

**FR. MARK DAVIS Coming to St. Mary Catholic Church, Vermilion, OH.**



Fr. Mark Davis is in his 25th year of pastoral service in the Diocese of Toledo. A native of South Toledo, Fr. Mark was educated at OLPH, St. John Jesuit, and the University of Notre Dame. He has always enjoyed sports, music, entertainment, and being with all kinds of people. While in high school, he shared and learned about faith with people of disabilities and worked for the New Jersey Department of Human Services in Trenton for 9 years.

During that time, he started the Office of Community Education, which helped people understand more about individuals with disabilities through puppets (“The Kids on the Block”), skits and other interactive programs. Being interested in the art of illusion since he was five, Fr. Mark has learned to share about God and our faith through stories, songs, jokes, magic effects, balloons, and just about anything.

Raised by loving and devoted Catholic parents, who were both converts to that faith, Fr. Mark was also blessed with wonderful Baptist grandparents in West Virginia, who had a profound effect on his religious education and spiritual development.

Fr. Mark studied psychology and philosophy in college and started a master’s in counseling during his time in New Jersey. His innate curiosity about human nature, how the world works, and emotional health led him to begin his theological studies at St. Meinrad Seminary (Southern Indiana) in 1991. Ordained in 1996, Fr. Mark was an Associate Pastor in Sandusky (Sts. Peter and Paul), Maumee (St. Joseph), and Sylvania (St. Joseph). He just enjoyed a twelve-year run as Pastor of St. Aloysius in Bowling Green.

Having grown up on Copland Blvd. across from the “old” Beverly school, Fr. Mark feels very blessed to be “back in the neighborhood” and closer to Wixey Bakery again!

# From the Heart of Deacon John

Friends, Lent is like Noah's 40 days of rain, the 40 days the Jewish people spent in the wilderness after leaving Egypt, and Jesus' 40 days in the desert. Why then, is Lent 44 days from Ash Wednesday to Holy Thursday. Lent used to begin on the first Sunday of Lent, also called Quadragesima and ended on the evening of Holy Thursday. If you count the days from the first Sunday of Lent to Holy Thursday, you come up with forty. Over time, the appreciation that Sundays during Lent should not be fast days. Sundays are the Lord's Day, a Sabbath Day, and a day of rest. If Lent started the first Sunday of Lent, and Sundays didn't count as days of fasting, this would make less than forty days before Easter. The resolution was to start Lent on Ash Wednesday and allow for the Lenten fast to conclude with Easter Vigil, therefore giving us forty days for fasting before Easter.

We all have heard by now that Lent is not just about giving up something, not eating meat on Friday, and fasting. Lent is a great time to climb down off our high perches (my mom would say "come down off your high horse and join the rest of us peasants"), examine our lives, and see where we might not be living up to our true potential as Children of God, where we need to focus more to stay faithful, and where there might be something controlling our actions rather than creating space for God in our lives. We should embrace this season as a time for radical transformation. Our Lenten observances of pilgrimages, scripture reading, **prayer, fasting, and almsgiving** are meant to help us with this as we make our pilgrimage to Holy Week and the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ.

As we move into Lent, we should hold onto the word **FAITH**. Faith is an attitude of trust. We can look at Abraham, the Father of Faith. God appeared to him and told him "Get up and go on a dangerous desert trek to a land that I will show you." My first reaction would be, "Holy Crap." Then after a moment, I would realize this is not an ordinary adventure, this is a God Adventure! Abraham is asked to go on a perilous journey to a land he has never seen. Abraham's adventurous life is marked by faith. You see, Abraham's faith had an attitude of trust. He does not know where he is going. He does not have a map. He is not in control. But Abraham trusts. That is the basic meaning of faith. We have an Adventurous God!

Let's compare Abraham with Adam for a moment. Adam, at the moment of truth didn't trust God's word, he didn't want the adventure. He wanted to be in control of every aspect of his life and wanted to be in power. At the moment of truth, he didn't want to turn his life over to an Adventurous God.

But God, throughout Sacred Scriptures, refuses to be controlled. God always calls upon his people to a life of adventure, a life of faith. Remember, faith is an attitude of trust. Faith is a pilgrimage with an adventurous God. We are entering into the desert with Jesus for forty days and forty nights. We have left our place of comfort and control to join Jesus in fasting and prayer. We have cast aside the drudgery of the mundane to embrace the adventure of faith. We do not know where our lives are going. We do not have a map or compass other than the light of faith.

Brothers and Sisters, our Lenten Adventure is taking us to our Easter Hope. How we get there is through faith, an attitude of trust, and a **Sense of Adventure**. We are always in danger of being tempted to stay in a place where we can control the sacred mysteries, control our religion, and control our relationship with God. Religion then becomes empty of mystery, absent of faith, and devoid of adventure. This God Adventure is so Amazing!





## What is the ACA?

## A Message from Father Paul

By now, many of you know that this year's Lent starts off with a unique pairing in 2024. This year, Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day! At first glance, you might be thinking, "How do chocolates, flowers and ashes mix together? How does one fast on a day where one usually takes their loved one out for a special romantic dinner?" Well, the short answer is: All things are possible with God!

As most wines can be paired with almost any type of food, I think that we can find a lot of similarities and pairings between both the celebration of Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day.

- We are called to both human and divine love – which is reflected in both in the Church and in our human relationships and families. Each celebration is an opportunity to love more!
- St. Valentine was a third century martyr who comforted other Christian martyrs who were being persecuted by the Roman Empire. He also endured suffering and death out of love of his faith.
- We take the time during the 40 days of Lent, (starting with Ash Wednesday,) to pray, fast and give alms – for the purpose of focusing on the Crucifixion of Jesus – His great act of love for us!
- Couples on their wedding day realize that their marriage includes living out and experiencing the sacrificial love of Christ on the cross – a cross that their spouse shares with them.
- "Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails."

(1 Corinthians 13:7-8)

I myself do not mind the challenge of fasting and abstaining both on a holiday and liturgical day. After all, my bride is the Church, and as a priest, I am always looking for more ways to love, protect and serve the spousal Church that Christ gave us. Summed up in the Catholic Catechism: "*The image of the Church coming forth from the pierced side of Christ on the Cross is compared to Eve coming forth from the sleeping side of Adam. This mirrors the image of the Church as the Spouse of Christ – the Church formed wholly by the self-giving sacrifice of Christ, i.e., by Christ's love.* §766

Sometimes I need to remind myself that I am ordained a priest to be Christ for others, and as such, I need to show His love for the Church – His spouse. On Ash Wednesday and throughout Lent, I look for additional ways to enter into Christ's sacrificial love by sharing my time, talent and treasure in different ways in my ministry at St. Mary Church.

Father Leo Patalinghug, who has a cooking show on the Catholic channel, EWTN, knows a thing or two about making a good Lenten meal, and he sees no conflict in the Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day overlap. Instead, he views it as a great teaching moment.

He says that the overlap of days is a "special providence of God" because it can offer a deeper sense of what love really means — which at times requires sacrifice. "Love is not just sweets and chocolates. You can have chocolate cake anytime." As he sees it, the bigger lesson is to think about "going without and where that will lead you. So often people treat love like fast food when love — and all things of God — take time," he added.


He said this Valentine's Day couples have the "perfect day to start Lent and to have that discussion of what love means." And, they can also have a modest meal that is delicious. Overall, it's "absolutely a win-win," he noted because couples can have a "Lent appropriate menu" essentially infused with the day's reminder "to know humbly we are from dust."

May you be able to celebrate God's love for humanity this Ash Wednesday/Valentine's Day!

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### **Lenten Observances & Regulations**

**Fasting:** Ages 18 through 59 on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and Good Friday March 29, limiting themselves to one full meal each day, with no solids between meals.

**Abstinence:** Catholics ages 14 and older abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays in Lent.
