### **Proposal Overview**

Dr. ET and Company LLC is pleased to present this proposal to **Progreso Independent School District** to facilitate the update of the district's **Strategic Plan** and **Comprehensive Needs Assessment (CNA)**. Our process provides a structured, inclusive, and actionable pathway that incorporates evidence-based practices, ensures alignment with federal and state expectations, and supports improved student outcomes.

We propose a collaborative and data-informed process that unfolds over a series of **4 to 6 strategic planning sessions**. These sessions will engage district leadership and board members in reflective, forward-thinking conversations that result in a future-ready strategic plan. As part of this work, we will also **revise and update the Comprehensive Needs Assessment (CNA)** to ensure it aligns with the updated goals, current data, and compliance requirements.

Each session will cost \$1,200, inclusive of facilitation, preparation, materials, and support.

#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Reading Apprenticeship for Academic Literacy Learning (RA4ALL) will combine curriculum and professional learning to accelerate reading achievement for 8th and 9th graders. It builds on the evidence-based Reading Apprenticeship® framework and the Systematic Instruction in Phonological Awareness, Phonics, and Sight Words (SIPPS).

WestEd will conduct a study to improve the academic outcomes of high-need 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> graders, specifically using evidence-based Reading Apprenticeship for Academic Literacy (AAL) curriculum and integrated foundational reading skills curriculum (SIPPS), referred to as "RA4ALL"; provide professional learning and classroom coaching to support implementation of RA4ALL; and develop mechanisms for sustainability and scale. Teachers will teach the RA4ALL curriculum and students will read disciplinary texts, collaborate with peers, and use foundational and reading comprehension-based strategies, leading them to improve literacy achievement.

#### **FUNDING SOURCE AND AMOUNT:**

NONE. Grant funded by US Dept. of Education's Education Innovation and research (EIR) Program (Grant Award Number S411230015), which provided funding to create, develop, implement, replicate, or take to scale entrepreneurial, evidence-based; field-initiated innovations to improve student achievement and attainment for high-need students; and rigorously evaluate such innovations.

All staff training (including all travel expenses), curriculum for students and staff stipend/compensation for his/her participation in (in-person/online) training/professional development, coaching and data collection will be provided by RA4ALL.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Requesting approval of MOU by WestEd and Progreso ISD for participation in Reading Apprenticeship for Academic Literacy Learning (RA4ALL) for the 2025-2026 (8<sup>th</sup> grade) and 2026-2027 school year (9<sup>th</sup> grade). This will not only provide evidence-based reading curriculum and integrated foundational reading skill curriculum (SIPPS) for 8<sup>th</sup> grade students in need of TIER 2 reading interventions, but will carry over into 9<sup>th</sup> grade, leading them to improved literacy achievement, which data demonstrates is what several of our secondary students are struggling with. This will also save PISD funds for general education Tier 2 reading intervention program.

RA4ALL has the potential for significant impact on adolescents' literacy and academic outcomes as it combines two successful interventions (an updated version of RAAL and SIPPS) to meet the complex reading needs of secondary students and their teachers. A prior randomized trial of RAAL involving 10 districts and 34 schools worked with 9th grade students reading between 2-5 years behind grade

level. Findings showed that the RAAL curriculum improved students' reading comprehension by 63% above expected year-to-year gains. Beyond immediate student impacts, this study will provide insights about engaging developing adolescent readers in rigorous, discipline-specific learning while simultaneously improving their foundational skills.

### Memorandum of Understanding by and between WestEd and Progreso ISD

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is effective as of the date fully signed by the Parties, and sets forth the agreement between WestEd and **Progreso ISD** ("Partner") to participate in WestEd's "Reading Apprenticeship for Academic Literacy Learning (RA4ALL)" ("Project"). The Project is funded by the United States Department of Education's Education Innovation and Research (EIR) Program (Grant Award Number S411230015), which provides funding to create, develop, implement, replicate, or take to scale entrepreneurial, evidence-based, field-initiated innovations to improve student achievement and attainment for high-need students; and rigorously evaluate such innovations. At times herein, WestEd and Partner are referred to each as a "Party" and collectively referred to as "the Parties."

### 1. Purpose

As part of the work, WestEd will conduct a study to improve the academic outcomes of high-need 8th and 9th graders in school districts in IL, MD, MI, NM, NV, TX, UT, CO, NC, and PA. Specifically, WestEd will 1) test the evidence-based Reading Apprenticeship for Academic Literacy (RAAL) curriculum and integrated foundational reading skills curriculum (SIPPS) (referred to here as "RA4ALL"), 2) provide professional learning and classroom coaching to support implementation of RA4ALL, and 3) develop mechanisms for sustainability and scale. Teachers will teach the RA4ALL curriculum and students will read disciplinary texts, collaborate with peers, and use foundational and reading comprehension-based strategies, leading them to improve literacy achievement.

The Parties also wish to adequately protect student, parent, teacher, and/or Partner staff data and to comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and directives relating to confidentiality.

### 2. Term and Termination

- A. This MOU is effective as of the date first set forth above and expires December 31, 2028.
- B. Either Party may terminate or amend this MOU at any time without cause, provided that written notice is given to the other Party at least 30 days in advance.
- C. The termination or expiration of this MOU shall not affect the rights or obligations regarding confidentiality or the retention, storage, or destruction of Data, as set forth in Sections 5 and 6 herein. Such rights and obligations shall survive the term of this MOU.

### 3. Project Activities

MOU RA4ALL & C-00020608



Schools agree to be randomized into early or late start groups. Early start groups will begin RA4ALL professional learning activities in 2025, late start groups will be "business as usual" and participate in RA4ALL professional learning in 2027. Both early and late start groups will participate in data collection activities beginning in 2025.

- A. Implementation/Professional Learning Activities include: Grade 8 or 9 teacher(s) from the district will take part in Reading Apprenticeship professional learning and implement RA4ALL curriculum in a reading intervention classroom.
  - 1. This professional learning will occur both in-person and online. The district agrees to allow early start teacher(s) to take part in professional learning from Summer 2025 through Summer 2027; the professional learning will include the following,
    - Three, consecutive 7-hour, in-person workshops (to be held before school starts);
    - Two, consecutive 3-hour, online workshops (to be held during the school year);
    - Four, one-hour, online Community of Practice (group) coaching sessions (to be held in the <u>late afternoon/early evenings</u>);
    - Six, 30-minute, online individual coaching sessions (to be held <u>during</u> the school day);
    - Two, 45-minute, in-person coaching sessions (to be held during the school day);
    - One, 7-hour, in-person workshop (to be held at the end of the school year)
    - On demand, virtual coaching sessions offered by Center for Collaborative Classroom ("CCC") through its online platform (to be determined by individual teachers, can be completed <u>during</u> or <u>after</u> the school day).
    - Six hours of in-class coaching by district Instructional Coaches.
    - WestEd will collect implementation fidelity data through attendance logs at the workshops.
  - 2. Late start teachers will participate in an abridged version of professional learning in summer 2027.
  - 3. Instructional coaches in early start schools will receive the following professional learning in the 2025-26 school year:
    - Four, consecutive 7-hour in-person workshops;
    - Four, one-hour, online Community of Practice (group sessions);
    - Ten hours of online coaching sessions
      - With participant's consent, WestEd will record and transcribe all online coaching sessions where an instructional coach is being coached by a WestEd team member.
    - Two, 45-min, in-person coaching session
  - 4. Instructional coaches in early start schools will receive the following professional learning in the 2026-27 school year:
    - Six, one-hour, online Community of Practice (group) coach sessions (to be held <u>during</u> the school year);
    - Three hours of online individual coaching sessions
    - Five, 7-hour, in-person workshops (to be held during the school year);
  - 5. Administrators in early start schools will receive (total equivalent of 1 day of workshops):



- Two, one-hour, online information webinars
- Two, consecutive, 3-hour online workshops regarding data
- 6. WestEd will provide the RA4ALL curriculum to early and late start classrooms as described above. Students participating in the study will engage in:
  - All students in the designated early start classrooms will engage with the RA4ALL curriculum, including classroom-teacher administrated SIPPS Assessment and Placement one time a year and SIPPS Challenge Level Progress Assessments four times a year.
  - All students in the designated late start classrooms will engage with a "business as usual" reading intervention curriculum.
- B. As a grant requirement, SRI Education ("SRI") will conduct an independent evaluation of the RA4ALL implementation. SRI will submit a separate research application and agreement with the District for its study activities, data collection, and stipend payments.

### **Definitions Regarding Shared Data**

- A. "Data," as used in this MOU, shall mean and refer to items in Appendix A.
- B. "Personally Identifiable Information" or "PII," as used in this MOU, shall mean any information or Data that, alone or in combination, is linked or linkable to a specific student that would allow a reasonable person, who does not have personal knowledge of the relevant circumstances, to identify an individual with reasonable certainty.
- C. "De-identified Data," as used in this MOU, shall mean Data from which all Personally Identifiable Information has been removed or obscured so that a reasonable person, who does not have personal knowledge of the relevant circumstances, would not be able to identify any individual with reasonable certainty.
- D. "Non-Financial" as used in this MOU, shall mean agreements that are typically non-monetary by nature, but occasionally involve the provision or exchange of something of value (e.g. Stipends). These types of arrangements set out expectations, terms, and requirements that protect the interests of the investigators and the participating organizations.
- E. "Educational Records," as used in this MOU are official records, files and data directly related to a student and maintained by the education agency or institution, or by party acting for the agency or institution (e.g. including but not limited to, records encompassing all the material kept in the student's cumulative folder, such as general identifying data, records of attendance and of academic work completed, records of achievement, and results of evaluative tests, health data, disciplinary status, test protocols and individualized education programs.)

#### 3. Confidentiality

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- A. WestEd agrees to take all necessary precautions to safeguard the Data and comply with all applicable Federal, State, or local laws, ordinances, regulations, and directives relating to confidentiality. These include, but are not limited to, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR part 99), the California Information Practices Act (California Civil Code § 1798 et. seq.), and the Privacy Act of 1974, as amended, (5 U.S.C. § 552).
  - a. FERPA Exception WestEd is authorized to receive this data under the following FERPA exception:
    - i. Studies Exception [34 CFR § 99.31(a)(6)] for the purposes of improving instruction
    - ii. School Official Exception [34 CFR §§ 99.31(a)(1) and 99.7(a)(3)(iii).]

       WestEd is considered a "school official" by [insert organization name] and: is performing a service or function for which the [insert organization name] would otherwise use its employees; is under the direct control of the school with respect to the use and maintenance of education records; and complies with the PII from education records use and redisclosure requirements
    - iii. Audit/Evaluation Exception [34 CFR §§ 99.31(a)(3) and 99.35] WestEd has been designated as the "Authorized Representative" of [insert organization name] to audit or evaluate a Federal or State supported education program.
- B. WestEd will limit internal access to PII to individuals working on the Project with legitimate interests in the PII and whose work reasonably requires access to the Data (i.e. on a need-to-know basis).
- C. WestEd will take reasonable steps to maintain the confidentiality and security of the Data at all stages of the Project. PII will only be used for the purposes of the Project.
- D. PII will be destroyed at the earlier of: (1) when the PII is no longer needed for analysis, (2) December 31, 2029, or (3) within 15 days of the early termination of this MOU pursuant to section 2.B hereinabove, and delivery to WestEd of Partner's written demand for destruction of the PII.
- E. De-identified Data may be retained by WestEd after the completion of the Project, and may be further used, shared, released or disclosed by WestEd without consent, to the extent permitted under FERPA.
- F. If WestEd publishes any reports or other publications created with the use of Data, WestEd will not include information that could lead to the identification of any individual whose information is included in the Data.

### 4. Data Handling, and Storage

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- A. All computers used to upload, analyze, or store Data containing PII will be encrypted and password-protected. WestEd will store Data in a password-protected and encrypted cloud-based content management system. WestEd will store the Data in accordance with a Data Security Plan, available upon reasonable request.
- B. WestEd will only transfer PII using secure, encrypted transmission methods.
- C. WestEd will share the Data outlined in Appendix A with SRI solely for purposes of the Project and subject to a written agreement with confidentiality terms aligned to this MOU.
- D. Reports containing aggregate-level data and results will also be presented to the members of professional associations and may be published in professional association publications.
- E. Educational Records shared by Partner **Progreso ISD** are and shall continue to be Partner's property.

## 5. Data Sharing

- Third-party sharing. WestEd will take steps to maintain the confidentiality and security of the Data at all times. The Data may be stored securely at WestEd or at an entity under a written agreement with WestEd to provide cloud-based providers such as Box, Survey Monkey, Qualtrics, Dedoose, Zoom, and Rev.com, for collection, storage, processing or analysis of some or all of the Data. Data stored at such a contracted entity shall be protected in accordance with the terms of this MOU.
- WestEd will ensure that all persons and entities, including contractors, and
  consultants who will have access to student-level data or PII to first enter into an
  agreement with WestEd that includes security and confidentiality terms no less
  stringent than those included in this MOU.

### 6. WestEd's Responsibilities

- A. WestEd will implement the Project Activities described in Paragraph 3.
- B. WestEd will provide up to \$1500 to participating early start teachers upon completion of professional learning activities and up to an additional \$450 upon completion of data collection activities in 2026. The same teachers will receive up to an additional \$500 upon completion of professional learning activities and up to an additional \$450 upon completion of data collection activities in 2027.

WestEd will provide up to \$400 to participating late start teachers upon completion of data collection activities in 2026. The same teachers will receive up to an additional \$400 upon completion of data collection activities in 2027. WestEd will provide up to \$750 to participating late start teachers upon completion of professional learning activities.

WestEd will provide up to \$50 to select late start teachers who complete a survey, \$25



who participate in a focus group, and \$100 to those who organize student focus groups in 2028.

WestEd will provide up to \$1500 to participating instructional coaches upon completion of professional learning activities in 2026 and 2027.

All stipends are prorated based on completion of activities.

- C. WestEd will provide professional learning for participating teachers, instructional coaches, and school administrators.
- D. WestEd will provide RA4ALL curriculum in digital formats for classroom implementation to participating teachers and their students.
- E. WestEd will provide certificates of completion to be applied to CPUs.
- F. WestEd will designate a liaison to facilitate communications between WestEd and Partner for coordinating the activities necessary to carry out this MOU. WestEd's contact person for this project is:

#### 7. Partner Responsibilities

- A. Partner will allow participating study teachers to participate in project activities outlined in Section 3 and all professional learning and coaching sessions.
- B. Partner will allow access to data described in Appendix A.
- C. Partner will arrange for substitutes, if necessary, so teachers can attend the professional learning and coaching sessions.
- D. Partner will allow WestEd staff to access participating teacher's classrooms for observations and feedback to teachers.
- E. Partner agrees that Data as described in Appendix A collected by WestEd may be shared with SRI solely for the Project and subject to the terms of a written agreement aligned to this MOU. Partner agrees that Data collected by SRI and CCC, may be shared with WestEd solely for purposes of the Project under the terms of this MOU.
- F. For any costs that Partner incurs that are not reimbursed that may be included as a non-federally funded cost match (per 2 CFR 200.306), Partner will provide documentation and submit in-kind cost match letters as part of participation in grant activities (e.g., value of facilities for hosting professional learning, value of laptops used for the Project, administrative time to help coordinate activities, travel expenses, printing digital curriculum, etc). See Appendix C for a sample in-kind match letter.
- G. Partner shall designate a liaison to facilitate communications between Partner and

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WestEd for coordinating the activities necessary to carry out this MOU. Partner's contact person for this project is:

#### 10. General Provisions:

- A. <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the substantive laws of the State of California, without regard to conflict of law principles.
- B. <u>Amendments</u>. This MOU may be amended at any time by mutual agreement of the Parties without additional consideration, provided that before any amendment shall take effect, it shall be in writing and signed by both Parties.
- C. <u>Assignment</u>. Neither Party shall voluntarily or by operation of law, assign or otherwise transfer its rights or obligations under this MOU without the other Party's prior written consent. Any purported assignment in violation of this paragraph shall be void.
- D. <u>Severability</u>. The provisions of this MOU are severable and the unenforceability of any provision of this MOU shall not affect the enforceability of any other provisions hereof.
- E. <u>Indemnification</u>. Each Party shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the other Party from and against any liability, loss, damage, expense, costs (including without limitation reasonable attorneys' fees) arising from any third party claim, demand, assessment, action, suit or proceeding related to its use of the Data under this MOU and/or any Appendix, unless such loss or damage was caused by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the party seeking indemnification.
- F. <u>Limitation of liability</u>. Except as stated in Section E, each Party shall bear all costs, risks, and liabilities incurred by it arising out of its obligations and efforts under this MOU. Neither Party shall have any right to any reimbursement, payment or compensation of any kind from the other Party, unless expressly agreed to in writing by both Parties.
- G. <u>Representations and Warranties</u>. Data is provided on an "AS IS" basis WITHOUT ANY WARRANTY, REPRESENTATION OR UNDERTAKING WHATSOEVER, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, ANY WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, TITLE, OR FREEDOM FROM INFRINGEMENT.
- H. Relationship between the Parties. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to grant either Party the right to make commitments of any kind for or on behalf of the other Party, without the prior written consent of the other Party. Nothing in this

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Agreement shall be deemed to constitute, create, give effect to, or otherwise recognize an employment relationship between the parties or a joint venture, partnership, or formal entity of any kind.

I. <u>Dispute resolution</u>. The Parties shall exercise commercially reasonable efforts to settle any claim, controversy, or dispute (collectively "Disputes") arising out of or relating to this Agreement. The Parties shall discuss any such Dispute no later than 30 days after either Party gives written notice to the other Party of a Dispute, including the legal and factual basis for such Dispute. No suit, arbitration or other proceeding may be commenced before the Parties have met pursuant to this provision, except as described herein.

In the event that a Dispute cannot be resolved through good faith negotiations, the Parties agree that such Dispute shall be finally settled through binding arbitration. The arbitration shall be administered by JAMS, in San Francisco, California, pursuant to its Comprehensive Arbitration Rules and Procedures. The decision of the arbitrator shall be final and conclusive upon the Parties. Judgment on the award rendered by the arbitrators may be entered in any court having jurisdiction.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, either Party may seek injunctive or provisional relief to protect confidential information at any time.

J. Notices. All notices permitted or required under this MOU shall be in writing and shall be delivered by electronic mail, or by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, to each Party's respective contact listed above, and will be deemed given upon personal delivery, five (5) days after deposit in the mail, or upon acknowledgment of receipt of electronic transmission. All notices related to the Data or Educational Records shall be delivered to Director of Privacy and Data Security: infosecurity@wested.org. Notices of intent to terminate this MOU shall be provided to the applicable contact above, and, if to WestEd, also be delivered to:

K. Negotiation and execution. This MOU has been negotiated by both Parties and shall not be strictly construed against either Party. This MOU may be executed in one or more original, electronic, or faxed counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same instrument. Each of the persons signing this MOU represents that he or she has the authority to sign on behalf of and bind their respective party.

#### APPENDIX A

"Data" as used in this MOU refers to the following data to be collected by WestEd:

Professional Development attendance log – name, email, date attended, school

Transcripts of coaching sessions: WestEd will record each of the coaching sessions with instructional coaches and transcribe them, using Zoom's transcription services or a recording device for in-person sessions

Classroom observation data – classroom observations will be conducted in partnership with instructional/literacy coach supporting implementing teachers; purpose of classroom observation is to provide feedback to the teacher only; identifies teacher but no personally identifiable information of students will be collected.

On Demand Coaching Logs: The Center for Collaborative Classroom (CCC) will offer participating teachers access to asynchronous "on demand" coaching sessions. Coaching logs are generated in CCC's online platform as a result of participating teachers accessing the on-demand coaching offered by CCC. CCC will share the participation data with WestEd solely for WestEd's use in the Project subject to this MOU.

Pursuant to a separate Research Application and Agreement between the District and SRI, SRI will collect: coaching logs, feedback exit tickets, professional learning observational notes, assessment data of students (from Rapid Online Assessments of Reading (ROAR) and Star Reading Assessment), teacher logs, and teacher surveys. SRI will share the Data with WestEd pursuant to its agreement with the District solely for WestEd's use in the Project subject to this MOU.

# Reading Intervention Curriculum for Grades 8 and 9

Reading Apprenticeship for Academic Literacy Learning (RA4ALL) will combine curriculum and professional learning to accelerate reading achievement for 8th and 9th graders. It builds on the evidence-based Reading Apprenticeship® framework and the Systematic Instruction in Phonological Awareness, Phonics, and Sight Words (SIPPS).

WHY SHOULD YOUR DISTRICT PARTICIPATE? RA4ALL has the potential for significant impact on adolescents' literacy and academic outcomes as it combines two successful interventions (an updated version of RAAL and SIPPS) to meet the complex reading needs of secondary students and their teachers. A prior randomized trial of RAAL involving 10 districts and 34 schools worked with 9th grade students reading between 2-5 years behind grade level. Findings showed that the RAAL curriculum improved students' reading comprehension by 63% above expected year-to-year gains. Beyond immediate student impacts, this study will provide insights about engaging developing adolescent readers in rigorous, discipline-specific learning while simultaneously improving their foundational skills.

#### **RA4ALL Impact Evaluation**

An independent research organization, SRI Education, will be leading the evaluation. SRI will examine the effects of RA4ALL on teachers' perceptions of the curriculum; instructional practices; students' perceptions of the curriculum. Within participating districts, schools will be randomly assigned to "early-start" and "late-start" groups.

Early-start schools will participate in RA4ALL professional learning and teachers will use the curriculum in 2025-26 and 2026-27.

Late-start schools will engage in "business as usual" during the 2025-26 and 2026-27 school years and will participate in RA4ALL professional learning and use the curriculum in 2027-28. All participating teachers, both early-and late-start, will participate in evaluation activities.

Schools must offer reading intervention classes to support developing readers in 8th or 9th grade. The students participating in the study can be reading no more than 5 grade levels below what is expected.

# INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT Establishing Duties and Responsibilities of Member School Districts and the Fiscal Agent for Operation of the Regional Day School Program for the Deaf

WHEREAS, the DONNA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, EDCOUCH-ELSA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, EDINBURG CONSOLIDATED INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, EXCELLENCE IN LEADERSHIP ACADEMY, HIDALGO INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, IDEA PUBLIC SCHOOLS, LA JOYA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, LA VILLA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, MCALLEN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, MERCEDES INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, MISSION CONSOLIDATED INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, MONTE ALTO INDEPENDENT DISTRICT, PHARR-SAN SCHOOL JUAN-ALAMO INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, PREMIER HIGH SCHOOL RESPONSIVE EDUCATION SOLUTIONS, PROGRESO INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, SHARYLAND INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, VALLEY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, SOUTH TEXAS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, and WESLACO INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, all of Hidalgo County, Texas; and SANTA MARIA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, of Cameron County, Texas; RIO GRANDE CITY GRULLA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, and ROMA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, SAN ISIDRO INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, of Starr County, Texas, hereinafter individually or collectively referred to as the "Districts", and the MCALLEN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, as Fiscal Agent for the REGIONAL DAY SCHOOL PROGRAM FOR THE DEAF, hereinafter referred to as "Fiscal Agent" in its capacity as fiscal agent and "McAllen ISD" in its capacity as a District, are authorized to provide Shared Services arrangements jointly with one or more other

school districts for a special education program (the "Program") in accordance with Section 29.007 of the Texas Education Code:

WHEREAS, the Districts and Fiscal Agent desire to enter into this interlocal agreement in accordance with Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code to operate and fund the Regional Day School Program for the Deaf (the "Regional School") and setting out the purpose, terms, rights, objectives, duties and responsibilities of the contracting parties hereto; and

WHEREAS, the Districts and the Fiscal Agent have determined that the operation and funding of the Regional School is for a public purpose and is within their statutory powers of government;

NOW, THEREFORE, KNOW ALL PERSONS BY THESE PRESENTS, that the Districts and the Fiscal Agent acting by and through their duly authorized officers, do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

I.

#### NAME AND HEADQUARTERS

#### 1.1 Name

The name of the Program shall sometimes be referred to as: Regional Day School Program for the Deaf, RDSPD, RSD, or the Regional School.

#### 1.2 Headquarters

The place of business shall be located at the administrative offices of the McAllen Independent School District, 2000 N. 23rd Street, McAllen, Texas 78501.

#### MANAGEMENT BOARD

#### 2.1 Establishment

Pursuant to the Shared Services Arrangement Procedures for Regional Day School Programs for the Deaf promulgated by the Division of Services for the Deaf of the Texas Education Agency, the Regional School shall establish a management board (the "Management Board").

#### 2.2 Composition

The Management Board shall be comprised of the Special Education Director of each of the Districts or such Special Education Director's designee. The Fiscal Agent shall have the right to have a representative present at all Management Board meetings (which may be in addition to the representation of MISD at the meeting provided that only the MISD member and not any additional Fiscal Agent representative, shall be entitled to vote).

#### 2.3 Chairperson

The chairperson of the Management Board shall be a member of the Management Board and shall be elected by the members of the Management Board at the first meeting of the Management Board held during each fiscal year, to hold office until the election of a successor chairperson at the first meeting of the Management Board held during the next fiscal year, or until such chairperson's earlier resignation or removal. The Management Board may remove the Chairperson at any meeting upon the vote of the members of the Management Board.

#### Responsibilities and Directions

#### 2.4 (a) Meeting

The Management Board shall meet at least once per year. The chairperson presides over the meetings of the Management Board and calls meetings upon the request of any Management Board member or the Fiscal Agent. The members of the Management Board in attendance at any such meeting constitute a quorum. Any votes shall be determined by a majority of the members present at the meeting or by written consent of a majority of the members.

#### (b) Minutes

The Management Board chairperson shall record or appoint someone to record the minutes of each Management Board meeting. In the event the person so designated is not present at a meeting and the chairperson is also not present to appoint a replacement, the Management Board shall appoint a person to record the minutes for such Meeting.

#### (c) Review of Budget, Fees and Reports

The Management Board shall review the Regional School's budget, including the Student Fees and any other fees to be charged to the Districts, and may provide its input, if any, to the Fiscal Agent. The members of the Management Board shall review such other reports provided by the Fiscal Agent.

#### (d) Direction of New Development

The Management Board shall stay abreast of educational and regulatory developments related to the Program and may provide its input, if any, to the Fiscal Agent.

IV.

#### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of the Regional School is to provide, to the extent that federal, state and local resources permit, an educational program for persons from birth through age

21 who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing which severely impairs processing linguistic information through hearing, even with recommended amplification, and which adversely affects educational performance, as provided in this Agreement. If a student cannot be served in the Regional School, it is the responsibility of the Member District in which such student resides to arrange for appropriate placement.

V.

#### POWERS AND DUTIES OF FISCAL AGENT

#### 5.1 Designation

The Fiscal Agent of the Regional School shall be the McAllen Independent School District.

#### 5.2 Power and Duties

The Fiscal Agent shall have the power and duty to discharge faithfully the following responsibilities.

- a. Employ a director for the Regional School, and to establish the duties to be performed by such person. The policies of the Fiscal Agent will govern the employment of all Regional School personnel.
- Provide a management system for the Regional School which meets state and federal requirements.
- c. Allocate funds based on student needs of the Regional School as a whole.
- d. Acquire, hold and sell real, personal and mixed property.
- Receive bequests, donations or other monies or property coming legally into the hand of the Regional School.
- f. Contract for the professional services required for the administration and operation of the Regional School.
- g. Authorize and the preparation of an annual budget, to adopt and amend the annual budget, to authorize preparation of periodic reports of receipts and disbursements, to authorize necessary applications for funds and amendments of such applications and to provide a copy of the annual budget to the Management Board for its review.
- h. Apply for, receive, safeguard, expend, distribute and account for all federal, state and local operating funds as the Fiscal Agent may, by policy or directive, provide in accordance with the annual budget and all federal and state requirements
- Prepare and submit any and all applications, reports and accounting for the Regional School as required by federal and state authorities
- j. Maintain personnel records for personnel employed by the Regional School and administer payroll, federal withholding, state retirement contributions, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, sick, vacation and personal leave, group insurance and all other personnel accounting functions for all personnel whose positions are funded through the Regional School. Member Districts shall provide such information required by the Fiscal Agent to fulfill this duty.

- k. Purchase, inventory, safeguard, maintain, distribute, dispose of and account for all real and personal property of the Regional School, in accordance with the policies and directives of the Fiscal Agent.
- Order an audit of the accounts of the Regional School annually following the close of each
  fiscal year, which audit may, as the Fiscal Agent determines, comprise a part of the annual
  audit of the McAllen Independent School District.
- m. Establish policies and issue directives governing the program and business of the Regional
   School in accordance with state and federal requirements
- n. Borrow money to purchase, repair, renovate and equip the Regional Day School.
- Report student data to the Texas Education Agency(TEA). TEA will consider the Fiscal Agent
  the district accountable for Texas Academic Performance Report (TAPR). McAllen ISD RDSPD
  will provide a PEIMS 011 record to TEA.

#### VI.

#### PERSONNEL AND PROPERTY

#### 6.1 Authority of Board of Trustees as Fiscal Agent

The Board of Trustees as the Fiscal Agent shall have final authority and responsibility for approving the hiring, employment, discharge and contractual nonrenewal of the Regional School's director, teachers and support staff

#### 6.2 Regional School Director

The Director of the Regional School must meet state certification requirements for the position and shall be employed by the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees of the Fiscal Agent. The Director's compensation shall be fixed at such intervals and under such terms and conditions of employment as the MISD Board of Trustees as the Fiscal Agent may

determine, and the Director, as well as all employees of the Regional School shall be subject to the personnel policies of the Board of Trustees as the Fiscal Agent.

#### 6.3 Duties of the Director

The Director of the Regional School in addition to those duties assigned, shall perform the following:

- a. Provide attendance and grade reporting information to the Member School Districts, if requested by any Member District(s) and maintain a record of each student attending the Regional School for the time period in accordance with applicable Federal law.
- b. Be responsible for the evaluation of professional and nonprofessional staff.
- c. Be responsible for planning and administering instructional programs in compliance with state Board of Education regulations.
- d. Be accountable for the expenditure of all funds flowing to the Regional School subject to the approval of the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees.

#### 6.4 Other Staff

Staff of the Regional School must meet any state certification requirements of their positions and shall be employed by the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees. Compensation for the Regional School positions shall be fixed at such intervals and under such terms and conditions of employment as approved by the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees, and such employees shall be subject to the personnel policies of the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees. Regional School personnel and students shall adhere to the school calendar of the fiscal agent.

#### 6.5 Ownership of Assets

Assets purchased with Regional School funds are the property of the Regional School. Property provided to the Regional School hereunder or donated to the Regional School shall be the property of the Regional School.

#### 6.6 Mainstreaming

Any revenue generated and/or received with respect to mainstreaming students of the Regional School within McAllen ISD shall be the property of McAllen ISD and not the Regional School.

- 6.7 Disposition of Fixed and Liquid Assets Subsequent to Withdrawal of District or Dissolution of Regional School
  - (a) Fixed Assets Upon Withdrawal

In the event a District withdraws pursuant to Article X (a "Withdrawing District") all real and personal property (e.g. equipment and supplies) in the Withdrawing District at the effective date of such withdrawal, used by the Regional School but not owned by the Regional School, will remain in the Withdrawing District if such property is not needed by the Regional School for the remaining students. A Withdrawing District shall give prompt written notice to the Fiscal Agent of any such property in its possession so that the Fiscal Agent may determine whether such property is needed by the school.

## (b) Liquid Assets Upon Withdrawal

In the event the Regional School has any unexpended funds attributable to the Withdrawing District, after the offset of all costs and expenses and other amounts due from the Withdrawing District, following the end of the first year in which such withdrawal occurred, the Fiscal Agent shall reimburse the Withdrawing District the balance of such unexpended funds.

#### (c) Dissolution

Upon dissolution of the Regional School, property will be distributed in accordance with Section 11.2 below.

#### COSTS

## 7.1 Costs Per Student

Services to be provided by the Regional School under the terms of this Agreement are subject to the availability of funds to the Regional School for the purpose of educating Deaf and Hard of Hearing students. Each Member District sending students to the Regional School bears the responsibility for the cost incurred in serving the students who reside within the boundaries of such district. The Regional School shall bill each Member District on September 1st of each year. The Member District will be billed for students enrolled in the Regional School on September 1st of the current school year. Student enrollment will be reviewed on December 1st, March 1st and June 1st to determine if new students have enrolled and Member Districts will be billed the additional tuition for each student. The Student Fee for Infants served by the Parent Infant Program cluster site students and itinerant students shall be determined by the Regional School.

Full payment is due to the Regional School within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of the invoice or bill from the Regional School

# 7.2 Adjustment in Cost per Student

Any adjustment necessary in the rate of the Student Fee as set by the Fiscal Agent for any calendar year charged any Member Districts shall be set and invoiced or billed by the Fiscal Agent following the report thereof by the Fiscal Agent to the Management Board. Member Districts shall not be entitled to any reimbursement of tuition when a student of the Member District withdraws from the Regional School for whatever reason after September 1st of school year for which the student is enrolled. If the Regional School personnel together with a

representative from the Member District, determines that Extended School Year Services (ESY) are needed for individual students of any Member District, the Member District shall be responsible for the transportation of the student(s) residing within such Member District, as well as a per student prorated portion of the salary of Regional School ESY personnel if State funds are unavailable.

# 7.3 Costs to Non Member Districts

For Districts not participating in the Shared Services Agreement and seeking services from the Regional School, a fee will be billed that is in excess of the tuition fees billed to the Member Districts.

# 7.4 Notifications of Student Fee

On or before June 15th of each year, the Fiscal Agent shall notify the Member Districts of the Student Fee of 10% above the Tuition fee billed to Non - Member Districts.

# 7.5 Reimbursement of Administrative Costs of Fiscal Agent

Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, the Fiscal Agent shall be reimbursed and/or paid for administrative costs incurred in an amount equal to the State Program Indirect Cost Rates of fifteen percent (15%). Any Student Fees due from McAllen ISD shall be deducted from the amount payable to the Fiscal Agent hereunder. In the event the Student Fees due from McAllen ISD exceed the amount due to the Regional School, McAllen ISD shall pay the difference.

7.6 Allocation of Costs Including Uncontrollable Costs, Liabilities and Legal Fees
Uncontrollable Costs, liabilities and legal fees (including but not limited to legal fees incurred due to complaints, grievances or litigation) and other costs and expenses not covered by the Student Fees, excluding only the administrative costs reimbursed pursuant to Section 7.5

above, incurred by the Regional School and/or the Fiscal Agent shall be divided among the Member Districts in proportion to the number of students of each Member District attending the Regional School over the number of students from all Member Districts attending the Regional School. For purposes of this Section 7.6 the number of students shall be calculated based on the most recent Public Education Information Management System ("PEIMS") report for the Regional School at the time the Fiscal Agent accrues such cost.

#### VIII.

# MEMBER SCHOOL DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES

#### 8.1 Program

As provided by state law, it shall remain the ultimate responsibility of each Member District to provide or cause to be provided education to all resident eligible students. In regard to direct services provided by the Regional School, each Member District retains the responsibility of monitoring its students' education and evaluating the appropriateness of such education.

# 8.2 Member School District Responsibilities

Specific responsibilities of each Member District include, but are not limited to the following:

- a. Carry out all screening, referral, initial evaluation and other appropriate procedures specified in State Board of Education Rules for Special Education, TAC §89 Sub Chapter G, and Commissioner's Rules for Special Education as necessary to establish which students are referred to the Regional School.
- b. Contribute to the Regional School on a timely basis the appropriate Student Fees and other amounts due t the Regional School.
- c. Schedule and participate in an Admission, Review, and Dismissal Committee meeting

- which includes designated Regional School staff to determine appropriate placement. If Regional School placement is determined to be appropriate to join in developing an Individual Education Plan ("IEP") for the student.
- d. Provide adequate funding for services specified in the IEP when funds procured by the Regional School from state and federal sources are not sufficient to cover the cost for these services
- e. Provide a District liaison staff member, which may be the same person the District provides as a member of the Management Board, whose responsibilities will be to:
  - Facilitate communication between the Regional School and the District Staff and parents.
  - (ii) Prepare reports as requested by the Regional School
  - (iii) Advise the Regional School on budget decisions.
- f. Abide by Regional School application procedures.
- g. Maintain an eligibility folder as required by state rules.
- h. Provide transportation between the students' residence and the Regional School sites. In addition, provide transportation when tutorials, extracurricular activities (including athletics) and summer school are required for participating students. Transportation for this purpose may cross District and geographic boundaries. The Member Districts may elect any mode of transportation it deems appropriate including District operated transportation, parent contracted transportation, commercially contracted transportation, or any combination thereof.
- Report District expenditures, if any, from the Regional School to the Fiscal Agent within 30 days of such expenditure.
- Comply with any state requirements concerning the District's participation in the Regional School, including reporting any withdrawal here from.

- k. Provide certification from the Member District's Board of Trustees to the Fiscal Agent certifying that such Board has approved this Agreement. The certificates shall be attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- Provide a PEIMS 011 record and indicate the fiscal agent county district number in the E0777 data element.

# 8.3 Responsibility for Legal Fees

- a. Each Member District bears its own risk of loss of personal or real property, costs of administrative hearings, litigation expenses, awards of actual damages, court costs, attorney's fees, and settlement costs.
- b. Responsibilities for expenditures not attributable to a specific District (and borne by such District pursuant to Section 8.3 above) incurred related to grievances, lawsuits, etc., taken against the Fiscal Agent shall be shared by all Member Districts as per Section 7.6 above

#### IX.

# ADDING MEMBER SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO THE REGIONAL SCHOOL

# 9.1 Approval of Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees

Upon receiving notice of the request of a non-member school district that it be allowed to join the Regional School, provided such notice is received by the Fiscal Agent no later than the last Wednesday of September of the year prior to the school year for which such non-member school district intends to join this Agreement, the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees may adopt a resolution that the requesting school district be admitted as a Member District.

#### 9.2 Assessments

Upon approval of the resolution, the new Member District students will be eligible for participation in the Regional School at the beginning of the school year at the same Student Fee as assessed against all Member Districts under the provisions of Article VII.

X.

#### WITHDRAWAL OF MEMBER DISTRICT

#### 10.1 Withdrawal Procedures

Any Member District may withdraw from the Regional School at the end of any fiscal year of the Member District by giving notice thereof no later than the last Wednesday of September of the year prior to the school year for which such District is withdrawing from the Regional School. On timely service of such notice the withdrawal will automatically become effective at the end of the following fiscal year of the Fiscal Agent and shall be deemed to carry the approval of the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees, unless thirty (30) days after receiving such notice, the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees elects to dissolve the Regional School as provided in Article XI below and serves written notice thereof on the withdrawing Member District, in which case the notice of withdrawal shall be of no force or effect.

XI.

#### DISSOLUTION

11.1 Action of Fiscal Agent Boad of Trustees

The Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees may adopt a resolution dissolving the Regional School.

11.2 Liquidation

Upon approval of the dissolution by the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees:

a. The Regional School shall cease to carry on its business, except insofar as may be necessary for winding up of the business of the Regional School.

- b. The Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees shall cause written notice of the dissolution and liquidation of the Regional School to be mailed to each known creditor of and claimant against the Regional School.
- c. The Fiscal Agent shall proceed to collect the assets of the Regional School, convey and dispose of such of its properties as are not to be distributed in kind to Member Districts, pay, satisfy, or discharge its liabilities and obligations, or make adequate provision for payment and discharge thereof, distribute copies of all student, personnel and fiscal records to the appropriate Member Districts, and do all other acts required to liquidate the business and affairs of the Regional School. After paying or discharging all of the obligations of the Regional School, or making adequate provision for the payment and discharge thereof, the Fiscal Agent shall then distribute the remainder of the assets of the Regional School, either in cash or in kind, among the Member Districts in proportion to the amount of funds and/or property contributed to the Regional School by the Member Districts as determined by the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees, which determination shall be final and conclusive.

#### 11.3 Termination

Upon completion of the liquidation, the Fiscal Agent shall so report in writing to the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees and on acceptance of the report, the Fiscal Agent Board of Trustees shall enter a resolution declaring that the Regional School is dissolved and its operation terminated.

#### XII.

# APPLICABILITY OF STATUTES AND REGULATIONS

In entering into this Agreement and in the operation of the Regional School, the

Member Districts intend to comply fully with all federal and state statutes and regulations governing the administration and delivery of education and services to eligible students, including any rules of the State Board of Education, as said statutes and regulations now exist or may hereafter be amended. In the event of irreconcilable conflict between this Agreement and any applicable federal or state statute or regulation, the latter shall be controlling.

XIII.

RENEWAL

This Agreement shall automatically renew for successive one year terms, unless any Member District notifies the Fiscal Agent on or before the last Wednesday of September of the current term of its intent not to renew this Agreement or the Texas Education Agency terminates this Agreement. The initial term of the Agreement is effective September 1, 2025 through August 31, 2026.

XIV.

PAYMENT PROVISIONS

The contracting parties to this Agreement paying for the performance of certain governmental functions or services by its maintenance and operation of the Regional School shall make payments from current revenues available to the Member District.

#### Scope of Work

Pricing is for the provision of the complete fire alarm system based on existing device counts and locations that were observed during a site survey by the Johnson Controls representative on 12/12/2024. The takeoff was performed off the building's emergency evacuation plan provided by the Progreso ISD representative. This project consists of a one-for-one initiating device and panel replacement.

**System Installation --** The existing Simplex 4010 fire alarm control panel shall be removed and replaced with a Simplex 4010ES panel. All the existing initiating and notification devices shall be replaced with new Simplex devices that are compatible with the new fire alarm control panel being proposed. The existing power supplies shall be replaced with new Simplex NAC Extenders that are compatible with the new FACP and can support the new notification devices. A monitoring module will be added to monitor the new Guardian hood suppression system located in Room #102, and two monitoring modules will be used for the existing kitchen hood suppression system in the building's main kitchen. One Simplex NAC Extender, two notification devices, and three initiating devices will be added to the Science Lab building located at the rear of the school in the Southeast corner of the campus.

**Existing System & Devices --** The building's fire alarm control panel and all fire alarm peripherals shall be removed and demolished by a JCI technician; this includes power supplies, strobes, horn/strobes, manual pull stations, smoke detectors, and duct-smoke detectors. The building's existing fire alarm wiring shall remain in place and will be reused for the new fire alarm system. The fire alarm system in the Science Lab shall be removed and demolished by the JCI technician.

**System Commissioning --** Johnson Controls shall provide a technician to program, test, and commission the new fire alarm system during normal business hours. 1. Deposit, Invoicing and Payments. Customer agrees to pay Company pursuant to the progress-based billing schedule of values set forth in Company's proposal. The remaining portion of the total price will be progress billed through completion of the work. Company progress-based billing can also include any services performed on-site or off-site. Invoicing disputes must be identified in writing within 21 days of the invoice date. Payments of any disputed amounts are due and payable upon resolution. All invoices will be delivered via Email, paid via Electronic Funds Transfer and are due Net 30 days from the date of invoice. Electronic Funds Transfer details will be provided upon contract execution. The proposed total price is contingent on Customer agreeing to these payment and invoicing terms. In exchange for close-out documents to be provided by Company, Customer agrees to pay Company the remaining project balance when on-site labor is completed and prior to any final inspections. As required under 6 C.F.R. 25.5 (e), to the maximum extent permitted by law, Company and Customer hereby agree to waive their right to make any claims against the other for any losses, including business interruption losses, sustained by either party or their respective employees, resulting from an activity resulting from an "Act of Terrorism" as defined in 6 C.F.R. 25.2, when QATT have been deployed in defense against, response to, or recovery from such Act of Terrorism.

7. General Provisions. Customer has selected the service level desired after considering and balancing various levels of protection afforded, and their related costs. All work to be performed by Company will be performed during normal working hours of normal working days (8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding Company holidays), as defined by Company, unless additional times are specifically described in this Agreement. Company will perform the services described in the Scope of Work section ("Services") for one or more system(s) or equipment as described in the Scope of Work section or the listed attachments ("Covered System(s)"). The Customer shall promptly notify Company of any malfunction in the Covered System(s) which comes to Customer's attention. This Agreement assumes the Covered System(s) are in operational and maintainable condition as of the Agreement date. If, upon initial inspection, Company determines that repairs are recommended, repair charges will be submitted for approval prior to any work. Should such repair work be declined Company shall be relieved from any and all liability arising therefrom. Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, any inspection (and, if specified, testing) provided under this Agreement does not include any maintenance, repairs, alterations, replacement of parts, or any field adjustments whatsoever, nor does it include the correction of any deficiencies identified by Company to Customer. Company shall not be responsible for equipment failure occurring while Company is in the process of following its inspection techniques, where the failure also results from the age or obsolescence of the item or due to normal wear and tear. This Agreement does not cover systems, equipment, components or PARTS THAT are below grade, behind walls or other obstructions or exterior to the building, electrical wiring,

8. Customer Responsibilities. Customer shall furnish all necessary facilities for performance of its work by Company, adequate space for storage and handling of materials, light, water, heat, heat tracing, electrical service, local telephone, watchman, and crane and elevator service and necessary permits. Where wet pipe system is installed, Customer shall supply and maintain sufficient heat to prevent freezing of the system. Customer shall promptly notify Company of any malfunction in the Covered System(s) which comes to Customer's attention. This Agreement assumes any existing system(s) are in operational and maintainable condition as of the Agreement date. If, upon initial inspection, Company determines that repairs are



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recommended, repair charges will be submitted for approval prior to any work. Should such repair work be declined Company shall be relieved from any and all liability arising therefrom. Customer shall further:

- supply required schematics and drawings unless they are to be supplied by Company in accordance with this Agreement;
- Provide a safe work environment, in the event of an emergency or Covered System(s) failure, take reasonable safety precautions to protect against personal injury, death, and property damage, continue such measures until the Covered System(s) are operational, and notify Company as soon as possible under the circumstances.
- Provide Company access to any system(s) to be serviced,
- Comply with all laws, codes, and regulations pertaining to the equipment and/or services provided under this Agreement.

Customer is solely responsible for the establishment, operation, maintenance, access, security and other aspects of its computer network ("Network") and shall supply Company secure Network access for providing its services. Products networked, connected to the internet, or otherwise connected to computers or other devices must be appropriately protected by Customer and/or end user against unauthorized access. Customer is responsible to take appropriate measures, including performing back-ups, to protect information, including without limit data, software, or files (collectively "Data") prior to receiving the service or products.

**9. Excavation.** In the event the Work includes excavation, Customer shall pay, as an extra to the contract price, the cost of any additional work performed by Company dues to water, quicksand, rock or other unforeseen condition or obstruction encountered or shoring required.

10.Structure and Site Conditions. While employees of Company will exercise reasonable care in this respect, Company shall be under not responsibility for loss or damage due to the character, condition or use of foundations, walls, or other structures not erected by Company or resulting from the excavation in proximity thereto, or for damage resulting from concealed piping, wiring, fixtures, or other equipment or condition of water pressure. All shoring or protection of foundation, walls or other structures subject to being disturbed by any excavation required hereunder shall be the responsibility of Customer. Customer shall have all things in readiness for installation including, without limitation, structure to support the sprinkler system and related equipment (including tanks), other materials, floor or suitable working base, connections and facilities for erection at the time the materials are delivered. In the event Customer fails to have all things in readiness at the time scheduled for receipt of materials, Customer shall reimburse Company for all expenses caused by such failure. Failure to make areas available to Company during performance in accordance with schedules that are the basis for Company's proposal shall be considered a failure to have things in readiness in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

11. Confined Space. If access to confined space by Company is required for the performance of Services,

Services shall be scheduled and performed in accordance with Company's then-current hourly rate.

- **12. Hazardous Materials.** Customer represents that, except to the extent that Company has been given written notice of the following hazards prior to the execution of this Agreement, to the best of Customer's knowledge there is no:
- Space in which work must be performed that, because of its construction, location, contents or work activity therein, accumulation of a hazardous gas, vapor, dust or fume or the creation of an oxygendeficient atmosphere may occur,
- "permit confined space," as defined by OSHA for work performed by Company in the United States,
- · risk of infectious disease,
- need for air monitoring, respiratory protection, or other medical risk,
- asbestos, asbestos-containing material, formaldehyde or other potentially toxic or otherwise hazardous material contained in or on the surface of the floors, walls, ceilings, insulation or other structural components of the area of any building where work is required to be performed under this Agreement.

All of the above are hereinafter referred to as "Hazardous Conditions". Company shall have the right to rely on the representations listed above. If hazardous conditions are encountered by Company during the course of Company's work, the discovery of such materials shall constitute an event beyond Company's control and Company shall have no obligation to further perform in the area where the hazardous conditions exist until the area has been made safe by Customer as certified in writing by an independent testing agency, and Customer shall pay disruption expenses and remobilization expenses as determined by Company. This Agreement does not provide for the cost of testing involving a discharge or release, capture, containment, transport, removal, or disposal (collectively, the "Discharge Services") of any hazardous waste materials, hazardous materials, or firefighting materials including without limitation firefighting foam encountered in and/or discharged from any of the Covered System(s) and/or during performance of the Services. Said materials shall at all times remain the responsibility and property of Customer. Customer shall be responsible for any Discharge Services associated with such materials, including all discharged firefighting foam in accordance with all applicable law. Company shall not be responsible for the testing, removal or disposal of such hazardous materials. Customer shall indemnify and hold Company harmless from and against any and all claims, demands and/or damages arising in whole or in part from the use of or any Discharge Services associated with any hazardous waste, hazardous materials, or firefighting materials including without limitation firefighting foam encountered or discharged from any of the Covered System(s) and/or during performance of the Services.

13. Occupational Health and Safety/OSHA Compliance. Customer shall indemnify and hold Company harmless from and against any and all claims, demands and/or damages arising in whole or in part from the enforcement of applicable laws regarding occupational health and safety for work performed in



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Canada or the Occupational Safety Health Act for work performed by Company in the United States. (and any amendments or changes thereto) unless said claims, demands or damages are a direct result of causes within the exclusive control of Company.

- **14. Interferences.** Customer shall be responsible to coordinate the work of other trades (including but not limited to ducting, piping, and electrical) and for and additional costs incurred by Company arising out of interferences to Company's work caused by other trades.
- **15. Modifications and Substitutions.** Company reserves the right to modify materials, including substituting materials of later design, providing that such modifications or substitutions will not materially affect the performance of the Covered System(s).
- **16.** Changes, Alterations, Additions. Changes, alterations and additions to the Scope of Work, plans, specifications or construction schedule shall be invalid unless approved in writing by Company. Should changes be approved by Company, that increase or decrease the cost of the work to Company, the parties shall agree, in writing, to the change in price prior to performance of any work. However, if no agreement is reached prior to the time for performance of said work, and Company elects to perform said work so as to avoid delays, then Company's estimate as to the value of said work shall be deemed accepted by Customer. addition, Customer shall pay for all extra work requested by Customer or made necessary because of incompleteness or inaccuracy of plans or other information submitted by Customer with respect to the location, type of occupancy, or other details of the work to be performed. In the event the layout of Customer's facilities has been altered, or is altered by Customer prior to the completion of the Work, Customer shall advise Company, and prices, delivery and completion dates shall be changed by Company as may be
- 17. Commodities Availability. Company shall not be responsible for failure to provide services, deliver products, or otherwise perform work required by this Agreement due to lack of available steel products or products made from plastics or other commodities. In the event Company is unable, after reasonable commercial efforts, to acquire and provide steel products, or products made from plastics or other commodities, if required to perform work required by this Agreement, Customer hereby agrees that Company may terminate the Agreement, or the relevant portion of the Agreement, at no additional cost and without penalty. Customer agrees to pay Company in full for all work performed up to the time of any such termination.
- **18. Project Claims.** Any claim of failure to perform against Company arising hereunder shall be deemed waived unless received by Company, in writing specifically setting forth the basis for such claim, within ten (10) days after such claims arises.
- 19. Back charges. No charges shall be levied against Company unless seventy-two (72) hours prior written notice is given to Company to correct any alleged deficiencies which are alleged to necessitate such charges and unless such alleged deficiencies are solely and directly caused by Company.

- 20. System Equipment. The purchase of equipment or peripheral devices (including but not limited to smoke detectors, passive infrared detectors, card readers, sprinkler system components, extinguishers and hoses) from Company shall be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. If, in Company's sole judgment, any peripheral device or other system equipment, which is attached to the Covered System(s), whether provided by Company or a third party, interferes with the proper operation of the Covered System(s), Customer shall remove or replace such device or equipment promptly upon notice from Company. Failure of Customer to remove or replace the device shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement. If Customer adds any third party device or equipment to the Covered System(s), Company shall not be responsible for any damage to or failure of the Covered System(s) caused in whole or in part by such device or equipment.
- 21. Reports. Where inspection and/or test services are selected, such inspection and/or test shall be completed on Company's then current Report form, which shall be given to Customer, and, where applicable, Company may submit a copy thereof to the local authority having jurisdiction. The Report and recommendations by Company are only advisory in nature and are intended to assist Customer in reducing the risk of loss to property by indicating obvious defects or impairments noted to the system and equipment inspected and/or tested. They are not intended to imply that no other defects or hazards exist or that all aspects of the Covered System(s), equipment, and components are under control at the time of inspection. Final responsibility for the condition and operation of the Covered System(s) and equipment and components lies with Customer.
- 22. Limited Warranty. Subject to the limitations below, Company warrants any equipment (as distinguished from the Software) installed pursuant to this Agreement to be free from defects in material and workmanship under normal use for a period of one (1) year from the date of first beneficial use or all or any part of the Covered System(s) or 18 months after Equipment shipments, whichever is earlier, provided however, that Company's sole liability, and Customer's sole remedy, under this limited warranty shall be limited to the repair or replacement of the Equipment or any part thereof, which Company determines is defective, at Company's sole option and subject to the availability of service personnel and parts, as determined by Company. Company warrants expendable items, including, but not limited to, video and print heads, television camera tubes, video monitor displays tubes, batteries and certain other products in accordance with the applicable manufacturer's warranty. Company does not warrant devices designed to fail in protecting the System, such as, but not limited to, fuses and circuit breakers. Company warrants that any Company software described in this Agreement, as well as software contained in or sold as part of any Equipment described in this Agreement, will reasonably conform to its published specifications in effect at the time of delivery and for ninety (90) days after delivery. However, Customer agrees and acknowledges that the software may have inherent defects because of its complexity. Company's sole obligation with respect to software, and



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Customer's sole remedy, shall be to make available published modifications, designed to correct inherent defects, which become available during the warranty period. If Repair Services are included in this Agreement, Company warrants that its workmanship and material for repairs made pursuant to this Agreement will be free from defects for a period of ninety (90) days from the date of furnishing.

EXCEPT AS EXPRESSLY SET FORTH HEREIN, COMPANY DISCLAIMS ALL WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO ANY IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY OR FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE WITH RESPECT TO THE SERVICES PERFORMED OR THE PRODUCTS, SYSTEMS OR EQUIPMENT, IF ANY, SUPPORTED HEREUNDER.

Warranty service will be performed during Company's normal working hours. If Customer requests warranty service at other than normal working hours, service will be performed at Company's then current rates for after ours services. All repairs or adjustments that are or may become necessary shall be performed by and authorized representative of Company. Any repairs, adjustments or interconnections performed by Customer or any third party shall void all warranties. Company makes no and specifically disclaims all representations or warranties that the services, products, software or third party product or software will be secure from cyber threats, hacking or other similar malicious activity, or will detect the presence of, or eliminate, treat, or mitigate the spread transmission, or outbreak of any pathogen, disease, virus or other contagion, including but not limited to COVID-19. Unless agreed to in writing by the parties, any technical support, assistance, or advice ("Technical Support") provided by Company, such as suggestions as to design use and suitability of the products for the customer's application, is provided in good faith, but Customer acknowledges and agrees that Company is not the designer, engineer, or installer of record. Any Technical Support is provided for informational purposes only and shall not be construed as a representation or warranty, express or implied, concerning the proper selection, use, and/or application of products. Customer assumes exclusive responsibility for determining if the equipment and products supplied by Company are suitable for its intended application and all risk and liability, whether based in contract, tort or otherwise, in connection with its application and use of the products.

23. Indemnity. Customer agrees to indemnify, hold harmless and defend Company against any and all losses, damages, costs, including expert fees and costs, and expenses including reasonable defense costs, arising from any and all third party claims for personal injury, death, property damage or economic loss, including specifically any damages resulting from the exposure of workers to Hazardous Conditions whether or not Customer pre-notifies Company of the existence of said hazardous conditions, arising in any way from any act or omission of Customer or Company relating in any way to this Agreement, including but not limited to he Services under this Agreement, whether such claims are based upon contract, warranty, tort (including but not limited to active or passive negligence), strict liability or

otherwise. Company reserves the right to select counsel to represent it in any such action.

**24. Insurance**. Customer shall name Company, its officers, employees, agents, subcontractors, suppliers, and representatives as additional insureds on Customer's general liability and auto liability policies.

25. Termination. Any termination under the terms of this Agreement shall be made in writing. In the event Customer terminates this Agreement prior to completion for any reason not arising solely from Company's performance or failure to perform, Customer understands and agrees that Company will incur costs of administration and preparation that are difficult to estimate or determine. Accordingly, should Customer terminate this Agreement as described above, Customer agrees to pay all charges incurred for products and equipment installed and services performed, and in addition pay an amount equal to twenty (20%) percent of the price of products and equipment not yet delivered and Services not yet performed, return all products and equipment delivered and pay a restocking fee of twenty (20%) percent the price of products or equipment returned. Company may terminate this Agreement immediately at its sole discretion upon the occurrence of any Event of Default as hereinafter defined. Company's performance of its obligations becomes impracticable due to obsolescence or unavailability of systems, equipment, or products (including component parts and/or materials) or because the Company or its supplier(s) has discontinued the manufacture or the sale of the equipment and/or products or is no longer in the business of providing the Services, Company may terminate this Agreement, or the affected portions, at its sole discretion upon notice to Customer. Company may terminate this Agreement, or the affected portions, at its sole discretion upon notice to the Customer if Company's performance of its obligations are prohibited because of changes in applicable laws, regulations or codes

26. Default. An Event of Default shall be (a) failure of Customer to pay any amount when due and payable, (b) abuse of the System or the Equipment, (c) dissolution, termination, discontinuance, insolvency or business failure of Customer. Upon the occurrence of an Event of Default, Company may pursue one or more of the following remedies: (i) discontinue furnishing Services and delivering Equipment, (ii)) by written notice to Customer declare the balance of unpaid amounts due and to become due under this Agreement to be immediately due and payable; (iii) receive immediate possession of any Equipment for which Customer has not paid; (iv) proceed at law or equity to enforce performance by Customer or recover damages for breach of this Agreement, and (v) recover all costs and expenses, including without limitation reasonable attorneys' fees, in connection with enforcing or attempting to enforce this Agreement.

27. Exclusions. Unless expressly included in the Scope of Work, this Agreement expressly excludes, without limitation, testing inspection and repair of duct detectors, beam detectors, and UV/IR equipment; provision of fire watches; clearing of ice blockage; draining of improperly pitched piping; replacement of batteries; recharging of chemical suppression systems; reloading of, upgrading, and maintaining computer software; system upgrades and the replacement of obsolete systems, equipment,



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components or parts; making repairs or replacements necessitated by reason of negligence or misuse of components or equipment or changes to Customer's premises, vandalism, corrosion (including but not limited to micro-bacterially induced corrosion ("MIC")), power failure, current fluctuation, failure due to non-Company installation, lightning, electrical storm, or other severe weather, water, accident, fire, acts of God or any other cause external to the Covered System(s). Repair Services provided pursuant to this Agreement do not cover and specifically excludes system upgrades and the replacement of obsolete systems, equipment, components or parts. All such services may be provided by Company at Company's sole discretion at an additional charge. If Emergency Services are expressly included in the scope of work section, the Agreement price does not include travel expenses.

**28. No Option to Solicit.** Customer shall not, directly or indirectly, on its own behalf or on behalf of any other person, business, corporation or entity, solicit or employ any Company employee, or induce any Company employee to leave his or her employment, for a period of

two years after termination of this Agreement. 29. Force Majeure; Delays. Company shall not be liable, nor in breach or default of its obligations under this Agreement, for delays, interruption, failure to render services, or any other failure by Company to perform an obligation under this Agreement, where such delay, interruption or failure is caused, in whole or in part, directly or indirectly, by a Force Majeure Event. "Force Majeure Event" is a condition or event that is beyond the reasonable control of Company, whether foreseeable or unforeseeable, including, limitation, acts of God, severe weather (including but not limited to hurricanes, tornados, severe snowstorms or severe rainstorms), wildfires, floods, earthquakes, seismic disturbances, or other natural disasters, acts or omissions of any governmental authority (including change of any applicable law or regulation), epidemics, pandemics, disease, viruses, quarantines, or other public health risks and/or responses thereto, condemnation, strikes, lock-outs, labor disputes, an increase of 5% or more in tariffs or other excise taxes for materials to be used on the project, fires, explosions or other casualties, thefts, vandalism, civil disturbances, insurrection, mob violence, riots, war or other armed conflict (or the serious threat of same), acts of terrorism, electrical power outages, interruptions or degradations in telecommunications, computer, network, or electronic communications systems, data breach, cyber-attacks, ransomware, unavailability or shortage of parts, materials, supplies, or transportation, or any other cause or casualty beyond the reasonable control of Company. If Company's performance of the work is delayed, impacted, or prevented by a Force Majeure Event or its continued effects, Company shall be excused from performance under the Agreement. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, if Company is delayed in achieving one or more of the scheduled milestones set forth in the Agreement due to a Force Majeure Event, Company will be entitled to extend the relevant completion date by the amount of time that Company was delayed as a result of the Force Majeure Event, plus such additional time as may be reasonably necessary to overcome the effect of the delay. To the extent that the Force Majeure Event directly or indirectly

increases Company's cost to perform the services, Customer is obligated to reimburse Company for such increased costs, including, without limitation, costs incurred by Company for additional labor, inventory storage, expedited shipping fees, trailer and equipment rental fees, subcontractor fees, compliance with vaccination requirements, or other costs and expenses incurred by Company in connection with the Force Majeure Event.

30. One-Year Claims Limitation; Forum; Choice of Law.Company shall have the sole and exclusive right to determine whether any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to the Agreement, or the breach thereof, shall be submitted to a court of law or arbitrated. For Customers located in the United States, the laws of Delaware shall govern the validity, enforceability, and interpretation of this Agreement, without regard to conflicts of law principles thereof, and the exclusive venue for any such litigation or arbitration shall be in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. For customers located in Canada, this agreement shall be governed by and be construed in accordance with the laws of Ontario, without regard to conflicts of law principles thereof, and the exclusive venue for any such litigation or arbitration shall be in Ontario, Canada. The parties waive any objection to the exclusive jurisdiction of the specified forums, including any objection based on forum non conveniens. In the event the matter is submitted to a court, Company and Customer hereby agree to waive their right to trial by jury. In the event the matter is submitted to arbitration by Company, the costs of arbitration shall be borne equally by the parties, and the arbitrator's award may be confirmed and reduced to judgment in any court of competent jurisdiction. Except as provided below, no claim or cause of action, whether known or unknown, shall be brought by either party against the other more than one year after the claim first arose. Claims not subject to the one-year limitation include claims for unpaid: (1) contract amounts, (2) change order amounts (approved or requested) and (3) delays and/or work inefficiencies. Customer will pay all of Company's reasonable collection costs (including legal fees and expenses).

**31. Assignment.** This Agreement is not assignable by the Customer except upon written consent of Company first being obtained. Company shall have the right to assign this Agreement, in whole or in part, or to subcontract any of its obligations under this Agreement without notice to Customer.

32. Entire Agreement. The parties intend this Agreement, together with any attachments or Riders (collectively the "Agreement) to be the final, complete and exclusive expression of their Agreement and the terms and conditions thereof. This Agreement supersedes all prior representations, understandings or agreements between the parties, written or oral, and shall constitute the sole terms and conditions of sale for all equipment and services. No waiver, change, or modification of any terms or conditions of this Agreement shall be binding on Company unless made in writing and signed by an Authorized Representative of Company.

**33.** Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is held by any court or other competent authority to be void or unenforceable in whole or in part, this



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Agreement will continue to be valid as to the other provisions and the remainder of the affected provision.

34. Legal Fees. Company shall be entitled to recover

**34. Legal Fees.** Company shall be entitled to recover from the customer all reasonable legal fees incurred in connection with Company enforcing the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

35. Software and Digital Services.

Digital Enabled Services. Data. If Company provides Digital Enabled Services under this Agreement, these Digital Enabled Services require the collection, transfer and ingestion of building, equipment, system time series, and other data to Company's cloud-hosted software applications. Customer consents to and grants Company the right to collect, transfer, ingest and use such data to enable Company and its affiliates and agents to provide, maintain, protect, develop and improve the Digital Enabled Services and Company products and services. Customer acknowledges that, while Digital Enabled Services generally improve equipment performance and services, Digital Enabled Services do not prevent all potential malfunction, insure against all loss, or guarantee a certain level of performance. Customer shall be solely responsible for the establishment, operation, maintenance, access, security and other aspects of its computer network ("Network"), shall appropriately protect hardware and products connected to the Network and will supply Company secure Network access for providing its Digital Enabled Services. As used herein, "Digital Enabled Services" mean services provided hereunder that employ Company software and related equipment installed at Customer facilities and Company cloudhosted software offerings and tools to improve, develop, and enable such services. Digital Enabled Service may include, but are not limited to, (a) remote servicing and inspection, (b) advanced equipment fault detection and diagnostics, and (c) data dashboarding and health reporting. If Customer accesses and uses Software that is used to provide the Digital Enabled Services, the Software Terms (defined below) will govern such access and use.

Digital Solutions. Use, implementation, and deployment of the software and hosted software products ("Software") offered under these terms shall be subject to, and governed by, Company's standard terms for such Software and Software related professional services in effect from time to time at www.johnsoncontrols.com/techterms (collectively, the "Software Terms"). Specifically, the Company General EULA set forth at <a href="https://www.johnsoncontrols.com/buildings/legal/digital/generaleula">www.johnsoncontrols.com/buildings/legal/digital/generaleula</a> governs access to and use of software installed on Customer's premises or systems and the Company Terms of Service set forth at <a href="https://www.johnsoncontrols.com/buildings/legal/digital/generaltos">www.johnsoncontrols.com/buildings/legal/digital/generaltos</a>

govern access to and use of hosted software products. The applicable Software Terms are incorporated herein by this reference. Other than the right to use the Software as set forth in the Software Terms, Company and its licensors reserve all right, title, and interest (including all intellectual property rights) in and to the Software and improvements to the Software. The Software that is licensed hereunder is licensed subject to the Software Terms and not sold. If there is a conflict between the other terms herein and the Software Terms, the Software Terms shall take precedence and govern

with respect to rights and responsibilities relating to the Software, its implementation and deployment and any improvements thereto.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement and unless otherwise agreed to by the parties in writing, the following terms apply to Software that is provided to Customer on a subscription basis (i.e., a time limited license or use right), (each a "Software Subscription"): Each Software Subscription provided hereunder will commence on the date the initial credentials for the Software are made available (the "Subscription Start Date") and will continue in effect until the expiration of the subscription term noted herein. #### Notification of Coverage Changes and Language Refinements Effective July 1, 2025

As a part of the annual coverage review, the TASB Risk Management Fund (Fund) implemented the following coverage changes and language refinements *for all renewals taking effect on or after July 1, 2025*. This document is a summary of changes and refinements only; please carefully review the full text of all Fund Coverage Agreements and any applicable Contribution and Coverage Summary (CCS).

#### **Automobile Liability & Physical Damage Coverage Agreement**

• Under Part A, § 3.1 **Automobile**, coordinate coverage for motor-driven equipment and motor vehicles between Automobile Liability, General Liability, and Property coverages and align coverage with evolving Texas common law definitions regarding motor vehicles.

#### **School Liability Coverage Agreement**

- Under Part A, § 3.1 Covered Person, update the definition of a Covered Person to explicitly name law enforcement employees and employee-participants in the guardian or School Marshal programs to affirm the Fund's coverage for members' law enforcement employees and employees participating in members' safety and security efforts.
- 4 Automobile, coordinate coverage for motor-driven equipment and motor vehicles between Automobile Liability, General Liability, and Property coverages and align coverage with evolving Texas common law definitions regarding motor vehicles.
- Under Part F, § 16 Related Acts, clarify that related acts, including the number of events and degree of damage, are considered a single act.

#### **Property Coverage Agreement**

- Add coverage for up to 125% of the cost to repair or replace a covered single-ply membrane roof when upgraded to a Very Severe Hail-rated roofing system, not to exceed \$250,000 per occurrence.
- Revise the Named/Numbered Windstorm and Flood Endorsements to indicate that flooding due to
  a Named or Numbered Windstorm (NWS) outside of Tier 1 and Tier 2 coastal counties will be
  covered under the Flood endorsement and its limit; however, only the higher deductible will apply.
- Add language to maintain claim timelines when losses are initially lower than the deductible.
- Under Part A, § 3.6 (B)(8) **Personal Property**, extend coverage for the personal property of others to include loan agreements in addition to lease or rental agreements.
- Revise the Crime and Employee Dishonesty Endorsement, § 2, Payments (A), to include a fraudulent or dishonest omission as a covered act and add abstraction (a form of embezzlement) as additional compensable elements for a claim.
- Under Part A, § 3.6 (B)(7) **Personal Property**, coordinate coverage for motor-driven equipment and motor vehicles between Automobile Liability, General Liability, and Property coverages and align coverage with evolving Texas common law definitions regarding motor vehicles.

#### **Privacy & Information Security Coverage Agreement**

• Change the coverage agreement's name to Cyber Liability & Security from Privacy & Information Security to better reflect its purpose and scope.

#### **Violent Act Coverage**

No changes.

#### **Property Coverage Provisions**

**Weather Perils:** Weather Perils is an Occurrence of wind, hail, convective storm, or freeze. The Weather Perils Limit and Deductible shown on this CCS will apply to Loss (including ensuing Loss) by a Weather Peril. Weather Perils does not include Named/Numbered Windstorm.

Named/Numbered Windstorm: Named/Numbered Windstorm (NWS) is an Occurrence directly caused by, resulting from, or arising from any hurricane, typhoon, tropical cyclone, tropical storm, or tropical depression (but not other convective storms) that is designated by name or number by the National Weather Bureau, National Hurricane Center, or any recognized meteorological authority, including any related wind-driven rain, flood, tidal water or wave, storm surge, wave wash, surface water, overflow of bodies of water, or spray from any of these conditions. The NWS Limit and Deductible indicated on this CCS will apply to Loss (including ensuing Loss) by an NWS to Locations in Tier 1, Tier 2, and Harris counties. In Tier 3, the Weather Perils Limit and Deductible indicated on this CCS will apply to Loss to Covered Property directly caused by, resulting from, or arising from NWS.

The term "Tier 1" means the Texas counties of Aransas, Brazoria, Calhoun, Cameron, Chambers, Galveston, Jackson, Jefferson, Kenedy, Kleberg, Matagorda, Nueces, Refugio, San Patricio, and Willacy.

The term "Tier 2" means the Texas counties of Bee, Brooks, Fort Bend, Goliad, Hardin, Hidalgo, Jasper, Jim Wells, Liberty, Live Oak, Newton, Orange, Victoria, and Wharton.

The term "Harris County" means the Texas county of Harris.

The term "Tier 3" means all other Texas counties.

**Percent Deductible/Occurrence Minimum Deductible:** General. When Covered Property sustains a Loss caused by a Weather Peril or a Named/Numbered Windstorm (NWS), the Fund Member's deductible will be a Percent-based Deductible or an Occurrence-based Minimum Deductible; the higher deductible applies. For Weather Perils or NWS in Tier 3, Covered Property structures that do not appear on the Statement of Values schedule and sustain a Loss will be subject to the applicable deductible based on its Total Covered Value at the time of the Loss. For Fund Members with Locations in Tier 3 and Tier 1/2/Harris County, additional provisions included on the Property Coverage Summary page may apply.

<u>Deductible calculation—Weather Peril or NWS in Tier 3.</u> The Percent Deductible amount for Weather Peril Occurrences or NWS in Tier 3 Locations will be calculated based on the designated percent, as shown on the CCS, applied to the Total Covered Value of the Loss-affected structure (including contents) in the Statement of Values schedule, which is considered a part of this CCS. This designated percent is reflected on the schedule as the deductible dollar amount listed under a Loss-affected structure's deductible column. This structure may be eligible for payment once the covered Loss amount for a Loss-affected structure exceeds the Percent Deductible amount listed on the schedule. For only one Loss-affected structure, the Percent Deductible amount for that structure will be compared with the Occurrence Minimum Deductible amount; the higher deductible applies.

<u>Deductible calculation—NWS in Tier 1/2/Harris County Locations.</u> The Percent Deductible amount for NWS Occurrences in Tier 1, Tier 2, or Harris County Locations will be calculated based on the designated percent per Location, as shown on the CCS, applied to the Total Covered Value of all structures (including contents) at that Location. All Loss-affected structures may be eligible for payment once the covered Loss amount in that Location exceeds the Percent Deductible (per Location) listed on the CCS. If there is only one Loss-affected Location, the Percent Deductible amount for that Location will be compared with the Occurrence Minimum Deductible amount; the higher deductible applies.

<u>Multiple-structure or—Location Loss—General.</u> In the case of an Occurrence causing Loss to more than one member structure or Location, the member may incur multiple Percent-based Deductibles, which will be added to determine the total percent deductible.

<u>Multiple-structure Loss—Weather Peril or Tier 3 NWS.</u> In the case of multiple Loss-affected structures for Weather Peril or NWS in Tier 3 Locations, the member will incur multiple Percent Deductibles, each calculated the same as one Loss-affected structure only. These Percent Deductible amounts will be added to determine the Total Percent Deductible amount for comparison with the Occurrence Minimum Deductible. (However, for payment purposes, the Total Percent Deductible calculation below will not affect the Percent Deductible application to each structure.)





To determine whether the Total Percent Deductible or the Occurrence Minimum Deductible applies when multiple structures are Loss-affected under these perils, only the actual Loss amount within each structure's Percent Deductible amount will apply toward the summed Total Percent Deductible amount, which is then compared with the Occurrence Minimum Deductible amount; the higher deductible applies.

<u>Multiple-Location Loss—NWS in Tier 1/2/Harris County Locations.</u> In the case of Loss-affected structures at multiple Locations for NWS in Tier 1, Tier 2, or Harris County Locations, the member will incur multiple Percent Deductibles. These multiple Location-based Percent Deductible amounts will be added to determine the Total Percent Deductible amount, which is then compared with the Occurrence Minimum Deductible amount; the higher deductible applies.

<u>Payment obligation—Weather Peril or NWS in Tier 3</u>. In either case (single or multiple Loss-affected structures), if the Fund has any payment obligation above the Occurrence Minimum Deductible, this payment will be based on the Loss amount for each structure exceeding that structure's scheduled Percent Deductible amount.

<u>Payment obligation—NWS in Tier 1/2/Harris County Locations.</u> In either case (single or multiple Loss-affected Locations), if the Fund has any payment obligation above the Occurrence Minimum Deductible, this payment will be based on the Covered Property Loss amount for each Location exceeding that Location's Percent Deductible amount.

<u>Occurrence Minimum Deductible—General.</u> Regardless of the Total Percent Deductible, the amount of Loss sustained, the number of Loss-affected structures or Locations in an Occurrence, or any other factor, in no event will the member's Percent Deductible obligation (Total or individual) be less than the Occurrence-based Minimum Deductible listed on the CCS.

**Location:** Location is a single street address that is the site of the Covered Property. Locations may have multiple Covered Properties, including structures.

**Flood Zone Exclusions:** The Fund Member's Covered Property (as defined in the Coverage Agreement) is excluded from coverage under the Flood Endorsement of the Coverage Agreement if any portion of the Covered Property subject to loss is located in any Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA) beginning with 'A' or 'V' as identified on the most recently published pre-Loss FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM).

Other Limits: If more than one Per Occurrence Limit may be applicable, the Fund will determine which limit will apply.

**Statement of Values:** The Statement of Values schedule will be provided to the Fund Member before the beginning of the Participation Period and is considered incorporated into the Agreements between the Fund and the member. The Fund Member agrees to allow the Fund to conduct property appraisals of the Fund Member's property periodically and agrees to accept values provided by the Fund. The Fund reserves the right to adjust the Fund Member's contribution for newly-constructed Buildings or Other Structures that are Covered Property and accepted within the Participation Period based on the certificate of occupancy date. The Fund reserves the right to adjust the Fund Member's contribution for newly-acquired Buildings or Other Structures that are Covered Property and acquired within the Participation Period based on the acquisition date.

**Salvage:** The Fund will have the right, at its discretion, to exercise rights of salvage to any damaged property paid for or replaced under the terms of this Agreement.

**Single Ply Membrane:** 'Single Ply Membrane' is a synthetic roofing material that includes EPDM, TPO, and PVC membranes. For Weather Perils, Single Ply Membrane roofs are subject to the Single Ply Membrane sublimit and deductible indicated on the CCS, except for roofs rated for Very Severe Hail by FM Global or UL Solution's equivalent rating, which are subject to the Weather Perils limit and deductible.

**Fund Member Mitigation**: As indicated in the Property Coverage Agreement, including Sections 9.29 and 12.5, the Fund Member must preserve Covered Property before and after Loss, or the Fund may exclude coverage.
