
Tuesday @ 5 pm Rosary & Bible Anointing of the Sick every 1st Tuesday

OUR HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS RENEWS APPEAL FOR HUMANITARIAN AID, RELEASE OF HOSTAGES IN GAZA

At Sunday's Angelus, Pope Francis renews his appeal for the free flow of humanitarian aid to Gaza and for the release of the hostages, saying every war is really a defeat.

Speaking after Sunday's Angelus prayer, Pope Francis expressed his concern and grief over what is happening in Israel and Palestine.

"I am very concerned, grieved. I pray and I am close to all those who are suffering, the hostages, the wounded, the victims and their families."

The Pope said he is very concerned over "the serious humanitarian situation in Gaza," and he was "saddened that the Anglican hospital and the Greek Orthodox parish" were hit in the war violence in recent days.

"I renew my appeal for spaces to be opened, for humanitarian aid to continue to arrive and for hostages to be freed."

The Pope then recalled that he has called for a day of fasting, prayer and penance on Friday, 27 October.

That day, in St. Peter's, at 6 pm, there will be an hour of prayer for peace in our world.

OUR HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS APPROVES DECREE ON MIRACLE ATTRIBUTED TO ARGENTINE BLESSED

Pope Francis approves a decree regarding a miracle attributed to the intercession of Argentine Blessed Maria Antonia of Saint Joseph, known as Mama Antula.

The Holy See Press Office communicated that on Tuesday afternoon Pope Francis met with Cardinal Marcello Semeraro, Prefect of the Dicastery for the Causes of Saints, when he authorized the promulgation of the decree on the miracle attributed to the intercession of Blessed Maria Antonia of Saint Joseph (born Antonia de Paz y Figueroa in 1730 in Silipica, Santiago del Estero, Argentina).

Known as Mama Antula, she founded the House for Spiritual Exercises in Buenos Aires, Argentina, where she died on 7 March 1799.

After the expulsion of the Jesuits from the country, she went from town to town in the poor regions of north-eastern Argentina promoting retreats in the Ignatian tradition. In only eight years, she managed to provide retreats to 70,000 people.

OUR MARONITE PATRIARCH BECHARA EL RAI'S AT MASS: SYNODAL PATH HELPS US RESPOND TO GLOBAL CRISES

Cardinal Béchara Boutros Raï, the Maronite Patriarch of Antioch, delivers the homily at daily Mass for Synod members, and urges Christians to imbibe a synodal way of living to confront the many issues that face our world.

Members of the Synod General Assembly celebrated Mass together in St. Peter's Basilica on Monday morning, ahead of the presentation of the fourth General Congregation.

Patriarch Youssef Absi, the Greek Melkite Patriarch of Antioch, presided over the Mass celebrated according to the Byzantine rite at the Altar of the Chair.

Cardinal Béchara Boutros Raï, the Maronite Patriarch of Antioch, delivered the homily at the Mass, reflecting on Jesus' invitation to pray for workers for God's abundant harvest.

Harvesting situations of suffering

In his homily, the Cardinal Patriarch noted that Jesus felt compassion for the large crowd which was following Him and so told His disciples: "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest."

Cardinal Raï said Jesus' words offer a starting point to understand the current state of the Church and the challenges facing society.

He reflected first on the abundant harvest as a symbol of various pressing global issues that require attention and action from the Church and all Christians.

These issues, he said, include the pursuit of just peace amid ongoing wars, addressing climate change and protecting the environment, challenging exploitative economic systems, aiding persecuted individuals, and healing the wounds inflicted by various forms of abuse.

Cardinal Raï added that the harvest includes the need to promote human dignity, foster ecumenical and interfaith dialogue, care for the marginalized and vulnerable, and engage with contemporary societal challenges.

Laborers guided by the Spirit

The Maronite Patriarch of Antioch went on to consider the laborers who are called to gather the harvest.

Cardinal Raï said the Synod *Instrumentum Laboris* (working document) identifies these laborers as every person sent by Christ and guided by the Holy Spirit.

God's Spirit, said Cardinal Raï, is the true "protagonist of the mission entrusted to the Church and thus of the entire synodal journey."

Every laborer needs to receive formation and guidance from the Holy Spirit to embrace a synodal way of living.

Such training, he said, "involves formation for a life of communion, mission, and participation, as well as synodal spirituality at the heart of the Church's renewal."

Our mission to heal wounds of others

In conclusion, Cardinal Raï invited Christians to feel compassion, as Jesus did, for our world's situations of suffering and the conditions in which people find themselves.


He said the suffering of the poor, discarded, refugees, innocent victims of wars, and the homeless all stir Christ's compassion and should stir our own.

Christ, concluded Cardinal Raï, "has chosen each one of us to heal these wounds and strive for a better world, where we can inhabit our common home in peace and tranquility.


The Power of Attitude



LEBANESE-AMERICAN OF THE MONTH



VENERABLE SANDRA SABATTINI, A MODERN SAINT FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

Here is something about the way saints live that stands distinctly apart from the surrounding culture. Whether it's barefoot St. Francis singing as he begged, or Mother Teresa lifting up the sick off the streets into her homes for the dying, the stories of holy men and women amaze us with their radical choices. Watch this video to learn about Alessandra Sabattini, a holy Italian woman whose life was both normal and countercultural, and whom the Church has declared venerable just 34 years after she died.

Alessandra, or "Sandra" as most people called her, was born in Riccione, Italy, in 1961. The oldest of two children, she grew up in a devout Catholic family—in fact, for most of her childhood, her family lived with her mother's brother who was a parish priest. She kept a journal as a child that revealed her pious nature from a young age, once writing as reported in this article, "A life lived without God is just a way of passing time, whether it's boring or fun, time to be filled in while waiting for death." Sandra was a teenager when she first met a holy priest named Oreste Benzi, whom the Church declared a Servant of God in 2014, and benefited from his spiritual guidance through the youth group he organized. Soon after, she participated in a summer program for teenagers to care for people who have severe disabilities. The experience changed her life, giving her a sense of purpose in serving and caring for the vulnerable. She told her mother, "We worked till we dropped, but these are people I'll never leave."

After graduating from high school, Sandra began her studies at the University of Bologna, with the goal of eventually becoming a medical missionary in Africa. She spent her weekends and summer vacations volunteering to care for drug addicts in rehabilitation centers. Despite her packed schedule, she made it a point to spend time before the Eucharist early every morning—another example of her unusual and admirable choices.

While at the university, Sandra became friends with Guido Rossi, a fellow student who also attended Oreste Benzi's youth group, the Community of Pope John XXIII. He shared her dream of becoming a medical missionary in Africa, and before long, the two had fallen in love and became engaged to be married. Their decision to live a chaste engagement, which they openly shared with their friends, stood out in the university and youth culture around them. Sandra spoke of the need for holy men and women to strive not only to avoid evil but to aim for greatness: "Today there are too many merely good Christians, while the world needs saints." Sadly, her own dreams of medical missionary work were not realized; in 1984, when she was only 23, she was killed in a car accident. Her legacy lives on, however, in her example of holiness, which continues to inspire and encourage many people today.

FILIPINO PRIESTS FROM THROUGHOUT U.S. TO GATHER AT NEWARK CATHEDRAL FOR HISTORIC MASS

For the first time in history, roughly 370 Filipino Catholic priests from throughout the U.S. will converge on Newark's Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart for a cultural celebration and Mass led by Archbishop Gabriele Caccia — the Vatican's permanent observer to the United Nations — on Thursday, October 26. Lay faithful are welcome, though Filipino attire is required.

The festivities, which come as part of the National Association of Filipino Priests (NAFP-USA)'s Fourth Assembly, will start at 1:20 p.m. with a procession of Filipino Catholics carrying items representing the Philippines' religious traditions like Simbang Gabi and Sinulog. Then, at 3:30 p.m., Archbishop Caccia will preside over a Mass dedicated to the theme "Cultural Integration Towards a Synodal Church." Afterward, the Filipino priests and faithful will gather for a formal gala in the Hilton Meadowlands at 6:30 p.m.

"The Filipino community is very excited about this Mass because our faith is our oxygen," said Father JM Manolo A. Punzalan, program director for the NAFP-USA's Fourth Assembly and director of the Archdiocese of Newark's Filipino Apostolate. "Our lives revolve around our religious practice, and our religion is a refuge for us when life gets hard. So, it will be nice to celebrate our devotion. And since many of us are immigrants, this is a chance to catch up with priests we knew back in the Philippines."

The Cathedral Basilica's event is one of several that will occur during the NAFP-USA's Fourth Assembly, which runs from October 24-27 (the last week of Filipino American History Month). Other noteworthy happenings included an October 25 Mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City celebrated by Auxiliary Bishop Edmund Whalen of the Archdiocese of New York. Auxiliary Bishop Michael A. Saporito from the Archdiocese of Newark will also deliver a keynote address about the topic "Priesthood in a Synodal Church" on October 26 at the Hilton Meadowlands.

Finally, the assembly will close on October 27 with a Mass led by Bishop Oscar Solis of the Diocese of Salt Lake City. Bishop Solis, a native of the Philippines, will discuss the importance of journeying together as Filipino priests in his homily.

"We all come from different provinces in the Philippines, so this assembly is a way for us to get to know each other, forge real friendships, and build camaraderie," said Father Punzalan, who added that approximately 99% of the participating Filipino priests are immigrants. "We'll share experiences in our ministry and discuss how we can assimilate into the American Church. It's all about walking together as Filipino priests."

New Jersey is home to 143,845 Filipinos — according to 2018 U.S. Census Bureau data — with a 2023 Pew Research Center survey finding that most Filipino Americans (54%) identify as Catholic. To engage them, the archdiocesan Filipino Apostolate offers spiritual programs, enjoyable gatherings, and social justice initiatives. Most recently, the apostolate celebrated the 500th anniversary of Christianity in the Philippines by hosting a yearlong pilgrimage in which participants followed a replica of the nation's famed Jubilee Cross to parishes with high Filipino populations throughout the Archdiocese. It all culminated in a celebratory Mass at the Cathedral Basilica that was attended by hundreds of Filipino Catholics.


