Vocabulary, Reading Comprehension, Spelling, Language and Social Sciences

Section II:

Writing

Section III:

Mathematics

These questions are examples so that the student is familiar with the format of the test.

Vocabulary

The test will contain 30 questions that are divided into three sections. The first section requires that students identify the same meaning for an underlined word in a phrase. The second section requires that students identify the opposite meaning for an underlined word in a phrase. The third and fourth sections require that students determine the meaning of multimeaning words by using sentence context.

Reading Comprehension

Test 2 contains 20 questions based on several reading selections. The test requires that students read a variety of material. Depending on the level of the tests, this material may include biographical sketches, factual accounts, fictional passages, poems, speeches, advertisements, letters, editorials, commercials or movie reviews. The questions measure skills in literal, interpretive and critical comprehension. See the **example below**

Spelling

Test 3 contains 20 questions that are divided into three sections: (i) to identify misspelled words, identify sentences in which the word is not spelled correctly for the way it is used in the phrase; and, to find the correctly spelled word that fits best in the sentence given. The words included in each level reflect common spelling errors. See **examples below**.

Language

Test 4 contains 30 questions. The test measures specific skills in language usage. It requires students to do a variety of questions that measure various skills related to effective written expression. The items may include choosing the word or words that best complete a sentence; identifying the subject or verb of a sentence; and, recognizing incorrect grammar in a sentence. All questions are based on rules of written Standard English.

WRITING

Mathematics

This test contains 50 questions. The questions measure addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills. The questions may include operations with whole numbers, fractions or decimals. Specific skills in the understanding and use of mathematics concepts are included. The test will require that students recognize concepts and apply problem solving operations in various contexts.

Compare and order whole numbers, decimals and fractions

Place value

Rounding -whole numbers, decimals

Addition and subtraction -whole numbers, decimals and fractions.

Application / word problems
