NCTRC Scope of Practice for the Practice of Recreation Therapy

The primary purpose of recreation therapy practice is to improve health and quality of life by reducing impairments of body function and structure, reducing activity limitations, participation restrictions, and environmental barriers of the clients served. The ultimate goal of recreation therapy is to facilitate full and optimal involvement in community life. The scope of recreation therapy practice includes all patient/client services of assessments, planning, design, implementation, evaluation and documentation of specific therapeutic interventions, management, consultation, research, and education, for either individuals or groups that require specific therapeutic recreation or recreation therapy intervention. This scope of practice represents, at a minimum, the process and knowledge base delineated in the most recent National Council for Therapeutic Recreation Certification (NCTRC) Job Analysis Study (Job Tasks and Knowledge Areas for the Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist) and delivered by a CTRS consistent with professional standards of practice, and codes of ethics with the intent of enhancing consumer safety.

Scope of Practice and Standards of Practice

Scope of Practice

The scope of practice refers to the legal and professional boundaries of what a recreational therapist is qualified, trained, and permitted to do.

Standards of Practice

The standards of practice outline the expected level of quality and professionalism in how recreational therapy services should be delivered.

Differences

Scope of Practice

Key Points:

- Defines the **range of services** that recreational therapists can legally provide.
- Based on education, training, licensure, and certification.
- Dictated by state laws, regulatory boards, and professional organizations.

Standards of Practice

Key Points:

- Provide **guidelines** for ethical, effective, and professional practice.
- Ensure consistency, safety, and accountability in client care.

Differences

Scope of Practice


Think of it as:

What a recreational therapist is allowed and prepared to do professionally.

Standards of Practice

Think of it as:

How recreational therapy should be practiced to maintain professionalism and quality care.

Purpose of the ATRA ScOP

To establish professional boundaries in recreational therapy.

To ensure consistency and clarity across the profession.

To provide guidance for regulatory and accreditation purposes.

To educate and advocate stakeholders for services.

To protect public by ensuring qualified professionals perform specific tasks.

Maintain professional standards by defining boundaries for practice.

The Development Process

Multi-phased approach (Phases I-IV)

Phase I

- Commissioned by the ATRA BOD
- Review and analyze RT foundational documents and provide a scoping review of all documents (ScOP Taskforce)
- Review and analyze related scopes of practice
- Send analysis of documents to ScOP sub-taskforce for independent review and feedback
- Taskforce analyzed all feedback and made changes/edits as necessary to the documents

Phase III (current phase)

- Collaborate with Stakeholders
- Engage input from:
 - Professional organizations (e.g., ATRA or NCTRC).
 - ATRA conference attendees.
 - Experienced recreational therapists.
 - Employers and regulatory agencies.
 - Allied health professionals for interprofessional alignment.
 - Licensure representatives.
 - ATRA chapters.

Phase IV

Write the Document

- · Use clear, concise language.
- Make it easily accessible for a diverse audience (e.g., professionals, policymakers, clients, caregivers).

Review and Revise

- Share the draft with stakeholders for feedback.
- Ensure the document aligns with professional standards and legal requirements.

Finalize and Disseminate


- Publish the scope of practice in relevant professional forums, websites, and regulatory boards.
- Train practitioners and stakeholders on its implementation and use.
