

Signs of the Times by Deacon Bill . . . The Four Manifestations of Jesus Christ


This sermon from the Liturgy of the Hours encompasses the four manifestations of Jesus Christ: Nativity, Magi Visit, Baptism of the Lord, and the Wedding Feast at Cana. All are "epiphanies," although the Magi Visit has taken the title, Epiphany, for itself.

A Sermon by St. Peter Chrysologus, 5th Century Bishop and Doctor of the Church

"In the mystery of our Lord's incarnation there were clear indications of his eternal Godhead. Yet the great events we celebrate today disclose and reveal in different ways that God himself took on a human body. Mortal man enshrouded always in darkness, must not be left in ignorance, and so deprived of what he can understand and retain only by grace.

In choosing to be born for us, God chose to be known by us. He therefore reveals himself in this way, in order that this great sacrament of his love may not be an occasion for us of great misunderstanding.






Today the Magi find, crying in a manger, the one they have followed as he shone in the sky. Today the Magi see clearly, in swaddling clothes, the one they have long awaited as he lay hidden among the stars. Today the Magi gaze in deep wonder at what they see: heaven on earth, earth in heaven, man in God, God in man, one whom the whole universe cannot contain now enclosed in a

tiny body. As they look, they believe and do not question, as their symbolic gifts bear witness: incense for God, gold for a king, myrrh for one who is to die. So the Gentiles, who were the last, become the first: the faith of the Magi is the first fruits of the belief of the Gentiles.

* Today Christ enters the Jordan to wash away the sin of the world. John himself testifies that this is why he has come: *Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world*. Today a servant lays his hand on the Lord, a man lays his hand on God, John lays his hand on Christ, not to forgive but to receive forgiveness. Today as the psalmist prophesied: *The voice of the Lord is heard above the waters*. What does the voice say: *This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased*. Today the Holy Spirit hovers over the waters in the likeness of a dove. A dove announced to Noah that the flood had disappeared from the earth; so now a dove is to reveal that the world's shipwreck is at end for ever. The sign is no longer an olive-shoot of the old stock: instead, The Spirit pours out on Christ's head the full richness of a new



anointing by the Father, to fulfill what the psalmist had prophesied: *Therefore God, your God, has anointed you with the oil of gladness above your fellows.*

** Today Christ works the first of his signs from heaven by turning water into wine. But water mixed with wine has still to be changed into the sacrament of his blood, so that Christ may offer spirited drink from the chalice of his body, to fulfill the palmist's prophecy: *How excellent is my chalice, warming my spirit.*"

* We celebrate the Baptism of the Lord on Monday, Jan. 8. ** The Wedding Feast at Cana is not one of the readings this year.

A Proclamation from Deacon Bill

On The Epiphany of the Lord, the proclamation of Easter and moveable feasts of the Church year takes place and is usually announced by the deacon:

Know, sisters and brothers, that we have rejoiced at the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, so by leave of God's mercy we announce to you also the joy of his Resurrection, who is our savior.

On the fourteenth day of February will fall Ash Wednesday, and the beginning of the fast of the most sacred Lenten season.

> On the thirty-first day of March, you will celebrate with joy Easter Day, the Paschal feast of our Lord Jesus Christ.

On the twelfth day of May will be the Ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ.

On the nineteenth day of May, the feast of Pentecost.

On the second day of June the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

On the first day of December, the First Sunday of Advent of our Lord Jesus Christ, to whom is honor and glory forever and forever. Amen

Furniture Needed for Refugee Families


Government officials are calling on Catholic Charities of Oregon to resettle more refugees in the Portland area, and furnishings for the new households are in short supply.

"We are low on furniture at our warehouse. And we have a lot of apartment set-ups in January," said Peter Vins of the Refugee Services program at Catholic Charities.

Beds, couches, chairs and tables are all welcome. Catholic Charities staff will arrange for pickup.

"These families are escaping Russian attacks in Ukraine, fleeing the Taliban in Afghanistan, and seeking safety from dangerous regimes in places like the Central African Republic," said Ed Langlois, spokesman for Catholic Charities. "In many cases, the families coming to us risked their lives to help American initiatives."
