

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

Introit #S-248 Canticle 16—The Song of Zechariah Benedictus Dominus Deus

The Choir introduces the Antiphon, and then the Choir and Congregation sing the antiphon together. Then, the Choir sings the canticle, and the People are invited to join in singing the antiphon where indicated.



Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel;

he has come to his people and set them free.

He has raised up for us a mighty savior,

born of the house of his servant David.

Through his holy prophets he promised of old,

that he would save us from our enemies,

from the hands of all who hate us.

He promised to show mercy to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant.

The Deacon or Celebrant says

All kneel as they are able. Silence is kept.

Minister and People


Most merciful God,

The Nicene Creed

All stand as you are able.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven:

by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,


and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Prayers of the People

A cantor introduces the prayers singing: Let us pray for the Church and for the world.

The choir and congregation hum a drone as the lector then leads the prayers. After each petition, the cantor sings "Lord in your mercy" to which the people sing in response "Hear our prayer."

Intercessor: Grant, Almighty God, that all who confess your Name may be united in your truth, live together in your love, and reveal your glory in the world. We pray for Gretchen, our Bishop, and Sean, our Presiding Bishop. We pray for the Anglican Communion, especially for the Anglican Church of Australia. We pray for the Diocese of Spokane, especially for the Episcopal Migration Ministries. Silence



Intercessor: Guide the people of this land, and of all the nations, in the ways of justice and peace; that we may honor one another and serve the common good. We pray for Donald, our President, Bob, our Governor, for legislators, judges, and all in public service.

Silence

Cantor Lord, in your mercy People Hear our prayer.

Intercessor: Give us all a reverence for the earth as your own creation, that we may use its resources rightly in the service of others and to your honor and glory.

Silence

Cantor Lord, in your mercy People Hear our prayer.

Intercessor: Bless all whose lives are closely linked with ours, and grant that we may serve Christ in them, and love one another as he loves us.

Silence

Cantor Lord, in your mercy Hear our prayer.

Intercessor: Comfort and heal all those who suffer in body, mind, or spirit; give them courage and hope in their troubles, and bring them the joy of your salvation.

Silence

Cantor Lord, in your mercy People Hear our prayer.

Intercessor: We commend to your mercy all who have died, that your will for them may be fulfilled; and we pray that we may share with all your saints in your eternal kingdom.

Silence

Cantor Lord, in your mercy People Hear our prayer.

The Celebrant adds a concluding Collect. After the collect, the congregation sings:






The Celebrant proceeds

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

The people remain standing. The Celebrant continues:

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself...

The Celebrant recounts before God how we were made in love and for love, and how, when we fell away from God's purposes, Jesus Christ lived among us to reconcile us to God. The prayer continues, recounting and remembering the Lord's institution of the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist at the last supper to feed God's faithful people throughout this life and in the ages to come.

Then the Celebrant says:

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving... The Celebrant voices our prayer that the Holy Spirit will descend upon our offerings of bread and wine so that they may be for us Christ's Body and Blood. We also pray that the Holy Spirit will also descend upon us, filling our hearts with God's presence as we prepare to receive them.

The Celebrant concludes:

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.



If you would like to learn more about Holy Baptism, please speak to one of the clergy after the liturgy; it would be our joy to walk with you as you enter into life in the body of Christ.


Following the invitation the congregation may be seated and then come forward at the direction of the ushers.




