



"This and That" from Deacon Bill... Parable of the Rich Man

As we all know, we can't take it with us – I have been involved with many funerals in my ministry but have yet to see a U-Haul trailer on a hearse.

Today we hear about a rich man in the gospel, but where does he go wrong?

The rich man in the gospel seems remarkably like us. He is saving something of discernible value, appears to have a good work ethic, and is planning for the future. However, I believe, he makes two mistakes.

First, the rich man never sees beyond himself.

Vanity of vanities benefits us nothing. Vanity adds up to zilch, zip, nada. St. Paul tells us to let go of the old man or woman and become our deepest truest self in Christ. Let us set our hearts on things that matter and not things that are just, well, things. The question to ask ourselves today is this: do we own our stuff or does our stuff own us? As daughters and sons of a loving God, we should recognize that all we have been given in this life are gifts from him. We should use things insofar as they help us live happily, healthy, holy and free; we should divest ourselves of those things which entwine and ensnare our hearts.

Let's ponder the question in the today's gospel, "The things you have prepared to whom will they belong?" Does the rich man think his riches impress anyone? Does he think that anyone really cares he is rich?

There is an old experiment. Name last year's MVP of the Super Bowl? Who won an Oscar this year for the best actor? Who is the richest person in this world? Who was on the cover of *People* magazine most often last year? Now name the best teacher you had in grade school? Name the best coach you ever had. Name your favorite aunt or uncle. Name the people who love you. Name those you love.

It's not about riches or accomplishments that impress. Those things barely matter. What really matters is who we love and who loves us. We are made to love and care for and cherish one another. Fame and fortune come and go with little rhyme or reason.

Secondly, the rich man never sees beyond this world.

There is an old image of heaven and hell. Hell is a place where there is this table laden with all kinds of succulent foods, wines, desserts, thick juicy steaks, fat lobsters, chocolate cakes, ice cream, and pizza, but everyone in hell is sitting five feet away from the table and starving. They can't get any closer, but they do have a set of chopsticks that are about four feet long. They can pick up food, but it is impossible to feed themselves. They spend eternity smelling the flavors and staring at the piles of food as their hungry, starving stomachs rumble.

In heaven, the image is the same with all kinds of food, with everyone sitting at a distance from the table, and holding very long chopsticks still unable to feed themselves, but they are all well nourished and happy. How can this be? Well, everyone in heaven uses their own chopsticks to pick up the food and feed the person near them.

Here at the table of the Lord, we are and become a community. As a community, we are called to help one another. Let us feast, today, together on the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, so that when we are called from this world, we can gather together to celebrate at that great feast which God has prepared for us.
