

history of the city

Spokane, nestled in the heart of Washington state, has a rich history that mirrors the dynamic evolution of the American West. Initially inhabited by the Spokane tribe, the area's name translates to "Children of the Sun" in Salishan, highlighting the indigenous people's deep connection to the land. The Spokane tribe's way of life was intricately linked with the Spokane River, relying on its resources for fishing, hunting, and gathering. However, the arrival of European settlers in the 18th and 19th centuries marked the beginning of profound changes, introducing trade and conflict over land and resources.

The late 19th century was a period of rapid growth for Spokane, driven by the discovery of valuable minerals in the surrounding region. This attracted a wave of settlers and investors, leading to Spokane's incorporation as a city in 1881. The city's subsequent connection to the Northern Pacific Railway further solidified its role as a key hub for trade and transportation in the Pacific Northwest. Spokane's economy flourished, diversifying into agriculture, timber, and manufacturing sectors, which laid the foundation for its urban development.

Transitioning into the 20th century, Spokane faced the challenge of economic transformation, responding by revitalizing its downtown and investing in new sectors like education, healthcare, and technology. The city's commitment to quality of life and environmental sustainability was exemplified by the hosting of Expo '74, leading to significant urban renewal projects like the development of Riverfront Park.

Today, Spokane boasts a vibrant arts scene and outdoor recreational opportunities, standing as a testament to its residents' resilience and adaptability through times of change and growth.

recreational options

WALKING & HIKING TRAILS

Spokane offers a host of natural and city walking and hiking trails, from Mt. Spokane, The 70 mile Centennial Trail, Rocks of Sharon, and Rimrock Drive at Palisades Park are just some of the many options.



Snowboarding and skiing at Mt. Spokane or the nearby Idaho ski resorts, such as Schweitzer Mountain in Sandpoint and Silver Mountain in Kellogg are only about an hour and half away from Spokane.

WATER SPORTS

There are many lakes surrounding Spokane, such as Lake Chelan, Newman Lake nearby Lake Coeur d'Alene and Hauser Lake in Idaho where you can enjoy boating, fishing, and waterskiing from Spring to Fall.











INCOME TAXES

There are no personal income taxes in Washington state.



PROPERTY TAXES

Levy rates (budget requests) are multiplied by each \$1,000 of assessed value. The county's average effective tax rate is 1.20%, which is higher than the state average of 0.84%. The typical resident of Spokane County pays \$2,934 a year in property taxes.



SALES TAX

While there are no personal income taxes in Washington, the larger cities have some of the highest sales taxes in the country. The minimum combined 2024 sales tax rate for Spokane County, Washington is 9%. This is the total of state and county sales tax rates. The Washington state sales tax rate is currently 6.5%.



TAX FRIENDLY POLICIES

If you are a senior citizen and/or disabled, you may be eligible for an exemption. The exemption applies to the primary residence and land on which it sits, up to one acre. Five acres are allowed if zoning permits it.



AVERAGE TEMPERATURE

Spokane's temperatures range from 26°F to 88°F throughout the year, and rarely go below 11°F or above 97°F. Spokane's 2021 summer was its hottest on record, with an average temperature of 73.1°F and a record high of 109°F at Spokane International Airport on June 29.

PRECIPITATION LEVELS

Spokane, Washington receives an average of 17 inches of rain per year, which is much less than the national average of 38 inches. Spokane's climate is impacted by its location between the Cascade Mountain Range to its west and the Rocky Mountains to the East and North. The mountains shield the city from weather patterns experienced in other parts of the Pacific Northwest.



EXTREME WEATHER EVENTS:

Spokane's winter weather can cause heavy snowfall and extreme cold, which can disrupt heat, power, and communications. It is important to prepare for the winter and make sure you have proper snow and ice tires on your vehicles as there could be several weeks where there are icy driving conditions.



SEASONAL CHANGES:

In Spokane, the summer months are warm, dry, and mostly clear. On average, Spokane gets 171 sunny days per year. Winters are cold and cloudy but, we get an average of 44 inches of snow every year. Spokane has 4 seasons with the Fall being extremely colorful with moderate temperatures.





AVERAGE SALES PRICE: \$395,000

As of January 2024, the median listing price for a home in Spokane County, Washington is \$469,900, and the median sold price is \$395,000. This is a 6.8% increase in listing price and a 1.7% decrease in sold price from the previous year.



APPROXIMATE DAYS ON THE MARKET: 42 DAYS

As of January 2024, homes in Spokane County, WA, sell after an average of 42 days on the market. This is down from 49 days last year.

There are 1145 active home listings and 106 new homes for sale in Spokane, WA. as of February 21st 2024.



AVERAGE PRICE PER SQUARE FOOT: \$226

As of January 2024, the median price per square foot in Spokane County, Washington is \$226. The median listing home price in January 2024 was \$469,900, and the median home sold price was \$395,000.

RIVERFRONT PARK

This iconic park is more than just green space; it's a piece of Spokane and world history, created for the 1974 World's Fair. 



MOUNT SPOKANE STATE PARK

1 Spokane International Academy K-9

13 Lewis & Clark High School 9-12

Lewis & Clark High School, located at 521~W 4th Ave, Spokane, WA 99204, has a rating of 8/10, placing it in the top 30% of all schools in Washington. This high school serves grades 9-12 with a student-teacher ratio of 19:1. It is known for its strong academic performance, with 50% math proficiency and 74% reading proficiency, reflecting a commitment to high educational standards.





14 St. George's School K-12 Private School

- 1. Division Street Bus Rapid Transit (BRT): This project is designed to improve connectivity along one of the region's busiest corridors, featuring dedicated transit lanes for faster travel and increased access for walking and cycling. The BRT aims to decrease congestion by accommodating over one hundred riders per bus, thus reducing the number of cars on the road. The Division Street BRT project is scheduled to launch in alignment with the completion of the North Spokane Corridor by 2030.
- 2. Spokane Transit Authority (STA): STA provides various public transportation services including buses, paratransit for individuals with disabilities, rideshare programs, and park & ride facilities. The City Line represents Spokane's first BRT route, and the success of this line is laying the groundwork for future expansions like the Division Street BRT project.
- 3. **Other Transportation Resources:** The Spokane Regional Transportation Council (SRTC) offers comprehensive information on a wide array of transportation resources. This includes bike and pedestrian plans, complete streets initiatives, and the Spokane Regional Clean Transportation Coalition. Additionally, SRTC provides details on the Spokane Regional Electrification Grant Program and various transportation improvement programs aimed at enhancing regional mobility and safety.
- 4. **Nonmotorized or Alternative Transportation:** Spokane supports nonmotorized transportation options, with resources like Friends of the Centennial Trail and various services aimed at improving the accessibility and usability of trails and bike paths across the city.
- 5. **Community and Specialized Transportation Services:** Spokane hosts a variety of services designed to meet specific community needs. This includes non-emergency medical transportation, inter-city bus services like Greyhound and Northwestern Trailways, and local initiatives like The Moccasin Express the Spokane Tribal Transit Program offering safe, reliable, and accessible transportation options.

These initiatives reflect Spokane's commitment to developing a comprehensive and accessible transportation network that supports a variety of transportation needs while promoting sustainability and community well-being.
