## In the Political Landscape

H.R.1, referred to as the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act," became law July 4, 2025. Most people probably heard something about it in the news media. The full bill can be found at <a href="https://www.congress.gov/bill/119th-congress/">https://www.congress.gov/bill/119th-congress/</a> house-bill/1 1. Tennessee's impact is found at https://www.tn.gov/ humanservices/news/2025/9/22/new-federal-law-updates-snap-work-requirements-for-able-bodied-adultswithout-dependents--abawds--in-tennessee-.html .This legislation directly affects many in our community and several outreach ministry recipients, and the evolving laws are already driving behavior in our local community. Recipients who receive SNAP benefits (a.k.a. "food stamps") will be required to work, volunteer, or participate in a job training program at least 20 hours a week (80 hours a month). If recipients cannot verify work, training, or volunteer hours, they risk losing benefits. Such changes are likely to increase assistance requests to churches and other non-profit agencies, many of which have already seen funding cuts. How should we prepare or respond?

I believe our church is positioned well to engage with struggling families and journey with them towards wholeness. Changes in benefit requirements may create a trigger in certain people. Hopefully, participants from our adult spring study When Helping Hurts imagine some possibilities taking shape. As noted in the book, "Three common triggers for change for individuals or groups are: 1) a recent crisis; 2) the burden of the status quo becoming so overwhelming that they want to pursue change; or 3) the introduction of a new way of doing or seeing things that could improve their lives." (Corbett, Steve; Fikkert, Brian. When Helping Hurts: How to Alleviate Poverty Without Hurting the Poor . . . and Yourself (p. 208). Moody Publishers. Kindle Edition).

Some will proactively respond to these new requirements. For example, one man recently asked how else he could volunteer at your church to help him keep SNAP benefits. I am proud of his response. Others may not respond until the last minute or at all. We can all help by communicating these changes to anyone impacted. Indeed, many personal or family crises are coming, but as the authors warn, "Never waste a crisis" (Corbett & Fikkert, 208)!

Some good news is a growing number of congregants have developed stronger relationships with homeless neighbors and SNAP recipients, and we can leverage these relationships and the emerging crises as framework for good ministry. We should be prepared, wise – even "shrewd" – see 9/28 sermon on Luke 16), as we anticipate the Spirit to guide families in crises to our doors. My first plea is to pray how our church might respond in grace and expectant faith so that we can better "make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world." Another step is to gather for discussion in pursuit of the Spirit's leading. When Helping Hurts participants, especially, or anyone interested in discussing our church's response to these changes in welfare benefits, are encouraged to gather for discussion in the fellowship hall Tuesday, October 14, @ **9AM.** Notes can be shared with those interested but unable to attend.

## **New Room Conference recap**

A handful attended the New Room Conference in Montgomery, AL, September 17-19. The name comes from our heritage. *New Room* is the oldest Methodist building in the world, located in Bristol, England. Founded in 1739 by John Wesley, the New Room became the cradle of the worldwide Methodist movement

(www.newroombristol.org.uk/). While Seedbed's conference doesn't take us to the exact place where the historic New Room is, it does take folks to the Spirit behind the movement. Many are counting on the Spirit to do it again.

Among the collective takeaways among our New Room participants to be sown into local fields of God's kingdom are prayer, worship, and outreach — in that order. If you want to consider these topics, join us Monday, October 13, at 11:45 in the fellowship hall to talk more. You can even bring your own lunch if you'd like. **Regenerate!** On a personal level, compost your food and lawn scraps; plant for pollinators; consider rewilding at least a portion of your property. On a larger scale, examine your agricultural practices (cover crops, low till, no chemicals...) for changes that will regenerate the fertility of the soil.

Tree planting season is coming. **Investigate potential tree sales** and planting services, including local government, nonprofit foundations, and nursery businesses. Trees pull down carbon from the atmosphere and nourish the soil, provide habitat and food for birds and other pollinators, and give shade in the summer and sun in the winter, reducing the need for fossil fuel energy.

**Purchase organic food.** The few extra cents you pay at the grocery support farmers who avoid using the synthetic pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers that have been proven to deplete the soil. Organic farmers also refuse to subject their livestock to antibiotics and growth hormones. Organic farming practices are healthier for soil, livestock, and for those who eat the food.

Reap the harvest. **Shop for food locally at farmers markets.** See and give thanks for those whose work feeds you and others. Care for the planet by reducing the carbon emissions that come from shipping food long distances. Eat more fruits and veggies and reduce the high cost to your body and the planet from many other foods.

Rake leaves this fall as a family, a group of friends, or a church youth group helping someone. Look for ways to **turn the leaves into mulch** so they continue to feed the soil, rather than bagging them and sending them to the landfill. Talk about the process God supplies for continuing to regenerate the land, which in turns sustains life.

**Compost food waste and more** (leaves, shredded paper, pet fur, coffee filters). Compost, which is nature's way to regenerate and nourish the soil. Browse for easy and effective options: backyard bin, indoor machine, commercial pick up, sharing a service with a neighbor.


