into a mother's heart a compassion that drives her to sacrifice for her children.

Addictions and self-destructive behaviors inhibit healthy mother-child bonding. Perhaps your mother modeled selfish-parenting instead of compassion-driven parenting. Allow God to search your heart. Confess what needs to be confessed so that healing can come. Repent of any selfishness and destructive ways that caused harm to your child. Turn to hope and life in Christ and agree to begin again as a godly parent.

There is unexplainable power in sacrificial love. As we let Christ transform us, we learn to love our children wholeheartedly and sacrificially. We love them with a love that heals and builds up.

We all have things we wish we could have done differently. In silent prayer, lay these things down at the feet of Jesus.

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. —Romans 8:1

How might Romans 8:1 encourage you as you take steps to exchange temporary pleasures for eternal treasures?

And He said to all, "If anyone would come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow Me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will save it." - Luke 9:23-24

1. Do I withhold my love from my child (or others) when they do not perform the way I want them to?

2. What sacrifices am I willing to make to invest in my child?

3. Have I set my child (or others) up to fulfill me? Do I attempt to live vicariously through my child?

4. Do I communicate with my child in a way that cultivates trust, honesty and security?

5. Is it evident to my child that I regularly take steps to improve who I am and to grow in Christlikeness?

Hannah's Sacrifice: Hannah understood that in God's economy, sacrifice and selflessness yield life and hope.

Reread 1 Samuel 1:21-28.

- Hannah got what she prayed for, so we have a nice happy ending, right? Isn't that what praying is all about? Getting what we want?
- ♦ Have you ever been guilty of treating God like your servant?

Many of us treat God like a servant. We want Him involved in our lives only as long as it suits our plans. But that is not who God is—Hannah knew this. She wanted God's way more than her own.

How long do you think it took Hannah to accept the Lord's plan? Did she try to make a deal or offer some other option?

Hannah knew that to serve God meant to submit to God. Submission to God is an admission of trust. You give up control of your life because you know God has your best interest in mind and you can trust Him to work things out for your good and for His glory. His way is always right, even if you can't fully see the rightness of it sometimes.

Put yourself in Hannah's situation. God has asked something of you that you did not like! How will you (and how did you) respond?
