Considerate Parking Please

Please be respectful to the residents who live near to school on the estate. It had been reported last term that parents were parking in front of garages and blocking driveways. Please park with consideration to the local residents on Keward Estate and Keward Walk.



We have also had concerns raised last year regarding the speed that some cars drive into Keward Walk. Please slow down and be very mindful that a lot of children from both juniors and infants are walking in this area.

Attendance and Punctuality

This year we will be continuing to focus heavily on good attendance and punctuality. It is vital that your child is in school each day and on time.

Reporting an absence

If your child is too ill to attend school, please contact the school office before 9.30am with full details of your child's illness/symptoms. If we do not hear from you, we will call or text you to find out why your child is not in school. If we are unable to make contact and you do not provide a reason for your child's absence, this absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

It is extremely important that children arrive promptly at school ready to begin the day's lessons with the rest of the child's class. Arriving late can be very distressing

for the child who is late and disruptive for both the teacher and the rest of the class. When children arrive late they miss vital teaching time and the main introduction to the learning for the day. This has a detrimental effect on a child's learning.

Persistent Absence

Persistent absence is defined by the Government as attendance below 90%. This equates to 19 days or more of absence a year.

If you are having difficulty with attendance or punctuality please come in and speak to us and we will do everything we can to help.

Snowdon class will be the first class to receive tuition and I know they are really looking forward to it.

Swimming will start on Tuesday 19 September and will continue until 28th November.


The first 2 classes to start swimming will be Alps and Pyrenees. Parents in these classes will receive further information via Parentmail.
