

Fr. Don's Musings . . .

This week, we begin Advent, our season of preparation for Christmas. I'm sure you've been seeing lots of Christmas decorations in stores and in front yards, hearing Christmas music on the radio, and seeing Christmas movies on the TV. The church doesn't start celebrating Christmas until Christmas, so you won't be hearing Christmas songs at Mass yet, but you'll be hearing Advent songs, songs about *getting ready* for Christmas. Our Christmas decorations in the church will gradually go up as we progress through the Advent season.

I encourage you to keep Christ in the center of Christmas. In our secular society, it's easy to let all the other aspects of the winter holiday overshadow the birth of Jesus, but as Christians, let's be proud to make Jesus the center of our celebrations. Reindeer, tinsel, eggnog, and candy canes are all good, but Jesus is the core of what Christmas is all about.

During the four Sundays of Advent, I will be preaching on the Eucharist. This year is the national Eucharistic Revival and the archbishop has asked all the parish priests to preach on the Eucharist this season. It fits: at Christmas, we celebrate Christ becoming present in our world, and in the Eucharist, Christ becomes present every time we celebrate Mass. This first week, I'll talk about the Eucharist as a meal, next week, I'll talk about it as a sacrifice, and then, I'll talk about the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist and living as Eucharistic people.



Signs of the Times by Deacon Bill . . . Advent has Arrived!

Welcome to Advent which is the start of another Church year.

So what is so important about Advent this year?

Just like every year, this season is one of waiting and preparing for God to enter more deeply into our hearts and minds, a time for reminding us that Jesus will come again, and a time to celebrate the great feast of Christmas.



Just like every year, purple vestments and somber music reminds us of this penitential season. Our Advent wreaths with their four candles symbolizing hope, peace, joy, and love help us journey week by week, so we will be ready to greet God who is Love.

Just like every year, it is a time to reflect on the end times whether it be our own individual death or when Jesus returns at the end of the entire world.

What can make this year different from past Advent seasons?

- Well, for one, we will begin to hear the gospel according to St. Mark, the shortest gospel, which tells us about Jesus in a simple and sweet way.
- Also, we will have another chance to really embrace the true meaning of the season by staying focused on its religious aspects instead of the craziness of the secular world.
- We could venture into the Formed program for quick five-minute reflections on the readings for the day or take home one of the special resources offered at the church doors.
- We could read and reflect on the readings of the day offered on the USCCB website at https://bible.usccb.org/ or listen to the Amen app on our phones.
- We could avail ourselves of the Sacrament of Reconciliation which is available every Saturday at 4pm in the church or mark our calendars to come to the community Reconciliation service scheduled for Friday, Dec. 15 at 7 pm.

Along this journey to and through Christmas, we will meet again many of those who became a part of God's plan for our Salvation. Let us clear our minds and open our hearts to embrace the people, places, things, and events that are part of that plan. Listen anew to the scripture passages about Mary, Joseph, John the Baptist, Herod, the innkeeper, and the kings' bearing gifts. Listen intently to the prophecies of Isaiah, Zechariah, Sirach, Jeremiah, Judges, Song of Songs, Samuel, Malachi, and the wisdom of Paul. Put yourself in the picture of the journey of Mary and Joseph from Mary's yes to God after her Immaculate Conception up to the Holy Family's journey to Bethlehem and then to Egypt. Be amazed with appearance of angels and the way God communicated to Joseph in dreams. Be amazed to "listen anew to what the Almighty can do" and recall what God did to save us and reopen the gates of heaven.

Yes, welcome to Advent 2023.

Let's share it with our families and friends. And remember, let's not get so caught up in the secular world of Christmas that when the Advent season is over, we say, "I could of, should of, would have - but didn't."

After all, Jesus is the Reason for the Season. Amen.

We will begin with a short reflection, peaceful music, and time with the Lord before the Blessed Sacrament.




Mark your Calendars Advent Reconciliation Service Friday, Dec. 15 7pm Church


What Is the Immaculate Conception?


