# A record 50 in-state football players likely to sign college offers by National Signing Day


Moncks Corner—As of early November the state of South Carolina has confirmed 45 senior prep football players in the Palmetto State who have committed to major college football and the HSSR strongly believes that by the final national signing say in February the state will hit a record of 50 2026 players moving on to major college football.

# You never know when an underdog is about to pounce - just ask Hilton Head Prep!

**Moncks Corner**—-The second season of prep football, known as the play-offs, will forever only see rare upsets in the first round, but in the SCISA ranks, one has to be mildly shocked that the 2-8 **Hilton Prep Dolphins** went up to 8-1 **Calhoun** Academy, and pulled off a major upset 27-26; giving the Dolphins their first play-off win in over a

Calhoun Academy came into the game averaging 400 yards of offense per game, while outscoring teams 376-132, entering the game. HHP came into the game having been outscored by teams 260-52. Wow! This "first round" upset ranks up there with just about any upset, in either the SCHSL or SCISA play-offs, in the 40 years the HSSR has been covering prep sports in South Carolina.

HSSR Historian Gerald Doolittle, who started a power rating for all prep football teams in South Carolina, starting way-back in 1967, had this to say about the HHP upset win. "It ranks among the top three all-time upsets in the first round of state playoff history," said Doolittle. "I checked six different sources before I was convinced the score was accurate. Calhoun Academy came into the game favored to win by 40-points on Doodles Doodles."

In US history class, we learned to say, "Remember The Alamo," and in week two of the play-offs in South Carolina, heavily favored teams might need to embrace the words, "Beware Of What Hilton Head Prep Accomplished In Round One."

Imagine what a fun ride home it was, after the big win, for the Hilton Head Prep fans that drove the 100-plus miles to the game. You also must wonder

how many of their fans didn't attend the game thinking it was going to be a blow-out in favor of Calhoun Academy.

All underdogs, in round two of the SC football play-offs, need to embrace what the Dolphins were able to achieve last week. One thing I do know, "You have to believe before you can achieve!"

In the 58 SCHSL & SCISA play-off games scheduled for round two of the play-offs this week, Doodles predicts no toss-up games. In the SCHSL Div. I & II AAAAA brackets, only **Dutch Fork**, Carolina Forest, Irmo, and Northwestern are favored to win by 26 or more points.

In the SCHSL AAAA brackets, only **South** Pointe, South Florence, Gray Collegiate and **Hilton Head** are favored to win by 20 or more points. In AAA, BHP, Oceanside Collegiate, Woodruff, and Newberry are favored to win their games this week by 20 or more points. In Class AA only **Clinton** and **Phillip Simmons** are favored by Doodles to win by 20 points or more. In Class A, Abbeville, Lamar, Cross, and Bamberg-Ehrhardt are favored to win by 20, or more points.

Finally, in SCISA, there are 10 games scheduled this week with the winners advancing on to compete for state titles. The 11-man SCISA state championships are scheduled to be contested at South Carolina State University on Friday and Saturday Nov. 21 and 22. The 8-man game is still TBA.

Only two SCISA teams are forecast by Doodles to win their games this week, by 20, or more points. Those teams are Class A Williamsburg Academy and SCISA AAAA team Northwood Academy.

For the record, Gerald Doolittle has been forecasting prep games in SC for 58 seasons. The HSSR publishes Doodles Doodles for amusement purposes only each week on our hssr.com web site. Over the years many people have asked Gerald what his formula for producing power ratings have been accurate over 80 per cent of the time!

Gerald refuses to share his process with anyone. This writer was shocked to be informed by the 82year-old Doolittle, within the last year, that upon his death (assuming I am still around when God calls the veteran genius forecaster to heaven) that yours truly will inherent the top-secret formula)! **Sumter** – As is normally the case, the first round of the South Carolina High School League AAAA football state playoffs, the overwhelming majority of the 16 games were blowouts.

Half of them were decided by by 20 points or more with six of the eight having victory margins of at least 30 points. Four more of them came by at least 14 points. Only four games were decided by less than 10 points.

Only three games were won by the lower seeded teams. One was the 8-9 game in the upper state bracket with No. 9 Emerald topping No. 8 Foutain Inn 44-36. The other two came in the lower state. No. 10 seed Wilson beat No. 7 May River 36-28. The other was a fairly significant upset. No. 12 seed Gilbert knocked off No. 5 seed Bluffton 38-21.

A huge upset came oh so close to occurring. Perennial power, once-beaten and No. 2 seed **Daniel** had to score a fourth-quarter touchdown to beat No. 15 seed Dreher 14-10. The Blue Devils ended the year with a 3-8

With all of the preliminaries out of the way, it's now time to get down to business. Let's work our way down each of the brackets and see who will be in Orangeburg on December 6 at South Carolina State's Oliver C. Dawson Stadium for a noon kickoff with the state championship on the line.

We'll start with the upper state bracket:

"Playing Daniel this year has a little added motivation for us," Rimpf said. "We have a recent history with them and are excited to be able to play a familiar team. Like all Daniel teams, they are well-coached, play with great effort and will be a tough opponent."

Daniel is in its first season under head coach Chris Stone. The Lions are led by sophomore quarterback Jace **Grass**. He has completed 170 of 275 passes or 2,641 yards and 29 touchdowns against just one interception.

This should be a fun game but look for the Lions to be victorious.

South Pointe is 10-1 and the No. 1 seed. The Stallions are led by South Carolina commitment Z'zavien Cur**rence**. He is a standout strong safety and is also the starting quarterback. They should come away with a comfortable victory over 6-4 Emerald. In the

This reporter was on hand for that mild upset win at Charleston Southern back in September but there is too much football left to be played in Class AAA just to go ahead and give the trophy to the most talented team in AAA in South Carolina

The AAA SCHSL state finals will take place at high noon on Friday December 5th at **South** Carolina State University so you AAA fans go ahead and phone in to your boss about having the flu because this is not a Saturday game.

Oceanside Collegiate, coached by **Brent** LaPrad, advanced this week to host Marlboro County by defeating Georgetown 49-15 last week. The Bulldogs, who have an 180- mile ride to Charleston in front of them this week, advanced with a 49-13 win over **Swansea**. Do not be surprised if the Bulldogs hang around for three quarters against Oceanside but in the final quarter the Sharks should win with their depth numbers.

BHP did survive the graduation of all-world running back **Maurquise Henderson**, now at Clemson, and the number one ranked 11-0 Bears advanced with a 56-7 win over **Palmetto** in round one. Russell Blackstone's team has been the most offensive productive team at all levels of prep football in SC with a state leading 558 points! (Wow!)

Coach Blackston told the *HSSR* recently, "It sure is good when you can graduate 8,000 yards and 100 touchdowns in Marquise Henderson, that you can still be very good. There are people who thought we were not going to be anything and that's okay. I knew we had 23 seniors back and six starters back on both sides. We're where I thought we would be. We had a tremendous Spring and a tremendous summer."

BHP will host Southside Christian this week. The Sabres defeated **Chapman** 55-18 to

Senior BHP QB Noah Thomas is among the best dual threat athletes in the state. By season's end Thomas should pass for well over 2,200 yards and he will be close to 1,000 yards rushing. His favorite target is junior stud Tajeh Watson Martin.

Third ranked **Loris** (11-0) beat **Dillon** for the second year in a row and that got the folks around town pretty whipped up for sure. # **Predicting the AA state champion? We think it's Central**

**Sumter** – Trying to figure out who the best football team is in the South Carolina High School **League's** AA classification has not been an easy task. Records have been distorted with teams like defending state champion **Clinton** and defending runner-up **Fairfield Central** playing up in non-region games and taking losses. Then you have tough regions like Region 2 with Strom Thurmond, Batesburg-Leesville and Saluda locking up in epic battles.

Then there is Region 4. It has the team with the best record among the contenders in **Central** with a 9-1 record after the first round of the state playoffs. However the Eagles didn't even wn the region title. They lost to **Andrew Jackson**, which is the region champion.

They could meet again – for the state championship – since Region 4 is a hybrid region. AJ is in the upper state bracket and Central is in the lower state bracket. Another region team, Cheraw, is still alive in the lower state bracket.

So you know how we figure all of this out, right? By letting the playoffs play out.

With one week in the books, let's try to figure out who will be playing for the state title on Saturday, December 6, at South Carolina State's Oliver C. Dawson Stadium in Orangeburg beginning at 4 p.m.

Here we go starting with the upper state second round:

Saluda at Clinton Fairfield Central at Andrew Jackson **Batesburg-Leesville at Chester** Liberty at Strom Thurmond

These are all teams that have been consequential in AA in the last few years. You have four region champions in Region 1 Clinton, Region 2 Strom Thurmond, Region 3 Chester and Region 4 Andrew Jackson. There are three second-place teams in Fairfield Central, B-L and Liberty.

Saluda finished third but it lost to both Thurmond and B-L in overtime and dropped a 1-point decision to **Ninety Six**. While the Tigers will put up a strong fight, Clinton shoul come away victorious with running back Javen Cook leadin the way.

Fairfield Central is 8-3, while AJ is 7-4 with one of thosef losses coming to the Griffins by a 35-0 count. The Volunteers won't be able to make up enough of that gap.

Batesburg-Leesville has rebounded from a slow start and is 8-3. Chester started the season 1-3 but has won six of its last seven to go to 7-4. Running back Amadre Wooden and wide receiver KD Whitt should provde enough plays to give B-L a victory.

# **Everyone chasing Abbeville and Bamberg-Ehrhardt in Class A playoffs**

**Moncks Corner**—There were no major upsets at the top of the Class A food chain in the first round of the playoffs on November, 7. Now that there are 16 schools left hoping to punch their tickets to the gold medal round, the winning margins are going to tighten up, and round two games should be much more competitive.

The goals of the 16 teams left are all the same; be 1-0 every week and eventually punch your team's ticket to the Class A gold medal round scheduled for 4 p.m. on Friday December 5 at South Carolina State University. (Be there and bring the whole town with you!)

In the first week of the playoffs the HSSR number two ranked Abbeville (9-2) defeated **Great Falls** 63-0, and the "A" will now host Trent Usher's Lewisville Lions team after the Lions drilled **Whitmire** 62-0 in the first round. These two teams met later in the playoffs last year with the Panthers winning easily.

Abbeville will be seeking their 14<sup>th</sup> overall state title this season. The Panthers earned number 13 last December in a 58-20 win over **Cross**. Last year's Panther team was comprised of 27 seniors and this year's team came into the 2025 season much younger but still loaded with home grown athletes.

After his team's season opening 42-0 win over Southside Christian, Coach Nickles told the HSSR, "We have a chance to be a really competitive football team. We have to keep working and improving. We'll see how it goes.'

Jaden Baylor took over the QB duties for Abbeville this season and he has improved with each game. **Darius Riley** is the team's work horse at RB, and he started off the season with tackle breaking touchdowns runs of 71 and 67 yards in the season opener. Cole Driggers is a leader at left

tackle in the offensive front.

Top ranked **Bamberg-Ehrhardt** (11-0) has the distinction of being the most productive scoring offense in Class A, so far this season (597 points) and they also have the best scoring defense (49) in the state entering the playoffs. The Raiders will host **Latta** this week as a double- digit favorite. Latta advanced with a 34-14 win over **Bap**tist Hill.

**Corey Crosby** is in his 5<sup>th</sup> season as the Raiders head coach and his team has now won 16 straight region games. His career record at B-E over this five- year period is 52-11 and the Raiders came into the 2025 season with 15 returning starters.

A few impact B-E players include senior all-state WR Marcus Cann (6-2, 195) who is also a topflight DB. OL is one of the strengths of the team and three returners from last season have literally road graded the competition. They are center Michael Manigault (6-0,265), LG Jaden Moody (6-0,255), and junior RT **Simeon Bamberg** (5-11, 195).

**Carvers Bay** is 10-0 and by Shrine Bowl OL **Zyon Guiles** (6-5, 295) who is committed to **South Carolina**. The Bears will host region rival Lake View this week in round two. They defeated Lake View 32-7 on October 10, but most observers feel like this game will be more competitive. The Bears advanced in round one with a 59-0 win over **Allendale-Fairfax** last week while the Wild Gators beat **Hardeeville** 28-6 to advance.

In upper state Class A this week, Blackville-Hilda will host CA Johnson after getting by eliminating McCormick 15-0 last week. **CA Johnson** advanced on a 12-0 win over **Calhoun County**. Number five HSSR ranked HKT (9-2) HKT would love to be the Cinderella of Class A and claim the glass slipper at SC State in December. They eliminated Lee Central 56-14 in the first round and they are now ready to host a talented number 8 ranked Ware

# Dillon defeats Fox Creek to open up AAA playoffs

**Dillon**—The **Dillon Wildcats** are playing very good football, at the right time, as the AAA playoffs began last week when they dominated visiting Fox Creek 49-8, and they are preparing to host Silver Bluff in round two this week.

"Silver Bluff is a very physical and athletic team and we will have to play well against them at home Friday night," said head Dillon coach Kelvin Roller. "I was pleased with our over-all performance against Fox Creek last week but we are yet to play our best game of the season."

One strong suit of the Dillon offense this season has been the combination of freshman quarterback Khayel Fong-Talia to senior receiver Zay Robertson, who is a commitment to North Carolina and he will also play in the Shrine bowl after the season. "Yes, Khayel to Zay has been really special this season," said Coach Roller.

"We also have received a lot of production in our running game from Domo Feltin and Noah Singletary," said Coach Roller. "Our defense has been led by all-star linebackers Daniel Capehart and Keryien Brown and they have been good leaders for us on defense.

"We have to stay healthy and it is also good to have some breaks go your way," said Coach Roller. "We have to focus on being 1-0 each week for the rest of the season. In Dillon, our goal will always be to compete for a state championship."

Against Fox Creek, receiver Rike Niyongabo got the scoring going for Dillon on a 32-yard pass from Fong-Talia early in the first period and the PAT made it 7-0. Later in the first period senior running back **Dominick Felton** scored on a seven-yard run and Fong-Talia's second PAT made it 14-0 after the first period.

In the second period, Dillon added three touchdowns to take a 35-0 lead at halftime. Fong-Talia scored on a 51-yard keeper on one score; receiver Nicholas Harrison caught a 280yard touchdown pass for the second score of he second period and then Felton capped off a drive with a four-0ayrd touchdown run late in the period to make it 35-0.

In the third period D'rontae McCalm returned an interception for pick six to make it 42-0 after Fong-Talia's PAT and near the end of the third period running back Noah Singletary scored on an 83-yard run with the PAT closing out Dillon's 49-point outburst in the game.

For the game Singletary led Dillon rushers with five carries for 106 yards and a touchdown. Fong-Talai added 70 yards on five carries and





# Barnwell's rare rebuilding year ends at Timberland

**Barnwell**—Barnwell began the 2025 football season with back-to-back wins over Blackville-Hilda and Williston- Elko before losing their next six games, but the Warhorses rebounded in their final two regular season games with wins over Edisto and Whale Branch before concluding the season with a 46-8 loss at **Timberland** that ended the season.

After the Timberland loss, head coach Brian **Smith** shared his thoughts with the media. "This was a tough way to end our season at Timberland tonight," said Coach Smith. "It's hard to win when you give up touchdowns on a kickoff return punt, return interception return, and a block punt for scores," added Coach Smith. "We started out strong and got ahead early, and then I think the kickoff return for the touchdown, took the wind out of our sails.

"I thought our kids fought hard all year," said Coach Smith. "We ended up losing **Jayden** Peeples and Nehemiah Brown to injuries during the game. That hurts us on both sides of the football.

"We are proud of all of our seniors and what all they have accomplished," said Coach Smith. "They've all had great careers, including last year's state championship game appearance. Their leadership is carried us through-out grueling and injury filled season.

"As we looked at the future, I told our kids tonight we gotta get back in that weight room, as soon as possible, and continue to work to get bigger, faster, and stronger." said Coach Smith. "I feel like we did a good job last year, pushing Timberland around, and they pushed us around a little bit also tonight. We've gotta get back in the weight room, and get back to work so that we can become a team that's more physical next season."

Senior running back Nehemiah Brown was a bright spot on offense for the Warhorses as he came into the Timberland game leading all rushers with 861 yards on 149 carries and 8 touchdowns. **Jayden Peeples** added 672 yards on 72 carries on six TD's before his season ending injury. **Henri Creech** stepped up and rushed for

202 yards on 45 carries with one touchdown and

Marcus Jacobs contributed 200 yards rushing

**Damahjai Devore** led receivers with 14 catches for 146 yards and one touchdown. Peeples had three catches for 114 yards and three touchdowns.

Veteran place kicker Lane Evans was perfect on his PAT's and he made one field goal from 41 yards. Quarterback Josiah Gibson completed 10-of-22 passes for 168 yards and two touchdowns on the season.

The defense was led by **Fat Brown**, Devoe, Bridgedon Youmans, Creech, Toryn Pickens, Alden Saxson, Jackson Beddingfield, Carl Hines, and Emmaunel Green.

Barnwell won their last two regular season games of the year with a 20-6 win over **Edisto** and a 43-12 win over **Whale Branch** in the final two regular season game when they went exclusively to the Wish bone offense.

"We made the switch to use the Wishbone exclusively because it gave us our best chance to be successful," said head coach Brian Smith.

In the win over Edisto the Warhorses piled up 246 rushing yards on 46 carries and three rushing TD's. Against the Cougars, Brown rushed for 139 yards on 24 carries with three TD's. Peeples added 104 yards on 21 carries.

Then against Whale Branch, Peeples has his best game of the season. On 16 carries he rushed for 190 yards and two touchdowns. He caught a 42-yard pass for a score. On defense he had five tackles and he also recovered an onsides kick.

Another positive note is that two-way lineman Jackson Beddingfield will represent Barnwell in the North-South all-star football game at Myrtle Beach in December. Beddingfield has also earned all-region honors.







# **Spartanburg Day football finishes on target**

Spartanburg—It has been 42 years since the Spartanburg Day School fielded a varsity football team, but that drought will be over starting with the 2026 season as the Griffins recently completed a season of junior varsity football, after starting the transition with a "B" team in

Patrick Moffitt is the Football Program Head for the Griffins, and he has been pleased with the progress of the athletes on the junior varsity this season. The team was 1-4 this season with their win coming over **Blacksburg** at home on September 18.

"We are very pleased with the progress we've made as a program these past two years," said Coach Moffitt. "If you would have told me after the first day of practice back in the summer of 2024 that we would have accomplished some of the things we have so far, I wouldn't have believed you.

"The progress and development of each and every player in the program, has been amazing to watch," said Coach Moffitt. "The way they have bought into the program is truly special, and if they continue to keep the same mindset, I think they will all have a very memorable next few years of varsity football together.

"The support from the school community has been incredible as well," said Coach Moffitt. "Everyone is so excited for each game each week, and that excitement will only continue to grow as we get closer to playing our first lot of guys started to get more comfortable and developed varsity game next year.

"Charlie Birch also chipped in with big plays in the passing game from his tight end position. Upfront, Nick Querin led the way on our offensive line.

On defense, Boyd and Wilson led the team in total tackles. **Tyler Fernanders** was great in the defensive back- field and he led the team with two interceptions. The defensive front was led by Gibbes Montgomery, **Lawson Robinson** and the trio gave opposing offensive lines problems with numerous plays during the season.

Coach Moffitt cited Armin Pader as a force on special teams. The majority of Pader's kickoffs were touchbacks. He was perfect on PAT's and made one of two field goal attempts with the one miss being 49 yards. Wilson was the Griffins leading return man and he had one kick-off return for a touchdown.

"One of the best things about this past year was that a as leaders," said Coach Moffitt. "We have a team full of guys that have all the qualities that it takes to be a captain and that is a good spot to be in as an emerging program.

The offense scored 60 or more points six times and the defense pitched four shutouts including the last three region games. They average 53 points per game on 86 touchdowns while gaining over 6200 yards of offense.



# **Manning overcomes slow start to claim region**

Manning - Following Manning High

**School's** 26-12 loss to **East Clarendon** on Septem- first half. ber 26, Monarchs head

coach **Reggie Kennedy** stood in the drizzling rain on EC's Shad Hall Field not chastising his team, but instead offering words of comfort.

Kennedy told his players that the loss in their Region 7-AA opener didn't mean their goals were out of reach, stating no one was going undefeated

Perhaps 31 years as a head coach makes one a soothsayer. No one did go undefeated in Region 7, but one team did lose just once and that was MHS.

Manning won its final five region contests and secured its second straight region title with a 40-12 victory over Lake City at Ramsey Stadium on Oc-

That set Manning up for the chance to host in the first three rounds of the state playoffs. The Monarchs got things started with a 48-7 win over Academic Magnet in the first round on November 7. They will take on **Timberland**, which beat Barnwell 46-6 in the second round on November

"I thought if this team every grew up we could be a good, solid football team," said Kennedy, whose team is now 8-3 on the season and finished with a 5-1 region mark. "It's probably one of the most talented groups we've had since I've been at Manning (his seventh season). We were just real young and we had to learn how to win on Fridays. Once we learned how to win, learned how to finish, we'd be a championship football team."

The Monarchs dominated the game in the trenches. They rushed for 462 yards on 61 carries. Senior running back **Jontavious Canty** led the way with 275 yards and three touchdowns on 31 carries. and eight scores on 60 carries. He also ran for two of MHS' five 2-point conver-

LC needed just two plays to take a 6-0 lead. Atter that, it was all Monarchs. They answered with a 9-play scoring drive. A 20-yard completion from quarterback Lovell Stevenson to brother Lovon **Stevenson** set MHS up for a first down and goal at the Panthers 4. Canty scored on the next play and Lovell Stevenson threw to **Dontavious Canty** for the 2-point conversion to make it 8-6 with 7:31 left in the first quarter.

The Monarchs needed eight plays to go 70 yards and reach the end zone the next time it got the ball with Jontavious Canty scoring on a 7-yard run. He then ran for two to make it 16-6 with 3:17 to go.

On its next possession, MHS was facing fourth and two at its 47 when it decided to go for a first down. Instead, it got a touchdown as Jontavious Canty broke through the line and went 53 yards to paydirt on the final play of the first quarter. He added the conversion run to make it 24-6.

Lake City responded with a nice drive, moving to a first and goal at the Manning 7. However, on the 10<sup>th</sup> play of the drive, quarterback **Amari** Hanna was intercepted by defensive back Isaiah

The Monarchs took over at their 3 and drove to the Panthers 7 before turning the ball over on

downs. Jontavious Canty ran for 95 yards on the drive on nine carries with the big run being a 40yarder. He finished with 224 rushing yards in the

Canty, who led MHS in rushing and tackles from his linebacker post last season, was sidelined for the first month with a dislocated hip. He missed the first five games of the season on offense and the first four on defense, finishing with 19 tackles at linebacker against Est Clarendon. Kennedy said there's no doubt his presence has made a huge dif-

"I've watched them grow up and really started playing well, especially when we got Jon back," the head coach said. "When we were starting to play well is when we were gelling well on both sides of the football.

"I'm just so happy for him," Kennedy said of Canty, who had rushed for 587 yards and nine touchdowns on 89 carries entering the state playoffs. "The way he bounced back from what he went through with the dislocated hip. He's a kid that does everything we ask him to do, day in and day out, on and off the field.."

**Tyrell Nelson** scored on a 20-yard run and Lovell Stevenson ran for two to make it 32-6 with 10:33 remaining in the game. Stevenson scored the Monarchs' final touchdown on a 14-yard run with 3:30 left. **Javonte Brock** ran for the 2-poiint conversion to make it 40-6.

Lovell Stevenson rushed for 70 yards on nine carries while completing 3 of 5 passes for 45 yards. Daniel Robinson had 44 yards on eight carries, and Nelson had 37 yards on five carries.

The Monarchs have a lot of options running the football. Robinson leds with 703 yards and six TDs on 91 carries, Baxter had 481 yards and four TDs on 87 carries, and Lovell Stevenson had 284 yards

Lovell Stevenson had completed 59 of 104 passes or 1,055 yards and 14 TDs against just five interceptions. His top target has been CJ Robinson, who had 36 catches or 739 yards and 12 scores.

Linebacker Ethan Lowder led Manning with nine tackles. Jontavious Canty had eight tackles, two of them for a loss.

Lowder leads the team in tackles with 90 and has 12 TFLs. Dontavious Canty had 50 tackles and 6 ½ TFLS, while Jontavious had 49 tackles, returned two fumbles or touchdowns and had eight TFLs. Lovon Stevenson led in TFLs with 12 ½ and quarterback sacks with three to go with 56 stops.

Kennedy is hoping the Monarchs will be able to take full advantage of what it has accomplished. MHS certainly did that last year, winning three home games before losing to Barnwell on the road in the lower state championship game.

"It's a key to play at home," Kennedy said. "We learned that last year (when Manning reached the lower state championship game). That 12<sup>th</sup> man, playing at home. It just felt good doing it. We knew if we won region, we've got first three rounds at home. It puts us in a pretty good bracket, in a pretty good situation."





# Stallions in pursuit of fifth straight title appearance

Kingstree – The Williamsburg Academy football team is one victory away from playing in a fifth straight state championship game. The Stallions defeated **Patrick Henry Academy** 40-12 in the first round of the SCISA Class A state playoffs. They will play host to Thomas Heyward Academy, the team they lost to in last year's title game, in a semifinal game on November 14.

With all of that recent success, first-year head coach Will Furse anticipated Williamsburg being good again. However, he knew there were a lot of variables involved in just how good it could be.

I was hoping we'd have a season like we've had so far," Furse said prior to the playoff opener. "They've worked hard and they've practiced hard. They're all good football players.

"I try not to look too far ahead. I try to make it where my expectations are just on the next day of practice. Hopefully our season has a couple of more weeks in it.'

The Stallions are 9-1 and have outscored the opposition 351-123 They have been consistent from week to week, according to Furse.

"I say it's been steady," Furse said. "We've been tremendous on defense. We had three region games and held our opponents to 21 points. Offensively, we've been able to run the ball really well. When your running back is averaging over 10 yards a carry and your quarterback is averaging over 10 yards a carry, those are usually good signs."

The aforementioned running back and quarterback are junior Grant Small and senior Micah **Balder**, respectively. Small had rushed for 1,582 yards and 24 touchdowns on 148 carries entering the playoffs, an average of 10.7 yards per carry. Balder was averaging 11.4 yards on 40 carries good for 456 yards and five scores.

Sophomore running back **Eli Brown** had 456 yards and four touchdowns on 66 carries.

Williamsburg's offensive line has junior Michael Ard at right guard, junior Marlin Morris at right tackle, junior **Mason Cribb** at left tackle, junior Sammy Tomlinson at left guard and sophomore Henderson Livingston at center.

Because of the success on the ground, Williamsburg only averages eight pass attempts a game. However, Balder is making pretty good use of them, hitting on 43 of 73 passes for 841 yards and eight touchdowns against just one interception.

In the regular-season finale, the Stallions beat previously undefeated **Dorchester Academy** 36-21 for the Region 1 title. While Balder only threw nine passes, he hit on eight of them for 186 yards and three touchdowns. Junior wingback/wide receiver Charlie Caulder had a great game, catching five passes for 172 yards and touchdowns of 95 and 64 yards, respectively.

The 95-yard score came on a wheel route, a play Williamsburg installed just for the Raiders.

"That was the first time we've ran it," Caulder said. "I got up the sideline (coming out of the backfield), and the quarterback threw one of the prettiest passes of the year. It was an over-the-shoulder pass. I just had to stay in bounds and had to make sure that I caught it. I had about four yards on the defender."

Was Caulder excited when he heard the play

"Anytime I know there's a chance of me getting that ball I'm excited," he said. "And it had the right

Caulder has easily been Balder's favorite target He had 25 catches for 548 yards and six touchdowns entering the playoffs.

Furse said he and his staff aren't using Caulder nearly as much as they should.

"Charlie had a phenomenal game," Furse said. "He does it in practice all the time, and it carries over to the games. We probably haven't gotten the ball to him all year the way we should. He's a matchup nightmare for other teams, and we've got to be trying to take advantage of that.

"He's a great blocker. We run behind him a ton. He's tall, 6-(foot-)3 (inches), 6-4. He's very fast, a 400-meter (dash) trak guy, and he has great hands. You put all that together and it makes him a very difficult matchup.'

Furse said it's nice to have that passing option to keep defenses honest.

"We probably should throw the ball more just to become more balanced," he said. "You're harder to defend if you're good at it. We'll take hat people are giving us."

The Stallion defense isn't giving the opposition much of anything defensively. Ard was easily the leading tackler with 102 from his linebacker slot. Caulder, also a linebacker, is a force defensively as well. He had 52 tackles, including a team high 13 tackles for loss.


### **Boys Volleyball**







# **Swampcats end regular season on hot streak**

**Manning** – The season was anything but steady for the Laurence Manning Academy football team with peaks and valleys along the way. The Swampcats ended the regular season on an upward climb with three straight victories to finish with a 6-4 overall record and earn the right to host a home game in the first round of the SCISA AAAA state playoffs.

Laurence Manning beat **Porter-Gaud** 22-21 at its Billy Chitwood Field to secure the right to host the Cyclones on November 7 in the playoffs. Unfortunately for the Swampcats, things didn't work out so well on the second go around. P-G came away with a 13-6 victory and was set to play Northwood Academy in the semifinals.

Veteran head coach **Jimmy Noonan**, who's in his first season at Laurence Manning, has no complaints about the year.

"I think it's been a very good season," Noonan said prior to the playoff game. "I feel like we navigated the ups and downs pretty well. We always had solid leadership throughout the season.

"Our numbers were not what they needed to be. That led to problems with injuries and we had to patchwork together a competitive team at times. I think this group is really maximizing its abilities and capabilities. The measuring stick is solid."

The triumph over Porter-Gaud was a spine-tingling one. Sophomore placekicker Daniel Vargas connected on his third field goal of the contest, this one from 35 yards out with 12 seconds remaining for the 1-point win.

Vargas was a reliable part of the offense, hitting his groove down the homestretch. He finished the regular season hitting on 10 of 13 field goal attempts, including 6 of 7 in the final two regular-season contests. The final one of those seven was the first one he attempted with the game on the line, where a miss secures a loss or a make gives you a victory.

The Swampcats put together a last-second drive to put him in position with quarterback Grainger Powell connected with wide receiver Scoop Dennis for a 21-yard gain to the Porter-Gaud 18-yard line. Laurence Manning, which converted on three fourth downs on the 15-play drive, rushed to the line and spiked the ball to stop the clock with a dozen ticks re-

Vargas, who had delivered on a 34-yarder and a 42-yarder earlier, was true once again to secure the win. Vargas admitted the circumstances surrounding the kick affected how he approached the attempt.

"It was a little bit of a different feeling," Vargas said. "We just had a few seconds on the clock. I was just trying to block out all the noise and focus on putting it through the uprights. I was just taking it step by step, and I knocked it through."

If Vargas was nervous about attempting a poten-

tial game-winning kick, Noonan said he didn't see it "If you know Daniel, not much rattles him," said Noonan. "He's even-keeled, not very emotional He was just as stressful as he was at the beginning of the

game. He does his job and is consistent and steady."

Vargas also had a strong game punting. He averaged 43.0 yards a punt on five kicks with a long of 64 yards and another for 60 yards. Plus, Porter-Gaud had no return yards, so the Swampcats were consistently flipping the field.

"He's really gotten stronger there," Noonan said "He hadn't punted much before this year, and he's gotten more and more comfortable.'

The Swampcats have had issues running the football, averaging just over 100 yards a game. A lot of that has to do with a lack of girth on the offensive line. However, Noonan is happy with its develop-

"We knew going in it would be a struggle up front, but they've really, really competed well," he said. "Despite the lack of physical attributes, the competitiveness of that group right now is tremendous. They don't listen to the noise, they're competitive and they've given 100 percent all year long."

The line had junior Tristen White (6-feet-2inches, 270 pounds) at left tackle, junior Eli Gamble (6-1, 170) at right tackle, junior Bryson Pepper (5-6. 170) at right guard, sophomore Cody Taylor (6-0, 202) at left guard and senior **Kib Newman** (5-11,

**Zy Dennis** had rushed for 238 yards and four TDs on 32 carries going into the playoffs to lead the way. Eli Sandifer had 218 yards and a score on 40 carries, **Payton Brown** had 183 yards and a touchdown on 34 attempts, and Powell has 132 yards and four TDs on 87 carries.

Powell had a solid season throwing the football. He'd completed 131 of 213 passes for 1,747 yards and 13 scores against just three interceptions.

His favorite targets had been Scoop Dennis and tight end Asher Sanders with 30 catches apiece. Dennis had 536 yards and six TD catches, while Sanders had 380 an one score.

Zy Dennis had 23 catches for 183 yards and three touchdowns, and Rob Briggs had 20 receptions for 301 yards and a score.

Sanders was leading the defense in tackles with 39 from his linebacker post. He is tied for the lead in tackles for loss with White with eight. White, a defensive lineman, had 29 1/2 tackles as did linebacker Peyton McGee.

Shawn Thomas Moore led in interceptions with three, while the Dennis brothers had two apiece. LMA had forced 20 turnovers – 12 picks and eight fumble recoveries – and had five defensive scores.

# **May River completes second straight winning** football season under Bonneville

**Bluffton**—Since switching over to the Slot-T offense, after his first season as the May River head football coach in 2023, Richard Bonneville's Landsharks have won 16 games, and made the AAAA playoffs both seasons.

This past season May River finished 7-3 after winning 9 games in 2024.

"As long as I am the head coach at May River, the Slot-T will be our offense, and all of our players and coaches are getting more comfortable with the offense more and more," said Coach Bonneville. "It has given us a chance to be successful, and that was our main objective switching over from a spread offense my first season as head coach.'

May River concluded the 2025 season with a 36-28 hard-fought loss to Wilson High last Friday night in the first round of the AAAA playoffs.

"Honestly, we felt like we were the better team against Wilson but we lost two fumbles, and had a pass intercepted that just killed some scoring opportunities," said Coach Bonneville. "Our slot-T offense had them fooled early but we failed to take advantage of our opportunities."

In the Wilson game, senior half-back **Sean** Mitchell scored on a five-yard run, sophomore running back **Justin Head** scored on a 42-yard run, while junior quarterback Luc Tran added a seven-yard keeper for the team's third score. The Sharks final touchdown was on a 40-yard run by junior fullback Mason Sweigart in the second half of the game.

"We just kept making too many of the same mistakes against Wilson to have a chance to win the game," said Coach Bonneville.

May River will be graduating 16 seniors off the 2025 team. "We will miss all of them and all 16 were pretty much starters and they all made positive contributions to the team," said Coach Bonneville.

Senior nose guard **Charlie Crace** (5-9,185) was a four- year player on the team and he was recently named all-region. "Charlie Crace gave us everything he had for four seasons and his strong character and leadership is what our program is based on," said Coach Bonneville.

Mitchell was also a four-year performer on the team who was named all-region also. As a senior Mitchell led the team in rushing with 1,372 yards on 242 carries and he scored 17 touchdowns. As a defensive back he contributed 28 tackles. He also caught three passes for 60 yards and had two touchdown recep-

"Sean was another four-year guy in our program that gave us everything," said Coach Bon-

Senior **Hudson Tanner** was also named the all-region punter after averaging 40-yards a boot. Tanner also played free safety where he had 41 tackles including two TFL.

Junior tackle **Ethan James** (6-5, 285) is a strong D-1 prospect according to Coach Bonneville. "He is already drawing some recruiting interest," said Coach Bonneville. "He runs well, in the 5.1 to 5.2 forty range. He blocks well with flexible hips and good feet with long arm extension."

Coach Bonneville called senior Devin Ryan (TE/DE/OLB) "an emotional captain on the field." On defense, Ryan contributed 66 tackles

Senior DE **Xavier Polite** (6-3, 175) was a two- year starter for May River. "He was a dominant and disruptive out on the edge and that is what we are looking for," said Coach Bonneville. Polite had 80 tackles and 16 TFL this past season.

"Senior Jackson Miller was our defensive captain until he got hurt in the Colleton County game and missed the rest of the season," said Coach Bonneville. "He was a solid defensive back." Miller had 20 tackles and three TFL while he played.

Some other seniors, who all made contributions to the team include tight end David Heitman (6-2, 245), along with tight end Chris **Beckman** (6-3, 170). Heitman and Beckman were called "swing men" who blocked well on the edge in the running game. Sean Zadroga McNulty (6-1, 235) was also a swing man who also played some OG and DE. Wesley Turtle did a good job as the team's senior snapper and senior Pavin Denton contributed at a tackle

One of the top sophomores around would have to be May River linebacker Michael **Poole** (6-3, 18). Poole led the team with 163 tackles and 9 TFL. "Poole has a high motor and a bright future in the sport of football," said Coach Bonneville.

"We'll get back in the weight room right away and start getting stronger for next season," said Coach Bonneville. "We were in every game we played this season and our kids never quit. We are already looking forward to next season."

# **Gaffney football moving on to second round**

Gaffney—The Gaffney Indians football team got the Div. II AAAAA playoffs started off on a positive note last week with a 28-10 win over Eastside, and the Indians now face a huge challenge in having to Greenwood for a secondround battle with the Eagles.

"Against Eastside we were able to get our running game going early and that was a major key in our win," said Gaffney head coach Donnie Littlejohn. "Zion Dawkins returned the opening kick-off to the one-yard line and then we got in our jumbo package and **Kadarius** "Peanut" Bailey scored to get us off to a great start on offense."

This week Gaffney is on the road to Greenwood. "I am sitting here right now watching the Greenwood quarterback on film with my defensive coaches and we do not know how we are going to stop him Friday night, but we do hope to slow him down a little," said Coach Littlejohn in reference to **Tristen Lewis**, who has committed to Bailey with 42 tackles including 15 TFL along **South Carolina** and he will play in the Shrine Bowl.

"He can beat you with the pass and he runs really well," said Coach Littlejohn. "The keys to us winning the game this week is to contain him as much as possible. We must keep their offense off the field as much as possible and get our running game going early. We also need not beat ourselves with stupid penalties or mental mistakes either."

Senior running back **Josiah Hill** rushed for 142 yards on 24 carries against **Eastside** and he scored three touchdowns to lead the Indians offense. Senior quarterback Banks Bouton managed the offense very well as he rushed 10 times for 46 yards and completed 5-of-8 passes for 98 yards.


Justin dawkins rushed for 41 yards on four carries while Bailey had 33 yards on five carries. The **Chanson Mickles**. top receivers versus Eastside were Chas Smith with three catches for 49 yards while **Brady** Smith and Quentis Hines each caught a pass for 26 and 23 yards respectively.

"Our defensive Player of the Game against Eastside was Peanut Bailey," said Coach Littlejohn. "He had two solo tackles, three tackles for a hurries and two big hits.'

Coach Littlejohn also cited the defensive play of junior MLB/DE Kamari Williams along with junior DB Adreyan "Money" Monroe for their play on defense against Eastside.

For the season the Gaffney tackle index is led by east Carolina commitment OLB Zyon Ratchford who has 88 tackles and four TFL to date. Monroe is next with 53 tackles including 4.5 TDL. Kamari Williams is next with 51 total tackles including seven TFL.

Top soph DB prospect **Zion Dawkins** has 47 tackles, one TDL, and three interceptions. "Zion has everything you are looking for in a defensive back," said Coach Littlejohn. "So far, he has

major college offers from Virginia Tech, Syracuse, Georgia Tech, Duke, Appalachian State, Central Florida and Coastal Carolina."

Other leaders on defense include LB Peanut with junior LB Ty McGil who has 35 tackles including 2.5 TFL. East Carolina DL commitment Kelton Smith has 25 tackles and 6.5 TFL. DL Jaleel Tate has contributed 20 tackles including four TFL and four sacks.

The Gaffney offensive line is led by **Ap**palachian State commitment Scotland Dover at left tackle. The starting left guard is soph **Derrius** Littlejohn, along with junior center Corderian Dawkins and right guard Cameron Shippy. Junior right tackle CJ Brooks (6-5,331) is considered a major college prospect, and he just picked up an offer from Liberty last week.

The Gaffney three-man defensive front consists of Willaims and junior Marquel Smalls on the ends with Smith at nose. The four linebackers are Peanut Bailey, Ratchford, McGil and senior

The secondary is patrolled by junior **Ayden** Montgomery and junior Kareem Shaw at the corners. The double free safeties are Monroe and the speedy Dawkins.

On the season, Hill leads all rushers with 835 yards on 149 carries and 17 TD's followed by Bouton who has rushed for 661 yards and 9 TD's. loss, six total tackles, one pile on, two quarterback Justin Sawkins has netted 345 yards rushing on 23 carries with three TD's.

> Bouton has completed 85 of 148 passes for 1,174 yards and five TD's. His top receiving targets include Chas Smith, Brady Smith, and Quentis Hardy with 358 yards, 268 yards and 210 yards in receptions respectively.

Gaffney has out-scored teams 309-173 this season. They have rushed for 2,084 yards and passed for 1,318 yards on the season.

"We use the running game to set up our passing game," said Coach Littlejohn. "We are having a good game any time we can get our running game going because we are able to eat the clock

Goose Creek - The Stratford football team received a bye for the opening round of the Class 5A Div. I playoffs, a reward for winning the Region 7-5A crown and becoming a top four seed in the Lower State.

The Knights crank up their playoff journey Nov. 14 in the second round against visiting River Bluff, which edged Cane Bay 24-13 in the first round.

As for the bye, Stratford coach **Dennie Mc-Daniel** might have preferred his team to get a game under its belt. He said he would know more after the River Bluff game.

"I think there is good and bad," said McDaniel, whose team is 9-1 and winners of nine straight. "The good part is you get a chance to get healthy and get your legs back under you, reset yourself a little bit. But, on the negative side, momentum is a thing. I like the way we're playing right now. I don't want anything to obstruct that mindset... We're going to try to spin it as an advantage for us."

The playoffs mark the final moments in a Stratford uniform for 30 seniors. McDaniel credits the group for catapulting Stratford into the conversation about potential state champions next month. Their region crown this fall was the second in three sea-

The Raiders advanced to the final four teams of the SCISA Class A state tournament for the first time in school history before falling to eventual 2-time state champion Cambridge Academy.

"I think we accomplish our goals of winning the regular-season region title and the region tournament championship and for the first time making it to the final four," said Jefferson Davis head coach Bart Owens. "So I think we had a great season."

The Raiders won the Region 1 title with a 9-1 record. They were led by senior Rynn Fickling, who was selected as the Region Player of the Year.

Fickling led the team in kills with 240 to go with 70 service aces, six blocked shots and 151 digs.

She was joined on the All=Region team by junior Mattie Morris, junior Abby Deering and senior Avari Yongue.

Morris had 168 kills, 175 digs, 50 aces and eight blocks. Deering led the team in assists with 468 and had 112 kills, 163 digs, 59 aces, and three blocks. Yongue led the team with 254 digs to go with six aces and 20 kills.

Fickling, Deering and Morris played in the **SCISA North-South All-Star matches.** 

"This team did a really good job of replacing key seniors we lost from last year's team," Owens said. "All **the** girls did a great job on teamwork, and at the end of the season we played really well."



# Smith happy with first season as football coach

**Orangeburg** – Even though the season came to an end in the first round of the AA State playoffs, Orangeburg Prep football head coach Brooks Smith is happy with how his first year in charge turned out.

"I think that this season was a successful one," said Smith, whose squad lost to defending state champion **Pee Dee Academy** 27-0 to finish with a 7-4 record. "Obviously we wanted to make a deeper run in the playoffs, but the kids played hard and improved each week of the season.

"We have laid out the vision for where we want this program to go, and the kids understand what it takes to build a successful program and that was evident by the effort and intensity that they displayed during practices and games."

The Golden Eagles limited the Indians to just 201 yards of total offense. Senior standout wide receiver Tilden "T" Riley had eight catches for 47 yards and four rushes for 47 yards.

"Obviously we are disappointed in the outcome of the game, but our kids played hard," Smith said. "We got inside the (Pee Dee) 25(-yard line) three times and we just couldn't put it in the end zone. I give a lot of credit to the players and coaches at Pee Dee. They were kinda bend but don't break defensively.

"I was very proud of our effort on defense. Pee Dee had averaged over 44 points a game in their previous six outings and we held them in check for most of the

Riley, the 6-foot-5-inch senior who is committee to Vanderbilt, had a tremendous season. He caught 55 passes for 1,059 yards and 17 touchdowns while carrying the ball 30 times for 309 yards and three more scores.

Sophomore quarterback Cholly Williams had a solid season in his first year as a starter. He completed 104 of 185 passes for 1,739 yards and 22 touchdowns against just three interceptions. He also rushed for 292 yars and four scores on 53 carries.

Junior running back **J'syri Parker** was the leading rusher with 554 yards and six touchdowns on 99 carries.

Sophomore wide receiver Council Burroughs had 15 catches for 242 yars and three touchdowns, junior wide receiver Maxx Judy had 14 catches for 187 yards and two scores, and junior tight end Marshall Livingston had 12 catches for 186 yards and a touchdown.

"Offensively our passing game improved tremendously from Day 1 to the end of the season," Smith said. "Cholly Williams really progressed as a quarterback, and I want to thank (assistant coach) Kyle Crab, who worked with our quarterbacks this season because it made a huge difference.

"T Riley did T Riley things and he made a ton of special plays throughout this season, but our other receivers and running backs really stepped up to catch a lot of balls, and we are excited about the future with Cholly coming back and guys like Marshall Livingston, Council Burroughs and Maxx Judy returning next sea-

Smith was happy with the way his defense improved. In a 4-game winning streak to close out the regular season, Orangeburg Prep allowed just 49 points.

"I felt that defensively as a unit we improved greatly throughout this season," he said. "Whenever you bring in a new coordinator there is going to be a learning curve, but Coach (Michael) Heath worked his tail off and was forced to make adjustments with personnel due to injuries along the way and he had us playing great defense by the end of the season. As the reps increased the players got more comfortable with doing their jobs and holding each other accountable and as that trust improved Coach Heath was able to dial up some blitz packages that really allowed our players to be in great positions to make plays and they had a lot of fun with

As a safety on defense, Riley had 68 tackles, four tackles for a loss and two interceptions.

Sophomore defensive lineman Mac Strickland led Orangeburg Prep in tackles with 150 and tackles for loss with 15. Junior linebacker Blake Inabinet had 115 tackles an eight tackles for loss, while defensive back Livingston had 86 tackles, outside linebacker Parker had 61 tackles and seven tackles for loss, and junior linebacker Chris Jackson had 68 tackles and 10 tackles

The Indians had 20 quarterback sacks spread out amongst 11 players. Mac Strickland, senior defensive lineman Jonathan Marcellana and Parker led the way with three sacks apiece. Like Riley, Judy had two interceptions playing in the secondary.

Along with Riley and Marcellana, Orangeburg Prep will be losing Ger'maury Robinson, Jackson Strickland, Stevein Sonny, Cooper Pound and James Williams to graduation. Smith believes they made a major contribution in moving the program forward.

"I am grateful to this senior class, because they bought into that vision and helped to lead our younger guys to do things the right way," Smith said. "Unfortunately, we lost three seniors due to injuries early in the season, but that made some underclassmen have to step up and play. That will pay dividends in the years to come."



# **AJA football focused on improvement in 2026**

**Ehrhardt**—With 15 of their 23 varsity players eligible to return for the 2026 football season, one should expect positive growth in the Andrew Jackson Academy varsity football program, that experienced an 1-8 rebuilding season in 2025, under veteran first year head coach Andy Palmer, who built winning programs at Edisto, Orangeburg **Prep**, and **Holly Hill Academy** before joining the Warriors program at the start of the summer.

The Warriors had been a tradition rich 8-man football program, with many state titles, before moving up to 11-man, two seasons ago.

The team's lone win was an impressive 34-0 win over **Clarendon Hall** at home on September 26. In that game, senior quarterback **Hall Sease** (6-4, 175) rushed for 149 yards on 10 carries, and he scored two TD's to pace the offense. Everette Ulmer added 55 yards rushing and one TD on 8 carries while Ollie Barnes and Landon Johnson added 33- and 27-yards rushing, respectively. Senior TE Elizuh **Davis** rushed for 76 yards and scored one TD while contributing two receptions.

As a team, the Warriors rushed for a season high 264 yards on 32 carries.

Against the Saints, numerous players recorded double digit tackles. They were junior DE Eli Mathys, soph LB Everett Ulmer, senior LB Grayson Hay, freshman LB Noah Riddle, soph LB Bryson Riddle, senior DL Walker Terry, and senior LB Cooper Hiers.

For the season, Sease completed 16 passes for

335 yards and five touchdowns. Sease was also the tam's top rusher with 615 net yards on 129 carries with seven rushing touchdowns.

Other top rushers were Barnes who gained 335 yards on 70 carries. Ulmer added 206 net yards on 512 carries while Johnson contributed 112 yards on 19 carries.

As a team, the Warriors rushed for 1,399 yards on 304 carries with 11 rushing touchdowns during the 2025 season.







"It starts with our North-South linebacker Jaemin Pinckney (6-5,220) who is committed to South Florida," said Coach Ford. "He was a returning all-state player from last year and he has made all-region for the past two seasons. Jaemin was a tremendous player for us, and he is still picking up late offers.

"Florida State and West Virginia have made recent offers, and we feel like **Tennessee** is close to making an offer," said Coach Ford. "Jaemin has a huge wingspan, and he is so athletic with great speed that gives him superior coverage range."

Another 2025 all-region pick is right tackle

**Tyreron Summerson** (6-2, 300) who has started for three years. He has a junior college offer from Northwest Oklahoma State. "Tyreon is big and strong with great feet," said Coach Ford. "His above average arm extension makes him a good pass blocker also."

Senior **Donovan Miles** is a 6-2,235-pound DL who was also named all-region. This past season he had 77 tackles, 8sacks and 12 TFL. "Donovan has decided he has no interest in playing college football, but I think he would do well at the next level," said Coach Ford.

Kneece, a Knight alum, is in his first year as a head varsity coach. Most of his current roster played for him at the middle school level that included one undefeated season. With a few transfer players this group has exploded into a powerful force.

The Knights have used a balanced offensive attack. The passing attack has been led by quarterback **Elijah Hutto** (jr) and the ground attack by explosive runner Joseph Morse (so). Hutto has completed 40 of 51 passes for 956 yards with 19 touchdowns. Morse has rushed the ball 125 times for 1505 yards scoring 25 touchdowns.

Hutto's top three receivers has been Dallas Hill (sr), Landell Anderson (jr) and Luke Harvey (jr). Hill has made 14 receptions for 375 yards scoring 11 touchdowns. Anderson has 13 receptions for 386 yards scoring 6 touchdowns. Harvey has 9 receptions for 150 yards scoring 1 touchdown.

The Knights defense has recorded 574 tackles, 10 quarterback sacks and 10 interceptions. Six players led by Jacob Bussey (fr) have over 40 tackles. Bussey has 110 followed by Casen Buzhardt (jr) with 79. Anderson has 48, Joshua Oswald (so) has 45, Dallas Hill (sr) has 44 and Harvey has 43.

Hill has recorded 3 sacks followed by Morse, Buzhardt and Greyson Rikard (so) with 2 each. Tucker McGinty (fr) leads the interceptions with 4. Jackson Hutto (fr), Harvey, Buzhardt, Elijah Hutto Bussey and **Brady Goff** (fr) all have 1.

The Knights drew a first round bye in the playoffs and will face the winner of **Jefferson Davis** vs Wardlaw game in the semi-finals on 11/14.

# Laurens Academy volleyball just misses on title



# Pair of top AAAAA teams duke it out in Irmo on Halloween

**Columbia -** Region play and the regular football season came to an end last week in the Midlands, and no finer representation of a regular season finale played out than that of the crosstown rivalry of Dutch Fork and

The Silver Foxes, defending 5A Division 1 state champions, traveled to W.C. Hawkins Stadium on Halloween night to take on the defending 5A Division 2 lower state champion Yellow Jackets for the Region 4-5A championship.

Dutch Fork held a 28-7 lead with eight minutes to go.

"There's eight minutes left, and we were over there celebrating," Dutch Fork head coach **Tom Knotts** said. "And I got a queasy feeling in my stomach. I said 'they're too fast, they could score in a New York second."

Irmo backup quarterback **Britton** Davis, replacing starter Dre Dopson, engineered a 6-play, 80-yard drive capped with his 42-yard touchdown pass to Corey Miller to make it 28-

"He provided a spark," Irmo head coach Aaron Brand said. "He came in, he ran the ball hard, he threw the ball well and he made some plays down the stretch to keep us in it."

On the Silver Foxes' next possession, the Yellow Jackets defense swarmed in for a 15-yard sack of **Jaxon Knotts**, and stripped the ball from him. Two plays later Davis found Maleek Miller for a 19-yard touchdown strike with 4 minutes left.

The Irmo defense forced a Dutch Fork punt, and Davis led the Yellow Jackets from their own 22-yard line to a third-and-1 situation at the Silver Foxes' 4 in the final minute of the game for a touchdown and a 2-point conversion for the win.

"In the grand scheme of things we were going to go for two, we weren't going to go to overtime," Brand said.

The Dutch Fork defense held on the final two plays, holding Davis to two incompletions and a turnover on downs.

"With 20-something seconds, right? Fourth and one, third and one, you get to move the chains and the clock stops with no times outs," Brand said. "You get a chance to run two more plays. It's just alarming that I was unaware."

For that, the Irmo head coach took the blame for it.

"It's alarming that when we get down here and we preach accountability, and the head coach is unaware of the situation," he said. "I'm going to take that one on the chin, and I want the world to know that this group fought like crazy, the head coach has got to hold himself accountable and I

One Jaxon Knotts kneeldown at the 2-yard line later, and the Silver Foxes rang up another region cham-

"They're just dynamic. We can't match their speed," Tom Knotts said of Irmo. "They can go, they can get vertical on you. We've had a little issue with that sometimes, but I'm just real proud of the way our guys responded when their backs were against the wall down there."

Jaxon Knotts was 17-for-25 in passing for 105 yards and two touchdowns, and also had 18 rushing hards and a score. Kyle Henry had 17 carries for 96 yards.

Davis finished the night completing four passes for 125 yards and two TDs, with Dopson completing 3 of 12 passes for 86 yards and a score. Miller had three catches for 169 yards and two touchdowns.

Both teams received a first-round bye in the playoffs.

Dutch Fork (8-1, 5-0) earned the top seed in the upper state bracket of the 5A Division 1 playoffs and plays No.9 **Boiling Springs** Friday. The Bulldogs (5-6) beat No.8 Mauldin (5-6) 16-14 last week.

Irmo (9-1, 4-1) earned the top seed in the lower state bracket of the 5A Division 2 playoffs and plays host to No.8 Lugoff-Elgin. The Demons (6-5) beat No.9 Socastee (3-8) 42-6.
