

Next Sunday is Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week. Lent has gone quickly this year. I hope it's been a good time of connecting closer to God.

This Friday, March 22, will be our Lenten Penance Service at 6:30pm. We'll have our usual 6pm soup supper and then instead of Stations of the Cross, we'll have Confessions. Two other priests will come to help, (Frs. John Henderson and Ted Prentice), we'll do a short communal reflection on sin/forgiveness and then go right into the individual Confessions.

If you haven't taken advantage of the Sacrament of Reconciliation yet this Lent, I encourage you to come Friday evening. Confession is a powerful sacrament for spiritual healing. It gives us the grace of not only being forgiven, but receiving healing from the effects of sin in our lives. It gives us healing and strength, so we can resist sin better and consequently be more fully alive. It's a great sacrament, take advantage of it this Lent.

In order to make Confession as convenient as possible, I will continue hearing Confessions after all the weekend Masses, and also during Holy Week, I'll be in the Reconciliation Chapel



#### St. Patrick's Day, March 17

Whether you know him as the man who brought Christianity to Ireland or simply as a reason you eat corned beef and cabbage in March, St. Patrick (415 - 493) is a well-known saint around the world.

St. Patrick was born in Britain of a Romanized family. At the age of 16, he was kidnapped by Irish raiders from the villa of his father, a deacon and local official, and brought into slavery in Ireland. He spent six long years there as a herdsman, during which he turned to his faith for strength. He later escaped back to Britain on a ship, where he was eventually reunited with his family.

His years of captivity changed him and brought out a zeal for God and a yearning to spread the message of Jesus Christ. Despite the constant danger of martyrdom, he continued to travel throughout Ireland where he baptized and confirmed in the name of Christ. ©LPi

# Reduce your taxable income by giving your IRA distribution to charity . . .

If you're 70½ and would like to reduce your taxable income, consider making a Qualified Charitable Deduction (QCD) from your IRA distribution to St. Clare Church. It can lower your taxes, because a QCD is excluded from your taxable income. It also counts toward your required minimum distribution. Any amount can be given up to \$100,000 per year. The QCD rule allows you to reduce your income and make a charitable contribution without having to itemize deductions.

#### Signs of the Times by Deacon Bill . . . Book of Exodus: Moses and the Israelites

Well here we are. It has been about 400 years since the Jewish people have settled in Egypt. The Pharaoh, the current leader, is concerned about the extremely large number of Israelites. He puts out an edict that all the male infants of the Israelites be killed for population control. As a result, we meet Moses (the Jewish word for his name is *mosheh which means draw out*) and from here on nothing will be the same. The four remaining books of the Pentateuch are all related to Moses, the Israelites, and their relationship with God.

In the story of Exodus, God claims his people and makes them into a nation. By the end of the book, the Israelites have a priesthood of Aaron and his sons (Ex 29), a tabernacle known as the Ark of the Covenant (Ex 25), and the law or Ten Commandments (Ex 20).

In the first four chapters of Exodus, Moses is saved from death when found in a basket in the river by the Pharaoh's daughter. Moses grows older and becomes aware of his Hebrew heritage. One day, he comes upon an Egyptian striking a Hebrew, kills the Egyptian and flees to Midian. There he marries and has a son. While tending the flocks of his father-in law, Jethro, a priest in Midian, Moses has an encounter with God at a burning bush. God enlists and convinces him with his older brother, Aaron, to go back to Egypt to free his people.


In Chapters 5-11, Moses with God's help convinces Pharaoh to grant freedom for the Israelites in the story of the ten plagues. The two extremely important parts of the Exodus story are the Passover meal and the parting of the Red Sea. (All the stories in Exodus as in Genesis were passed down from four different oral traditions and put down in writing by the official editor between the 6<sup>th</sup> and the 5<sup>th</sup> century BCE. The actual event took place around 13 BCE.) The Passover meal is described in a very precise way using the priestly tradition, so that it can always be remembered and passed along to future generations. That tradition is celebrated even today by the Jewish people. It is also the feast where Jesus gave us his Body and Blood which Christians continue to commemorate to this day. The escape through the Red Sea for us Christians signifies our baptism when we are given new life by passing through the waters of baptism.

The next part of Exodus, starting just before Chapter 16, finds the Israelites in the desert grumbling to Moses about no food and water. Recall that the Israelites were in Egypt for 400 years, lived a peaceful life and comfortable in their situation. Now they are starving, so God supplies manna, quail, and water. (We will learn much more about the desert journey in the Book of Numbers.) They arrive at Mount Sinai where God tells Moses that the Hebrews will be his chosen people if they obey his commandments and keep his covenant. Moses then goes up the mountain, stays for 40 days and receives the Ten Commandments. Since he delays coming down, the Israelites make a golden calf to worship. God gets angry and kills many in a rage. The people repent and make an atonement for their sins, and our merciful God forgives them. (This, my friends, will be the continuing cycle we will witness throughout the entire Bible culminating with Jesus dying on the cross for our sins).

The balance of this book presents more laws, the Ark of the Covenant and the royal priesthood with detailed procedures regarding all of these subjects. But the next three books will go even deeper into the history and formation of God's people.



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
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
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
