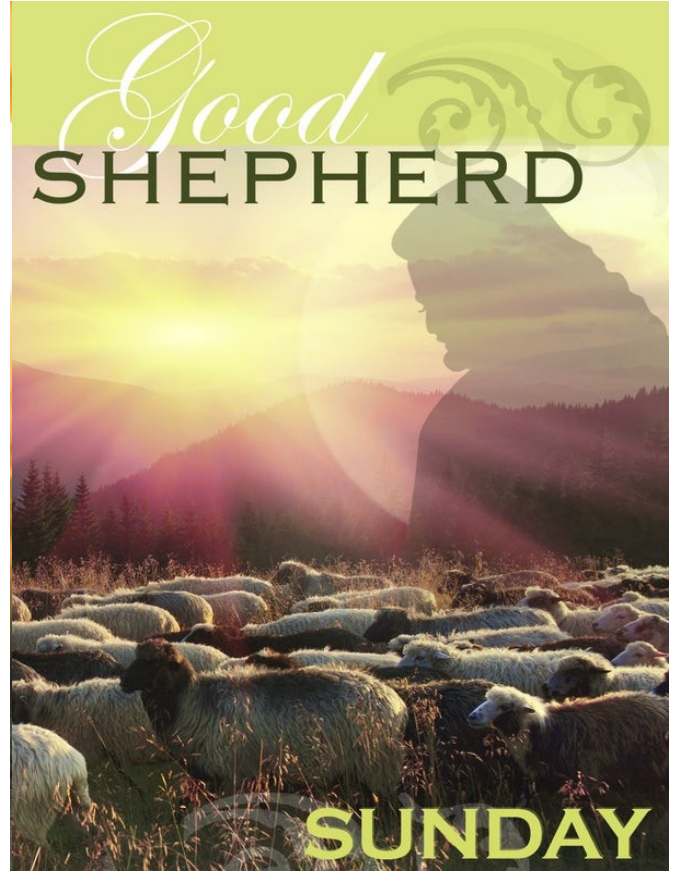

Fr. Don’s Musings . . .

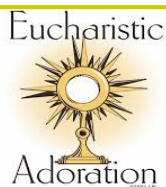
This weekend we celebrate 1st Holy Communion for almost 40 of our young people. Jesus tells us that he is the Bread of Life. These young people will be receiving the Bread of Life for the first time. As Catholics, we believe that the bread and wine are transformed during the prayers of the Mass by Jesus into the real presence of his body and blood. It still looks like unleavened bread and tastes like wine but sacramentally it has become the true presence of Jesus. He comes right inside our lives/our bodies in this sacrament.

Here are a few things Jesus said about the Eucharist: “Unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood, you have no life within you (John 6:53), Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in them (John 6:56), Whoever eats this bread will live forever, and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world (John 6:51).” At the Last Supper when Jesus first gave the Eucharist to his apostles he said, “Do this in memory of me”.

The apostles continued to celebrate the Eucharist each Sunday after the resurrection, and we continue that every Sunday when we come to Mass to celebrate the Eucharist. We are following Jesus’ command to “do this in memory of me”. Holy Communion changes us. Every time we receive the Eucharist we are changed, we become more like Jesus.

This weekend we celebrate with our young people as they receive their first Holy Communion. And we celebrate the gift of this sacrament that unites all of us with Jesus.

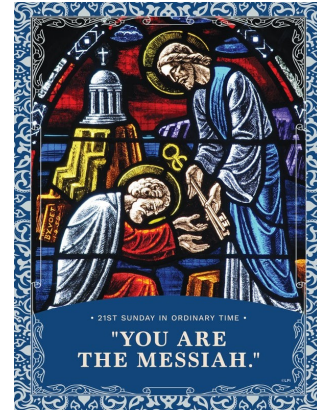
FIRST COMMUNION



“This and That “from Deacon Bill . . . St. Peter and the Early Church

As we begin our journey into the Acts of the Apostles, we first focus on St. Peter, the head of the Apostles and our first pope. The Gospels provide a great profile of St. Peter. He was the first Apostle, a fisherman, who could be called “The Fisherman Philosopher”, for he asked the Lord more questions than the others. For example, “To whom shall we go?” “Where are you going?” and “Why cannot I follow you?”

At Caesarea Philippi after Simon Peter declared to Jesus , “*You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God. Jesus replied: “Blessed are you, Simon, son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father. And so I say to you, you are Peter, (Jesus changes his name) and upon this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven...” (Mt 16: 16:19)* .



Peter became part of Jesus’ inner circle along with James and John. He witnessed the Transfiguration on Mount Tabor where Moses and Elijah spoke with Jesus, the raising of Jairus’ daughter, and the Agony in the Garden of Gethsemane. It was there that Peter fell from grace by sleeping instead of praying. Later he denied Jesus three times, and fled in fear after the crucifixion. Yet Jesus appeared to him and the other disciple on the shores of Galilee and asked Peter three times if he loved him. Through these three affirmations, Peter was forgiven. All of this is taken from the Gospel passages.

In the Acts of the Apostles, Peter is the main figure up to chapter 12. Paul first appears in chapter 7 and dominates most of the stories from chapter 12 through 28 except during the Council of Jerusalem, where Paul meets Peter and the Church welcomes the Gentiles.

Some of the important decisions Peter made for the early Church included choosing a new apostle to replace Judas. Two candidates were proposed, Joseph and Matthias, and after prayer and casting lots, Matthias was chosen. We also hear the apostles receiving the Holy Spirit, Peter’s speech in Jerusalem, and then 3,000 people joining the Church. (from the upcoming reading on Pentecost Sunday).

Peter also healed a crippled beggar which increased the number of believers up to 5,000. He and John were arrested but later released with orders not to preach in the name of Jesus again. Despite this, Peter continued preaching. People even brought the sick so that Peter’s shadow might fall upon them to be cured. As a result, he was imprisoned again, but through the prayers of the community, he experienced a miraculous escape.

As the Church grew, the need for helpers led to the creation of the diaconate (more about that next week with Saints Stephen and Philip). In the name of Jesus, Peter healed Aeneas at Lydda and restored Tabitha to life. Then Peter encountered the centurion, Cornelius the Gentile. Both Peter and Cornelius see visions that bring them together. They dine and Cornelius’ household is baptized. This event inspired Peter to advocate for the baptism of the Gentiles.

Tradition places Peter in Antioch, where he later founded a Christian community. He then went on to Rome and wrote two letters to Christian communities, and was ultimately crucified under Nero in the year 64 AD.

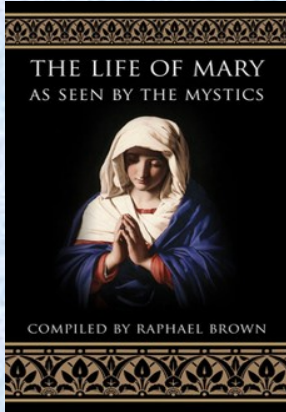

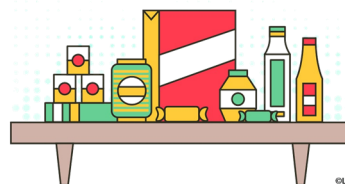
