Fishing line Is A Deathtrap for Wildlife



This young male dolphin was spotted under Big San Carlos Bridge, entangled in fishing line and reported to FWC. Several weeks passed before the dolphin and its mother were able to be captured. The mother was released..... but the injuries to the long suffering young male were too serious and had to be mercifully euthanized on site. The mother was released unharmed.

What Can You Do?

While many angler dispose of line in responsible ways, all it

takes are a few uninformed or lazy people to make others look bad and cause coastal animals to suffer.

Not only can animals become entangled in old fishing line and die or suffer multiple injuries, but boats can suffer damage if old fishing line is caught between the hooks and lines caught on branches. The line can harm animals causing them to become tangled on legs, wings, and beaks of birds. They can sustain crippling injuries after one or both of their legs become wrapped in fishing line. A hook caught in a beak or mouth can make eating painful or impossible, resulting in death by starvation.

Fishing line entangles animals, leaving them vulnerable to predators, starvation, and drowning. As they struggle, the line becomes tighter, cutting off circulation and severing wings or legs.

Meet Ranger Cody Bellan


For Ranger Cody




with the seasons. Take binoculars and bug spray along as you wander.... Because this is the true old-Florida back to nature experience.

But.... please leave nothing behind including holes you have dug in the sand! This hole could have trapped a mother turtle coming on shore to lay her eggs.




