Greetings, Siblings!

In preparation for the Council's discernment on renewing our partnership, I prepared and provided for them an analysis of our work, together, in the last year. I thought it might be a good time to reflect with you, too, as the Council has extended an opportunity for us to continue to grow together, and within Ishpeming, for another year as Bridge-Building partners. In short? My heart is full of gratitude. Our minutes, reports, and shared stories remind us that what we do is not simply administration or planning—it is ministry, carried out answering our Call from God. Through worship, service, learning, and fellowship, we have witnessed the Spirit moving among us in both familiar rhythms and surprising new ways.

Faithful Rhythms: What Has Endured

- Worship at the Heart: From Advent through Easter, from quiet midweek services to joyful combined gatherings with our 4-ISH partners, worship has remained the center of our life together.
 Music, choirs, bells, and liturgical creativity have given voice to our praise. Even in moments of lament, we have found God's presence faithful and sustaining.
- Christian Education & Youth: Parents' Night Out, Confirmation retreats, Vacation Bible School with Fortune Lake counselors, and book studies for adults have reminded us that formation is a lifelong journey. Our youth have learned about mental health and faith in transparent and supportive ways, while adults have deepened their discipleship through prayer and study.
- Hospitality & Care: We have continued to reach out to our homebound siblings, to welcome
 neighbors into our space, and to extend hospitality at funerals, festivals, and Sunday gatherings.
 Volunteers, even when few-in-number, have carried the weight of this ministry with remarkable
 grace.
- **Stewardship & Generosity**: Despite challenges, Bethany has remained generous. Roof and technology needs were met, debts retired, and designated funds used faithfully. A memorial gift of \$20,000 invites us to dream of how we might support mental health, healing, and wholeness in Christ's name.
- Collaboration with 4-ISH: Our partnership with our Lutheran siblings in Ishpeming continues to grow. Shared worship, retreats, and mission conversations remind us that we are part of something larger than ourselves, even as we wrestle with what faithful participation looks like.

New Ministries: Signs of Bridges being Built

This year has also brought **new growth**, signs of resurrection life among us:

- The **Formal & Professional Wear Closet** for youth and young adults, will offer clothing, alterations, and dignity for life's milestones.
- Restorative Yoga and Singing Bowls, creating safe space for healing and spiritual wellness.
- **Creative outreach**, from "Crime Syndicate" t-shirts supporting Lutheran Social Services to community events like film screenings and Strawberry Festivals.
- **Technology and Communication upgrades**, strengthening livestream worship and office systems to better connect us across generations and geographies.
- **Governance renewal**, as we move toward the ratification of our constitution and bylaws, shaping how we walk together into the future.

Challenges We Name Honestly

It is important that we speak with honesty as well as hope. Alongside joy, this year also brought seasons of conflict and strain. At times, decisions were made outside of our shared structures, leading to confusion, hurt, or mistrust. Some felt sidelined or pressured when traditions or communications moved forward without consultation. These moments have tested us.

Yet even in conflict, God has been at work, and our growth continues in learning. Our constitution and bylaws remind us of the shared responsibilities of pastor, council, and congregation. They provide a framework where leadership is mutual, accountability is clear, and trust can be rebuilt. Confidentiality in pastoral care is not secrecy, but faithfulness. Together, we are learning again how to move from confusion to clarity, from frustration to shared purpose, and from broken trust to reconciliation.

We give thanks for those who have served faithfully in areas of long responsibility, including technology ministry, and we celebrate new hands stepping forward. This is the work of the Spirit: passing the torch, welcoming new gifts, and finding healing where there was hurt.

Looking Forward in Hope

As we step into a new year, let us carry with us both gratitude and vision. We give thanks for:

- Worship that centers us in growing into a Body of Christ that manifests the broad invitation of "loving our neighbors" in our time.
- Partnerships that stretch our imagination.
- Ministries of care and creativity that bring life to our community.

We look forward to:

- A renewed constitution and strengthened leadership.
- Expanded ministries of hospitality, wellness, and justice.
- Opportunities to invite new voices and younger generations into the heart of our life, together.

The apostle Paul reminds us: "The one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:6). We trust that God's good work continues among us—through every council meeting, every act of service, every note of music, every loaf of bread, every welcome offered as we meet our neighbors where they are and share the love that God offers us through grace, without strings or our merit.

Beloved Siblings, thank you—for your prayers, your presence, your gifts, and your partnership in the gospel. May we continue to walk together as people of faith, hope, and love. And may the peace of Christ, which passes all understanding, strengthen our hearts and minds, inviting us to focus on creation and service with joy, through faith.








UP Home Health and Hospice is having a volunteer orientation for all interested in spending some time with our hospice patients. Training will take place on



Letter to the Congregation

I wanted to check in with you and share where I see things currently at Bethany.

I'm not speaking for anyone but myself, but I hope you will find my comments useful in your own deliberations.

In the time I've been involved with church administration, a lot has changed. We've come through an uncertain time, largely, I believe, unscathed. We are still standing. Our energy and vitality are increasing. We have added to our ministries.

But we face the same challenges churches everywhere face ... declining membership and giving, increasing expenses, shortage of safety for available clergy (there <u>are</u> unemployed ELCA clergy, members of the LGBTQIA+ community, women and people of color), and as a result, we face the question of our continued existence as a church family, in this building.

We have, I believe, been good stewards of the gifts given us, at least so far. Soon we must make choices, and in doing so, must rely on our spiritual gifts of wisdom, experience, and discernment.

I am asking, sincerely and humbly, that we keep our eyes on the prize: a healthy ELCA family, doing God's work in our community, as much as we can, for as long as we can answer God's Call to do so.

I'm also asking that we not allow ourselves to be distracted from this work by fears that, in the longer run, will not matter.

We have seen a number of conflicts throughout the change that we are working toward: from personnel management to partnership around our building usage and presentation, to lights, Communion, the Creeds, how we discern and engage ministry, and our presence with our 4-ISH family. We look for decisions, then complain about them to our allies instead of talking to the person who's caused our discomfort and being open to learning from that discussion.

We do have things to worry about. Worthy things. The welfare of our neighbors and their children and striving to build unity around that work as Christ calls us to recognize the widow, the poor, the unhoused, the hungry and unclothed. Paul

and Peter invite us to recognize that each human, regardless of religion, skin color, or creed, is worthy of our love and care, as they are a beloved child of God. The immigrant *is* our neighbor. These are the worries from scripture, this is the work we can do, but we can lose sight of it when we use our energy in growing anxiety about worship, or those things we used to do, or those things we have never done.

A year ago, we invited Pastor J to be our spiritual leader and to be a bridge to the three other ELCA congregations in Ishpeming, and to the larger community of believers and God's helpers. We expected change. We asked for change. We knew we needed change. Pastor J is an agent of change. The council has determined to renew his contract for a second year, as a synod-called clergy.

At our most recent council meeting we unanimously agreed that Pastor J has been a force for good as well as change. I am, as I hope we all are, profoundly grateful for his presence and his work here. No Bethany pastor has had as large a task as has he.

I am always eager to discuss anything Bethany-related, though I am perplexed at the views some of us have taken and the comments I've received. If your council and the 4Ish committee have not been clear that this is a watershed moment in the story of our four church families, then we've fallen short of our intentions.

I ask, once again, that we put aside any concern less than the survival of ELCA Lutheranism in our community and that we consider seriously what would be required of us if we were to join hands with one or more of the 4lsh family. We can do little alone and so much more together, but that would require a clear view of our combined mission and a pocketing of personal preferences. If we are serious about continuing the work, in concert with our neighbors and ELCA Siblings, and anyone seeking to "love one another, as I have loved you," for as long as we are called, we must, I believe, keep

focused on what we can do together. Nothing else will last. Nothing else matters.

Social Ministry Food Collection

Please consider donating non-perishable food items to help the local bank:

- Canned meats: Canned beef, ham, chicken, salmon, etc. Or ready to go meals like stews and chili
- Canned vegetables: potatoes, carrots, spinach, peas, etc. Low sodium preferred
- Canned fruit: unsweetened or in fruit juice without sugar added. Dried fruit is good too
- Boxes of rice (bags tear) Low sugar cereal as plain Cheerios or Raisin Bran
- Mac and Cheese cups. (regular boxes require milk and butter but the cups do not)
- Peanut butter, canned beans, pasta (consider gluten free, too) pasta sauce
- · Biscuit mix, or any mix adding water
- Cans, cartons, or boxes of powdered or evaporated milk
- Snack items for kids to take to school: juice boxes, applesauce containers, granola bars, fruit snacks, etc.
- Spices like cinnamon, oregano, basil, salt, pepper

Non-food items:

- Paper products such as toilet paper, paper plates, and paper towels are also helpful
- Diapers in sizes above newborn, plus wipes
- Toiletries: toothbrushes, soap, toothpaste, lotion, shampoo & conditioner, Chapstick (consider someone living outside this time of year)
- Feminine hygiene products: unscented pads will be most universally used, not tampons

Consider donating reusable shopping bags. It takes a lot of humility for people to come to a food bank and since they'll likely be walking home or taking public transportation, it's nice to at least blend in.

WHAT I DIDN'T REALIZE ABOUT FOOD BANKS

A lot of people have diabetes in this group. Consider low-sugar dietary restrictions. Cans and boxes are sturdier than bags. By the time families are receiving the food, it's been handled A LOT and packaging needs to be strong enough to hold up. One food bank said never bring anything in glass.

Pop-top cans are ideal; particularly for those living on the street Kids who qualify for free lunches typically receive breakfast at school too and when schools are out for holidays or summer, these families need more support.



Congregational Council Meeting Highlights September 16, 2025

- The Council selected October 12, 2025 as the date for the Special Congregational meeting to vote to ratify the Constitution, which will be the only item of business. A turkey dinner will follow the event. Meeting notices will be distributed in a variety of methods (mail, Facebook, notice in bulletin).
- The Council received an update on the work of the 4ISH ELCA Consortium. The 4-ISH Update is in a separate article.
- The Council reviewed the details of the Bridge Pastor Contract renewal. Some minor changes were suggested and later approved by an email vote, after a meeting with Pastor J. His contract has been renewed for another year.
- They approved using \$6,000 of the Hager Bequest to sponsor a join missional effort in partnership with the Episcopal Diocese of the UP. This partnership will help "equip the faith community leaders and congregations with the tools and knowledge to effectively minister to individuals and families impacted by suicide, offering compassionate support, guidance, and hope" through a Soul Shop certificate and training event. The funds will help provide scholarships for the attendees and help cover the speaker's honorarium and other expenses for the event.
- The Council received an update on the plans for the Sunday school curriculum for the coming year.
- The Council discussed the budget process for 2026 and the stewardship campaign.
 The letters and pledge cards should be mailed before the end of September.
- The Council decided not to pursue a proposal to redesign the Sanctuary wall. It has asked the Worship and Music team for their input on options.
- The Council received updates from Social Ministry that they donated \$400 to the CROP Walk and \$200 to the Lutheran Disaster Relief Fund. They will collect food for the local community instead of a Noisy Offering in October. There will be a blood drive on October 6 from 3:00 6:00P.
- The Council approved funds to support the Turkey Dinner on October 12 and having a craft sale on November 15 to support Pajama Palooza.
- The next meeting will be on Tuesday, October 21, 2025 at 5:30 PM.






Worship Options

Prayer Chain Update: Bethany established an active prayer chain in 2013. A prayer chain is a way for people to gain assistance through the power of prayer. It is also a way for any person to act on God's commandment to love one another (John 13:34-35). Prayers have been offered for family, friends, non-church people; we pray for ALL. Deep cleaning - 8-29-2025

There is something incredibly satisfying about taking what is dirty through the harsh process of restoration, making it useful again. This skillet will be cooked in again. These sheets will become bandages,

quilts and more. All these items that would take up space in a landfill are now made beautiful and called into service for the world's good.

It doesn't take a theological rocket scientist to see why a pastor like me would enjoy deep cleaning. This is what the sacrament of baptism is about: God drowning us to sin, raising us to new life, calling us to serve for the sake of the world. God takes our flaws – those same imperfections that keep us from being what we were initially intended to be – and repurposes them so that we can be the hands, feet, heart and voice of Christ.  - The Office cannot build every invitation for you, without you.
- Gather graphics, photos, or fonts to accompany their submission and include all supporting information in the submission (pictures help)
- Any submission received after the posted deadline, (grace is available, within reason) without accompanying cookies, cupcakes, or beverages for the Editor in Chief will be posted in the following month's Outlook

November issue deadline: Tuesday, October 21st, noon

December issue deadline: Tuesday, November 18^{ht}, noon

Helpful tips and notes:

- Fonts in the body of the article/announcement/invitation should be Aptos, 14 pitch
- Pictures, graphics, should at a minimum be 1280×720 pixels (smaller than that reduces the print quality to the point of being unable to read by struggling eyes)
- We might start looking ahead, at least 2 months (ideally 3), and coordinating our activities across the teams here, and within the ELCA community here in Ishpeming
 - The general open-invitation structure is 11 times, in at least 3 modalities (verbal, non-verbal, listening, etc.)
 - This structure helps our siblings see it and remember it and discern their ability to engage the invitation.
- Information without BLC contacts, leadership, or partnership, through team support or community bridges, will be questioned, lovingly
 - Recycling someone else's information to fill pages isn't what we're looking for in the Outlook

God isn't put off by our weaknesses – 9-26—25

The question is not whether or not we fail, but how do we recover? Are we able to harbor the losses and grow stronger because of them, or do

we break under the weight of defeat? Can we learn from our mistakes and renew our efforts to succeed?

St. Paul is famous for struggling with some sort of flaw that he called a "thorn in his flesh." Whatever it was, Paul felt that the "thorn" made him appear foolish in public and hampered his ability to do God's work effectively. He took his concerns to God, begging at least three times that his painful situation be remedied. He records God making this response: "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Cor. 12:9a).

We may wish that the pain of failure, humiliation, and rejection would go away, but we need to know that it may not. This is not because God does not care or does not hear us when we plead for mercy. It means, simply, that God is not dissuaded from partnering with us, no matter how inadequate or overwhelmed we may feel.
