Father David's Message: Knowing God's Word in Our Lives

To know God's Word is far more than recognizing its stories or recalling its verses. The goal of knowing His Word is to allow it to take root within us, to shape our thought, guide our decisions, and transform our hearts. In daily life, where responsibilities press in and distractions abound, the Word of God can easily be set aside as something reserved for Sunday worship or occasional prayer. Yet Scripture invites us into something much deeper: a living relationship in which God speaks continuously, offering wisdom, correction, encouragement, and hope for every moment of our lives.

At its heart, knowing God's Word is about relationship. The Bible is not merely a collection of ancient texts; it is a living message through which God reveals His love and His will. When we open Scripture, we are not just reading words – we are encountering the voice of God. Just as any relationship requires time, attention, and openness, so too does our relationship with God's Word. If we only approach it occasionally or superficially, we miss the richness it offers. But when we return to it daily, even briefly, we begin to recognize God's voice more clearly. We begin to see how His truth speaks directly into our lives, addressing our fears, our struggles, and our joys.

In daily life, this knowledge of God's Word becomes a source of guidance. Each day presents choices – some small and routine, others significant and life-changing. Without a moral and spiritual compass, it is easy to be swayed by convenience, emotion, or the influence of others. God's Word provides clarity. It reminds us of what is good, what is just, and what is loving. It calls us to act with integrity, to forgive when it is difficult, to show compassion when it is inconvenient, and to trust even when the path ahead seems uncertain. When Scripture becomes a part of our daily rhythm, it begins to inform our decisions almost instinctively. We carry its wisdom within us, and it quietly shapes our responses to the world around us.

Another important aspect of knowing God's Word is that it brings comfort and strength. Life inevitably includes moments of suffering, confusion, and loss. During such times, human understanding often falls short. Words from others, though well-meaning, may not fully reach the depth of our pain. But God's Word speaks with a unique authority and tenderness. It assures us that we are not alone, that God is present even in our darkest moments, and that His love endures

beyond all circumstances. We are reminded that our struggles are not without meaning and that hope is always within reach.

To truly know God's Word, however, we must move beyond simply reading it – we must live it. The Letter of James reminds us that we are called not only to be hearers of the Word, but doers as well. This means allowing Scripture to influence our actions in practical ways. It may call us to reach out to someone in need, to reconcile with someone we have wronged, or to stand firm in our values even when it is unpopular. Living the Word requires courage and humility, but it is through this lived experience that the Word becomes real within us. It ceases to be abstract and instead becomes a guiding force that shapes our character and our relationships.

Prayer plays an essential role in this process. When we read Scripture in a spirit of prayer, we open ourselves to deeper understanding. We begin to ask not only, "What does this passage say?" but also, "What is God saying to me through this?" This shift transforms reading into a dialogue. We listen, we reflect, and we respond. Over time, this practice helps us to discern God's presence more readily in our daily lives. We become more attentive to the quiet ways in which He speaks – through moments of peace, through the word of others, and even through the challenges we face.

In a world filled with constant noise and distraction, making space for God's Word requires intentional effort. It may mean setting aside a few minutes each morning before the day begins, or finding a quiet moment in the evening to reflect. It may involve carrying a verse with us throughout the day, returning to it during moments of stress or uncertainty. These small practices, when done consistently, create a habit of attentiveness to God. They remind us that our lives are not separate from our faith, but deeply intertwined within it.

Community also strengthens our knowledge of God's Word. When we share Scripture with others – whether in a parish group, a Bible study, or even a simple conversation – we gain new insights and perspectives. We are reminded that God speaks not only to us individually but to His people as a whole. Together, we can support one another in living out the word, encouraging each other when we struggle and celebrating the ways in which God is at work in our lives.

Ultimately, knowing God's Word in our daily life leads to transformation. It shapes our hearts to become more like Christ – more patient, more forgiving, more compassionate, and more faithful. This transformation does not happen all at once; it unfolds gradually, through the encounters with Scripture and daily efforts to live according to its truth. Over time, we begin to notice a change – not only in our actions, but in our attitudes and desires. We find ourselves seeking what is good more naturally, responding with love more readily, and trusting God more deeply.

This journey of knowing God's Word is lifelong. There is always more to discover, more to understand, and more to live out. Yet even in its simplicity, the Word of God offers everything we need to navigate life with purpose and hope. It is a light for our path, a source of strength in weakness, and a constant reminder of God's enduring presence.

As we strive to know God's Word more deeply, may we approach it with open hearts and willing spirits. May we not only read it, but truly listen. May we not only understand it, but live it. And in doing so, may we come to experience more fully the richness of God's love, guiding us each day and drawing us ever closer to Him.

Pentecost Sunday, which falls on the 50th day following the Resurrection of our Lord, ends the period of Eastertide and is one of the principal celebrations in the liturgical life of the Church. It marks the day on which the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles. Pentecost is the official birth of the Church, transitioning from Jesus Christ's early ministry to the ministry of the Church through the Holy Spirit.

As we celebrate Pentecost, we are reminded that in the Sacrament of Baptism, we first received the Holy Spirit. This Sacrament marks the indwelling of the Trinity (God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit) to take away our sins, regenerate us to a new life of grace, unite us with God, and make us members of the Church. In the Sacrament of Confirmation, we received the gifts of the Holy Spirit to strengthen us, to bring us to the fullness of the Holy Spirit, and to make us soldiers of Jesus Christ ready to profess our faith in word and deed.

As you travel on your faith journey, you must allow the Holy Spirit to convict your heart. With a dynamic and growing faith which is living and changing and maturing at all times, you will encounter and experience God in a myriad of ways in your daily life. You must surrender yourself to God completely – to His will, not yours; and to His timing, not yours. In doing so, you find freedom in the Holy Spirit which is then manifested in a transformed life. The Holy Spirit begins to shape your character and renew your mind. You gain freedom from the power and dominion of sin pursuing a life of holiness instead. You break the chains of past hurts, offenses and negative patterns that often hinder one's spiritual growth. You begin walking consciously in obedience to God's will. You are empowered to pray effectively, boldly and courageously -- even when you may not know what to pray, the Holy Spirit will intercede on your behalf. You experience God's love, grace, guidance and mercy in a new and personal way.

Modeling Jesus Christ and aligning with God strengthens the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit you received in the Sacrament of Confirmation – namely, wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, Godliness and fear of the Lord. As you grow in intimacy with our Lord, the fruits of the Holy Spirit, which are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control, will manifest themselves by taking root in your heart, mind, body and soul.

Let's look now at four aspects of the Holy Spirit – the Person, the Presence, the Power and the Purpose of the Holy Spirit – which will help you recognize Him and allow Him to work in and through you.

The Person of the Holy Spirit. *“When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly, a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. Now there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout men from every nation under heaven. And at this sound the multitude came together...” Acts 2:1-6*

The Holy Spirit is sometimes symbolized by a dove or flame of fire. He is also commonly referred to as a “wind” or “breath”. Wind cannot be seen but its effects are felt. Likewise, the Holy Spirit is known through His impact of stirring hearts, bringing transformation and creating new life. He fills individuals and takes control of their actions, guiding them according to God’s will. The Holy Spirit revitalizes individuals during times of discouragement and provides strength when it is needed. The Holy Spirit is distinctly a Person. Specifically, the Holy Spirit is the third Person of the Holy Trinity. He is our divine Companion. He comes to us in the following ways, as

Comforter – “Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God.” 2 Corinthians 1:3-4

Counselor – “I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you with my loving eye on you.” Psalm 32:8

Helper – So we say with confidence, “The Lord is my helper, I will not be afraid. What can mere mortals do to me?” Hebrews 13:6

Intercessor – “In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans.” Romans 8:26

Advocate – “If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and He will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive because it neither sees Him nor knows Him. You know Him because He abides with you, and He will be in you.” John 14:15-17

Strengthened – “I can do all this through Him who gives me strength.” Philippians 4:13

Standby – “God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble.” Psalm 46:1

The Presence of the Holy Spirit. *“You will fill me with joy in Your presence.” Psalm 16:11*

As Jesus Christ came down from God in human form, the Holy Spirit comes down from God in spirit. Jesus Christ was present with the disciples as He lived amongst them. The Holy Spirit is present with you as He dwells within you. He is present in the Old Testament, and He is present in the New Testament. He is present in eternity, and He is present in history. He is present in humanity, and He is present in you as He dwells within you. You are never alone. The Holy Spirit has a permanent presence in your life. Long for a stronger faith so you can see the invisible, hear the inaudible, comprehend the incomprehensible.

Learn to recognize His presence in your daily life – as you come and go, as you sit down at a meal by yourself or with others, as you read Holy Scripture, as you receive the Holy Eucharist. Feel the Holy Spirit’s presence as you are carried through the challenges of life whether they be illness, suffering, bereavement, adversity or shattered dreams. Feel the Holy Spirit’s presence as you awaken to a new day refreshed by restful sleep. Feel the Holy Spirit’s presence in the accomplishments and successes in your life. Feel the Holy Spirit’s presence as you are compelled to share your faith with others, not knowing what to say but trusting the Holy Spirit to guide you.

Feel the Holy Spirit's presence as you pray for others. Feel the Holy Spirit's presence as you sit quietly in His creation observing the clouds, stars and rainbows, the sun or moon, the beautiful grass and flowers and budding trees, the mountaintops, the ocean waves, and all the beautiful animals that He creates. Sit with confidence that the Holy Spirit is always with you and in you.

The Power of the Holy Spirit. *“You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you.” Acts 1:8*

You know the Holy Spirit dwells within you. He is the fuel, if you will, or the power that enables you to live a Christian life. You need to learn how to rely on His power. The power of the Holy Spirit is transformative – it is anticipated, it is needed, and it should be experienced. To activate the transformative power of the Holy Spirit, He needs your full surrender, your obedience and your faith. While you have invited the Holy Spirit to dwell within you, you must allow Him into all areas of your life – the sensitive areas, the private areas, the sinful areas, the areas that are cluttered with bitterness or resentment or unforgiveness. He needs access to every nook and cranny, every dark recess, every memory, every ambition, every relationship, every attitude, every habit, every thought, every action in your life. Take inventory of your life: What areas have you surrendered already? What areas are off limits to the Holy Spirit? All areas of your life must be placed under His supreme authority so you can experience the full presence and power of the Holy Spirit.

The Purpose of the Holy Spirit. *“We, who with unveiled faces all reflect the Lord's glory, are being transformed into His likeness with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit.” 2 Corinthians 3:18*

When the Holy Spirit dwells in you, He grows a yearning within you to live for a purpose greater than yourself. You are created in the image of God, with a capacity to know Him in a personal relationship, for the purpose of bringing Him glory. To transform your life so you may bring Him glory by reflecting His character, the Holy Spirit *energizes* you in your spiritual life. He stimulates or grows your faith into maturity. The Holy Spirit gives you an insatiable desire to grow in your faith and in your relationship with God – to know, love, obey and serve Him. The Holy Spirit also prompts you to love and serve others.

“But when He, the Spirit of truth, comes, He will guide you into all the truth”. John 16:13 Another purpose of the Holy Spirit is to *guide* you allowing you to more easily glorify God in your life. If your steadfast resolution in life is to glorify God, you will do so whether you are healthy or suffering illness, whether you travel the world or are housebound, whether you are monetarily wealthy or struggling to make ends meet, whether you are successful in your career or other areas of your life or whether you are facing challenges. If you are committed to glorify God in all that you do, the Holy Spirit will guide you in doing so.

“Do not quench the Spirit”. 1 Thessalonians 5:19 Another purpose of the Holy Spirit is to set you on fire or to *ignite* you. Your heart should be on fire for God, for Jesus Christ, and for God's Word so that you may glorify God in all that you do. You quench or stifle the Holy Spirit within you through sin, disobedience, neglecting daily prayer, or rushing through Scripture reading. You must maintain the fire by fanning the flame. You can do this by intentionally establishing spiritual disciplines such as daily prayer, daily Bible reading, sharing the Gospel, obedience to God's laws, surrendering yourself to His authority, and trusting in Him.

“Can I not do with you, O house of Israel, just as this potter has done?” says the Lord. ‘Just like the clay in the potter’s hand, so are you in My hand, O house of Israel.’” Jeremiah 18:6 Another purpose of the Holy Spirit is to *shape* you. The Holy Spirit is the Potter who uses everything that comes into your life, good and bad, to apply the pressure that forms you into the shape He desires. You need to be open to the Potter’s touch so He can do His work within you. If you resist, He may need to break you in order to reshape you into something more suitable and pleasing to Him thus transforming you from the ordinary into the extraordinary.

“There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work.” 1 Corinthians 12:4-6 The Holy Spirit also *equips* you with spiritual gifts but they are not yours to choose since their distribution is at the discretion of the Holy Spirit. You must learn what your spiritual gifts are and use them to glorify God and serve others. You must trust the Holy Spirit and say “yes” when He prompts you to take on new or different endeavors, responsibilities or challenges. It’s a huge risk but once you learn to follow Him beyond your abilities and capabilities, your expertise and experience, your personality and preferences, your comfort and convenience, you will see firsthand how the Holy Spirit can really work in your life!

I pray that this Pentecost might be different for you. I hope you celebrate the birthday of the Church by recommitting yourself to our One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Polish National Catholic Church. May you completely surrender yourself to the Trinity – God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. May you feel the indwelling of the Holy Spirit every day of your life – the Person, the Presence, the Power and the Purpose of the Holy Spirit as He energizes, guides, ignites, shapes and equips you to glorify God and serve others.
