from the desk of Pastor James



Dear Church,

In July, I discussed that one way we can gain a broader understanding of our health as human beings is by breaking it down into five categories: Physical, Volition, Mental, Emotional, and Spiritual. In August, I will be focusing on physical health. I invite you to read Mark 2 as we explore Physical Health.

Physical Health tends to be the category of "health" we understand the best and are most used to. It refers to our body, whether we are physically in shape, without sickness or injury, and how our bodies are doing. Physical health is the category we can see and, as such, tends to be the health we are most aware of. Physical health is also the health we get taught (or at least told) about the most, some good and some bad in our society.

When we look at scripture, we tend to see God focused on two aspects when referring to physical health.

- 1.) Are you sick or injured?
- 2.) Are your basic needs (food, water, sleep, shelter, safety) taken care of?

In Mark 2, we see Jesus addressing people's need to be healed and their need for food (injured and basic needs). At the beginning of Mark 2, Jesus physically heals a man who was paralyzed, so that he might walk again. As we look at the rest of Mark 2, we can see Jesus debating with the Pharisees over eating. Jesus continues to prioritize that people be fed enough so that they may survive and that this physical need be met.

When we look at physical health today, we have a lot of struggles. Two of the struggles I wish to bring up for consideration are:

- 1.) Whose needs are not being met?
- 2.) Are we more worried about our physical health or our beauty standards?

Scripture points us to work on meeting our physical needs, while also caring for the physical needs of our neighbors. Are we and are they getting enough food? Are hygiene items available? Are people getting enough time to rest appropriately? Many of our mission and ministries focus on our call from God to help our neighbors with their basic needs. How are we doing that as a church? How can we continue to do so?

The other point I wish to make is how our society is full of voices telling us that beautiful is healthy and you're beautiful if you buy certain products. The truth is beauty is not health. In fact, many times the most beautiful models and celebrities can be the unhealthiest. We see ourselves and our neighbors struggle with this. God continues to call us to care for our health so that we can care for ourselves and our neighbors. Society calls us to care for our beauty so that we will continue to buy their products.

This month I invite you to read Mark chapter 2. I invite you to choose one of the two topics on Physical Health above- 1.) Basic needs or 2.) health vs beauty and pray on it. Ask yourself, "How am I as an individual and we as a church meeting our basic needs and help our neighbor with theirs?" or "How am I as an individual understanding physical health over beauty expectations?" "Where do I see someone that I love, or a neighbor whom I am called to love, struggling with beauty expectation and physical health?"

May we be reflective and know that we are blessed by God.
