FEEDING THE HUNGRY DECEMBER MISSION OF THE MONTH



<u>Greensboro Urban Ministry (GUM)</u> - This ministry serves dinner the FIRST FRIDAY every other month at the shelter. Serving is typically from 6:30-8pm in downtown Greensboro. Our church has been providing service and support to this ministry for over 25 years. We look for groups to take on the food purchase, prep and serving for the months we are assigned (Feb, April, June, Aug, Oct and Dec). We serve between 60-100 residents. <u>Good Samaritan Ministries (GSM)</u> - This is truly a local mission, serving those in need who live in northwest Guilford County. There are 11 participating churches in Stokesdale and Oak Ridge who support this ministry. No one is turned away. A family is only asked to provide a name and address for record-keeping purposes.

The pantry is located at Gideon Grove United Methodist Church, 2865 Gideon Grove Church Rd in Stokesdale. Each month each church is responsible for providing 2-3 different food items to replenish the pantry. Then on the fourth Saturday of each month, the pantry opens to distribute boxes of food to all who come. The boxes are substantial, containing approximately 30 lbs. of 17 different items of food. This is enough to provide a family of 4 basic nutrition for about a week. If a family is larger, they receive two boxes. In March and November, Oak Ridge Methodist Church is responsible for distributing the food boxes.

Good Samaritan Ministries also offers emergency financial assistance for those who need help with critical expenses, such as utility bills or rent. The requests are verified, and money is paid directly to the utility or landlord.

ORMC supports this ministry through our general budget and through your financial support of GSM as a Mission of the Month. Christmas Cards are also sold that support GSM. These cards are available from Sheila Gallow.

November Recap





Greetings in Christ from the Ministry. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ." Ephesians 1:3 (NKJV)

Thank you for the continued support you have shown us this year. It has been a busy, but very exciting year. This newsletter highlights the impact we are having on the vulnerable children (orphans, former child soldiers, street kids) in Kanyaka and Kasungami, settlements in DRC, home to displaced people who have fled conflict further north.

Throughout this year we have had the privilege of watching our programs flourish. Within this newsletter you will hear some incredible testimonies which are truly inspiring and show first-hand the impact this ministry can have on individuals.

Remember, oftentimes, extended family members take orphans into their already crowded homes, but this still leaves them vulnerable as they share already stretched resources. Consequently, most of these children are left with their poor grandparents some are left as homeless orphans, hence ending up on streets or getting involved into high-risk groups such as army groups, vendors or breadwinners without education. For these reasons it is vital for us to continue our work and support children living in extreme poverty.

Education: It was a blessing this year to send 30 vulnerable children to school. We provided uniforms, backpacks filled with appropriate school supplies and paid school fees so children can go to school feeling confident, aligned with their peers, and prepared to learn. We praise God as our children displayed positive improvement and performance in both their classwork and attendance at school. Among these children some are in primary schools, and some are in secondary schools. Some others are in vocational training where they are gaining different skills in welding, sewing, mechanics and masonry including making cement blocks at Amani. For a follow-up, we made frequent visits to different schools to monitor the children's progress. They are very excited when they see us. The impact is so positive, they are gaining skills and improving life conditions.







Aimee said: "We are happy and thankful for the opportunity to go to school. Education provides us with opportunities to build positive relationships, develop social skills, and learn important life skills such as teamwork and leadership. It teaches us to socialize with people in society and outside the family. We thank donors and express our acknowledgements".


Amani Home: Amani means peace in Swahili. At Amani children's home, we keep providing a safe, stable, and caring environment for 15 boys who cannot live with their family members due to abuse, neglect, or other difficult circumstances. We offer basic needs, food, emotional support, access to education and healthcare. During their spare time, we help them develop life skills to prepare for independent living such as growing vegetables, making cement blocks, cleaning, washing and cooking food. Additionally, we provided weekly tutorial to help them improve in specific subjects. We also integrated weekly biblical teachings that focus on spiritual, moral and integrity development. The children are enjoying life in Amani.



Arsel said "It was so painful when I was living a street life. On the street my life turned very bad. There was no food, clothes, shoes, medication or education But since we are living in this home, I am so happy, it is a nice place of affection and to learn life skills. I can sweep, cook, grow vegetables and share stories with my roommates. My behavior has positively changed."

Shoes Distribution: 100 children benefited with pairs of shoes and socks this year. The distribution was a special event and a day of joy. They were filled with emotion and excitement after receiving new shoes and socks.

Shoes and socks distribution always brings positive impact on education, health, and overall, well-being of our children. In some areas of Kasungami and Kanyaka jiggers are prevalent. Jiggers, caused by the Tunga penetrans flea, are a significant public health issue in Africa, particularly affecting impoverished communities and leading to severe health complications. The shoes act as a barrier against infection from jiggers. They also protect from parasitic worms, hookworms, injury, and soil-borne diseases. This ensures children are attending school with proper gear and gives them a sense of dignity and hope. The shoes act as a barrier against infection from jiggers. Construction of Kanyaka Chapel: This building is an endeavor that carries not just the hope of a building, but the promise of a stronger community. This chapel is not just a symbol, but







a beacon of faith that has started giving the villagers a sense of identity, pride, and fulfillment. It has a multifold impact on the community. First, church members have a dedicated space for gathering and a place from which to carry out the ministry of the church. It provided worship services for the community and Amani children, and it is a place for youth and women meetings.

"It attracts the attention of the whole area and draws people toward opportunities to hear the Gospel and experience the love of God in Christian community", said Pastor Mukala.

Clean drinking water: We keep providing safe drinking water to many families through the borehole wells at Amani Children's Home in Kanyaka and Nazareth Church in Kasungami. People in these areas face challenges to get safe drinking water. The community had a main source of water from a river, which is very poor quality and not suitable for drinking. They are very happy for the opportunity to get clean

drinking water from the well.



In closing, we would like to thank you for your support and prayers. Because of your generosity and faithfulness, we can train future community leaders, who can make a lasting impact in their communities.
