The annual SCACA clinic is a time to learn, exchange ideas & renew lasting friendships

Greenville—With nearly 8,000 SCACA coaches pre-registered for the annual “Coaches Clinic”, under-way between July 27-30 at the Greenville Convention Center, the start of the 2025-2026 school year is about to begin.

Time to jam the torpedoes and forge full speed ahead!

The process of learning is a never-ending endeavor. The late **John McKissick** would come to the clinic, sit on the front row, listen carefully, and take notes; clinging to every word that came out of the speaker’s mouths.

Dabo Swinney once commented, “I am a brand-new head coach at **Clemson**, and I am at the Coaches Clinic giving a talk about Clemson football. There in the front row sits John McKissick taking notes, as if every word I spoke had relevance to him. Moments like that, you don’t forget.”

Coaches gather at the clinic from all 46 counties in South Carolina. They represent over 350 high schools and middle schools, and they traveled roads to get to the clinic this writer has also been down many times, in a 40-year crusade in search of future first round NFL picks, WNBA picks, etc. Sometimes even getting to take note on a second stringer, working hard to be a first stringer, who caught my eye as I noted their name on a yellow legal pad, that reminds me of where I’ve been.

Have you ever visited Gaddy’s Mill, or been to the town of Silver? How many of you coaches road by the famous Peach on I-85 passing through Gaffney on your way to “Clinic Land”. Have you ever climbed on the famous Angel Oak tree on Johns Island, where I lived for a few years growing

up? Somewhere on that historic Oak tree you can find my initials carved, many years before the City of Charleston bought it as a tourist attraction.

This is the 39th year the “*High School Sports Report*” has been a vender at the SCACA Coaches clinic. Also, I get to say hello to my old friend **Mike Reeder**, who has also been a long time SCACA supporter. Mr. Reeder shares financial advice with coaches as a clinic speaker. Did you know that Mr. Reeder once played football under **Pinky Babb** at Greenwood? (small world after-all).

This writer will turn 71 on August, 7th. I have joked many times that it would be okay for me to die in a press box on Friday night, but only as the game was ending. We feel blessed to have survived through 39 seasons of being the only statewide prep publication in the nation covering all sports.

This might be an ideal time for you, as an athletic director, to stop by the *HSSR* booth to discuss the possibilities of your hard-working student athletes, in all varsity sports, receiving statewide publicity as the various sports roll though the 2025-26 school year. Ridge View (8-5, 5-1 Region 5-5A). The Blazers placed second behind **Sumter** in the region and went deep in the 5A Division I postseason after an early exit in 2023. Fifth-year head coach **Derek Howard** looks to build on last year’s momentum, and he’ll have his son, quarterback **Derek “Tre” Howard III** in charge of it. The younger Howard passed for 2,476 yards and 22 touchdowns and rushed for 298 yards and three touchdowns. In addition, running back **Spencer Bobian** (146 carries, 973 yards, 5 TDs) returns, as well as Howard’s top three receivers—**Khristian Jackson** (49 catches, 737 yards, 10 TDs), **Darius Carter** (36 catches, 549 yards, 3 TDs), and **Hayden Morris** (32 catches, 465 yards, 7 TDs).

White Knoll (8-6, 1-4 Region 4-5A). The Timberwolves got off to a 4-1 start last fall but the buzzsaw of region play tempered their record to 5-5. Even so, White Knoll reached the third round of the playoffs. Among other seniors, the Timberwolves lose 3-year starting quarterback **Landon Sharpe** (2,765 passing yards, 31 TDs; 568 rushing yards, 7 TDs).

Fairfield Central (12-2, 4-0 Region 3-2A) The Griffins reached the upper state final, falling 32-21 to eventual 2A champion Clinton. **Ty’Derion Grier**

River Bluff (10-3, 3-2 Region 4-5A). The Gators got off to a 6-0 start and finished behind Dutch Fork and Irmo in the region. River Bluff loses quarterback **Parker Murray** (1,091 passing yards, 9 TDs) and 29 other seniors, but running back **Hayden Myers** (1,360 yards, 12 TDs) returns.

Gilbert (8-5, 5-2 Region 4-4A). The Indians got off to a 1-3 start before finishing the regular season 6-4. They reached the third round of the playoffs and fell 63-14 to eventual 4A champion North Augusta.

Batesburg-Leesville (Region 2-2A). The Panthers rebounded from a 5-6 effort in 2023 to reach the third round of the 2A playoffs, falling to eventual 2A state champion **Clinton**. Batesburg-Leesville loses quarterback **Tanner Watkins** (1,245 passing yards, 16 TDs) and top receiver **Jamerius Clark** (25 catches, 500 yards, 7 TDs) and 14 other seniors, but return running back **Amadre Wooden** (1,543 rushing yards, 19 TDs) and receiver **K.D. Whitt** (21 catches, 423 yards, 9 TDs), among others.

Camden (9-4, 4-2 Region 3-4A) The personnel losses after the Bulldogs’ 3A state championship run in 2023 affected them in 2024, but not by much.

McCollum has his top target back in junior **Joseph Haupt**. He caught 65 passes for 784 yards and five touchdowns.

Camden finished the regular season 7-3 and placed second in the region behind **South Pointe**, then went 2-1 in the postseason. This fall the Bulldogs are without quarterback **Wyatt Thompson** (941 passing yards, 11 TDs; 1,032 rushing yards, 6 TDs) and 13 other seniors. Camden has another quarterback returning who played in seven games last year, junior **Greyson Rimpf** (853 passing yards, 6 TDs), the son of longtime head coach **Brian Rimpf**. Also returning is top receiver **Tylin Drakeford** (56 catches, 938 yards, 11 TDs).

AC Flora (8-4, 4-2 Region 3-4A). The Falcons are another team that may be poised for a fantastic 2025. After a 13-1 season in 2022 in which A.C. Flora reached the lower state final, the 2023 season (4-7) was a letdown. So in 2024, then-junior and second-year quarterback **Roper Wentzky** continued to throw the longball, to the tune of 2,684 yards and 28 touchdowns. Wentzky most of the rest of the team return, as the Falcons lost just 11 seniors to graduation. This year’s A.C. Flora team, under fourth-year head coach **Ken Floyd**, could well be the most surprising team of the Midlands.

Moncks Corner – The more things change, the more they stay the same. Makes no sense really but in the case of South Carolina high school foot- ball, the 2025 preseason rankings by the *High School Sports Report* look very similar to the rank- ings in previous years.

With transfers being a major part of the land- scape, it seems the rich are getting richer as players seek better opportunities. Regardless of what we hear, a large portion of transfers go to other programs to chase a ring. Certainly not anything wrong with that but stop saying the new program will get your more heavily recruited. If you can play at a high level, go to camps and colleges will find you.

Anyway, back to the rankings. In Class AAAAA Division I, perennial No. 1 and title contender **Dutch Fork** will sit atop the rankings until someone can knock them off. No team did that last year as **Tom Knotts** won his ninth state champi- onship. Knotts is closing in on 500 career wins and has 177 wins since taking over at Dutch Fork in 2010.

The Silver Foxes allowed just seven points per game last season and some feel the 2025 defense stands to be even better. Linebacker **Raleigh Salters** and linemen **Julian Walker** (Michigan commit) and **Luciano Cesario** will anchor the unit. Walker is a Georgia transfer.

Two key offensive transfers are running back **Cole Martin** and receiver **Stone Furrey**, both from Chapin High. Two solid weapons to aid the development of junior first-year starting quarter- back **Jaxon Knotts**.

Speaking of transfers, **Sum- merville**, the Division I state runner- up last fall, has done quite well in the portal. Two key newcomers from Goose Creek are sophomore receiver **Teru Davis** and senior defensive back **Jordan Ravenel**.

Highly regarded QB will lead Dillon to the top in AAA in '25

Moncks Corner—The *HSSR* is just being the messenger with a prediction that **Dillon** will win the 2025 AAA state football championship with rising freshman Under Armour all-American quarterback **Khayel Sam Fonga-Talia** (6-1,191) leading the way, along with **North Carolina** wide receiver commitment **Zay Robertson** (6-0,170,44).

Behind Dillon in the HSSR Class AAA football ranking is second ranked **Mountain View Prep**, the defending AAA champions **Oceanside Collegiate** is number three, followed by **Loris** and **BHP** at 4-5 respectively.

Dillon finished 10-2 last season. In this tradition rich football community, the goals and expectations never change. “We always want to be playing our best football once the play-offs start,” said head coach **Kelvin Roller**. “We always have a goal of playing in the final game and competing for a state championship.

“I have coached at both Dillon and Marlboro County, and sometimes you win a state championship, not so much for having more talent, but for having focused hard-working players who play with unity and purpose,” said Coach Roller. “It’s all about getting everyone, coaches included, to work towards a goal of winning a championship.”

Dillon set attendance records for junior varsity football games last season when “Khayel” lit up the scoreboard with his big time NFL arm.

He and Robertson are a match made in heaven, and opposing defenses will have fits trying to stop the Wildcat's balanced attack of run and throw during the 2025 season. As they say, "Chose your poison?"

Dillon head coach **Kelvin Roller** is very high on his young quarterback. "Aside from his physical size, Khayel is a quarterback who can make all the throws," said Coach Roller. "No doubt he is a special player with a huge upside. The thing that has also impressed me is his leadership skills to be an incoming freshman. The guys on the team look up to him and follow him around everywhere. He's a young man that leads by example.

“Zay is just a great natural athlete who is also a talented basketball player,” said Coach Roller. “When he faces press coverage it is similar to the defenses he sees as a point guard on the basketball team. He is long and lengthy and he catches a ball at high point. He is so fluid and a great route runner also. He is a very smart football player.

“We expect Khayel to help Zay and vice-versa this season,” said Coach Roller. “We will have some talent on the other side also.”

Senior **Dominick Felton** returns as a key running back, after nursing injuries his sophomore and junior seasons. “We know that Dominick is a good football player, and he gives us great depth at running back, but we need for him to stay healthy,” said Coach Roller.

The offensive line returns left guard **Kiele Pompey** (6-0,270). “He’s the strongest kid on the team,” said Coach Roller. “He is built like a brick

house and he is very coachable.” Pompey will flip to the defensive line this season and start both ways, a very rare two- way player for Dillon.

The OL should also add depth from **Dillon Christian** sophomore transfer **Jasper McEntyre (6-4,245)** who will start at one of the tackle slots. “Jasper is a big kid with good football genes,” said Coach Roller. “His father played at **Wofford** and his grandfather played at **South Carolina**.

Depth at WR is expected to come from senior **Rike Niyongabo** and **Jotavious McAlister** who is being moved from FS to slot receiver.

Freshman **Nibras Huggins**, cousin to former Dillon WR **Ahmari Bruce Huggins** who played at **Louisville**, will be the team's back-up quarterback and he will add depth at receiver.

Coach Roller also said that linebacker **Daniel Capehart** (6-1, 195) looked good in the play-offs last year when he got some carries at running back. “Capehart has had an extremely good off-season and he is locked up with more strength this season. He runs a legit 4.5 forty. He reminds me of some of those old schools I formation running backs that run downhill right at you.” Capehart will still start at linebacker on defense where he had 120 tackles last year including three TFL and three sacks.

Noah Singletary also returns to provide depth at running back. **Keyshawn Ray** will see action as a tight end and linebacker.

Speaking of the *Nasty Cats* of defense, leading tackler linebacker **Keriyon Brown** returns bigger, stronger and faster and he will lead the linebacking

season group. Brown led the defense with 158 total tackles last season, including 9 TFL and three sacks.

“Keriyon is a three-year starter with great football instincts and he was just a tackling machine last year,” said Coach Roller. “He is also a good team leader. He is an outstanding linebacker who can also come down and play in the box.”

Kelvion Manning returns at FS where he 49 tackles and five TFL a year ago. **Tristian Blue** returns to play LB after having 49 tackles and three sacks last season. **JJ McAlister** is back at one corner after having four picks last season. Sophomore **Lucas Butler** (6-1, 180) will see action in the defensive front this season. **Jamir Washington** and **Dan Rogers** will provide depth in the defen-

sive front also. **Dontavious Tanksley** should provide depth at LB and in the DL.

Dillon will have a new kicker with the same last name of last year's place kicker. **Steven Rojas** has graduated but his brother Jose Rojas will take over place kicking this season. While punting duties are still up in the air, **JJ Campbell** is back after doing a good job in the play-offs last season.

Dillon's first scrimmage in August will be hosted by **Carolina Forest** and they will also be joined by teams from **North Myrtle Beach** and **West Florence**. On June, 19 Dillon will also compete in a 7-on-7 skills competition camp at USC. Last year they played in the championship finals against a highly regarded team from Atlanta.

2024 Clinton Red Devils

Red Devils clobber Barnwell to bring home AA football crown

Orangeburg – The Clinton High School football team did what it does offensively – pound the football and pound the football some more – and its defense had its best game of the season in the biggest game of the year.

And that’s why the Red Devils are the state champions for the first time since 2009.

CHS ran for 312 yards and limited Barnwell to 155 yards of total offense on the way to a 35-6 victory in the AA state championship game on Thursday on Willie E. Jeffries Field at South Carolina State University’s Oliver C. Dawson Stadium.

Clinton finished the year with a 12-2 record in winning its ninth state championship. The Warhorses finished the year with a 13-2 record.

After making deep playoff runs the past three seasons only to come up short, Red Devils head coach Corey Fountian was elated to be bringing a championship trophy back to the Laurens County school.

“I’m just elated and I give the glory to God,” said Fountian, who just completed his sixth season at CHS. “He put together the coaches that we needed and the players that we needed. They gelled together, they bought in and the seniors have been working for six years.

“I have to give thanks to all of the players who came before them. We didn’t win a lot of games those first two years, but we kept grinding and working. That’s what it’s all about. I’m proud for our community, for our coaches, for our players.” Clinton runs a flexbone offense out of the shotgun formation and it was dominant throughout behind its huge offensive line. The Red Devils ran the ball 55 times for the 312 yards, an average of 5.7 yards per attempt.

“It’s our staple,” said CHS right tackle Tre Aiken, a 6-foot-5-inch, 300-pound junior who has several Power 4 offers, South Carolina among them. “We’ve been running the football since Day

1. We’ve just gotten better and better.” Clinton set the tone for the day pretty much from the outset. On the second play of the game, Red Devils quarterback Tushawan Richardson kept the football and went 77 yards for a touchdown. Running back Rhett Gilliam ran for the 2-point conversion to make it 8-0 with 11:20 still remaining in the first quarter.

BHS wasted no time with an answer. Jaquan Peeples fielded the ensuing kickoff at his 23-yard line, broke a couple of early tackles and went 77 yards for a touchdown. The extra point attempt was no good, leaving the score at 8-6 just one minute into the contest.

CHS had to work a little bit on the ensuing possession, but it answered with another score. It put together a 9-play, 65-yard drive that ended with a 27-yard scoring run by running back DJ Clark. Placekicker Lukas Kuykendall added the extra point to make it 15-6 with 7:07 left.

Richardson thought that response was a key point in the game even though there were still over 3 ½ quarters to play.

“You’ve got to rise to the occasion and score to seize the momentum and we were able to do that,” said Richardson, who ran the touchdown on five carries while completing 2 of 6 passes for 38 yards and another TD. “It was important to put points on the board, and our defense was amazing.”

The Red Devils limited Barnwell to just 34 rushing yards on 18 carries and just 121 passing yards. The Warhorses had just nine first downs as they were stopped on all five of their fourth-down conversion attempts.

“Our defensive coaches did a great job of preparing our kids,” Fountian said. “We just did an excellent job on fourth down. I’ve never seen so many fourth-down stops.”

BHS head coach Brian Smith summed

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do to help his team compete to defend their title. He completed 11-of-19 passes for 411 yards and six TD's. The Rams rallied late in the game when Woods hit **Chamarryus Bomar** with a 50-yard scoring pass with 1:52 left, to close the deficit to a mere point. A trick play calling for a WR reverse pass to the end zone was well defended to preserve the win for SF.

The game was a tale of two extremes. While the Rams passed for 411 yards, and ran just 27 plays the entire game, the Bruins ate the clock with 361 rushing yards and ran 77 plays. The time of possession favored South Florence 38:45 to 9:15.

As **Keith Coward** begins his second year as the athletic director at his alma mater (**Dillon High**) he is thankful that all varsity head coaches remain the same at his school and that everyone is pulling the wagon in the same direction.

“First of all, becoming the athletic director behind the leadership of **Zach Hayes** and **Jackie Hayes** made my job so much easier,” said Coach Coward. “Jackie is still employed by the school district and he is always available to answer any questions I might have.

“Also, our Superintendent **Ray Rogers** has been very helpful and supportive,” said Coach Coward. “He has many years of experience to share and he can break down any problem. I am fortunate to have his support and help any time I tis needed.”

As Coach Coward enters year two in his role as athletic director, what were some things he learned in his job during year one? “First of all, the entire experience was eye opening,” said Coach Coward. “It is very important to stay organized and communicate with all your coaches on a frequent basis. You need to get on matters as early as possible to keep them from becoming bigger concerns.

"I compare being an athletic director to being an auditor," said Coach Coward. "When situations do arise, they are more often more negative in nature, rather than positive. My job is to help find solutions and results when these situations happen."

While serving as athletic director, Coach Coward is also the head baseball coach at Dillon High. "As the athletic director I am obligated to help all our sports, but when baseball season begins, I also want to give my best for the team I coach," he said.

Coach Coward was asked about the new transfer rule approved by athletic directors at their annual conference in the Spring. This new transfer rule allows any high school varsity athlete a one-time opportunity to transfer to a different high school without their family having to move. Coach Coward serves as the athletic director for both Dilon and Lake View High Schools.

“People, by their very nature, are resistant to change and this applies to life and not just sports,” said Coach Coward. “The new one-time transfer rule can be a positive change if it is not abused. However, everyone involved will need to follow the rules.

"In our school district we do not want to see athletes transfer to Dillon, or athletes transfer to Lake View," said Coach Coward. "We do not want one athletic program to benefit at the expense of the other."

Coach Coward talked about the winning tradition at Dillon High and how it has developed into a winning culture. "We expect to win in all our sports at Dillon," said Coach Coward. "We have high expectations in all sports. There is no doubt in my mind that our culture has helped us

win many games over the years. When you expect to win, winning results most often follow.”

There are two improvement projects either under-way, or just completed, involving Dillon and Lake View High Schools. At Dillon new batting cages have been installed at both the baseball and softball fields. At Lake View new locker rooms, shared by all the athletes, have been installed in the gym.


In terms of longest serving coaches at Dillon High, **Alan “Tiger” McLaurin** takes honors with 32 years of service as the wide receivers coach for the football team. Head girls’ basketball coach James McMillian has served 20 years as a coach at Dillon. Head football coach **Kelvin Roller** and assistant football coach **Kevin Roberts** each have 19 years of experience in the coaching profession.

Other varsity head coaches returning for the upcoming school year include Johnna Jones in volleyball, Bryan Grice with the boys' basketball team, while Stevie Grice is back as head softball coach. **Karla Grice** returns to handle the co-ed soccer program while Randy Gray and Sam Grooms return to coach the boy's and girl's track teams.

On a personal note, Coach Coward wanted to pay tribute to long-time football stats and public address announcer **Lonnie Turner** who passed away earlier this summer. “Mr. Lonnie was very dedicated to Dillon High School for over 50 years and he will be greatly missed,” said Coach Coward. “His work and dedication to the athletic program at Dillon High will never be matched.”

Coach Howard also said that **Brandy Hugins** does an excellent job at helping run the athletic program at Lake View High. He also cited **Sprinter Spivey** for his assistance in helping him run the Dillon athletic program.

“We have many volunteers we also need to thank who help out in numerous ways,” said Coach Coward. “Two of them that come to mind are **Macado Bethea** who helps out maintaining some of our athletic fields and **Ronnie Herring** who helps out with fund raising activities.”

Jody LeCroy is returning as the Belton-Honea Path athletic director. He made a trio of new hires for the upcoming school year.


Paige Knotts will be the new volleyball coach, **Max Bolden** is the new girls basketball head coach and is the new boys soccer coach.

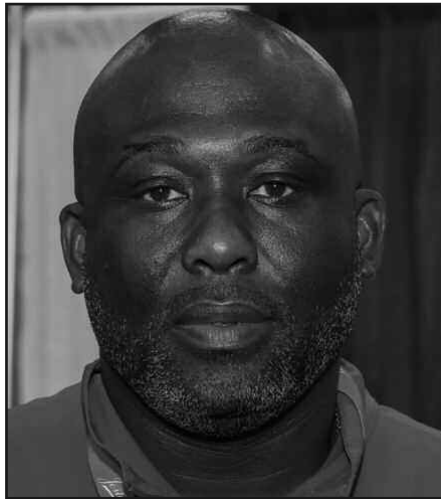
said coach.

Manning – It took a little bit of work, but **Jimmy Noonan** has his first staff as the football head coach at **Laurence Manning Academy** put together.

“I feel good about the staff going forward,” said Noonan, whose first year at LMA will be his 24th as a head coach. “There’s not a head coach out there that doesn’t want to strengthen his staff and keep stability. It’s an evolving process, but I like the people we have in place.”

Noonan, who has a career record of 131-133 in stops at **Spring Valley**, **Wando** and **Georgetown** high schools and **Wilson Hall**, will handle the offensive play calling. Helping Noonan out on that side of the ball are **AJ Nelson**, **Andrew White** and **Cedric Bennett**. Nelson will coach the wide receivers, White the offensive line, and Bennett, a former standout for **Manning High**, will coach the running backs.

Noah Ernest, a newcomer to Laurence Manning, will be the defensive coordinator. He had been on the staff at **West Florence**. Another newcomer is **Craig Hatcher**, a former head coach at **Central**. He will be in charge of the linebackers. **Casey Connors**, the former head coach at **Clarendon Hall**, will coach the defensive line.

Shawn McCord, a longtime coach at Laurence Manning, will be the junior varsity head coach and will be assisted by **Patrick Anderson** and **Jason Duke**. Anderson was the interim head coach for the final six games last season after **Robbie Briggs** resigned the post. The Swampcats went 1-5 under Anderson to finish 3-8 on the year.

Another Laurence Manning fixture, **Al Nelson**, will be the B team head coach. He will be assisted by **Chris Ford** and **Jackson Brunson**.

Outside of the one year at Wilson Hall, the rest of Noonan’s coaching career has come in the **South Carolina High School League**. He is having to learn the different nuances of the **South Carolina Independent School Association**.

Part of the challenge is getting used to the ins and outs of SCICA when all I’ve known is High School League,” Noonan said. “I’ve gotten great support and great backing from the board.”

Noonan has been happy with what the football team has been able to accomplish during summer workouts.

“I’m not used to not having spring, so we had to answer questions and find our what we’re about,” he said. “I think we made plenty of progress in that venture, but most of it came without pads and contact. That’s why our scrimmages will be important.”

The Swampcats will go to **Florence Christian School** for a scrimmage on August 1 before playing host to **Lake View** on August 7. Laurence Manning will then take on **East Clarendon** in a jamboree at Manning on August 15.

Laurence Manning opens its regular season on August 22 with a home game against **John Paul II**.

“Jimmy has a very structured and disciplined style and is great in the weight room with developing our players,” said Laurence Manning athletic director **Morgan Watt**. “I’m really excited for this season.”

Watt will be in his first full season as athletic director after serving as the interim AD following last year’s shakeup. He will return as the boys golf coach, a position he has held for several years.

Laurence Manning has **Buddy Truett** returning as softball coach after leading the Lady ‘Cats to their second consecutive AAAA state championship. Laurence Manning went 24-3 and swept Wilson Hall in the best-of-3 championship series.

“Buddy does a great job with our softball program, building and developing championship-level players,” Watt said. “His success speaks for itself.”

Veteran head coach **Barry Hatfield** will remain in charge of the baseball program. Hatfield has guided Laurence Manning to three state championships. The Swampcats won back-to-back state championships in 2016 and 2017 with the other coming in 2022.

Laurence Manning finished this past season with a 17-4 record, going undefeated in winning the region title. The season didn’t end the way the Swampcats had hoped for though as they dropped their final regular-season game and went 0-2 in the state playoffs.

Watt is more than happy that Hatfield is still in the fold.

“Barry has a ton of experience and knows what it takes to win,” Watt said. “He is great at developing players.”

Laurence Manning will have both of its basketball coaches coming back for their second seasons in girls coach **Lisa Ard** and Anderson, the boys coach.

Ard, a longtime successful head coach at **Crestwood High School**, led the Lady ‘Cats to a 14-13 record and a berth in the AAAA state tournament. With most of the starting lineup returning, Watt thinks big things await the girls program.

“Lisa has tons of experience and has a great, positive style,” he said. “I’m looking forward to our girls taking the next step with the players we have returning.”

Anderson led the Laurence Manning boys to a 13-15 overall record and was 6-4 in region play, tying for third with John Paul II. The Swampcats earned a berth in the AAAA state tournament but lost to **Northside**

Christian Academy 68-54 in the first round.

“Patrick brings youth and passion for the game.” Watt said. “I’m really excited to see how he builds on the success of last season.”

Veteran **Jay Atkins** will return as the bowling head coach. He has led Laurence Manning to multi-

Manning football staff has a little shakeup

Manning – Coming off one of the best seasons in recent history, the Manning High School football team had a little shakeup in its coaching staff. Veteran head coach Reggie Kennedy is still in charge, but some have moved on, necessitating the changes.

Charlie Richards, the defensive coordinator last season, has moved on to Richland Northeast. Marco Thompson, a longtime assistant for Kennedy, has moved into the defensive coordinator role. “He has been with me for a while,” Kennedy said of Thompson, who will coach defensive backs as well. “He was with me at Irmo and he’s been with me here at Manning. We’re going to do a lot of the same things we did last year. It’s been a smooth transition, not only for the kids but for the staff as well.”

The Moanrchs went 11-2 last season, winning the Region 7-AA title with a 6-0 record. They advanced to the quarterfinals of the state playoffs as well.

Kennedy will again serve as the offensive coordinator. Dontavis Miller has assumed the role of assistant head coach. He will also be the special teams coordinator and coach linebackers. Kevin Miller is a new addition to the defensive staff and will coach the linemen. Calvin McClary will coach defensive backs.

Helping Kennedy on the offensive side of the ball are Calvin Giles-McClary Jr., Gregg King, Marcus Lloyd and King Cutter. Giles-McClary will coach the quarterbacks, King will handle the running backs, Lloyd will coach the wide receivers, and Cutter will coach up the offensive line as he rejoins the staff.

Kennedy is pleased with the summer the Monarchs have had. Instead of focusing so much on 7-on-7 scrimmages, Kennedy said Manning has participated in more joint practices. That affords the teams the opportunity to actually play 11 on 11.

“We’ve had a pretty good summer,” he said. “We did six joint practices and I feel like that really helped us out a whole lot. It gives us the opportunity to see what our kids do well. It helped us identify what the kids do well and what positions they play well. The joint practices are a great learning tool for us.”

Manning is having to replace Ja’Rae Mitchell at quarterback. Kennedy let it be known that Lovell Stevenson is at the front of the pack for the job.)

“Stevenson was our No. 1 guy going into spring practice, he was our No. 1 guy going into summer workouts, and he’s our No. 1 guy going into the fall,” Kennedy said.

Manning only has two coaches in their first year with the school, and one of those is also coaching a brand new sport to the athletic program. Amos Conyers will be the head coach of the first boys volleyball team at the school.

Kennedy said the program’s start came about because of demand and supply – the male student-athletes demanded it and Kennedy and his staff supplied it.

Our girls basketball ccoach (Justin Johnson) coaches PE (physical education), and they were playing volleyball in the class,” Kennedy said. “Some of the boys were asking why we didn’t have a boys volleyball team. Coach Johnson spearheaded it and we had about 20 kids sign up to play. If we can have another opportunity for the kids to have something after school, then I’m all for it.”

With boys volleyball still in its infancy, there are a limited number of South Carolina High School

League schools participating. Because of that, Manning will compete at the AAAA level.

The only other new varsity head coach is Deizmond Kelly-Gaskins as the cheer coach.

Kennedy is the athletic director for Clarendon County School District and is the site athletic director for Manning. The assistant athletic director is Johnson. He is part of the Johnson & Johnson team in charge o the basketball programs.

While Justin Johnson is coaching the girls for a second straight season, Dr. Shwn Johnson – the district superintendent – is coaching the boys for a second straight year. When Dr. Johnson took over for his second tenure, he bookended four years with four different head coaches.

“That gives us a little bit of stability there going into the season,” Kennedy said.

The Monarch boys finished with a 17-6 overall record and went 9-3 in region play to finish second. Manning beat Woodland 72-66 in the first round of the state playoffs before falling to Andrew Jackson 67-55 in the second round.

The Manning girls were 5-18. All of the other head coaches are back in Holly McCabe as the girls tennis coach, Kimberly Ferrari as the boys and girls cross country coach, Sonia Daniels as the girls volleyball head coach, Richard Scheider as the wrestling coach, Raymond Gibbs as the baseball coach and Catherine Mahoney as the softball coach.

The Monarchs baseball team finished with a 10-13 overall record and went 6-6 in reigon play. That was more than enough to get Manning into the state play-offs for the first time since the 2018 season, which was also the last time it had a double-digits-win season.

Kennedy is pleased with the job Gibbs, a slick-fielding third baseman for some outstanding Manning teams under the guidance of Rick Coker in the late 1980s, has done in his two years in charge.

“I knew when I made the hire it was going to be in a rebuilding stage,” Kennedy said. “We wanted to get the interest back up, to where baseball is important to the community. Raymond can talk about the importance of baseball to our kids and what it used to be like. He can be a good role model for the kids playing for him, seeing that he is a product of the Manning baseball program.”

Dontavis Miller will coach the boys track an field team, while Daniels will coach the girls track team. The boys soccer coach will be Ryan Glosson, and Ellese Rojas will coach the girls soccer team. The boys golf coach is Marion “Doc” Lewis, who happens to be the athletic director at Scott’s Branch, a fellow Clarendon County School District high school.

Lake City – While the focus of Carolina Academy athletic director David Rankin is making sure all sports are competitive, he says the biggest opportunity for success at the school in the short term is with female sports.

“We’re headed in a good direction across the board,” he said.

After posting just nine wins over a three-year stretch, Rankin’s football team managed five wins in his first season. The coach has a proven record as a team-builder, guiding both Williamsburg Academy and Lee Academy (three) to state titles. He also has been state runner-up eight times with 14 region titles and 26 playoff appearances.

Rankin’s teams are known for being physical and play with great effort. Getting a strong effort has never been an issue at Carolina, regardless of the coach.

“This is a good group physically,” he said of the 2025 team. “We’re a lot stronger this year. If we can put it together mentally I think we will be improved.”

Rankin reports one change among varsity coaches for the coming year. Trey Parker will assume duties as head volleyball coach.

Cameron Sebuck returns as the girls tennis coach while Patrick Hunt will coach the girls golf team. Rhett Long coaches the boys golf team.

Robert Phillips returns as the boys basketball coach and Scotty Phillips is the softball coach. Head of school Stevie Phillips heads up the track and field program.

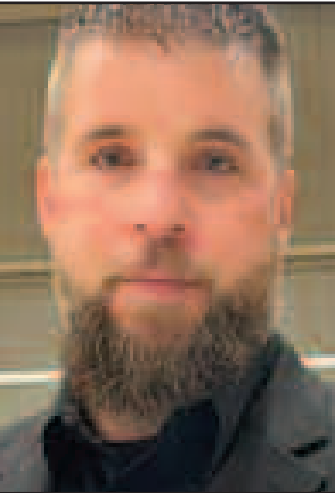
Lake City – Although he has been running the show for the past two seasons, Jamison Estep is now officially the football head coach for Lake City High School.

Furse pleased with football staff at Williamsburg

Kingtree – Although **Will Furse** has had a relationship with all of his assistant coaches on the **Williamsburg Academy** football staff, there is a bit of a different dynamic involved. After all, Furse is the new head coach for the Stallions, meaning he is ultimately the one in charge.

However, with a spring practice under its belt and the summer workouts now in, Furse believes his coaching staff has pulled together quite well.

“I really think we’re coming together well as a staff,” said Furse, who came to Williamsburg after one season as the head coach and athletic director at **Lee Academy**. “We’ve had a really good summer working with the athletes. We’ve all worked together in the past, either playing for someone or having coached with me in the past. Things have gone smoothly thus far.”

Furse inherits a staff in which each member coached under former head coach **Tyler Boyd**, who took the head job at his alma mater, **Lamar High School**. One of those will be **Ken Kellahan**, who will be the defensive coordinator while coaching the secondary and offensive line.

Kellahan, who won a state title as the Williamsburg head coach himself, was Furse’s head coach when Kellahan was the head coach at **Laurence Manning Academy**. Furse was also a member of Kellahan’s coaching staff at LMA.

John Floyd will be in charge of the defensive linemen and tight ends, while **Chase McFaddin** will be the junior varsity head coach and coach wide receivers. **Sam Plowden** will be in charge of the running backs, and **Britton Morris** will coach linebackers and the offensive line.

Williamsburg had high participation in the summer workouts, and that afforded the coaches the opportunity to put in a lot of work in regards to what the Stallions want to do this season.

“Our main goal is to get the kids showing up to lift weights,” Furse said. “When you have that you’re able to have more practice sessions. It’s not just lifting and running.

“Defensively, all of our base stuff is in. What we want to do in th8e passing game is in, and we’ve been able to fine tune what we want to do in the running game. When practice starts (which was on July 24), we’ll be ahead of the game.”

Williamsburg has played for a state title in each of the past four seasons, the first two under **Don Shelley** and the two most recent seasons under Boyd. The Stallions played for the SCISA AA state title the first three years, winning it in 2022. They played for the Class A crown in 2024, losing to Thomas

Heyward Academy 23-8 in the state championship game to finish with a 10-2 record.

Boyd was 22-3 in his two seasons as head coach. Furse was 3-7-1 in his one season at Lee. The Cavaliers started the season 3-1-1 before

losing their final six games. That left Furse with a career record of 22-14-1.

Furse led Laurence Manning to two AAAA state championship games in his two seasons in charge of the program. Furse was 19-7 at LMA, with four of those losses coming to now 8-time defending state champion **Hammond**.

Furse also became the athletic director at Williamsburg, and he said that transition has been a smooth one as well.

“It’s been very steady, about what I expected. We’re still having some problems with our scheduling because we had a couple of teams that dropped (from SCISA Class A) to 8-man. I’m trying to find someone to fill those spots. I think I can get one, but ideally you want 10 games.”

Furse’s first game as Williamsburg head coach will come on August 22 in a home game against **Thomas Sumter Academy**.

Another part of Furse’s AD duties is finding a new baseball head coach. Boyd was the Williamsburg head coach for 10 years.

Williamsburg will have a new head coach in softball as well as veteran **Pat Wildes** stepped down from the post. He is being replaced by **Jada Cox**, who helped him with the team this past season.

She started full time at the school last spring,” Furse said. “She played college softball (at **Columbia International University**) and is very knowledgeable. Coach Wildes was ready to step away, and he was the natural successor and is ready to roll with it.”

One of the Williamsburg head coaches with whom Furse is very familiar is **Will Epps**, who will be in his second season both as the girls basketball head coach and the volleyball head coach. Like Kellahan, Furse played for Epps and coached with him at Laurence Manning.

“Will Epps is a pehonomel coach, Furse said. “I’ve been very impressed with both the volleyball and softball workouts this summer. Those girls are committed and working hard. I’m very excited about what the season holds. I can’t wait to see them get positive results from that.”

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Cornelius loves his East Clarendon coaching staff

Turbeville – Call him crazy, but **East Clarendon High School** football head coach **Larry Cornelius** is actually considering moving his 2-year starter at quarterback to wide receiver for his senior season.

“Right now, we’re moving **Takoda (Cornelius)** to wide receiver,” Coach Cornelius said of his son. “A lot of coaches don’t think we’ll do that because why would you move a quarterback that you’ve won 13 games with in two years to wide receiver for his senior season? We feel that is going to make us a better team overall.”

Such is the thought process for Coach Cornelius, who is set to begin his third season in charge of the Wolverines. After winning five games his first season, East Clarendon catapulted to eight last year. Coach Cornelius said the Wolverines had a strong session of summer workouts.

“It was good, even though **Turbeville** is a little bit different,” he said.

“We have people taking multiple vacations during the summer. The big thing though is we have good communication as to who is and isn’t going to be there. We normally have very good turnout, and the kids are all working really hard.”

Going back to the quarterback situation, Coach Cornelius feels like he has three options available. As of now, sophomore **Gavin White** is the No. quarterback after being the B team starter last season. Takoda Cornelius will start at wide receiver to strengthen the wide receivers room and better showcase his talent, while junior **Blease Hardy**, who saw some time at signal caller last season, will start at running back to meet another need.

That doesn’t mean though that Cornelus or Hardy won’t have a special package with each behind center.

“Gavin is a gunslinger and we want him to be able to get the ball to Takoda some,” Coach Cornelius sid. “Blease ran the ball a lot of power reads as our quarterback so we think this utilizes his talents best. We’ve changed our playbook a little bit. We’re probably going to be pretty much 50-50 (percent) running and throwing the ball, but we haven’t had pads on yet either.”

With her guidance we are moving the athletic program upward. She is one of the finest educators and coaches that I have ever worked with.”

India Robinson is back as the cross country head coach after starting the program last year. It was a co-ed team last year, but Lewis is hopeful that there will be enough participation to have both a boys and girls team this year after the team had 10 members last year.

“the team was composed of mostly freshmen and sophomores so we are expecting a bright future for the program,” Lewis said.

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

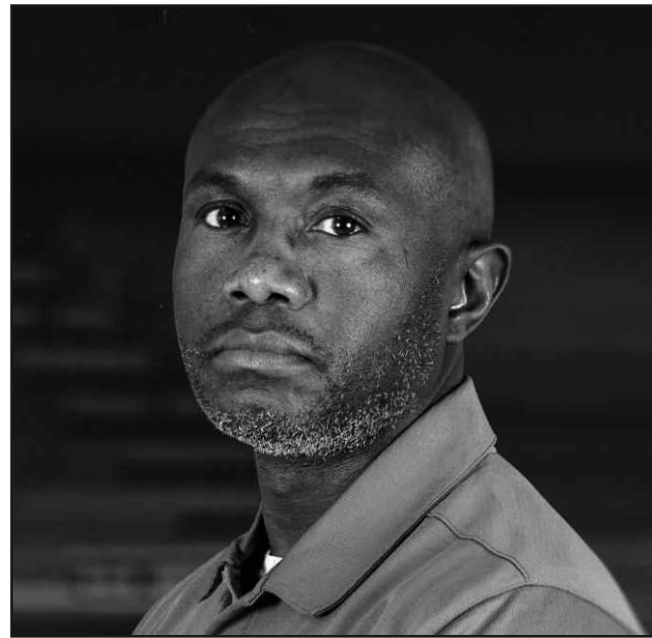
Jesse Gladis, who has been the head coach for the Boys Tennis team the last several years, is adding to his responsibilities by taking on the Boys Swimming team.

Spartanburg—There is no doubt that the **Spartanburg Day School**, despite being a small SCISA athletic program, has put together a great group of coaches all focused on mentoring the student athletes they feel honored to coach.

Spartanburg Day School athletic director **Mike Cerino** tells the *HSSR*, "We are very proud of our Program Heads at Spartanburg Day School," he said. "Certainly, they have achieved a lot in their various sports, personally; that much is clear. We have a profile for sure "We like teacher/coaches who have played their sport at a high level collegiately, and/or professionally, and who are vested in the over-all development and well-being of their players," said Coach Cerino.

"That means this team of coaches we've put together are committed to excellence across all aspects of the student experience at our school," Coach Cerino. "What are students learn from them on the field, or on the court, is amplified because they are invested in our students lives at school as well. When excellent coaches invest in excellent student athletes, we believe excellent outcomes will follow. That's why we have gone all-in in our teacher-coach model and setting up our program for sustainable and enduring success."

Coach Cerino came to Spartanburg Day after 27 years at **Limestone College** on April, 18 2023 where he served primarily as vice-president of intercollegiate athletics at the former Div. II school. In 2028 Cerino was named the Under Armour Div. II Athletic Director of the Year.

A main focus of the Griffin's athletic program is the excitement generated around the school starting a varsity football program in 2026. To that goal **Patrick Moffitt** was hired in May of 2024 to start a football "B" team comprised of around 28 sixth-8th graders. The program will elevate into a junior varsity program this Fall and already over 36 players are working out for the upcoming season.

Moffitt had previously worked at the St. Andrews School in Middleton, Del where he served as the head football coach. While at the St. Andrews School, Moffitt doubled participation, and led the school to their first play-off appearance in two decades.

Moffitt has a Master's Degree from **Norwich University**. While on the football team at **Williams College** he was a decorated quarterback who started for three years and he led his team to a 20-4 record over his tenure. He was named the NESCAC Offensive Player of the Year his senior season in college among numerous honors he earned.

This summer, two football assistants were hired to help Coach Moffitt with the expanding junior varsity program. **Chris Cormier** was the offensive coordinator at tradition rich St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Florida last year. In college Cormier was a four-year quarterback letterman at **West Virginia Wesleyan**.

The other new assistant is **Andrew Vaught**, who will coach the offensive line. He played college football at **Toledo** and **Wofford**. Vaught played on three high school state championship teams at Roanoke Catholic (Va.) and he was also voted a top Div. III VISAA offensive lineman in college.

In May, Spartanburg Day announced the hiring of head boy's and girls' basketball coaches for the upcoming season. **Elizabeth Konradi** will be the Program Head and Varsity Coach for the girls' basketball program and **Caleb Jordan** as Program Head and Varsity Coach for the boys' program. Additionally, the school welcomes **Sharon Dillon** as Coordinator of Player Development and Assistant Coach for the girls' program.

Coach Konradi was a stand-out forward at the **Episcopal School of Dallas** where she set the school record for blocks in a season (135) and totaled 273 blocks and 352 rebounds in her career. She was a First Team All-Southwest Preparatory Conference selection and continued her playing career at the University of the South (Sewanee). Coach J

Coach Jordan is a graduate of **Charlotte Latin School**, and he began his coaching career at his alma mater. He served as an assistant coach and played a key role in player development within one of the Southeast's most respected independent school basketball programs. As a player, Jordan was a four-year starter at **Roanoke College**, where he earned multiple All-ODAC honors.

Veteran head tennis coach **Bob Allsbrook** returns to the Griffins and he has led team to two straight SCISA state titles over highly regarded **Hilton Head Prep**.

Coach Allsbrook is a USPTR Pro 1 Tennis Professional. He has been named South Carolina Pro of the Year and has been ranked as high as #2 in the USA as a player. He was ranked on the ATP Tour and has been inducted into the Spartanburg Day School Athletic Hall of Fame, the **Appalachian State University** Athletic Hall of Fame, and the **South Carolina Tennis Hall of Fame**.

Gaffney—Former *HSSR* Mr. Football, **Malcolm Long**, established new school passing records at **Gaffney High** when he led the Indians to great success on the football field nearly 20 years ago, so he is quite at home starting his third season as the athletic director at his alma mater.

“What I stress to all our coaches at Gaffney is to be fair and consistent in their dealings with the student athletes on their teams,” said Coach Long. “I also want our coaches to be good role models and to teach our athletes good life skills, along with how to be successful citizens after they graduate.”

Coach Long said he has grown into the athletic director’s role at Gaffney High as he starts his third season, over-seeing one of the state’s top athletic programs year-end and year-out. “I have learned to be more eccentric in my relationships with coaches, the school administration, and all the student athletes in our program,” he said. “Communication is very important in all relationships.”

During his prep career at Gaffney, Long helped lead the football team to three state titles, plus two in basketball. He went on to **SC State** where he set 14 passing records and led the Bulldogs to three straight MEAC titles in 2008, 2009, and 2010.

In prior interviews, Long has told the *HSSR* he did not pursue a professional football opportunity, after college, because he was focused on becoming a minister. Today, Long serves as the Pastor of the Cedar Grove Missionary Baptist Church in Gaffney. He is married to the love of his life **Porchee** and they are the proud parents of two football and basketball playing sons, **Jamarion** (15) and **Malachi** (12).

Prior to becoming the athletic director at Gaffney, Coach Long spent six seasons on the Gaffney staff as the team’s quarterback coach.

“I want to thank Gaffney principal **Eric Blanton** for his trust in me in offering me the athletic director’s job,” said Long. “I am grateful for his support and leadership. He is also very supportive of the athletic program at Gaffney High as well.

“I also want to thank our Superintendent, **Dr. Thomas White**, and the Cherokee County School board, for budgeting for the total renovation of the baseball and softball stadiums at Gaffney High School that are presently under construction,” said Coach Long. “Both teams are getting new locker rooms, new bleachers, and it is a complete face-lift for both facilities.”

This past season two very successful head coaches (**Dan Jones** and **Mark Huff**) retired after long coaching careers at Gaffney.

“Coach Jones was the longest serving football coach in Gaffney history with 32 years of service to the team,” said Coach Long. “Coach Jones taught his players mental toughness. Maybe I should not say this but he was the first coach I ever saw hit a kid with his head without a helmet on and that got the entire team’s attention. He was a former Gaffney player who loved teaching the game of football.”

Coach Huff announced his retirement as the girls’ basketball coach at the end of this season. Huff won five boy’s state titles (2003, 04, 05, 2010, and 2012) and he was selected in to the SCACA Hall of Fame in 2014. **Julian Wright**, Huff’s top assistant last season, has been named the girls’ basketball head coach for this season.

Littlejohn was named the new head football coach in January of this year. “Coach Littlejohn understands the Gaffney tradition, being a former player who has been coaching in the program for 22 seasons,” said Coach Long.

“Since becoming the head coach he has been doing a very good job holding the kids accountable for things like their weight room work-outs and being on time for meetings.

“We are anticipating a very good football season and this team has a lot of potential to compete for a state title,” said Coach Long. “I consider Coach Littlejohn a player’s coach.”

Coach Littlejohn will be assisted by **Kevin Phillips** who will serve as the team’s Associate Head Coach/Linebackers/ and also as recruiting coordinator. **Ian Cooper** is the defensive coordinator while **Brad Van Horn** will serve as offensive coordinator.

Green said he has two main goals once he gets to Florida after high school. “I want to get a good education and I hope to play early and contribute to the success of the team,” he said. “Then with those two goals accomplished I hope to make it to the NFL.”

Green’s high school coach, **Greg Wright**, shared some comments on why he thinks Green is a special football player. “He is a phenomenal kid, and he embodies everything you want in a student athlete,” said Coach Wright. “He is all about leadership, hard-work and determination. He is super smart in the class room and on the field.

“He is a film junkie and that is what any coach wants in a player,” said Coach Wright. “From my time playing at a high level I can tell you that he embodies everything it takes to be successful at the highest level of football.

“Desmond is always finding ways to get better,” said Coach Wright. “He is a polished young man with a great work ethic. I am thankful we have him for one more season.”

Michigan came into SEC/ACC country on July 1 and gained a commitment from highly regarded **Dutch Fork DE Julian Walker** (6-6,250) rated number 14 at the time of his commitment. Walker chose the Big Blue over **South Carolina** and **North Carolina**.

Walker announced on his social media account: “I am beyond honored for the opportunity to be a Michigan man!”

To date there has been a flurry of recruiting activity at **Gaffney High School**. Associate head coach **Kevin Phillips** gave the *HSSR* an update on numerous Indians with commitments and offers as we were going to press with this issue.

In recent weeks Gaffney 2026 linebacker **Zyon Ratchford** (6-4,200) and 2026 DL **Kelton Smith** (6-5,290) have committed to **East Carolina**. Gaffney 2026 running back **Jaiden McDowell** (5-10,165) has committed to **Mercer**. McDowell is a top 20 rated senior in South Carolina by the *HSSR* while Ratchford and Smith are both Top 50 players.

Gaffney already has 2026 quarterback **Jayvon Gilmore** (65-5,200) committed to **Arkansas** and 2026 OL Scotland Dover (6-5,305) is a commitment to **Appalachian State**. The *HSSR* rates Gilmore as the number four over-all prospect in SC while Dover is at the 15th spot coming into August drills.

In a hot scoop news matter. Former Goose Creek QB **Corey Taylor** (6-0,164) moved to the Gaffney earlier this year. Taylor is rated among the top 10 quarterbacks in the nation in the 2029 class by some services.

In the 2027 class at Gaffney four rising juniors have firm major college offers. They are LB **Kendarius (P-nut) Bailey (6-0,215)**, OL **CJ Brooks** (6-4,320), DB/RB **Kareen Shaw** (5-10,181), and DB/WR **Ayden Montgomery** (5-10,162). In the Gaffney 2028 class DB **Zion Dawkins** (5-11,182) already has seven major college offers.

There has been one unusual commitment the *HSSR* has verified through **Andrews High** head coach **Scott Durham**. On his football team information , returned to the *HSSR* recently, Coach Durham listed 2026 DE (edge rusher) **Chris Stewart** (6-4,228) as a firm commitment to **Western Michigan**. Stewart had committed to Elon back in April. .

Stewart went on a visit to **Western Michigan** in early June. His contact at WM was through a former coach from PC now on the staff at WM. Stewart had a great camp and he was officially offered but he was also asked not to go public with his commitment. His name also does not appear on the Western Michigan commitment list on their web site either. It could be that WM feels like they have found a di-

As a junior Stewart had 93 tackles, 31.5 TFL, 13.5 sacks, four PBU and two FF. He earned all-state honors after producing such quality numbers.

“Chris is one of the best players I’ve coached,” said Coach Durham. “He is relentless with his effort on a football field and his motor never stops. He is long and quick and is a natural edge guy who just now growing into his body.” (Could Western Michigan be hiding the next **JJ Watt**?) Not anymore!

Coach Durham, who had a talk with a coach from WM, agreed that it was highly unusual any college would ask a player not to go public with their commitment after accepting an offer.

South Carolina, (as of July, 26) has 12 commitments in the 2026 football recruiting class, and six of them are in-state prospects.

The Gamecocks have commitments from number three rated DB **J’zavien Currence** (6-3,205) from **South Pointe**, number five rated OL **Zyon Guiles** (6-4,295) of **Carvers Bay**, number 10 rated OL **Anthony Baxter** (6-3,330) of **South Pointe**, number 11 rated WR **Sequel Patterson** (6-0,165) of **Indian Land**, number 12 rated TE **Jamel Howze** (6-3,215) of **Newberry**, and in late July the Gamecocks got their sixth in-state pledge from **Greenwood** QB/Ath **Tristen Lewis** (6-4,200) and he was offered as a DB with an upgraded player rating of 27.

As of July, 26 Clemson had 18 commitments in the 2026 recruiting class. To date, only one in-state player has committed to the Tigers. He is number 8 rated DB **Kentavious Anderson** (6-2,181) of **Dorman**. Anderson runs a 10.8 100 and is a highly rated cover athlete.

North Carolina had **Dillon** WR **Zay Robertson** (6-0,165,4.4) in camp in late June. In the morning session, an eye witness, told the *HSSR* that after **Bill Belichick** watched Robertson run two routes, with two great catches in double coverage he blew his whistle and told one of his coaches standing near him, “Get that kid in our afternoon elite group of receivers.”

Robertson must remind Belichick of former NFL **New England** great **Troy Brown**, a Blackville-Hilda graduate, who retired as the leading receiver in Patriots history. After the afternoon session Belichick offered Robertson and the rest is history. Robertson ran a 4.4 forty at several camps this summer. The *HSSR* has Robertson ranked as the top WR in the 2026 class in SC, and he is expected to exceed 1,500 yards in receptions at Dillon this season.

Throwing passes to Robertson this season will be Next Level Under Armour All-American Dillon freshman quarterback **Khayel Sam Fong-Talia** (6-1, 190). “Kel” was very impressive in the all-Amer-

ican game played in Orlando, Florida last December. The game comprised the top 80 rising freshman players in 2029 class across the nation.

“Kel” moved with his family to Dillon from Utah just before his 8th grade season on the Dillon varsity. He could have re-classified up to a freshman a year ago, but Kel declined after he had been approved academically. He grew up in Hawaii and folks in Dillon went to jayvee games last year just to check out his NFL arm.

North Carolina was able to flip Virginia Tech WR commitment **Carnell Warren** (6-4,196) of **Bluffton** in recent weeks giving the **Tar Heels two of the top receivers in the 2026 class in South Carolina**.

Other 2026 commitments include Top 30 **Orangeburg Prep** TE **Tildren Riley** (6-5,211) headed to **Vanderbilt**. Other top 25 *HSSR* rated players not mentioned earlier, include, North **Augusta** OL **Malcolm Gaston** (6-5,330) committed to **Georgia**, and **Northwestern** big play DB **Tamarion Watkins** (6-4,200) who chose **Texas A&M** recently.

Other top 25 rising seniors who have committed include **Boiling Springs** DB **Jeremiah Favorite** headed to **Michigan State**, **Christ Church** WR **Jude Hall** is headed to **Memphis**, Athlete **Somad Eaddy** (6-0,165) of **Riverside** is pledged to **Wake Forest**, **Fairfield Central** WR/DB **Jayden Boyd** (5-9,166) is committed to **Duke**, and OL **Tre Aiken** (6-4,265) of **Clinton** recently committed to **NC State** at the number 25 *HSSR* player ranking.

NC State has also picked up number 34 rated DB **Jordyn Best** (5-11,180) of **Ridge View** giving them two in-state players thus far.

Appalachian State has four 2026 in-state players committed as of July, 26 with Dover being the highest rated player at 15. The other three are between 30 and 50 on the Top 100 list with great next level potential. They are DE **Sawyer Arnold** (6-4,220) from **Oceanside Collegiate**, DL **Chris Doyle** (6-1,290) of **Bluffton** and OL **Caden Muskus** (6-5,270) of **Chapin**.

East Carolina has landed commitments from three in-state players thus far. The aforementioned Smith of Gaffney is the highest rated player at 24. Spartanburg QB **Trey Burke** (6-3,205) is at 30 and Ratchford of Gaffney is number 38.

Liberty has secured commitments from number 28 QB Jachin Davis (6-1,185) from **Stratford** and number 29 **Crescent** WR **Amiri Acker** (6-2,186).

Rounding out all major college commitments as of this issue: Number 32 DL **Chris Doyle** (6-1,290) is committed to UNC Charlotte, number 36 WR **Jaemin Pinckney** (6-5,217) of **Woodland** is committed to **South Florida**, while **Spartanburg** kicker **Will Love** (6-2,205) is committed to **Virgina Tech** in the 43rd slot.

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Hammond’s formula for success continues

Columbia - As another athletic season at **Hammond** dawns, the school continues with the formula that has worked for decades.
“We keep high standards for all of our student athletes and coaches, and maintain those standards in the classroom and in the community,” Athletic Director **Jeff Barnes** said.

Barnes often refers to the formula—hard work, accountability for actions being the foundation for the athletic programs, a formula that has its roots in academics and in community work. It may sound like a generic idea were it not for the fact that every Hammond coach and student buys in, knowing that the school has won 161 state championships in its history, with the most to come.

By far the most successful program has been on the gridiron. **Jon Wheeler**, going into his fifth year as head coach of the Skyhawks, led the team to another SCISA 4A state championship last fall with a 28-21 victory over Porter-Gaud. It was the team’s eighth straight state championship, fourth straight for Wheeler as head coach, and 22nd in school history.

They’ll take the field in a few weeks as the favorite in SCISA to win it all again, but this fall they’ll be much younger—just three players, all offensive linemen, return on an offense that averaged 45.1 points per game. Five players return on defense.

With an array of younger players contending for the starting positions, Hammond will certainly rely on that foundation of discipline and hard work, and with an experienced coaching staff that includes Barnes as the offensive line coach, defensive coordinator **Hamp Smith**, and second-year offensive coordinator and former **Heathwood Hall** and **Porter-Gaud** coach **Rick Reetz**, to teach the new players the finer points of starting at the varsity level.

The most visible hire over the past few months was that of head girls soccer coach **Ryan Brewer**. Brewer, a former **University of South Carolina** football standout in the **Lou Holtz** Era who was

most notable in the team’s 2001 victory over Ohio State in the Outback Bowl, volunteered for the girls soccer coaching job when head coach **Rafael Marquez** stepped down just before the 2025 season. Brewer had two daughters on the team, **Elle Brewer**, who graduated and now plays for Winthrop, and rising junior **Brooks Brewer**.

The Skyhawks under Ryan Brewer last spring won the Region 1-4A championship. Hammond reached the state championship game, only to fall 6-0 to Porter-Gaud. Five of the Cyclones’ goals came after a controversial decision by the officials to red-card senior goalkeeper **Maxine Palisin** after an illegal touch.

While the season ended on a sour note, and while Brewer’s time as head coach may have been perceived as an interim effort, Barnes said that his former roommate at USC

“It started off that way (as a temporary hire), but Ryan enjoyed it so much that we’re trying to get some support around him,” Barnes said. “I think because his daughter’s a junior and she’ll be a part of the team for two more years and a college prospect at that, he may want to stay on at least until she graduates.”

The Hammond swim team has a new coach in **Randi Vogel**. Vogel, a longtime assistant at USC as well as at **Missouri** and **Cincinnati**. She also the Gamecock Swim Camp director from 2012-2016. As an athlete, she earned a scholarship to swim for **Tennessee** before transferring to Cincinnati.

Hammond girls basketball, which went 1-16 last spring after a 15-6 run in the 2023-2024 season, also has a new coach with a familiar background. Long-time boys assistant **Mark Goddard** will take over the girls program.

Hammond has made many facility improvements over the past three years, such as installing turf on the football field that is marked for soccer and lacrosse, a new track and a new throwing area for track and field events, and new tennis courts. More recent improvements are a student athlete congregation area beside the tennis courts that includes lockers and a shaded area for cooling down.

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

Returning to Jefferson Davis’ football staff are defensive coordinator **Matt Lightsey**, **Johnny Calloway** and **Mitchell Webster**. Reitenour will be calling the plays on offense.

Having that continuity will be a big plus, according to Reitenour.

“It always helps having a good group of coaches,” Reitenour said. “Lightsey (who was Reitenour’s predecessor as head coach), me and him meshed from Day 1. Calloway, I knew him from his coaching at Holy Hill and Dorchester, plus it is fun coaching with an old high school teammate.”

“Mitchell Webster, he’s young and learning from us. He’s improving every year. He’s still young, but he’s getting better at it. We all have things that we’re better at, but I feel like we complement each other really well.”

The Raiders have been ultra successful in Reitenour’s tenure, gong 31-9. They were 8-5 in his first season before going 12-2 and winning the 8-man state championship in 2023. Jefferson Davis was 11-2 last year, losing in the semifinals of the state playoffs.

The Raiders lost nine seniors from last year’s team, and the high school classes do not have a lot of boys in them. That has an obvious effect on numbers for football, with Reitenour saying he’s had 17 players for varsity and 11 for junior varsity for summer workouts.

That being said, Reitenour is happy with how the summer has gone.

“Things are not going bad,” he said. “We’re showing a lot of progress. We’re having to go back to the drawing board and work a little bit harder, but we’ve had to do that before. We’ve still got some unknowns, some things we need to work out, but these kids know how to win.”

Jefferson Davis will be breaking in a brand new offensive backfield, and whoever it is will have some mighty big shoes to fill. Gone are **Colson Loadholt**, **Nasir Void** and **James Grubbs**.

Grubbs rushed for 1,120 yards and 11 touchdowns, Void had 1,079 yards and 15 touchdowns, and Loadholt had 769 yards and 15 touchdowns as the quarterback. That’s 2,968 yards and 41 touchdowns.

The Raiders will open their season with a Week Zero game on August 15 against **Providence Athletic Club** in Columbia.

Reitenour led the boys basketball team to a 12-9 record and a share of the Region 2-Class A regular-season title with eventual state runner-up **Curtis Baptist**.

Veteran Jefferson Davis coach **Bart Owens** will return as the head coach for both volleyball and softball.

Owens led the volleyball team to a 15-4 record and its second straight region championship. That happened to be the second region title in program history as well.

The softball team won the 2024 Class A state championship under his tutelage.

Reitenour has the utmost respect for Owens.

Bart’s Bart,” Reitenour said. “You’re really not a part of SCISA if you don’t know who he is. He’s so passionate, and he loves the kids. Where a lot of coaches seem to hit a wall at a certain point, that’s not him. Bart seems to improve every year. He does so many things at JDA beyond coaching.”

The Raiders swept **Wardlaw Academy** in the best-of-3 quarterfinal series before being swept by then defending state champion **Richard Winn Academy** in the semifinals.

“Mannie’s great,” said Reitenour, who hired Wright as the athletic director. “He loves the kids. He creates a relationship with the kids even though he can be hard on them at times. He knows the game well, teaches the game well. This will be his third season, and I’ve seen progress every year. I’m happy to have him back again.”

Larry Johnson will be the girls head coach for the second straight year. He’s had other tenures as head coach, but his time at JDA has been interrupted by his military commitment.

“It’s been a flip-flop thing with him and Shawn (Howze), so we’re happy to have him for a second consecutive season,” Reitenour said. “The girls had a pretty decent year last year, and he has a pretty good group coming back. I know he’s excited for next year, taking it a little further. He’s consistent and does a good job.”

Jefferson Davis finished the season with a 7-12 record, losing to **Holly Hill Academy** 40-27 in the quarterfinals of the state tournament. They will return two All-Region performers in rising sophomores **Rileigh York** and **Riley Williams**.

Brian Rimpf will be back as the athletic director and football head coach. Rimpf has had to reshuffle his staff a bit with some of his assistants moving on.

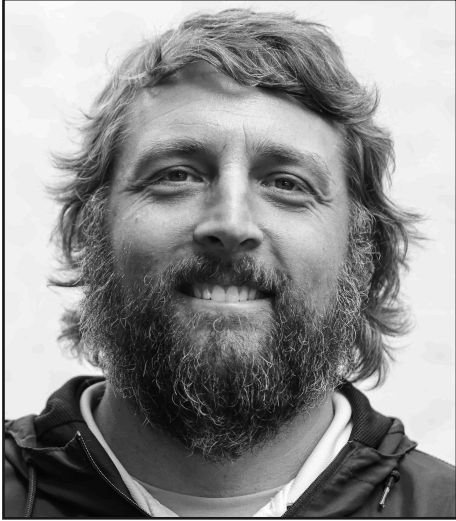

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
season in charge of the wrestling program.

Chesterfield – Looking for more stability in what has been a revolving door, **Chesterfield High** has hired a former player and alum to head up its football program.

Dixon also had previous coaching stops at McBee and Hannah-Pamlico before matriculating back to Chesterfield.

“This is where I always hoped I would be,” he said. “I’ve learned a lot from a lot of great coaches along the way and I’m excited to put my spin on things.”

Dixon feels strongly that relationships with the community and families will be the foundation for success.

“It is some important that our community is proud of their football program and I want to bring our players and community together,” Dixon said. “If we can do things to make our community proud, they will give us all the support that we need to be successful.


Dixon has brought in several other former players, both as volunteers and paid, to serve the program in some capacity. He says about 14 of the 17 coaches are Chesterfield graduates.

“I felt it was important to have guys that played here and have the same love for the program as I do,” Dixon said. “Our kids can relate to these guys and our coaches can relay what it takes to win to

Smith said Heath’s base defense is the 3-4, which is what Orangeburg Prep operated out of last year. However, the Indians are going to be more of an attack-oriented defense this year, according to Smith.

He led both the boys and girls to Division II titles in 2024.

The athletic program is led by athletic director and longtime girls basketball head coach **Jan Stoudenmire**. She led the Lady Indians to the championship round of the AAA state tournament this past season. She is returning to the sidelines for her 27th year as the Orangeburg Prep head coach.

Veteran **Tate Jameson** will return as the baseball head coach after guiding the Indians to their best season in over two decades. They reached the AAA best-of-3 state championship series before losing to **Hilton Head Prep** in three games. It was the first time Orangeburg Prep, which finished with a 27-5 overall record, had played for a baseball state title since 2003.

The district, as part of a county-wide upgrade of area schools facilities, refurbished the track and installed artificial turf on the football field. The track was completed in the spring of 2022 and the football field was ready by the start of that season. The turf cost is estimated at \$1.2 million while the track upgrade cost about \$800,000 dollars.

The stadium also has a new lighting system and also has a new video board.

The softball and baseball facilities have the best playing surfaces around and new scoreboards.

“It’s a joy to work here with so many great people,” said Heilbronn. “A lot of great things have happened over the last few years and we continue to make improvements where we can. 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
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


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Jones is the offensive coordinator who works with quarterbacks.

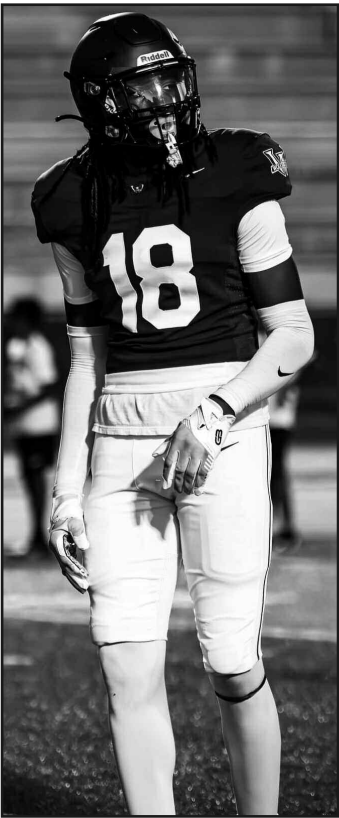

Zach Howerton is back after starting up the wrestling program last season. He’ll be the boys


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head coach while Brian Hall will be in charge of the boys program.

Columbia - One year into **Gray Collegiate Academy’s** move from the 2A classification to 4A, the transition process is in the rear-view mirror.
Last year was also **Kevin Heise’s** first full year as athletic director, and while the soccer and cross country coach had the challenge of taking on yet another job for the school, he and the school finished the year on a strong note.
“It was a great learning experience for me as a full-time AD. I’m certainly a better AD than I was a year ago at this time,” he said. “We had a very good year going from 2A to 4A. Regardless of classifications, we were sixth overall in the Carlisle Cup in Class 4A, and that speaks volumes for our coaching staff, student athletes, and our commitment to the process.”
The Carlisle Cup is awarded to the most outstanding athletic program in each classification. Gray Collegiate finished second in its final year as a 2A school.
Gray’s high finish despite its football team receiving a postseason ban for fielding an ineligible player is telling of the strength of the school’s other programs.
“That our football team did not get to participate in the playoffs, but if they had our finish would have been a little higher,” Heise said. “It is what it is. We learned a few things that set ups back, but we’re willing to soldier forward.”
The school’s boys and girls basketball teams both finished second in Region 4-4A and both reached the third round of the playoffs. Girls head coach **Brandon Wallace**, who won a state championship in 2023, returns. Boys head coach **Carlos Powell** was recently let go to make way for a familiar face.
Dion Bethea, Gray Collegiate’s first boys basket-

ball coach in the school’s history, returns to the program.
Bethea led the program before Gray joined the High School League for the 2014-2015 school year. Since being eligible for the postseason in 2016-2017, Bethea led the team to 273 wins and six Class 2A state championships, including three in a row from 2022-2024.
Bethea, who spent the 2024-2025 season as an assistant at Georgia Southern, replaces Powell, a former USC standout who coached at **Wilson** for four seasons before succeeding Bethea. Powell led the War Eagles to a 19-8 record.
“Anytime you get a coach who won the way he did and wants to come back in the program, you take him,” Heise said. “When he took the job at **Georgia Southern** he had been scratching an itch. He had always wanted to get into college, but his family stayed in Columbia and I guess it was homesickness. It couldn’t have been a better time for us and a better time for us. He put the mark of excellence on the program.”
Gray Collegiate ended the year strong, with the softball team winning its second state championship in three years and first at the 4A level. The girls track and field team won its second straight state title.
Heise’s boys soccer team (24-4) won the region title and reached the lower state final. Heise, a 34-year coaching veteran, also won his 600th soccer game this year.
Heise’s wife, **Emily Heise**, won her 100th soccer game last year and led the War Eagles to a 22-3 record, a region title and a second-round appearance in the state playoffs.
As for the football program, Heise said the team is in good hands with **De’Angelo Bryant** in his second year.

Midlands football teams to watch when fall begins

Columbia - Summer vacation

draws to a close, and with it comes the opening of preseason football camps across the state. In the Midlands two schools immediately come to mind when it comes to football: 5A Division I power **Dutch Fork** and SCISA 4A favorite **Hammond**.

Between those two teams are 31 state championships—22 for the Skyhawks (16 since 2006) and 9 for Dutch Fork (all since 2013). While both Hammond and Dutch Fork have firmly established winning traditions, both schools face the challenge of replenishing rosters following the loss of many senior starters and playmakers.

Plenty of teams besides Dutch Fork and Hammond will be interesting to watch this fall.

Irmo played for the 5A Division II state championship and while it loses phenomenal quarterback A.J. Brand to graduation, the Yellow Jackets still have plenty of weapons to remain a force in Midlands football.

Two other 5A schools, **River Bluff** and **Ridge View**, look to improve on their successful 2024 efforts, as will 4A schools **A.C. Flora** and **Gilbert**. On the 2A level **Fairfield Central** fell two scores short of playing for the 2A state championship, and **Batesburg-Leesville** rediscovered its football tradition with a great regular season and a decent run in the playoffs.

For now, the greatest promise this time of year has to offer is that every team in the Midlands is 0-0, and from that point forward everything is up for grabs, and any team could well grab it, no matter what they did the year before.

Dutch Fork (13-0, 5-0 Region 4-5A)

The Silver Foxes’ 35-21 victory over Summerville in the 5A Division I state championship game was the school’s third straight state title and ninth since head coach **Tom Knotts** took over the team in 2010.

“The climb to the top of the mountain is much easier than staying on the top. Trust me on that,” Knotts said after the win. “We’ve got to find ways to innovate, keep them working, keep them motivated. I’ve said many times that success is a double-edged sword. It can give you a lot of confidence but it can also destroy work ethic.”

Knotts touched on a critical time in 2023, when a senior-depleted team struggled in the early season but eventually came together and defeated Region 5A rival White Knoll for the state championship.

Dutch Fork may be in a similar position this fall. The Silver Foxes lost 30 seniors and lose up to nine starters on offense and up to seven starters on

defense. Quarterback **Ethan Offing** (2,974 passing yards, 24 TDs; 451 rushing yards, 8 TDs) returns, as does a core of experienced offensive linemen, but the Silver Foxes will have to find successors for running back **Maurice Anderson** (159 1,177 yards, 22 TDs; 40 catches, 521 yards, 3 TDs), three tight ends and four wide receivers, including wideout **Boykin Bickley** (60 catches, 1,160 yards, 9 TDs).

Linebacker **Raleigh Salters** (83 tackles, 15 TFLs, 4 sacks, 2 INTs) returns along with defensive end **Julian Walker** (50 tackles, 19 TFLs, 11 sacks), but Dutch Fork will have to find new talent along the defensive line and in the secondary, which lost **Elgin Sessions** (43 tackles, 4 TFLs, 3 INTs, 14 PBUs) but returns **Mario Anderson** (49 tackles, 2 TFLs, 1 INT, 8 PBUs).

Hammond (13-0, 7-0 SCISA Region 1-4A)

The Skyhawks won its eighth straight state championship, and **Jon Wheeler** won his fourth straight state title as a head coach. The Skyhawks, needed some serious veteran leadership in beating Porter-Gaud 28-21.

With the game tied at 21 late in the game, **Porter-Gaud** had the ball inside the 20-yard line, but the veteran defense pushed the Cyclones back to the Hammond 38-yard line and forced Porter-Gaud to punt.

The Skyhawks seasoned offense cranked out a clock-melting 80-yard

scoring drive, capped with yet another game-winning **Andrew Turner**-to-**Michael Tyler** touchdown pass with 45-seconds left. The defense came back on the field and secured the win for Hammond.

“Just so proud of this group, their resilience, their fight,” Wheeler said after the game. “We’ve been down at halftime in three of our last four state championship games. This team is battle-tested and they rise to the occasion.”

Hammond averaged 45.1 points per game last year in extending their winning streak to 23 games dating back to Sept. 8, 2023.

The Skyhawks take the field in a few weeks as the favorite in SCISA to win it all again, but this fall they’ll be much younger—just three players, all offensive linemen, return on offense. Five players return on defense.

With an array of younger players contending for the starting positions, Hammond will certainly rely on that foundation of discipline and hard work, and with an experienced coaching staff that includes athletic director

Jeff Barnes as the offensive line coach, defensive coordinator **Hamp Smith**, and second-year offensive coordinator and former Heathwood Hall and Porter-Gaud coach **Rick Reetz**, to teach the new players the finer points of starting at the varsity level.

Irmo (12-2, 4-1 Region 4-5A)

The Yellow Jackets, who went 25-3 over the past two seasons, fell to Dutch Fork in the region championship game last fall but reached the 5A Division 2 state final, their first state championship appearance since 2006. Irmo lost 34-31 in the final game as **Northwestern’s Matthew Fish** hit a 27-yard field goal as time expired.

Seventh-year head coach **Aaron Brand** returns while his son, **A.J. Brand** is beginning his college career at **Virginia Tech**. The younger Brand led the Yellow Jackets with 2,600 passing yards and 30 touchdowns, and rushed for 2,029 yards and 27 touchdowns. Replacing Brand’s production will be Irmo’s biggest challenge, but with junior running backs **Amire White** (118 carries, 942 yards, 7 TDs) and **Maleek Miller** (21 carries, 330 yards, 3 TDs), and with wide receiver **Donovan Murph** (96 catches, 1,328 yards, 12 TDs) all returning, the Yellow Jackets’ offense may be in good shape.

Behind Dutch Fork, Hammond and Irmo, there is no shortage of teams who could improve upon last year. Below are just a few teams who

players committed to major college programs

Moncks Corner—Coming into the annual SCACA Clinic (July, 27) there are 30 football players from the 2026 class in South Carolina who have committed to major college football programs to date, a 10 player increase over this exact time a year ago.

As always, we would like to extend our sincere appreciation to **Mark Grainger**, and the fine folks at *Modern Turf*, in Irmo and Rembert, for sponsoring our monthly recruiting feature page.

One thing that might be helping the numbers increase, via more players being offered, is the fact that major colleges now have a total allotment of 105 scholarships, when in the past it was 85. Last year the state of South Carolina produced 40 major college football signees from within the state, with 8 to 10 players firming up offers into December and early January.

The *HSSR* attended the announcement of **Timberland** offensive lineman **Desmond Green** (6-

5,348), rated at number one by the *HSSR* based on 21 confirmed major college offers, on June, 26 in the gym at his high school.

At his announcement ceremony, Green told the *HSSR*, in the end, he chose Florida from a final-five list that also included **South Carolina, Virginia Tech, Oklahoma, and Georgia**

Green, a straight A student, shared just why he chose Florida. “I just fell in love with everything down there in Gainesville,” said Green. “Their tradition, culture and the environment along with the people at Florida impressed me very much. I just fell in love with everything I experienced on my visits to Florida.

“I wanted to make a decision now, so I can focus on helping my high school team have a successful season my senior year,” said Green. “I also want to focus on my academics as well.”

Green said he is still developing as a player and realizes he still has work to do to reach his ultimate goal of one day playing in the NFL. Green will major in Business once he gets to college.
