

A pastor's kid reflection on Exodus 25 "the Ark of the Covenant", as told through Godly Play on October 11th, at the 4ISH Joint Council retreat.

I would not call myself a very religious person. I'm intrigued by religion in the way that it has a hold on people and how people carry it out. When I go to church, or religious outings, I always keep an open mind. Very rarely does a bible story get to me and this one did. It had a playful way of being told, consisting of sand, a tent, and four colorful layers... and how this portable, colorful, tent with barriers added on an on has the "secrets" or God (probably God is better, but in my mind it's the faith and the secrets). It struck me that this was a moving church (tent), and in my mind this story revealed that a building, whether it moves or is

stuck in the ground, we the people are the church. While everyone has church memories, it isn't the building that carry those memories. It's us. Just like how a building cannot hold the fullness of "church", or even the community-like atmosphere. In my 19 years of life, and the over-10 churches that I have been to, none of those memories of faith and love fall on the building. The community of people who hold a faith, or something I don't understand or believe in. I truly believe that these are the arks-of-the-covenant in the story: the people. The people whose faith in God is so loud in their aura that it brings God's love closer. These people of faith are the ones who thin that barrier between us and the spirit world, in my mind. It becomes magical to feel and be a part of, even from the sidelines.

I originally came to this retreat to help my dad, and after talking to and having encounters with the leaders who attended, I changed my perspective; it's not just about moving forward with these four churches. And *also* moving forward in sharing a loving and warm church community (and it's nice to know that being *new* is not a "baby idea" or a "bad thing").

Here's what you'll notice for 2026:

Social Ministry Food Collection

Please consider donating non-perishable food items to help the local bank:

- Canned meats: Canned beef, ham, chicken, salmon, etc. Or ready to go meals like stews and chili
- Canned vegetables: potatoes, carrots, spinach, peas, etc. Low sodium preferred
- Canned fruit: unsweetened or in fruit juice without sugar added. Dried fruit is good too
- Boxes of rice (bags tear) Low sugar cereal as plain Cheerios or Raisin Bran
- Mac and Cheese cups. (regular boxes require milk and butter but the cups do not)
- Peanut butter, canned beans, pasta (consider gluten free, too) pasta sauce
- · Biscuit mix, or any mix adding water
- Cans, cartons, or boxes of powdered or evaporated milk
- Snack items for kids to take to school: juice boxes, applesauce containers, granola bars, fruit snacks, etc.
- Spices like cinnamon, oregano, basil, salt, pepper

Non-food items:

- Paper products such as toilet paper, paper plates, and paper towels are also helpful
- Diapers in sizes above newborn, plus wipes
- Toiletries: toothbrushes, soap, toothpaste, lotion, shampoo & conditioner, Chapstick (consider someone living outside this time of year)
- Feminine hygiene products: unscented pads will be most universally used, not tampons

Consider donating reusable shopping bags. It takes a lot of humility for people to come to a food bank and since they'll likely be walking home or taking public transportation, it's nice to at least blend in.

WHAT I DIDN'T REALIZE ABOUT FOOD BANKS

A lot of people have diabetes in this group. Consider low-sugar dietary restrictions. Cans and boxes are sturdier than bags. By the time families are receiving the food, it's been handled A LOT and packaging needs to be strong enough to hold up. One food bank said never bring anything in glass.

Pop-top cans are ideal; particularly for those living on the street Kids who qualify for free lunches typically receive breakfast at school too and when schools are out for holidays or summer, these families need more support.

Congregational Council Meeting Highlights October 21, 2025

- The congregation met on Sunday, October 12, 2025 and voted to ratify the Constitution. Attendees also shared a traditional turkey dinner afterward.
- The Council received an update on the work of the 4ISH ELCA Consortium. The 4-ISH Update is in a separate article.
- They discussed two congregational questions received. The first was about the candles on the wall in the Sanctuary. The Worship and Music team have been gathering information and reviewing options to refresh the front of the Sanctuary. The second question focused on how to bring youth into the church. Pastor J. shared the Northern Great Lakes Synod resources offered by the Synod's Youth Ministry Team for building and celebrating youth ministries, so those will be explored.
- Council members participated in the Visioning Retreat on October 11, for the leaders of the 4-ISH churches. Pastor J. facilitated the day's events, which included Godly Play, storytelling, and fellowship. Council members shared that they met many leaders they did not know, but the atmosphere was congenial with a shared sense of "being in the same boat and wanting to share a theme of hospitality. It was time well-spent, and they plan to have another in about six months.
- The Council discussed how to support the congregation with conversations about the changes that have occurred and those that will take place. They want everyone to feel heard and be included in the journey of the 4-ISH churches. You are encouraged to continue to ask questions of the Council members and share in your stories, so we can all understand each other's perspectives.
- The Council received the initial draft of the 2026 proposed budget which is to be reviewed with the needs of each ministry in mind. The Council will review the updated budget in November.
- Staff evaluations have been completed for 2025. The Council discussed ways to support staff development.
- The Property Team is exploring companies for snow plowing.
- The Social Ministry team had a blood drive on October 6 with about 21 donors. They updated the shut-in list and are making plans for food baskets.
- Stewardship reported that 15 vendors have signed up for the craft sale on November 15 to support Pajama Palooza.
- The Council approved up to \$500 to have the membership records digitized so they can be available in the church.
- They reviewed the plan for Advent service projects and Advent services. Thoughtful discussion took place regarding the times for the services.
- The work to migrate to new church software and Google operating system is ongoing.
- The next meeting will be on Tuesday, November 18, 2025 at 5:30 pm.






Worship Options

They enjoyed a moving Reformation Sunday service and a harvest-themed fellowship meal. The joy of sharing in community was a blessing to all. About 45-60 people participated in the Northern Lights Canvas painting, creating their own visions of the Northern Lights.
- The 4-ISH ELCA group heard a presentation from Meg Holeva about Parents' Night Out. She shared information about the program and invited them to share the information with their respective churches.
- The Community Activities team continues to plan events for the coming year. The next one will be the Cookie Walk at Bethel on Dec.13 from 9:30A 12:00P.
- The Council leaders of all 4-ISH churches attended the Visioning Retreat on October 11 at the Ski Hall of Fame.
- The group finalized plans for Advent and is working on plans for Lent next year.
- The group discussed ways to expand participation in the community, through events like community dinners, worship services at various locations, and so on.

I imagine the disciples were disappointed in Jesus' response to their request for "more" faith. They may have wondered if their puny faith would be enough, in the end. In light of their actions at Jesus' arrest, we may wonder ourselves. Although that faith seemed to fail them at the foot of the cross, it was still enough for

God to work through. In their expectant waiting in the upper room, they were able to receive the power of the Holy Spirit. They became bold preachers and apostles, stepping into an unknown future in faith, through which God was able to do some pretty amazing things.

Jesus trusted that the fragile faith of his disciples would be enough for God to work through. It still is enough. When we are able to sit in the expectation and simply receive the grace and power that God will pour out in us, the Holy Spirit will enable us to trust God's promise in our lives, and will empower us to live boldly as Jesus' disciples – no matter what the year brings.



Prayer Chain Update: Bethany established an active prayer chain in 2013. A prayer chain is a way for people to gain assistance through the power of prayer. It is also a way for any person to act on God's commandment to love one another (John 13:34-35). Prayers have been offered for family, friends, non-church people; we pray for ALL. Imagine raising children in a culture in which gratitude is the first priority. Freida Jacques works at the Onondaga Nation School. She is a clan mother, the school-community liaison, and a generous teacher. She explains to me that the Thanksgiving Address embodies the Onondaga relationship with the world. Each part of Creation is thanked in turn for fulfilling its Creator-given duty to the others. "It reminds you every day that you have enough," she says. "More than enough. Everything needed to sustain life is already here. When we do this, every day, it

leads us to an outlook of contentment and respect for all of Creation." You can't listen to the Thanksgiving Address without feeling wealthy. And, while expressing gratitude seems innocent enough, it is a revolutionary idea. In a consumer society, contentment is a radical proposition. Recognizing abundance rather than scarcity undermines an economy that thrives by creating unmet desires. Gratitude cultivates an ethic of fullness, but the economy needs emptiness. The Thanksgiving Address reminds you that you already have everything you need. Gratitude doesn't send you out shopping to find satisfaction; it comes as a gift rather than a commodity, subverting the foundation of the whole economy. That's good medicine for land and people alike.

We are approaching the time of year when activities pick up, and information is a struggle to share. We endeavor to grow through our communication and calendaring lessons of the past year.

For the Outlook Newsletter, and in support of our valued ministry support staff, if you wish to submit an article for the Outlook, please note the following:

- Prepare the article/ announcement/ invitation as you would like to see it in the Outlook.
 - If you need help, that's totally fine; reach out and schedule a time to partner with one another, or our Administrator, or Pastor
 - The Office has access to Adobe, Canva, Word, PowerPoint and can partner to build anything; let's dream a dream together and build your vision of invitation.
 - The Office cannot build every invitation for you, without you.
- Gather graphics, photos, or fonts to accompany their submission and include all supporting information in the submission (pictures help)
- Any submission received after the posted deadline, (grace is available, within reason) without accompanying cookies, cupcakes, or beverages for the Editor in Chief will be posted in the following month's Outlook

December issue deadline: Tuesday, November 18st, noon

January issue deadline: Tuesday, December 16^{ht}, noon

Helpful tips and notes:

- Fonts in the body of the article/announcement/invitation should be Aptos, 14 pitch
- Pictures, graphics, should at a minimum be 1280×720 pixels (smaller than that reduces the print quality to the point of being unable to read by struggling eyes)
- We might start looking ahead, at least 2 months (ideally 3), and coordinating our activities across the teams here, and within the ELCA community here in Ishpeming
 - The general open-invitation structure is 11 times, in at least 3 modalities (verbal, non-verbal, listening, etc.)
 - This structure helps our siblings see it and remember it and discern their ability to engage the invitation.
- Information without BLC contacts, leadership, or partnership, through team support or community bridges, will be questioned, lovingly
 - Recycling someone else's information to fill pages isn't what we're looking for in the Outlook

November 2025 Year C 2024/2025 to Year A 2025/2026

Year C focuses on the Gospel of Luke. The semi-continuous first testament readings are of prophetic proclamation chosen in chronological order and highlighting Jeremiah. The second testament, readings are chosen mainly from Galatians, Colossians, 1 and 2 Timothy and 2 Thessalonians.

Year A focuses on the Gospel of Matthew. The semi-continuous first testament readings focus on major Genesis narratives, the covenant with Moses, and the establishment of Israel in the Promised Land. The second testament readings are from Romans, Philippians and 1 Thessalonians.


