Suggest that they sit down with family members, their spouse, or close friends and initiate a genuine conversation about how to love one another uniquely. You/they might start by reading the passage:

"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. . . It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no records of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth, it always protects, always trusts, always hopes, and always perseveres" (1 Corinthians 13:4–7).

The diagnostic questions on the next page will help put a practical perspective on what loving our family and friends might look like. There are many good answers to each question, but we've provided a few to get you thinking. We've offered one possibility for each question, but they're not in order.



First, match the question on love with the answers we've suggested.

- 1. How can I show you that I am patient?
- 2. How can I show you special kindness?
- 3. How can I show you that I am not envious?
- 4. How can I show you that I am not trying to impress you?
- 5. How can I show you that I am not proud?
- 6. How can I show you that you are more important to me than I am to myself?
- 7. How can I show you that I am not defensive?
- 8. How can I show you that I have the memory of an offense?
- 9. How can I show you that I am not delighting in your defeat?
- 10. How can I show you that I am happy when you make difficult but right decisions?

- By not reminding you of your past failures
- By being helpful to you during sickness or disappointment
- By understanding the struggle and praising your standard
- By not sharing your defeats with others
- By not getting irritated when you don't understand me
- By not reacting when you show me I am wrong
- By making your personal needs a priority in my schedule
- By not promoting my own skills or accomplishments but praising the efforts of others
- By treating you as I would want to be treated
- By telling others how God is working through you

Secondly, ask each person to provide individual answers to the questions above. Listen carefully to how you might demonstrate this attribute of love for them. Remember, this is your chance to listen to how you might love each person better.

Lastly, you might also take turns sharing about times when a family member has exhibited this aspect of love.

End your family time with a prayer: Ask God to help you "do" 1 Corinthians 13 and love your family and friends in the ways you've discovered during this discussion.
