

Native Plants for Birds

Plants for Insects

Native insects are the foundation of a healthy bird habitat. Most songbirds rely on insects—especially caterpillars—to feed their young, and many adult birds depend on them for protein, fat, and essential nutrients.



Blanketflower

Gaillardia aristata

Prefers full sun and welldrained soil. Blooms late spring to fall.

Black-eyed Susan Rudbeckia hirta

Prefers full sun and well-drained soil. Blooms early summer to mid-fall.

Plants for Seeds

Planting native seed-producing species creates a dependable, nutrient-rich food supply that supports both resident birds and migrants throughout the year. Finches, Juncos, Towhees and other sparrows will thank you for these plants!



Blue Flax Linum lewisii

Prefers full sun and dry soil. Blooms early spring to fall.



Prefers full to part sun and well-drained soil. Blooms late spring to late summer.



Goldenrod

Solidago spp.

Prefers full to part sun and all soil. Blooms late summer to fall.

Sandcherry

Prunus pumila besseyi

Prefers part sun and any soil. Blooms in spring with fruit through late summer.

Gambel Oak

Quercus gambellii

Prefers full sun and low water. Blooms in late spring with showy fall foliage.

Prairie Coneflower

Ratibida columnifera

Prefers full sun and well-drained soil. Blooms late spring to fall.

Silver Lupine

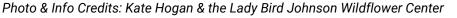
Lupinus argenteus

Prefers any light and dry soil. Blooms early- to mid-summer.

Common Sunflower

Helianthus annuus

Prefers full sun and dry, welldrained soil. Blooms midsummer to mid-fall.



Plants for Berries

Native berry-producing shrubs fruit at the times local birds need them most, and their berries are easier for native birds to digest than many ornamental varieties. These plants will attract birds like thrushes, waxwings, orioles, and catbirds.



Wax Currant Ribes cereum

Prefers full to part sun and dry, well-drained soil. Blooms early spring to mid-summer.

Kinnickkinnick Arctostaphylos uva-ursi

Prefers any light and all soil. Blooms early spring to early summer with berries in midto late Summer. Evergreen.

Plants for Nectar

Native nectar provides the precise sugar concentrations and bloom timing that local nectarfeeding species evolved with. Broad-tailed, Rufous, Calliope, and Black-chinned Hummingbirds all rely on these plants during breeding and migration.



Colorado Columbine Aquilegia coerulea

Prefers part sun to shade and well-drained soil. Blooms midspring to early summer.

Indian Paintbrush Castilleja spp.

Prefers full to part sun and well-drained soil. Blooms midspring to mid-summer.



Woods' Rose Rosa woodsii

Prefers any light and all soil. Blooms late spring to midsummer.

Serviceberry

Amelanchier alnifolia

Prefers any light and welldrained soil. Blooms late spring with berries through fall.

Chokecherry

Prunus virginiana

Prefers any light and welldrained soil. Blooms late spring with berries through late summer.

Beebalm

Monarda fistulosa

Prefers full to part sun and well-drained, moist soil. Blooms late spring to fall.

Penstemon

Penstemon spp.

Prefers full sun and dry soil. Blooms vary by species. Over 60 species native to CO.

Rocky Mountain Bee Plant

Cleome serrulata

Prefers full to part sun and dry, well-drained soil. Blooms mid-summer to fall.

Other recommended plants for birds: Trees/Shrubs - Blue Spruce, Boxelder Tree, Boulder Raspberry, Redosier Dogwood, Big Sagebrush, Rocky Mountain Juniper. Perennials - Showy Milkweed, Tickseed, Showy Four O'Clock, Rocky Mountain Iris, Blue Grama, Harebell, Nodding Onion, Narrow-leaf Fireweed.
