

Fr. Don's Musings . . .

I hope you all had a good Thanksgiving holiday. I'm big on gratitude and I am thrilled that we have a major national holiday that focuses on giving thanks. The pilgrims did it 400 years ago, and it is still important today.

I want to remind you of one of my gratitude practices that works well. I start each day with gratitude: before I get out of bed in the morning I thank God for two or three things, it might be a good night's rest, might be a secure house to sleep in, might be something good that I anticipate in the coming day. And when I go to bed, the first thing I do in bed is think through my day and identify the highlight of the day and then I thank God for that blessing. This practice allows me to start the day with gratitude and finish it the same way. Gratitude bookends for the day that God has given me. I encourage you to try it.

This weekend we shift gears into a new liturgical year and the season of Advent. Advent reminds us to keep the core of Christmas in focus: the birth of Jesus. There are so many other good things that go along with the holiday but as Christians we want to always keep in mind the core of the holiday. Christmas reminds us that God chose to come among us as one of us to help and ultimately to save us. God did this out of love for us, God's love is boundless.

"This and That" from Deacon Bill . . . 1st Sunday of Advent

Welcome to another Advent! As we enter this season, we are reminded to focus, dwell and prepare for the three-fold coming of Christ. We preto celebrate Christmas Day, when Jesus Christ became human to suffer and die for us so we can join him some day in heaven. We await the time when Jesus will come again to raise all the living and dead to eternal life. Finally, the in between time (St. Bernard thoughts below) when we make an all-out effort to know, love and serve God better in our lives.



From a sermon by Saint Bernard of Clairvaux, abbot (1090 -1153):

We know there are three comings of the Lord. The third lies between the other two. It is invisible, while the other two are visible. In the first coming he was seen on earth, dwelling among women and men: he himself testifies that they saw him and hated him. In the final coming all flesh will see the salvation of our God, and they will look upon him who was pierced. The immediate coming is a hidden one; in it only the elect see the Lord within our own selves, and they are saved. In his first coming, our Lord came in our flesh and in our weakness; in this middle coming he comes in spirit and power; in the final coming he will be seen in glory and majesty.

Because this coming lies between the other two, it is like a road on which we travel from the first coming to the last. In the first, Christ was our redemption; in the last he will appear as our life; in the middle coming, he is our rest and consolation.

In case someone should think that what we say about this middle coming is sheer invention, listen to what our Lord himself says: *If anyone loves me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him.* There is another passage of Scripture which reads: *He who fears God will do good*, but something further has been said about the one who loves, that is, that he will keep God's word. Where is God's word to be kept? Obviously in the heart, as the prophet says: *I have hidden your words in my heart, so that I may not sin against you.*

Keep God's word in this way. Let it enter into your very being, let it take possession of your desires and your whole way of life. Feed on goodness, and your soul will delight in its richness. Remember to eat your bread (The Eucharist), or your heart will wither away. Fill your soul with richness and strength.

If you keep the word of God in this way, it will also keep you. The Son and the Father will come to you. The great prophet who will build the new Jerusalem will come, the one who makes all things new. This coming will fulfill what is written: *As we have been born the likeness of the earthly man, we shall also bear the likeness of the heavenly man.* Just as Adam's sin spread through all mankind and took hold of all, so Christ, who created and redeemed all, will glorify all, once he takes possession of all.
