

Fr. Don's Musings . . .

Last Sunday was Divine Mercy Sunday and we did a Litany of Trust at the homily time. Several people asked for a copy of that, so here it is:

From the belief that I have to earn your love - Deliver me Jesus.

From the false security that I have what it takes - Deliver me Jesus.

From the rebellion against childlike dependency on you - Deliver me Jesus.

From anxiety about the future - Deliver me Jesus.

From the belief that my life has no meaning or worth - Deliver me Jesus.

From discouragement - Deliver me Jesus.

That you are continually holding me, sustaining me, loving me - Jesus, I trust in you.

That your love goes deeper than my sins and failings, and transforms me - Jesus, I trust in you.

That not knowing what tomorrow brings is an invitation to lean on you - Jesus, I trust in you.

That you are with me in my suffering - Jesus, I trust in you.

That your plan is better than anything else - Jesus, I trust in you.

That you always hear me, and in your goodness always respond to me - Jesus, I trust in you.

It's a good litany to remind us of God's unconditional love for us. It comes from Sr. Faustina, a Polish nun in the 1930s who God spoke to about his Divine Mercy.

On another note, my 66th birthday was Wednesday. Thank you for all the warm greetings I received. You have been very supportive of me and my ministry here. St. Clare Church/School/Preschool is a great place to be! I hope to stay here until I semi-retire at age 70. \sim *Fr. Don*

Signs of the Times by Deacon Bill . . . Historical Books of the Bible

Today we begin to look at the Historical Books of the Bible.

The Book of Ruth is an extremely short book placed right after Judges to which it is closely related. There is much dialogue in the book. It is historical and relates the story of Boaz, who according to the law marries Ruth. They produce a son named Obed, the father of Jesse, the father of David. (Ru 4: 17b). It was written in the time of Judges and provides an excellent introduction to the Books of Samuel which brings us to the next chapters of Israel's history.

Introduction to the Historical Books. In the Book of Judges, we experience the continued cycle of the people abandoning their religion, God punishing them with a trial, and then sending a judge to deliver them. The people see the error of their ways and repent. All of this activity happens in the different areas where individual tribes have settled but becomes known throughout the land. By the end of the book, the Israelites ask for a king to unite the tribes and the land (Jdg 19:1a, 21:25a). In Genesis Chapter 12 and Deuteronomy Chapter 17, God promises his people land, worldwide blessings, and a royal dynasty. In the first 6 historical books, Samuel, Kings, and Chronicles (each title includes two books), we are introduced to the start of that royal dynasty.

The Books of Samuel introduce Saul, the first king, and David, his successor. (*I will discuss in greater detail that important part of history here next week.*)

In the Books of Kings at the beginning of the first book, we hear the story of Solomon who is the one who builds the temple in Jerusalem. The three greatest kings of Israel are Saul, David, and Solomon who each rule for approximately 40 years. The balance of the Books of Kings describes the good, bad, and ugly kings of Israel who reign until the fall of Jerusalem in 587 BC. Overall, there are 42 kings and one queen. The kingdom is divided after the death of Solomon in 930 BC, and the northern kingdom has 19 of those kings in its 208 years of existence.

The Books of Chronicles is written during and after the Jewish exile from 597 until 537 BC. Those years are presented as a punishment for idolatry and disobedience to God. The Jewish temple is destroyed in 586 BC. These books are similar to Deuteronomy which recaps and reinforces the Book of Exodus with additional information. The Books of Chronicles are written to save the history of Israel for future generations. They supplement the Books of Samuel and Kings with extra stories from various other sources. Their purpose is less concerned with reporting precise facts than it is with explaining the meaning of those facts. As a result, the books focus on the action of God in the lives of the leaders and the proper worship in the temple. This information is extremely important to be preserved for the Hebrew people to survive as a nation after their exile.
