Device Access

Compudopt provides refurbished computers at no cost to families in need. Each participant receives a free laptop to support their education and career pathways. These devices are a valuable tool for our recipients to empower themselves while connecting with their communities. **In 2024, Compudopt distributed 45,170 devices across 25 states, impacting hundreds of thousands of lives for the better.**

Through the generous support of many organizations and individuals, **Compudopt received 25,717 laptops and desktops through gift-in-kind contributions in 2024.** In addition to providing a valuable outlet for device retirements, Compudopt also offers a comprehensive IT asset disposition service to our partners and donors. Our device donation program is designed to reduce the amount of e-waste potentially created by promoting reuse through our programs and engaging in responsible recycling with our R2-certified partners. Every donated computer that our staff refurbishes saves enough money to provide six families with Compudopt services, maximizing the impact of each contribution. **In 2024 alone, we recycled 246,820 pounds of e-waste, actively reducing the environmental impact of discarded electronics.**

Digital Life Services

Technical Support Services

Compudopt provides ongoing technical support to help families successfully navigate the digital world. Through our Community Support Center, we offer a dedicated support line that handled nearly **60,000 calls last year**, ensuring families remain connected and equipped to use their technology effectively. Live interpreters enhance our support in up to 26 languages.

Digital Life Fairs

In Spring of 2024, Compudopt launched Digital Life Fairs to provide an opportunity for individuals and families to connect with meaningful organizations offering valuable local resources. **Serving over 5,000 individuals**, these events proved to be an eye-opening experience for many. One attendee shared, **"I loved the informative event for me and my family, a way to expand our minds toward the future."** Others emphasized the impact of the resources provided. **"I loved the organization and the resources offered that I didn't know existed,"** said one participant, while another noted, **"They gave me a lot of information and resources I didn't know about."**



Connectivity

As an independent ISP, we provide free high-speed internet to households in under-connected communities, ensuring reliable access for school, work, and daily life. Alongside our strong partnerships with major providers like AT&T, Comcast, and T-Mobile, we collaborate to expand connectivity options. Through these joint efforts, we deliver free internet access to those who need it most.

In 2024, Compudopt successfully connected over 15,000 households to free internet. To expand access, we developed a targeted text outreach initiative to ship internet solutions to families previously served with devices. One parent shared, ***“It has helped my son to do all his homework on time and having the free internet helps him a lot. We are very appreciative of this program. Thank you so much for the computer and for checking up on us.”*** Another family expressed how transformative this support has been for their children’s education: ***“The main benefit for my family is that my kids have their own computer to do their schoolwork. Before, they had to stay after school or go to the library, and sometimes that wasn’t possible. Now there is no worry about completing assignments because not only do they have a computer, but we also have home internet too thanks to you. We are so appreciative of this. Thank you very much.”***



Tech Education

Compudopt is committed to empowering individuals through our tech education programs.

Our programs serve learners of all ages, equipping them with essential digital skills to thrive in school, work, and daily life. Introducing learners to futures they may never have imagined.

Tiny Techs

A STEAM program for grades 1-2 where students explore technology and computational thinking through hands-on activities inspired by zoo-keeping.

Early Adopters

An after-school enrichment program for grades 3-5, teaching students to design virtual reality worlds and code using Scratch and MakeCode.

STEAM Team

A mystery-themed enrichment program for grades 6-8, using MakeCode and robotics to solve an interactive art heist.

Learn2Earn

A program for grades 9-12 that builds tangible technology and workforce skills, including coding, hardware, and web design.

Pathways

A workforce development program for ages 16-26 that provides hands-on training, career exploration, and placement support in high-demand technology fields.

Digital Skills Builder

A digital literacy program for learners of all ages offering both self-paced videos and trainer-led lessons on computer and internet safety, job searches, and daily digital tasks.

The team partnered with The Covenant House Shelter to provide laptops and internet to homeless youth, offering critical opportunities for education, employment, and stability. Through strategic partnerships and targeted outreach, the Atlanta team provided essential resources and skills to underserved families, creating pathways for long-term success.

In 2024, Compudopt Chicago distributed devices across zip codes, addressing the digital divide in low-income communities. Partnerships with organizations like AT&T and the Daniel Murphy Scholarship Fund were instrumental in providing technology access.

Programs such as Women in Tech inspired youth to explore STEM careers, with participants and their families expressing gratitude for the transformative opportunities. Compudopt Chicago continued to expand its efforts, further cementing its commitment to digital opportunity and empowerment.

Program Spotlight | Dallas



In Dallas, 2024 was marked by the expansion of connectivity programs, including the distribution of high-speed internet devices to families in need. The back-to-school initiative, in partnership with AT&T, equipped families with computers and internet, significantly enhancing students' academic performance and parents' ability to work remotely.

In 2024, a key highlight in Dallas was the expansion of our connectivity program, which provided 335 internet access devices to eligible families. A major milestone occurred in July during our back-to-school initiative, allowing families who had previously received computers through our program to access free internet service.



In December, just before Christmas, we distributed another 175 devices, keeping families connected during the holidays. This access helped students stay on top of schoolwork and allowed parents to work from home.

Compudopt Houston made significant strides in 2024 through its core programs: Device Access, Connectivity, Workforce-Aligned Education, and Digital Life Services. After Hurricane Beryl, the Houston team partnered with local organizations to provide laptops and internet access to displaced families, helping them rebuild.

Educational programs exceeded expectations, with initiatives fostering interest in science and technology. The holistic approach to digital inclusion, combined with strong community and corporate partnerships, ensured Compudopt Houston could expand its impact and support families in achieving stability and growth.

Seth, a Pathways program student at 8 Million Stories, began with limited tech knowledge but finished with skills in cybersecurity, networking, and professional tools like email and resume creation. Gaining confidence, he now aspires to a career as an ethical hacker.

Our Program Manager, Keown Keys, found Seth's progress "particularly gratifying." The day after the cohort graduation, Seth completed his GED exam.



In 2024, Compudopt Mesa completed its first full year of programs, solidifying its role as a trusted community partner. Highlights included the grand opening celebration, which brought together the Mesa City Council, community partners, and residents, as well as the inaugural Digital Life Fair, which provided access to devices, digital literacy resources, and STEAM education.

Charles, one recipient of a laptop, overcame unemployment by securing a job, demonstrating the life-changing impact of technology access. Compudopt Mesa also ensured connectivity for households through our partnership with the city of Mesa and distributed high-speed internet devices, ensuring continuity for families after the Affordable Connectivity Program ended.

In its first year, Compudopt San Antonio made an impact through initiatives like the Digital Life Fair, which connected families with devices, digital literacy resources, and community services. Many families gained internet access and devices, opening new doors for their children's education and the parents' job opportunities.

Over the year, events and partnerships with organizations amplified the reach of their programs. With a focus on collaboration, Compudopt San Antonio strengthened its foundation to create lasting change for underserved families.

Program Spotlight

National

In 2024, our National team achieved key milestones in connectivity, partnerships, and organizational growth. Highlights include launching our San Antonio site and connecting 1,200 households to free internet.

One of our most impactful interventions this year was delivered in partnership with AT&T, resulting in the distribution of over 21,000 devices across all of our national pop up sites and site locations. This initiative significantly expanded digital access for students, families, and community members, ensuring that more individuals had the tools necessary to stay connected, learn, and work remotely. Additionally, the partnership included digital literacy resources and technical support, empowering recipients to make the most of their new devices.
