

We continue to celebrate Easter here at St. Clare. This weekend concludes the "Octave of Easter," eight days of extended Easter celebrations. We are also in the Easter Season of the Church which extends to the Feast of Pentecost 50 days after Easter (May 19th). I really enjoyed our Easter celebrations last weekend. We had joyful Masses with our church packed full of worshippers, great music, and beautiful decorations, welcomed in 14 new Catholic converts, and also had a fun time for the kids with the Easter Egg Hunt (4000 eggs!). Alleluia, he is risen!

This Sunday is also Divine Mercy Sunday. After our Masses we will provide the opportunity to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet. This is a prayer that God inspired Sr. Faustina to use. It uses the rosary beads and begs for God's mercy for ourselves and the whole world.

The Divine Mercy Image is in the background. A copy is in the east transept of our Church. Jesus requested Sister Faustina, in another revelation,

to have it painted as she envisioned him and include the inscription, "Jesus, I trust in You."

Signs of the Times by Deacon Bill . . . The Books of Joshua and Judges

This week we begin our journey into the historical books of the Bible. There are approximately 16 of these books. They help define Israel as a nation and a people of God.

The Book of Joshua - If you recall from Deuteronomy, God chose Joshua to be Moses' apprentice and the one to lead his people into the Promised Land. In the opening verses of the Book of Joshua, God is so clear about Joshua's role as leader that he instructs him to "be strong and courageous" three different times.



The Israelites have been in the desert for 40 years which has been like a boot camp to prepare for a battle as they plan to move into Canaan. The book's purpose is to demonstrate God's fidelity in giving the land he promised to the Israelites as an inheritance. It tells the story of God's intervention in capturing Jericho by using the Ark of the Covenant to block the waters of the Jordan River so Canaan can be entered. Then the Israelites walk around the city for seven days. On the seventh day, seven priests sound their trumpets and the walls of Jericho collapse. After many other battles, the entire land is conquered and divided up among the 12 tribes of the Israelites.

The book ends with Joshua recalling the history of God's action with the people through covenants made from the time of the escape from Egypt until the present. He challenges the people saying, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." (Jos 24:18b) and the people responded, "We will still serve the Lord, our God, and obey his voice." (Jos 24:24)

The Book of Judges - This book records the story of 12 judges who were considered heroes for 110 years between 1130 and 1020 BC. The Israelites continue to abandon their religion, so God punishes them with a trial. Then he sends a judge to deliver them from the trial, so they repent. Finally God shows mercy and forgives them. This behavior throughout the entire Old Testament is called the cycle of apostasy. These 12 individuals are not judges or magistrates as we might know them today, but military leaders God sends to aid and relieve the Israelites in times of danger. These 12 judges most likely exercised their authority simultaneously in different areas where the 12 individual tribes of Israel had settled but never over the entire nation.

We will explore the nation as a whole when we study the books of Samuel and Kings in which, as you may guess, the kings emerge. The six major judges are Othniel, Ehud, Barak, Gideon, Jephthah, and Samson. However, they are not great examples. Gideon, Jephthah, and Samson are guilty of significant sins even though they are part of God's plan to help the people. Only Deborah, the one female minor judge who is a prophet and a warrior, proves to be the exception. The kings rescue the Israelites though the power of God, but the people continue to fall into the cycle of apostasy. By the end of the book, we see that Israel needs a king to lead by doing right in God's plan. "In those days there was no king in Israel; everyone did what they thought was best" [for themselves]. (Jgs 17:6)
