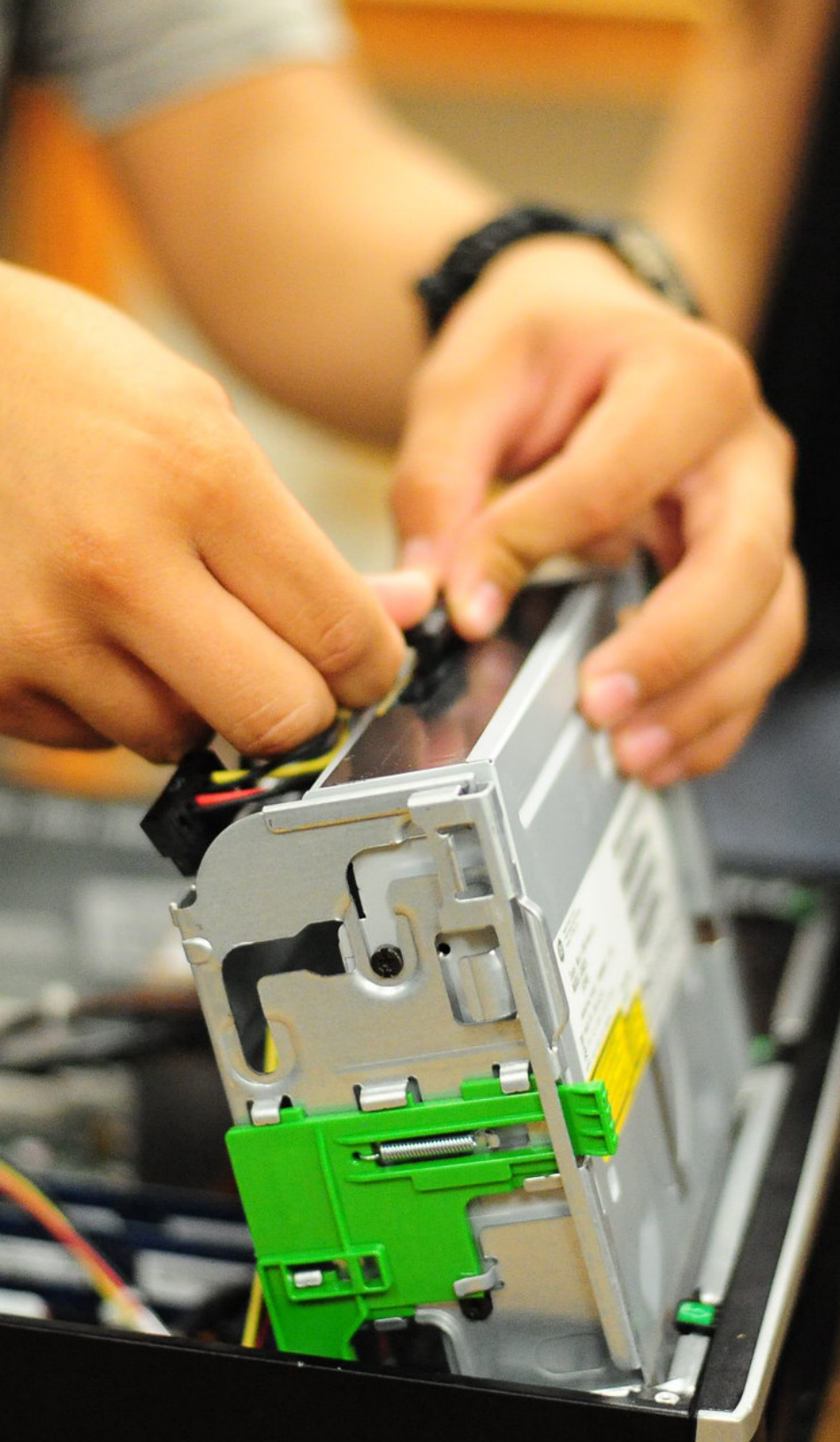

The extraordinary generosity of our donors allowed us to expand our reach into even more underserved communities. We're now delivering programs in 38 cities and 17 states.

We have made tremendous progress in producing immediate help to urgent digital inclusion challenges across the country. We connected our first-ever households to our own network and built a national support center that is laying the groundwork for digital life services that will work hand in hand with our community partners to ensure families have the vetted resources they need at their fingertips. In addition to introducing the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), we've connected more than 500 households to our very own network. Adding connectivity and the support center has positioned Compudopt as the largest and only nonprofit in the country with a complete digital equity solution that delivers all services at no cost to the families who participate.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT:

Compudopt Connected



Our solution to **getting households connected** to free or low-cost high-speed internet.

In 2022, we launched Compudopt Connected to help families we serve access the wealth of content, knowledge, and resources available online. This program supports families by helping them register for the Affordable Connectivity Program and sign up for a high-speed internet plan with a major carrier that's mostly, if not fully, subsidized through federal benefits.

For low-income families who are not eligible, comfortable, or otherwise under-connected, we've created Compudopt Connect, offering high speed service at no cost.

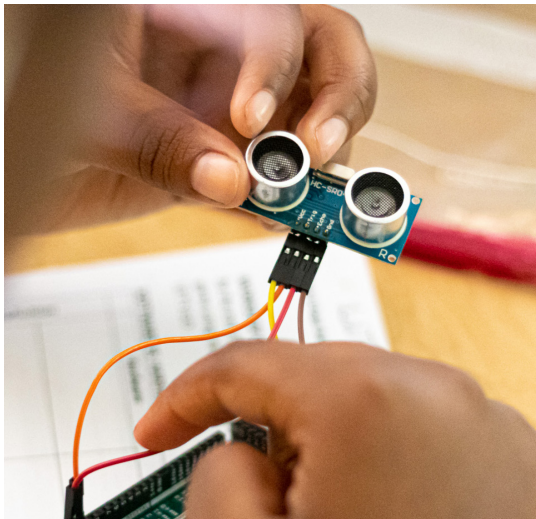
Device Access Program

In 2022, we distributed 20,847 computers to families through our drive-thru computer distribution program.

Access to devices provides more than just an opportunity for e-learning. It helps the success and future of the whole family. With a computer in the home, parents can search for jobs and pay bills online, family members can attend telehealth appointments, and relatives can be together virtually for the holidays. The ultimate benefit of technology access is the facilitation of connection.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT:

Technology Education & Support

Free technology programs that incite curiosity around learning!

Digital Literacy: The Compudopt Digital Skills Builder Program is a digital literacy program to help students of all ages navigate their way around both computers and the internet.

Technology Education: Through our free signature programs, Compudopt offers workforce-relevant, project-based tech education sessions for youth up to age 26. **All program participants who complete 80% of the program receive a free laptop.**

Support Center: Compudopt employs Digital Navigators to offer free tech support for those who have received refurbished computers, need help getting connected to the internet, or need support accessing high-quality, vetted technology resources.

Community Portal: We know that for many of the families we serve, the barriers they face go beyond the digital divide. We built the community portal to offer individuals in-home access to vetted, localized support to meet some of these other needs; these include but are not limited to housing, childcare, additional education, healthcare, and food insecurity.

ECO-FRIENDLY SOLUTIONS:

Device Donation Program

Providing new purpose to repurposed computers!

Each year **6.9 million tons of e-waste** are produced in the US and 80% of e-waste ends up in landfills, leaching toxic metals into the environment.

Since Compudopt was founded in 2007, we have kept over 665.8 tons of waste out of the landfills through our programs and recycling partnerships.

In 2022 alone, we recycled or reused over 110 tons of equipment.

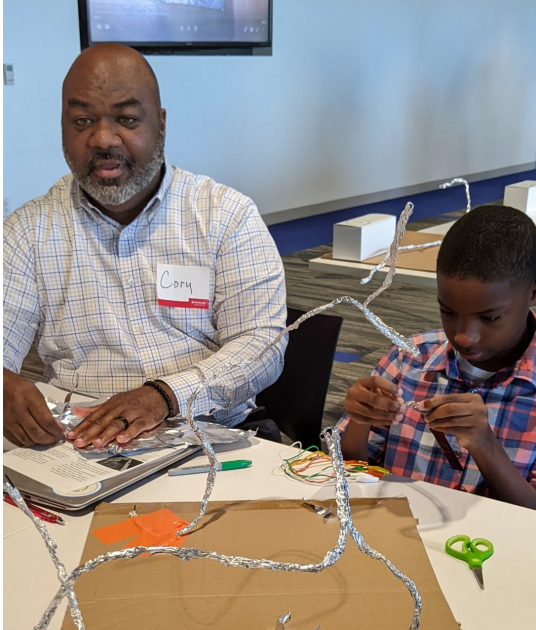

Transformational Partnership

The digital divide is a solvable problem, but we can't do it alone. In 2022, we announced a transformational partnership with **Santander Consumer USA** to achieve digital equity and increase economic mobility in high-need communities over the next few years. Santander Consumer USA's **\$35M investment** will enable us to impact thousands of community members across the country. Launching first in Dallas, this gift will support five cities where we will provide 7,500 computers, connect 10,000 households, offer 24,000 residents digital literacy courses, and 300 students workforce-aligned tech education programs.
