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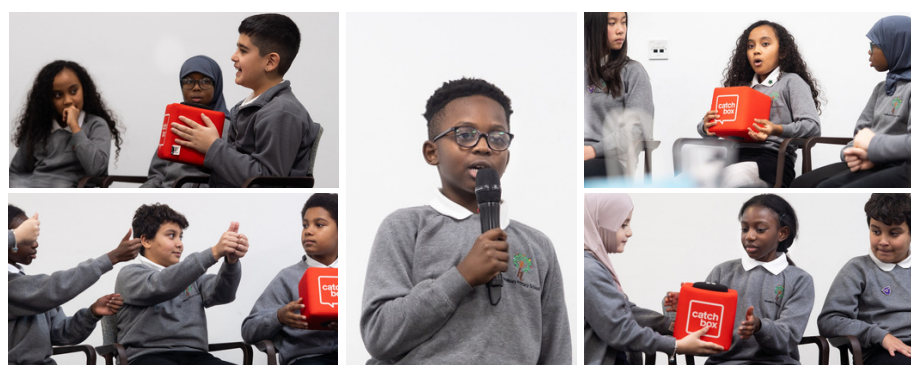

Message from the CEO

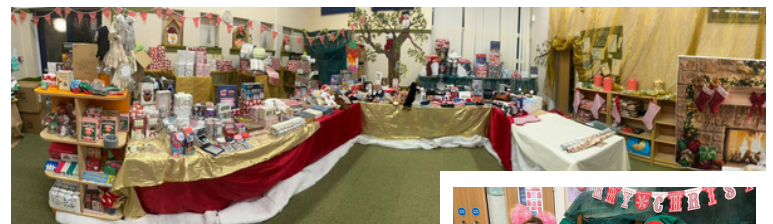

Lots of Trips Supporting Learning

Y6 visited Bletchley Park to extend their understanding of codebreaking and World War II. Y4 visited Castle Hill Church and the Gurdwara as part of their learning about different faiths. Y1 carried out a local area study, and Y5 completed a one-night residential with a focus on outdoor and adventurous activities. Y3 enjoyed a Pantomime at the theatre and SLP were really proud to take the Pupil Parliament children to visit the Houses of Parliament. They had the opportunity to meet and interview MP Lucy Rigby, who was so impressed by the children and is very keen to visit the school in the future.

SLP welcomed a number of visitors who supported learning across phases. Nursery received a visit from local police officers, who shared information about their role and allowed pupils to explore the police vehicle. Y2 had a Victorian Day, with experts in school to lead.
