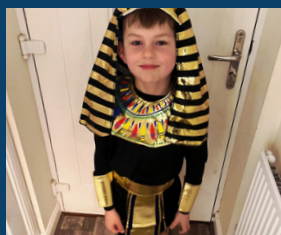
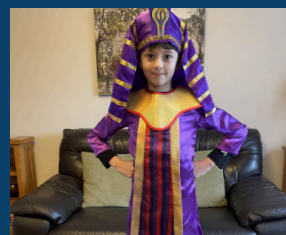
## Budding Young Bakers

## Caring Citizens

Pupils explored how they can make a positive contribution to their community through a range of activities. Highlights included an engaging assembly from The Wombles on the environmental responsibility of keeping our community clean, tidy, and safe; a visit to Hazard Alley for Y3 to learn vital lessons about personal safety, community awareness, and responsible decision-making; and Safer Internet Day learning how to stay safe online and make positive digital choices.



## Effective Communicators

Fifteen Y5 pupils were selected to present their writing at the Telling Tales event at the University of Northampton. They were praised for their exceptional behaviour, enthusiasm, and confidence with which they shared their work – reflecting the strength of the Talk for Writing approach. World Book Day was another highlight, with classrooms buzzing with storytelling, character discussions, and a shared love of reading across the school. Y2 children presented a fabulous assembly all about Ramadan, sharing what they've learned with their parents and carers.



## Expert Learners

Learning was brought to life through a range of hands-on learning experiences. Y4 explored Northampton's modern railway station and the historic Lamport Steam Railway. These visits helped deepen their understanding of how the Industrial Revolution shaped the local area. Y1 pupils visited MK Museum to explore toys from the past, linking directly to their history learning. They loved comparing what they saw to modern toys and were fascinated by the changes over time. The whole school enjoyed Number Day, with maths challenges, games, puzzles, and problem-solving activities which created a joyful buzz of learning.



## Aspirational Thinkers

Y5 pupils who attended the Telling Tales Event and the Dan Freedman Author Day embodied what it means to be aspirational. Sharing their writing at the University of Northampton, speaking confidently to academics, and being inspired by a published author encouraged them to dream big, set goals, and believe in their potential. Pupils in Y4,5,6 had the chance to shine with specialist cricket coaching where they demonstrated ambition, focus and growing confidence in their sporting abilities.



## Healthy Individuals

Y6 girls, after several weeks of dedicated rugby coaching from Northampton Saints, competed in a Rugby Festival against local schools. Children from SLP were also represented at various sporting events, including an archery competition and the KS2 winter games. Y5 children were busy out on the roads in the Spring Boroughs, taking part in their bikeability course.
