A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT AND FOUNDER

Dear Friends and Supporters,

Needless to say, this past year has been an exceptionally difficult one for Ennis Center as well as for myself, ...both professionally and personally. And all the while our organization is still confronting

the many challenges imposed by the lingering pandemic.

Despite such arduous times, Ennis Center has stayed focused over the last year on several of its strategic goals to boost its media and social media presence, collaborate with other agencies across the state, and get information out to redefine what social workers do and how essential they are to the communities they service. This has led to an increase in our name recognition, generated fresh volunteers, and attracted like-minded people wanting to help us in other ways.

However, Ennis has not been immune to "The Great Resignation." We have seen more turnover in the past couple of years than we ever have before. We are also experiencing staffing shortages, as seen in nearly every industry, and a decrease in qualified applicants for open positions. The number of youth coming into care and needing foster homes has not decreased, therefore, staff are carrying extra loads and taking on even more responsibility than they were before.

What we are seeing from the workers who are staying is commitment. Commitment to youth and families, commitment to Ennis Center, and commitment to their community. For these folks, this is not just a job, it is a Calling.

While there have been struggles, this has also been a year of tremendous growth for Ennis Center. We have grown more than 26%. We now have 7 offices across southeastern Michigan, as well as a contract with Spectrum in Wayne County for Juvenile Delinquency Services. We are BUSY. Through all of this, we have persevered. Committed staff, committed Board of Directors members, and committed donors have all helped us carry on and continue to move forward.

As I mentioned, this has been a challenging year for me both professionally and personally. My wife of many, many years passed away in May 2022. This was not just an unbearable loss to me: it was also an unmeasurable loss to Ennis Center.

There would be no Ennis Center for Children without Jill Ennis. She helped build Ennis into what it is today through hard work, commitment to the mission, and a love for children. She also supported staff through her many years of employment here, and well beyond retirement.

She was a tireless advocate for children and families. She was also my biggest supporter.

Jill became ill roughly 20 years ago, and her health has slowly continued to fail ever since. We will pay tribute to her in many ways in the coming year, ensuring that as many people as possible hear about her contributions to this agency, and to the communities we serve.

In addition to losing my wife and partner, we also lost the Chairperson of our Board of Directors, Mr. Darren Simpson.

Darren was a huge supporter of Ennis Center and had been committed to the Board of Directors since 2011. He never missed our golf outing, he and his co-workers would "adopt a family" at the holidays, and he could always be counted on to provide gifts and meals to those in need. He had a steady countenance that I often relied on throughout the years.

Darren was such a kind-hearted man, and a dedicated father and husband. He was the first African American Board Chair Ennis Center has had. He was only 47 years old, and we will miss his guidance and his presence every day. We will also be paying tribute to Darren throughout the coming year in several ways.

I also want to mention that under Darren's leadership we have been working on a very special project that we are calling FACT (Families and Children Together). It has the potential to revitalize the Child Welfare system and I am looking forward to sharing more of the details with you in the near future.

With all of that said, we have come a long way. With the support of our friends, donors, and supporters we continue to push on.

I want to thank each and every one of you for your commitment to Ennis Center for Children. It is through people just like you that we are able to help as many families and children as we do. It is the support you give that reinforces our commitment when the going gets tough.

On behalf of Ennis Center staff, children, and families, THANK YOU for everything you do for us, ...and everything you give from your heart!

FOSTER CARE

Ennis Center is licensed by the State of Michigan to provide services to children, from birth to age 21, who have experienced abuse and/or neglect. Ennis Center's foster parents participate as full partners with our certified, licensed staff to provide temporary, safe care in a stable family environment, while working to reunify and preserve birth families whenever possible or seek permanent adoptive families when needed.

TREATMENT FOSTER CARE

A community-based model program for youth that utilizes licensed foster care homes and provides genderspecific and intensive in-home services to youth who may struggle in placements. Youth entering the program may be returning to the community from a residential placement or are being diverted from a residential placement and do not have appropriate homes to return to within their community.

SPECIALIZED GROUP CARE

A community-based model program for adjudicated youth that utilizes licensed foster care homes and provides gender-specific and intensive in-home services to males and females ages 13 or 17 years. Youth entering the program may be returning to the community from a residential placement or are being diverted from a residential placement and do not have appropriate homes to return to within their community.

ADOPTION

Ennis Center is a member of a specialized recruitment effort to find permanent homes for children and adolescents available for adoption in our foster care programs, as well as those outside of our program, and is currently the third largest specialized adoption agency in the state.

COMMUNITY-BASED DELINQUENCY

Specially trained staff works intensively with juvenile justice, Wayne County youth and their families on becoming positive, productive members of the community.

YOUTH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

YAP works with youth who have come to the attention of the juvenile justice system and are at risk of continued involvement in the system.



PROGRAMS

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROGRAMS


Designed to provide therapeutic services to children between the ages of 7 and 17, and their families, who have multiple service needs which require access to various mental health, clinical and community services. The program's primary goals focus on promoting normal developmental milestones, supporting, and promoting healthy family functioning along with preserving and reuniting families while reducing the need for institutional care in psychiatric hospitals and other placements. Ennis Center therapists are experienced and have a wide variety of backgrounds. We offer many services and specialize in individual therapy for children, teens, and adults, family therapy, and marriage counseling. We accept most insurance including Blue Cross Blue Shield, Blue Care Network, Health Plus/Hap, and Medicare.

FOSTERING CREATIVITY

Fostering Creativity is a free Therapeutic Creative Arts Program offered at Ennis Center for youth 6-21 years of age in foster care/out-of-home placement in Genesee, Oakland, and Wayne Counties, made possible with funding provided by the Community Foundation of Greater Flint, Central Care Management Organization (Detroit) and Oakland Together (Pontiac).

The program offers a variety of 6-to-12-week therapeutic creative arts groups in the areas of: painting, music exploration, song production and recording, expressive writing and poetry, photography, comics as a personal narrative, theater, sculpture, dance and more. Each two-hour therapy group is facilitated by a Registered Art Therapist and/or a credentialed, skilled local artisan experienced in working with children with trauma.


Throughout the year, youth participants develop and strengthen skills in a variety of artistic mediums and learn ways in which art can be used as a tool for deeper self-awareness and positive self-esteem, improving academic performance and encouraging stability in foster/adoptive placement.

Babies always stir up emotions. Usually they're emotions of new swelling love, overwhelming happiness, nerves and pressure. But with this baby, ...the emotional cocktail is a little different. Not because this baby is any more or less precious than another of course. But because this baby has a particularly emotional story.

Hearing about a baby who was airlifted out of a hospital and wasn't expected to live is heart breaking.

Hearing about a baby who had more broken bones then weeks of life is so heart wrenching you feel it to your core.

Hearing about a baby who had to have holes drilled into each side of the skull to relieve bleeding and stop the seizures, because she was so badly beaten, is almost too much emotion to articulate.

Now imagine holding that baby.

That tiny, 16 week old baby who had all those broken bones, sutures covering their swollen head from ear to ear, left kidney dilated from too many blows,



and not expected to see or hear from being shaken and beaten so badly.

Imagine holding that little miracle baby ALIVE in your arms for the first time and the emotions that run through you. That fragile baby once covered in casts, bandages and bruises, attached to feeding and breathing tubes who defied the odds is now our (foster) daughter.

Most of her tiny bones have started to heal, her sutures are coming out, her kidney (while still swollen) is functioning properly. Surgery was also required on the left eye, but she can see, and both eyes are fully functional.

She can hear, and she is HAPPY.

She is a fighter, a survivor, a miracle baby, ...our warrior princess!

Note: She is now three years old and continues with her recovery, walking and learning new words. She recently started school at GISD in September 2022 and is thriving. Never underestimate the possibilities of miracles. We see them every day.


the opportunity to meet her and spend time with Aunt Jill then, you are truly blessed. I will always remember you and love you Aunt Jill.



UNITED WHOLESALE MORTGAGE LENDS THEIR SUPPORT

For eight weeks this past Summer, 12 youth from our Detroit prevention and juvenile justice program participated in a unique, United Wholesale Mortgage 'financial literacy bootcamp' entitled Future You. It's a pilot program in development and is presently being exclusively offered to Ennis Center for Children.

The goal of the program is to instill self-assessment and life-skills training, along with money management capabilities, as the teens explored new possibilities about their futures. The learning experiences included a wide range of topics including budgeting, resume writing, why your social media footprint matters, and giving back to the community. Each person was assigned a mentor (a UWM Employee) who worked closely with the individual on each specific topic.

UWM is one of the largest and most innovative mortgage lenders in the nation. The weekly Future You sessions typically met from 11-3:00 each Monday inside UWM's spacious world headquarters located in Pontiac. The corporate campus also houses the UWM Sports Complex, a state-of-the-art athletic facility that is open for community use.

At the end of eight weeks the group graduated and talked about the key elements of what they got out of the Program.

Owner and CEO of UWM, Mat Ishbia, personally found the time to attend the Future You graduation ceremony. He shared his vision on the importance of being self-motivated and ready to make positive changes. "Nothing in life comes easy, but great things happen when you are willing to work hard. It starts with preparation and a winning attitude."

Several of our teens expressed wanting to work for UWM after completion of high school. And several others stated they would like to come back next year as mentors themselves to assist with a new group of youth that will be participating.

ADOPTION

In May we had 3 siblings with an adoption finalization (aged 13, 5, and 4). They had moved around due to several family members not being able to handle behaviors. They were finally placed in a Detroit licensed foster home, and they thrived. The adoptive parents have advocated for everything for these children from educational needs to therapeutic services they were previously denied. All three children had said several times that all they want is a forever home, and to finally be loved. In May at the adoption finalization the 13 year old girl cried and told me she finally has a family that she knows won't guit on her.

OUTPATIENT THERAPY

Janee M. and her brother were in dire need of food, clothing and other necessities of life Oftentimes Janee would come to therapy with her brother and prior to the end of the session, he would put together a care package of food before they left the building for himself and siblings. Upon further and deeper investigations it was discovered that these young people lacked clothing, food, school supplies and other essentials. In a matter of days, Ennis Center and its caring staff were able to assist these individuals with clothing donations, gifts cards, school supplies, shoes, backpacks, and a host of other items. In brief, the talented members of our organization worked together on a moment's notice to immediately impact a family seeking assistance on so many different levels.
