Nancy Hipple



The River Valley Chapter of the American Guild of Organists honored Nancy Hipple for over 15 years of service and dedication to church music in a Concert and Awards Ceremony in the Voxman Music Building on the University of Iowa Campus.

Nancy started piano lessons before she was 10 years old. Her first piano teacher was the organist at the Presbyterian Church, and she also took lessons from the organist at the Methodist Church.

Nancy started playing at Red Oak Presbyterian Church when she was in 8th or 9th grade. She played for VBS and Sunday School and her role progressed from there. The organ at Red Oak was a home organ with one octave of foot pedals. She played for church until she started nursing training. During early married life, she played every other Sunday at Red Oak.

Nancy joined First UCC in 1976, and from then until 1991 she only played the organ for funerals. She also sang in and directed the choir. In 1991 Nancy subbed for organist Betty Trevathan due to Betty's health. This turned into a permanent position until she retired in January of 2008.

"The hardest part [during this time] was playing with the beeper in my pocket, never knowing when I could get called out to assist someone," Nancy said. Bonnie Deerberg was her sub when she was on call for her nursing duties.

From 2008—2019 she only did music for funerals.

In 2019, Nancy returned to the organ bench and began playing regularly on Sunday's while sharing the respon-

sibilities with Pat Barglof and Deb Schwitzer.

"I love how our music team works together, and I feel like we each have our own style, and we complement one another well," Nancy said.

What keeps Nancy doing this? "The music. Music has always been important to me. During the years that I didn't play, I was able to get my music "fill" by singing in the choir. During Covid-19, church was my outlet, my happy place. I do worry that churches won't have organists in the future."

One of her special moments was playing for Pastor Kerri's call weekend.

As an attendee of this Concert and Awards Ceremony, Nancy commented, "I am so glad I was able to attend the program honoring church organists and hear the minister talk about how music reaches people when nothing else does. I believe that people don't realize that when you play the organ, the words to the songs go through your head. The scriptures are repeated in the hymns."

Congratulations Nancy on providing music for over 40 years to the Church!

Pat Barglof



First UCC organist Pat Barglof began playing the organ in 4th grade. When she wanted to join the band, and her dad decided the organ would be a little more "peaceful" for him to hear as she practiced. Her parents bought her a single keyboard organ to make sure that she enjoyed it. Once she started, they got her a "real" organ. Interestingly, Pat never played the piano.

Playing the organ shaped her love of music. In 8th grade she remembers that the band instructor was looking for an alto saxophone player.

She adds, "I began playing saxophone in the elementary band as an 8th grader. I stood out like a sore thumb, but it didn't take long for me to learn. It was much easier than the organ because I only had to play one note at a time with the saxophone."

As she was learning, Pat's teacher was an organist for a large cathedral in Davenport which became the site for her recitals when it was time for her final projects.

When she attended Marycrest College, Pat majored in speech and drama education with a minor in organ. Interestingly, Pat took 40 hours of lessons to get this minor which is specifically designated as an organ degree, not a music degree. During her college experience, she took one semester of classes at UNI and took organ there as well, with one lesson each week. Her final test was in the concert hall at UNI on a four-manual organ.

After her mid-year college graduation, Pat worked at Griggs Music teaching organ and piano lessons. The people who ran the business were always good to me. What she remembers most about working there was how people who were getting married were always needing an organist. At least 5-6 times Pat would be given the address to go to a church and play at a wedding.

"One time I remember someone called in the morning and needed an organist for their 2 p.m. wedding. One time, I arrived in time to play the processional and recessional for a wedding, and I never even met the bride or groom."

With marriage and raising children, Pat didn't play as much – mainly for weddings and to sub for organists at Peace Church in Bennett where she was a member. When her children were very young she gave lessons at home. When they were old enough to go to school, Pat began her teaching career.

Pat joined First UCC in 2005 and began playing whenever they needed someone. She would often play the hammer dulcimer as a duet with Rev. David Lorenzen playing the guitar. Eventually, Pat was part of the rotation playing once each month. Now, she splits the responsibilities with Nancy Hipple and Deb Schwitzer.

What she loves most about playing is practicing. She loves looking over new music and preparing. It gives her something to work on and a goal. In the 60 years she has been playing she says, "I am addicted to music!"

Playing music has been a part of Deb Schwizer's life since she began taking lessons in 2nd grade. The family rule was that they could choose one activity – and Deb and one other sister chose the piano. She was always drawn to the instrument and then began playing the organ when she was 13. Arlyn Hasselbush was her instructor, and she learned with two others. Later, another person in Tipton taught her the organ and gave her music.

The first time she played for an audience was actually at church – St. John's in Clarence. The minister's son was getting baptized, and she was asked to play the organ for that event. She continued to play at church regularly while in junior high. She says, "There were enough of us that I played a couple times each month. I wasn't very good then and made lots of mistakes, but I really enjoyed playing."

Deb got married after college and didn't play regularly, just a little here and there at St. John's. When her kids were young, she remembers taking them with her to practice in the balcony at St. John's.

When she became a member of First UCC, Deb didn't play for the first 2-3 years. Nancy Hipple was the main organist with Bonnie Deerberg subbing. Eventually, she began playing regularly and has continued for the last 25 years at First UCC.

Deb's favorite thing about playing is the challenge of new music. She often does this as she brings people together for special music in the services. "I like having more musical stuff going on at church. I hope when people see others providing music they will know they can do it." "I thank God for the musical talent I have been given. I try to select music for the church service to glorify God"

When asked about the hardest part of playing she said, "Playing the song *I Was There to Hear Your Borning Cry* without crying."

Thank you, Deb, for sharing your talents!
