH / OPEN EXHIBITORS

Throughout the Rules and Regulations the word "exhibitor" refers to, but is not limited to 4H, FFA, and Open Class participants.

- 1. The Elmore County Fair and Rodeo will not be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to any property, article, animal or person while the same is on the Fairgrounds. Presentation of animals for exhibition shall be deemed acceptance of this rule.
- 2. Class entries may be in person or in writing on/or before twenty-one (21) days prior to the Fair commencing.
- 3. Unless otherwise noted, livestock must remain on the grounds throughout the Fair and will not be released until Sunday after 9:00 am.
- Exhibitors will give personal attention to such displays that require close personal attention. Exhibits not properly attended to will have to be removed from the premises.
- 5. Exhibitors must prepare and decorate their area. The Fair does not furnish materials or labor for preparing or decorating.




<u>CONCESSIONS AND</u> <u>SPECIAL EXHIBITS</u>

1. The Elmore County Fair and Rodeo will not be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to

any property, article, animal, or person while the same is on the Fairgrounds. Presentation of said property shall be deemed acceptance of this rule.

- 2. Entries may be in person or in writing any time on/or before twenty-one (21) days prior to the commencement of Fair.
- 3. All concessions and special exhibits must remain on the grounds throughout the Fair, leaving Sunday morning unless other arrangements have been approved by Fair Manager.
- All concession and special exhibits having displays are required close personal attention. Concessions and exhibits not properly attended to will be removed from the premises.
- 5. All concessions and special exhibits must secure contract from the Fair Manager and must occupy such spaces as are assigned to them, and must be removed within two (2) days after fair or it becomes property of the County unless arrangements have been provided.
- 6. Concession stands are required to be neat and substantial in appearance and must comply with local and state Health Department regulations.
- No contract will be issued to any exhibitor or concessionaire presenting any exhibit deemed to be unethical or objectionable. Any holder of concession who violates any law of the State or regulation of the Fair, shall forfeit his/her space. All fees for exhibit space, parking and admission shall be forfeited.
- 8. The posting or distribution of posters, handbills, and other advertising material is prohibited except from the booth of licensed exhibitors and concessionaires.
- 9. Food & Drinks in designated areas of Expo Building.



ANIMAL HEALTH

These guidelines have been established by the <u>Fair</u> <u>Management</u> for all animal exhibitors to include 4H/ FFA, and Open Class.

- 1. Each exhibitor is responsible to see his or her entry is in good health when received at the Fair.
- 2. The Department Superintendent or the Fair Manager may determine if veterinary assistance is needed for each entry.
- 3. The exhibitor will be responsible for any expense incurred for the treatment of any livestock entry.
- 4. To enter the Fairgrounds, all livestock and poultry, of any age or class, must be sound, of good health and show no sign or communicable disease. Any animal or fowl developing clinical evidence of disease after entering the Fairgrounds may not

show and shall be subject to expulsion, depending upon the nature and seriousness of the disease.

5. Should the veterinarian concur with the Superintendent or Fair Manager that any entry is unfit for participation in the Fair, the entry must be removed from the Fairgrounds.

EXHIBIT INFORMATION FOR OPEN CLASS

- A. Any rule/regulation in this book (unless it is a printing or typographical error) stands as printed unless changed by the Fair Board.
- B. Refer to Department for additional show rules.
- C. In all cases, the decision of the judge is FINAL.
- D. No animal or article may compete in more than one Class except in Champion Classes.
- E. All exhibits must be in place as specified in the Special Rules of the Department. All Open Class Home Arts, and 4-H will be released Sunday, July 23, 9:00 am to noon. Premiums will be paid out during that time ONLY. To receive exhibit or premium, you must have your property claim check.
- F. Where there is but one exhibit in a Class the award shall be made on merit alone.
- G. Judges will be selected and approved by the Open Class Manager/Supervisor prior to the Fair.
- H. The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to the Fairgrounds, either for exhibit or for other purposes, assumes responsibility for its loss, damage or injury to any person or the property of any person by any animal owned or exhibited by him and shall indemnify the said Elmore County Fair against all claims and any injuries or damage arising from actions or negligence of exhibitor.
- I. A ribbon will be given on merit of projects as follows:

- J. All Open Class entries, <u>except perishables</u>, can be entered between 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm Monday, July 17, all others and <u>perishables</u> must be entered from 8:00 am to 11:00 am, Tuesday, July 18. No entries prior to or after these hours will be accepted without prior approval of the Open Class Chairman.
- K. All entries will be classified as professional, amateur or novice, as here defined.

<u>Professional:</u> Teaches these services, or receives income from sales of material to be exhibited.

<u>Amateur:</u> Someone who has had some training or uses special equipment to create exhibit.

Novice: A person with no training and producing for their own pleasure.

- L. Exhibits not claimed within one week of the Fair will be considered abandoned and will be disposed of as the Fair Manager sees fit.
- M. Age divisions for Open Class are determined by each Department. Please refer to Department rules for specific age categories.



GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR OPEN CLASS DEPARTMENTS

1. Open Class exhibits are open to the world. Division head are authorized to accept entries not listed in the Fair Premium Book if there is space and if they judge the entry to be worthy.

2. Entry dates are listed in each specific department.

3. All exhibitors must be of Amateur or Novice standing except where special categories are listed at the Elmore County Fair for Professionals.

See definition of Amateur, Novice and Professional in Exhibit Information

- 4. Exhibitors are asked to complete their own entry blanks prior to entry time. All entries must be listed on entry blanks provided by the Elmore County Fair. Separate entry blanks must be used for each department.
- Exhibits previously shown at the Elmore County Fair will not be judged.
- 6. All exhibits, when assigned space, become subject to the control of the Department Superintendent.
- 7. All exhibits must bear the entry tag given by the clerk at the time of entry and that of the stub held by the exhibitor.
- 8. Where there is one exhibit in a Class, the award shall be made on <u>merit alone</u>.
- Exhibitors must present their claim check to Superintendents or clerks in charge of various Departments before exhibits will be released. Exhibitors are NOT allowed to remove own displays. (For exceptions, see Department Superintendent.)
- Exhibitors may make only one entry in each Class, except as specified in the Class rules of each Department.
- 11. The owner or custodian of property of any kind brought to the Fairgrounds, either for exhibit or for other purposes, assumes as a condition of its admission to the grounds all risk of and responsibility for its loss, damage or theft.
- 12. The decisions of the judges are final. Exhibits not claimed within one week of the Fair will be considered abandoned.



See General Rules and Regulations. Read carefully.

It is important to enter your photograph in the class that it is best suited for. For example: if you were to enter a beautiful photograph of a rose in the scenic class—that is how it will be judged—regardless of what a wonderful photo it is, it is bound to not do very well as it has been entered in a class that does not fit. This decision is yours and neither the Superintendent nor his or her assistants may assist you with this decision. A more detailed explanation a class may be given but no direction as to which class you should enter. GOOD LUCK!

- **A.** All photographs must have been taken within the last 24 months by the exhibitor.
- **B.** All entries (both professional and amateur) may be color or black and white.
- **C.** More than one entry within the same class is permitted, but take note: you will be competing against yourself!
- **D.** No Photographs may be entered in the Elmore County Fair that has been entered in previous years. Photos previously entered in other competitions or fairs will be permitted.
- E. All entries are to be mounted on foam core board (a light weight substance consisting of two sheets of cardboard with a thin layer of styrofoam sandwiched between them) or mount board (a super durable, extremely strong cardboard). Entries should be no more than 3/16" thick. No other mounting substance will be accepted! By mounted, we mean affixed/glued/adhered to the mount board or foam core and trimmed to the exact size of the photograph. For ease of handling and display purposes framed and/or matted photographs will not be accepted. Plastic sleeves or other protective coverings will also not be accepted. TIP: Make sure your photograph is firmly attached to your mount board or foam core to prevent the photograph from separating from the mount board or foam core in the summer heat and humidity.
- **F.** The smallest photograph permitted will be 8"x10" and the largest photograph permitted will be 16"x20" trimmed to the edge of the photograph (no borders). Overall size without borders no white around the image) may not exceed 16"x20".
- **G.** Please plainly print on the back in the upper left of each entry:Exhibitors Name Address Phone Number Division Number, Section Letter, Class Number (Note Division 2 Professional does not have a designated section)
- **H.** Any photo deemed inappropriate for Public display by the Fair Board and/or Superintendent will be judged but not displayed during the fair.
- **I.** All photos should be printed on glossy or semiglass/lustre paper. The only exception to this will be entries into the Metallic Photo class.

CANNING GUIDELINES:

- A. All products must be in a standard clear canning jar (i.e. Ball, Kerr, Golden Harvest, etc.), NO MAYONNAISE OR ODD JARS WILL BE JUDGED!
- B. All canned products must have been processed within the last 12 months and be sealed in standard canning jars with ring. NO PARAFFIN SEALS WILL BE JUDGED! Judges reserve the right to open any jars. NO OPEN KETTLE PRODUCTS WILL BE ACCEPTED!
- **C.** <u>Jars must be clean!</u> Rings must be on jars, but must be loose and clean, so judges can remove and check head space.
- D. Jars must be labeled with CONTENT, PROCESSING METHOD, PROCESSING TIMES, PRESSURE, DATE PROCESSED, ELEVATION AND SOURCE OF USDA APPROVED RECIPE. (see below)

EXAMPLE:

Content: Green Beans Processing Methods: Dial-Gauge Pressure Canner Processing Time: 25 minutes @ 13lbs pressure

Your Elevation: 3,250 feet

SOURCE OF USDA APPROVED RECIPE: Ball Blue Book

- **E.** Use quart or pint jars for fruit, meat, pickles, juices or vegetables (except corn, which must be in pints), pint or half-pint jars for fish, jam and jellies.
- **F.** Appropriate head space recommended in jars:
 - 1/4 in. for jams and jellies
 - 1/2 in. for tomatoes, fruits, pickles
 - 1/2 in. to 1 in. for vegetables
 - 1 to 1-1/4 in. for meats

Up to date canning information is available in publications at the Elmore County Extension Office

DEHYDRATION GUIDELINES:



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

Elmore County Fair Youth Exhibitors General Rules and Regulations

- 1. The Fair Board reserves the right to refuse admittance or demand removal of any animal from the grounds which may endanger the public safety, health or standards and qualifications set forth by the Fair as determined by *Fair Management*.
- 2. The <u>animal care/welfare committee</u>, consisting of the Livestock Superintendent from each youth group, the Fair Manager, and a Fair Board Member, shall inspect each livestock barn on a daily basis to ensure that all animals have proper feed, water and clean surroundings.
- 3. The Fair Manager will assign stalls and pens. Stalls and pens will be assigned in the following order: 4-H/FFA and Open Class Show.
- Youth must be eight (8) years of age by January 1st, *of the current fair year*, to be assigned a stall or pen.
- Youth not of age, (8) years of age by January 1st, *of the current fair year*, are to arrive on the Fairgrounds the morning of their class and depart the same day.
- 6. No diseased stock will be assigned space on the Fairgrounds.
- 7. Classes can be changed or combined at the discretion of the *Fair Management*.

- 8. Exhibitors shall not attach evidence of previous awards to any animal or article prior to being judged.
- 9. Exhibitors shall furnish bedding and other feeds at his or her own expense.
- 10. Every Exhibitor of livestock is expected to keep his or her pens and stalls clean and sanitary. Stalls and pens must be cleaned by 10:00 am each day.
- 11. Exhibitors are responsible for knowing the hours of judging, parades, etc. Stock must be in the Show Ring for judging or for stock judging contest at the request of the Superintendent.
- 12. No animal is eligible for entry in both market and breeding classes.
- 13. 4-H/FFA members may sell only one livestock animal.
- 14. 4-H members may sell more then one livestock animal if each livestock project has been awarded with Grand or Reserve Grand Champion in their respective divisions.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person

for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show

officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Any violation of "The National Show Ring Code Of Ethics" or specific rules as designated by individual fairs and livestock shows will result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualification, and may result in probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation in organized livestock competition.

Possible civil penalties may be imposed by the proper authorities, based on evidence provided by the livestock show, of exhibitors in violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act or the animal mistreatment, neglect, and abandonment laws that apply on the local, state, and national levels.

The decision of the livestock show management will be final.

Other cooperating shows (The International Association of Fairs and Expositions, The American Livestock Show & Rodeo Managers Association, and Western Fairs Assn.) will be notified of the action taken by the show management, which may affect the eligibility of the individual, group, or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows who are

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also members of these organizations.

By making entry in a livestock show or event you are verifying you have read "The National Show Ring Code of Ethics" and understand the consequences of the penalties involved for illegal, unethical, inhumane, and unfair practices of competition. You also verify that you and your family may be prohibited from future participation in organized fairs and livestock shows in the United States, and could face possible criminal prosecution and/or civil penalties if implicated in any of the aforementioned acts.







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2023 Elmore County Fair and Rodeo Grand Marshals - Steve & Helen Percy

Stephen Hugh Percy II (Steve) was born June 1934 in Ventura, California, the second child to Eugene and Ruth Percy, and the 4th generation of the family in Ventura County. Steve grew up with his parents and older sister, Catherine, on their ranch on Hopper Mountain, which is now the California Condor Reserve. The ranch was located in a remote area accessible by eight miles of two-track road that had twenty-four creek crossings, which meant that it would wash out every winter and access frequently meant travel by foot or horse. The family maintained a cabin close to the highway which served as secondary quarters when the road washed out. Ruth home-schooled Catherine and Steve until they were in the 7th and 6th grades, respectively, and she then started teaching in Fillmore where they both attended school.

Steve initially attended Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, but eventually enrolled in the University of California at Davis, where his sister, Catherine, attended. Helen also enrolled at UCD, so that was an added attraction for Steve.

Helen was born in Flint, Michigan in 1934, eleven days before Steve was born. She is older sister of Joyce and Dan. The family lived on a farm outside of Flint, but moved to town when the WWII started and gas and tires were rationed. Soon thereafter, her father, Jim, enlisted in the Marines. Tired of the long Michigan winters, Helen's mother, Lois, moved her three children to Orange County, CA while Jim was in active duty in the South Pacific. She tipped a porter to get herself and the three kids on the train to California. The family lived in a fourteen-foot trailer in Newport Beach until Jim was released from the military hospital in San Diego after having been wounded in action.

Steve was a chaperon for his sister Catherine on a visit to her fiancée, and the three of them borrowed fishing gear from Helen's dad. Steve says it was love at first sight for him. Steve and Helen married between their junior and senior years at UCD, and Helen delivered twins, Amy and Jim, in March 1957. She dropped the class that was going to require lots of library time, but Steve graduated with a B.S. in animal sciences.

After graduation, Steve took a job on a ranch in Wyoming. When they arrived with the twins at their new house there wasn't any hot water, and the only stove was woodburning, but she managed for the time being. They didn't stay in Wyoming long; it snowed in June and again in September, which was just too much!

The next job Steve got was on a ranch in Arizona. He set off with a truckload of furniture and arrived at the Cowden Ranch outside of Seligman, Arizona to get the house ready for his family. Steve's dad helped Helen move the two babies with a car loaded down with all the miscellaneous stuff that didn't fit in the moving van.

Arizona was different. The ranch job included some colorful cowboys who were welcomed as family into Steve and Helen's little house. They knew when Helen was making pies, and they showed up for dinner on a regular basis, claiming that she should charge the company for meals.

In February 1959, Steve and Helen brought home their third child, Catherine. Despite a couple of harrowing trips to Prescott on snowy roads, this was their "take her home now" child as compared to Amy and Jim who had arrived two and a half months early and had to share an incubator for one week of their monthlong stay.

When Catherine was two months old, Steve took a job with a ranch in Northern California near Alturas. The work was hard and the hours were long. Helen milked the cow and hauled water to the chickens, as well as doing other chores around the place while caring for three small children. One cowboy gave Steve a bad time about feeding the baby when he got home every night. Steve's reply went something like this: "My wife has done all the other chores when I get home and it's a pleasure to spend time with my child."

Ranch work wasn't turning out the way Steve had imagined, so he and Helen decided to return to Fillmore. Steve got a job teaching 4th and then 5th grade at the local school, and he thrived in that environment. Weekends were spent on the family ranch on Hopper Mountain, where the children learned to value the outdoors in a beautiful and remote setting. Steve's mother, Ruth was still teaching English at the local high school, so Helen helped out on the ranch when Gene needed a hand. Helen learned to ride, bale hay, and drive a tractor, among other ranch work.

Once all three children were in school full time, Helen went back to finish her BA in History at UCLA. She commuted from Fillmore to Westwood three times a week for about a year. As soon as she had finished her degree, the school district offered her a Kindergarten teaching job at the little town of Piru. Helen took over a neglected classroom that had blocks that were so old and ill-cared for that they had splinters. But she soon had things put in order, and spent almost thirty years teaching in a community that was predominantly Hispanic. Helen learned Spanish, enrolling in an



immersion program that meant spending the summer in Mexico, in order to be able to communicate with the parents of her students without using an interpreter.

Meanwhile, Steve had finished his Master of Animal Science during degree summer sessions at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. He taught high school agriculture classes in Fillmore including welding, tractor driving and maintenance, and animal science. After the Santa Clara River flooded Fillmore's nine-hole golf course in 1970, Steve leased the land and then subleased it to the school district and the Fillmore School Farm was born. Using his contacts throughout the area. Steve acquired equipment and buildings for the school farm, which eventually developed swine units, sheep units, and steer units in which the local

FFA students could house their animals. Parts of the property raised hay, while other parts were used for a Senior Citizen Garden. Using a bond issue, the school district eventually purchased the property outright. Much of the campaigning for the bond issue was done by FFA students who went door to door promoting it.

After Steve's parents sold Hopper Mountain Ranch in 1968 and moved to the house next door to Steve and Helen outside of Fillmore, Steve started running some cattle on his own. He leased land behind Elkins Ranch Golf Course, and ran steers there during the spring and early summer before sending them off to market. A long-time friend and fellow teacher. Helen Morris, introduced Steve to her future husband, Morrie Caldwell. Morrie

owned a number of profitable truck stops and had some other business interests that left him with spare cash, so he proposed that he and Steve become partners in the cattle business. Morrie wanted to learn about ranching, and his was the motivation behind the PerCal cattle company. Steve and Morrie's partnership thrived, moving first from Elkins Ranch Rancho Sespe to of Fillmore, west and then expanding to the Tapo Ranch, a 10,000-acre ranch just north of Simi Valley in Ventura County. After several years of ranching on the Tapo Ranch, and enduring drought, fire, and the constant pressure from а growing

population in the valley, the mega-corporation that owned the ranch decided that they weren't renewing PerCal's lease. Suddenly, Steve and Morrie were faced with making a big decision. Do you sell all the cows and call it good? Or do you move? Steve had been scouting for ranches to buy for a few years prior to this event, but now it was time to make a decision.

After looking at ranches in eastern Oregon and other parts of the west, Steve came to Idaho to look at the Long Tom Ranch. He fell in love for the second time in his life when he visited Long Tom Valley. He went back to his motel room and called Helen to tell her that he'd found the right one. Helen's teaching career was still in full swing, and she hadn't planned to retire for a few more years when she got

the news about the new ranch having been located. But. after visiting it herself, she acquiesced and in February 1989 they flew to Idaho to close escrow on the ranch. Their son, Jim, was working for PerCal at the time, so he moved up to Idaho first to start mending fences and getting to know the area. Jim and his then wife, Deb, and son, Stephen had to live down the road at Knudsen's place because there was only one house on the ranch. Steve and Jim worked side by side for several years, rebuilding corrals, building new fence lines, and developing water sources for the cows. Helen went back to teaching as the reading specialist and head teacher for Bruneau Elementary School. Stephen grew up on the ranch, and

he learned to ride and work cows alongside his father and grandfather, just as they had learned from their fathers.

Steve was active in the Cattlemen's California Association, the Ventura County Cattlemen's Association. the Farm Bureau, and the California Fire and Watershed Council when they lived in Fillmore. Upon moving to Mountain Idaho, Home. Steve immediately became active in the Idaho Cattlemen's Association, eventually serving in various offices for the Owyhee Cattlemen's Association. Steve served on the Farm Bureau Board, the Mountain Home Economic Development Council, and the Elmore County Fair Board. He spent many volunteer hours improving the facilities at the



Elmore County Fairgrounds, including installing electrical wiring systems for the sheep barn. He served as a consultant for the Optimist youth for the steers they raised for the fair, and he made the ranch available for Optimist events throughout the years. Jim and Steve worked with the BLM, the State of Idaho, and the Boise Valley Fly Fishermen's organization to install fences throughout Long Tom Valley to protect riparian areas along Long Tom Creek.

Eventually, Jim decided to return to his nursing career, which he had interrupted to work on the ranch in Simi Valley. Steve hired various help over the years until his niece, Rebecca, married Charles Lyons, who was working for Simplot as a cowboy. Rebecca and Charles moved to the ranch in 1998 and raised their two children. Henry and Alice, there. As Steve says, he still had great ideas of what improvements to make, but his body wasn't in full agreement anymore with the schedule. Charles provided the youth and enthusiasm that was needed. Over time, Henry and Alice became members of the crew, too.

In 2013 Steve, Helen, and Charles worked together with the BLM, Forest Service, and State of Idaho to form Idaho's first Rural Fire Protection Association (RFPA), designed to use ranchers and their resources in the area as the first line of defense in fighting wildland fires. Hours were spent around the table in Steve and Helen's house with the various agency representatives and local ranchers working out the details. They modeled the organization after the Eastern Oregon RFPA, and wildland fire damage has decreased dramatically as a result of the combined efforts, and now

Idaho has ten other RFPAs. Now Steve and Helen enjoy sitting by the woodstove in their earth shelter home, watching videos on their of their iPhones great granddaughter, Ada, learning to walk. Their daughter, Amy and her husband, Kit, live in San Diego where Amy teaches school. Amy and Kit's son. Thomas and his wife, Amy, also live in San Diego where Thomas works as an architect. Thomas and Amy will become parents this summer, bringing the great-grandchild count to six with the births of their son and their daughter. Amy and Kit's daughter, Anne works as an accountant and lives in Lodi, CA with her husband Marcus and their daughter Ada. Steve and Helen's son. Jim. lives in Boise with his wife, Ardella, and he continues to work as an RN at St Luke's in the pediatric intensive care unit. Jim's son Stephen lives with his wife and two youngest daughters in Central Point, Oregon where he works as an equipment operator for a fire suppression company and trims trees in the offseason. Stephen's eldest daughter, Jordan, is a student at Lewis-Clark State College. majoring in culinary arts. After trading in a successful career as a CPA for the life of a high school English teacher at Bennett Mountain School, Steve and Helen's youngest daughter. Cate, now lives with her husband, Rob, and their menagerie on the ranch. Over the years, Steve and

Over the years, Steve and Helen have given tirelessly to their community, to their family, and to the land they call home.

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
