EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Comprehensive Community Needs Assessment (CNA) was conducted, in 2023 by HARCATUS Tri-County Community Action Organization (HARCATUS) staff. The CNA was approved by the Head Start Policy Council in October 16, 2023, the HARCATUS Board of Directors in September 27, 2023, and the report was released in October 17, 2023. Prior report was approved in June, 2020. The assessment was completed in conjunction with Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) and Head Start Grant requirements, in which grantees must assess the needs and characteristics of their communities that will have an impact on the agency planning and program development activities in the coming years. A purpose of this assessment was to assist HARCATUS in delivering high quality services to meet the changing needs of Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas County residents.

In 2023, HARCATUS currently offers the following services:

- Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)
- Comprehensive Client Case Management Employment Program Youth Employment Services (YES)
- Community Services Home Relief Program (ARPA HRG), Harrison County Food Pantry, Carroll County Clothes Closet, and Tuscarawas County Nest.
- Energy Assistance Programs Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Winter Crisis, Summer Crisis, Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP)
- Head Start and Early Head Start
- Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP)
- Senior Nutrition Program (SNP) Congregate Sites, Home Delivered Meals, and Harrison County Senior Transportation
- Weatherization & Housing Home Weatherization Assistance Program (HWAP), HWAP Enhancement,
 HWAP Readiness, and other Energy Programs

Methodology Overview

HARCATUS collected qualitative data from low-income households and stakeholders/key sector representatives through a combination of surveys and face-to-face interviews. In addition, quantitative data was obtained from the Community Action Partnership Comprehensive Community Needs Assessment tool and from various reputable sources (e.g., COAD 4 Kids, County JFS Offices) to draw a comparison between the results of the data collected by HARCATUS and existing data on the population.

<u>Surveys</u>: Two different surveys were administered to collect data from a variety of individuals throughout the HARCATUS service area. The first survey was completed by low-income households. The second was completed by stakeholders and key sector representatives, including those from community-based, faith-based, private sector, public sector, educational institutions, health and counseling. In addition to collecting demographic information, both surveys asked questions regarding education, health, nutrition and social services community resources.

<u>Interviews:</u> 251 households participated in interviews which were conducted by Head Start Family Advocates, during the 2021-2022 Head Start school year. 94% of those interviewed were at or below 130% of the Federal Poverty Level. Basic demographic information was collected. Households were asked to rank their greatest needs in the areas of education, health, nutrition and social services. Interpreters were used in this process as needed for households with limited English proficiency.

Responses from the surveys and interviews are analyzed thoroughly later in this report.

Key Findings, Recommendations and Next Steps Overview

The key findings section describes the causes and conditions of poverty for the corresponding reference area, found through analysis of the survey results and supporting data regarding poverty, and its prevalence related to gender, age, and race/ethnicity, as well as other important, supportive information.

Causes of poverty are many, but all result in a person's lack of available resources to obtain the minimum necessities to live. The conditions of poverty describe a person's living situation as a result of living in poverty. Causes and conditions of poverty have been identified in the areas of education, health, nutrition and housing.

Results and Supporting Data

The results and supporting data provide the qualitative and quantitative data and analysis of the Low-Income Household Survey, Stakeholders/Key Sector Survey, Head Start Family Interviews as well as the Community Action Partnership Comprehensive Community Needs Assessment tool and from various reputable sources. This data was utilized as the catalyst for the HARCATUS Assessment Team meeting that was held July 17, 2023 with representatives from HARCATUS and Head Starts management teams, as well as, the HARCATUS Planning Committee that analyzed the data on September 13, 2023.

Summary

The goal of the Community Needs Assessment is for HARCATUS to determine the needs and resources within Carroll, Harrison and Tuscarawas Counties that are available to assist in fulling HARCATUS mission. HARCATUS will continue to be a leader in understanding poverty in our region, disseminating poverty data, providing advocacy and outreach, and partnering with other community organizations to further its mission to improve the quality of life for individuals and families by minimizing the effects of poverty, promoting self-sufficiency and advocating for positive change.

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METHODOLOGY

HARCATUS collected qualitative data from low-income households and stakeholders/key sector representatives through a combination of surveys and interviews. Primary and secondary sources of information were used in this assessment including: demographic information analysis, survey of clients, parents, individuals and other caregivers, survey of stakeholders/key sector representatives from community-based, faith-based, private sector, public sector, educational institutions, health and counseling. Internal documents, such as previous Community Assessments, Program Information Reports, Child Plus Data, CSBG Annual Report, CSBG ROMA Data, client satisfaction surveys and HARCATUS strategic plan were also used. The OACAA State of Poverty report released on July 10, 2023 was also used. In addition, quantitative data was obtained from various reputable sources to draw a comparison between the results of the data collected by HARCATUS and existing data on the population. The Community Action Partnership Comprehensive Community Needs Assessment tool can be seen in Appendix D. Analysis of the data supports the key findings regarding causes and conditions of poverty outlined later in this report.

HARCATUS Low-Income Household Survey:

Survey was completed by 130 low-income individuals during the months of May and June 2023. All survey respondents were at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level. Surveys were emailed to the Agency's low-income clients and questions were asked regarding the households needs and experiences with the education, health, nutrition and social services community resources and HARCATUS. A copy of the blank survey is included in Appendix A. Respondent demographics from the low-income household survey are shown below.

HARCATUS Stakeholder and Key Sector Representative Survey:

Survey was completed by 26 stakeholder/key sector representatives. Data for this survey was collected during the month of June 2023, surveys were emailed to stakeholders and key sector representatives. They were asked questions about their perspectives of the education, health, nutrition and social services community resources and needs, as well as their perception regarding HARCATUS services. A copy of the blank survey is included in Appendix B. Respondent sector affiliation is show below.

HARCATUS Head Start Family Interviews:

Interviews were conducted by family advocates with 251 Head Start families in the months of August and September 2022. Of those interviewed, 94% were at or below 130% of the Federal Poverty Level. Questions were related to their household demographics, as well as education, health, nutrition, and social service needs. They were also asked about the literacy practices of their household. This survey consists of subjective qualitative data (coming from individuals' own perceptions of their circumstances and/or their feelings). Thus,

some results of the survey may not directly correspond to the Child Plus Data or other objective data obtained from other sources. A copy of the blank survey is included in Appendix C. HARCATUS Head Start family demographics are shown below.

Total Number and Distribution of Eligible HARCATUS Head Start Children:

One task of the Community Assessment is to develop an estimate of the number and distribution of eligible Head Start children. Using the following steps, by estimating, 747 children would be eligible for Head Start (living at or below 100% of the Federal Poverty Level). The estimates by county are; 48 in Harrison, 179 in Carroll, and 526 in Tuscarawas.

Step One: The child poverty rate was applied to the total number of children < 5 years of age to determine the total number of children < 5 years of age living in poverty.

It would appear there are an estimated 484 more children eligible for Head Start services than served by the current funded enrollment number of 263. Although, when considering the enrollment turnover of 50 children, the estimated number of un-served children is reduced to 434.

KEY FINDINGS – CAUSES & CONDITIONS

The key findings describe the causes and conditions of poverty for the corresponding reference area (education, health, nutrition and social services) as well as the important, supportive, high-level information found in the research and results presented above.

EDUCATION – Causes and Conditions of Poverty

CAUSE:

 Analysis of the data supports that one of the causes of poverty in our service area is a low rate of educational attainment.

CONDITION:

- Youth not graduating from high school and not working
- Adults do not have post-secondary degrees
- Residents are working but not making enough to cover even their basic living expenses.
- Lack of parenting skills
- Lack of computer training
- Difficulty finding good paying jobs
- Low reading and math performance

Education – Supporting Data

Data from the American Community Survey 2017-21 shows that the percentage of residents in our service area without a high school diploma or GED is slightly higher than the 11.13% for the United States and more than 2.5% higher than the rate for the State of Ohio. In the report area, only 46.7% of residents has only a high school diploma; with 16.4% with some college, 8.7% with an Associate's Degree, 10.9% with a Bachelor's Degree and 5.9% with a Graduate or Professional Degree. With Carroll and Harrison County college graduates holding Associates Degrees while Tuscarawas County graduates obtained Bachelor's Degrees. According to this same survey, 9.5% of veterans have no high school diploma. 10.61% of Tuscarawas County veterans, 6.07% of Carroll County and 9.86% of Harrison County when the national percentage is only 5.25%. Analysis of the data supports that our service area faces a gap in educational attainment with the state of Ohio and the United States overall.

Adult literacy is also a problem for our service area where 19.5% struggle with basic vocabulary and understanding multiple forms of text, this is higher than the state average of 17.7%.

The results from our low-income households, stakeholder/key sector representatives, and Head Start parents show the respondent's identified the following as the top education needs for the community: Parenting skills, pre-employment skills, job specific training, help to manage money, computer training, help to find employment and education after high school.

With educational attainment directly impacting socioeconomic status it is easy to see why the low-income families in our service area are struggling financially.

OACAA reports there was a significant decline in tests scores during the height of the COVID pandemic for test scores in reading and math. Students in economically challenged areas and households in high poverty districts fared much worse. Students economically challenged in suburban districts saw a decrease of 10.2% while those in very high poverty urban districts saw a 13.5% decrease in test scores. Ohio students are up to a half a year behind in reading and 1 year behind in math.

It is important to consider what other problems might surround the occurrence of the central problem. As discussed in our Assessment Team Meeting this could be a fear of asking questions, time spent on cell phone and other devices, parents' difficulty communicating with educators, children worried about violence in school, bullying, lack of English proficiency and society's decreased value in families. In addition, the HARCATUS Planning Committee discussed the ongoing impact of the pandemic including that a number of parents in the area decided not to return their children to public schools in the fall of 2023.

HEALTH – Causes and Conditions of Poverty

CAUSE:

• Analysis of the data supports that two of the causes of poverty are lack of affordable and accessible primary care and mental health care.

CONDITION:

- Wait times to get an appointment
- Doctors not accepting new clients
- Lack of understanding of medical billing
- Doesn't take my insurance
- Unable to miss work

- No outside of work appointments
- Doctors too far away
- Specialty doctors not in our area
- Selling of local hospitals to regional hospitals
- Can access hygiene items
- Lack of medical, dental, vision care
- Lack of disability services
- Need for preventative care
- Lack of prenatal care
- No medical insurance

Health – Supporting Data

Data from the American Community Survey 2017-21 shows access to Primary Care Providers in our service area is at a rate of 56.52 per 100,000 population as compared to Ohio at 109.70 and the United States at 107.28. Access to Dental Health Providers in our service area is at a rate of 23.80 per 100,000 population as compared to Ohio at 31.16 and the United States at 36.00. Access to Mental Health Providers in our service area is at a rate of 87.75 per 100,000 population as compared to Ohio at 196.23 and the United States at 146.55.

Additional data shows the lack of health insurance is considered a key driver of health status. Our service area shows that 10.87% of the population age 18-64 are without insurance where as 9.07% of Ohioans and 12.84% of the United States lack coverage. Also, the population ages 0-18 without insurance in our service area is 6.82% where as 4.89% of Ohio children and 5.62% of the children in the United States lacks insurance. In the same data our service area reported only 44 active Medicare and Medicaid service providers. Carroll County has no hospitals, Harrison County has one, and Tuscarawas County has two.

Within the report area, there are a total of 35,215 adults age 20 and older who self-reported having a BMI greater than 30.0. This represents a 34.1% of the survey population compared to Ohio at 33.1% and the United States at 29.0%.

The results from our low-income household, stakeholders/key sector representatives, and Head Start parents show the respondent's identified the following as the top health needs for the community: Disability services, mental health services, emotional support for self and child, accessible and affordable health care, dental care/insurance and doctors that accept Medicaid.

There are numerous factors which are tied to individual health and several issues at the forefront of health outcomes – especially for our low-income residents. These issues include health disparities, lack of access to care.

It is important to consider what other problems might surround the occurrence of the central problem. Problems such as a family's missing appointments, lack of literature for community health services available, lack of interpreters or interpreters not knowing the exact dialect, stigma in the community for Latino families, stigma in the community regarding mental health are a few of health-related problems that were mentioned in our Assessment Team Meeting. In addition, the HARCATUS Planning Committee discussed that although uninsured adults in Tuscarawas County have access to treatment at the Tuscarawas Clinic for the Working Uninsured and Springvale Health Centers, Carroll and Harrison County adults without insurance need to travel out of county to access services if they are available to them at all.

NUTRITION – Causes and Conditions of Poverty

CAUSE:

 Analysis of the data supports that one of the causes of poverty is a lack of access to affordable and healthy food.

CONDITION:

- Convenience of unhealthy resources
- Not having the education to know what is healthy
- Not understanding food labels
- Lack of nutrition knowledge
- Lack of supply
- COVID food shortages
- Parents not signing up for available services
- No home economics in the schools
- Distance to travel to get healthy food
- Lack of knowledge or ability to afford delivery resources
- Lack of understanding of discount programs
- Lack of access to phones, phone apps and discount memberships

Nutrition – Supporting Data

Data from the American Community Survey 2017-21 shows that access to healthy foods such as fresh fruits and vegetables in the service area is at a rate of 14.87 per 100,000 population as compared to 16.87 in Ohio and 18.79 in the United States. Data also shows that the service area has 3,695 households that are below poverty level and are not receiving SNAP benefits. Data from the report also shows that two of our three counties have a food desert. The USDA Food Access Research Atlas defines a food desert as any neighborhood that lacks healthy food sources due to income level, distance to supermarkets, or vehicle access. In Harrison County 2,346 people reside in a food desert track and in Tuscarawas County 3,620 people reside in a food desert. The results from our low-income households, stakeholder/key sector representatives, and Head Start parents show the respondent's identified the following as the top nutrition needs for the community: Fresh fruits and vegetables, meal planning skills, protein items, adequate amounts of food, nutritious food options and nutritious recipes.

During our Assessment Team Meeting, it was discussed that individuals living in poverty have limited access to necessities such as clean water, kitchen appliances, hygiene items, healthy and affordable food. Households have a lack of knowledge regarding good nutrition, family schedules make it difficult to share family meals and to visit local farmer markets. Convenience foods are often unhealthy and fresh fruits and vegetables are expenses and short shelf life. Many low-income seniors are housebound, have limited mobility, lack of transportation and are unable to shop for groceries by themselves. Low-income households are not only underutilizing SNAP but are also WIC. In the HARCATUS Planning Committee meeting, the ending of the temporary pandemic SNAP benefits this past spring was discussed. It was commented that the SNAP benefits were not reduced but returned to pre-pandemic level. However, the cost of food has remained high. The difficult SNAP work requirements can have on those who are temporarily laid off was also discussed.

Families in poverty often have food insecurity, poor health and nutrition. Lack of proper nutrition as it leads to poor focus, strength, and the ability to socialize properly, which in turn leads to poor academic performance, risky behaviors, and difficulty performing job duties. However, when their nutrition is improved, they often achieve better health. This can contribute to increased work productivity which can then lead to increased income.

SOCIAL SERVICES – Causes and Conditions of Poverty

CAUSE:

• Analysis of the data supports that one of the causes of poverty in our service area continues to be the lack of affordable, quality housing.

CONDITION:

- Couch-Surfing
- Adult children continue to live with parents
- Overcrowding particularly with some of our minority households
- Landlords preferring to leave units empty rather than rent at an affordable rate
- Eviction moratorium expiring
- Cost of routine household maintenance
- Lack of knowledge and resources to perform routine maintenance
- Cost of major repairs
- Lack of skilled and affordable repair contractors

Nutrition – Supporting Data

Data from the American Community Survey 2017 - 2020 indicates that our service area has experienced a decrease of 342 units since 2012 compared to a 2.51% increase statewide. Households in our service area that lack complete plumbing facilities total 174. Carroll County experience an increase from 2000 of 8 units.

Households in our service area that lack complete kitchen facilities total 2,386 or 3.87%, this is higher than the Ohio average at 3.32% and the United States at 2.56%. In the report area, of the 9,524 students enrolled in reported districts during the school year 2019-2020, there were 293 or 3.08% homeless students, which is higher than the statewide rate of 2.11%. Housing Units in our service area that lack telephone service to both make and receive calls totals 1,024 or 1.87% compared to an Ohio total of 1.12% and the United States at 1.17%. Households with no computers in our service area total 6,543 or 11.96% compared to Ohio's percent of 8.12% and the United States at 6.95%. The housing units in our service area that have access to broadband total 88.67% compared to Ohio's percent of 95.67% and the United States at 92.88%.

The results from our low-income households, stakeholders/key sector representatives, and Head Start parents show the respondent's identified the following as the top social services needs for the community: Assistance with monthly living expenses, affordable housing, affordable/accessible child care, employment that pays a living wage, before/after school program for youth/children, health insurance, high speed internet and cell phone coverage at home and adequate living space.

Interesting to note that stakeholders/key sector representatives rated affordable housing as the greatest need as did Head Start parents in our service area however low-income households rated housing as the 10th need. It should be considered that the low-income survey was sent many households that received pandemic home relief funding. This will be of note in future assessments to determine if this priority shifts for respondents to the low-income household survey.

According to the National Low Income Housing Coalitions 2023 Ohio Out of Reach report; in Ohio, the Fair Market Rent (FMR) for a two-bedroom apartment is \$993. In order to afford this level of rent and utilities – without paying more than 30% of income on housing – a household must earn \$3,308 monthly or \$39,702 annually. Assuming a 40-hour work week, 52 weeks per year, and this level of income translates into an hourly Housing Wage of \$19.09 per hour. A person would need to work 60 hours per week at minimum wage or 1.5

full-time jobs, to afford a 1-bedroom rental home at FMR or 76 work hours per week at minimum wage or 1.9 full-time jobs, would be necessary to afford a 2-bedroom rental home at FMR.

During our Assessment Team meeting, we considered what other problems might surround the occurrence of the central problem. If a household does not have access to child care, then they are unable to work. We need advocacy for broadband and for families to make a living wage. Rising housing costs continue to be impacted due to the gas and oil industry. Housing shortage in our service area, and the substandard housing that is available, along with the costs of maintaining where our low-income households reside. Lack of programs that provide home improvements outside of energy efficiencies. Important to note from the HARCATUS Planning Committee in looking at the Census data on households that lack complete kitchen facilities, the influx of oil and gas workers in Harrison County may have inflated this data. Houses were split up into multiple rental units to accommodate workers who may have been only interested in a place to sleep.

RECOMMENDATIONS & NEXT STEPS

Based on the knowledge gained, several key recommendations for HARCATUS Tri-County Community Action can be made:

- This 2023 Community Assessment Report indicated that both our Head Start and Consumer survey respondents identified the need to continue and expand upon services currently provided by HARCATUS. This shows that current HARCATUS programs are helping meet the needs of individuals, families and communities experiencing poverty in the HARCATUS service area.
- Partnerships are vital to ensuring the needs of low-income individuals, not addressed by HARCATUS programs, are met. HARCATUS should continue to develop partnerships in order to assist low-income individuals and families. Partnerships will also increase the visibility of HARCATUS within the community.
- HARCATUS can continue to reduce low-income households' anxiety and worries by assisting households
 with utility assistance, energy efficiency suggestions and by supporting their basic needs; such as soap,
 laundry detergent, cleaning supplies, hygiene items and day-to-day household necessities. HARCATUS
 should explore additional donation opportunities and partners to collect these resources for distribution.
- HARCATUS should put a plan in place that will better assist at-risk, low-income youth participants in their career path. This plan should include options for both internal (assistance by HARCATUS) and external (assistance through partnerships).
- There is a growing population of families with cultural and language differences (i.e., English proficiency) that may present additional barriers to achieving self-sufficiency. HARCATUS should work with staff through cultural diversity trainings and form partnerships with advocates for this population.
- HARCATUS understands the needs of its service area for access to internet services. While HARCATUS
 cannot increase the reach of internet service, HARCATUS may be able to play a role in internet service
 payment assistance and knowledge awareness of technology options for low-income individuals.
 HARCATUS should explore funding opportunities for this and other related services.

Needs Assessment is an ongoing process of evaluating needs and resources in our community. HARCATUS will use the knowledge gained through this process to further our ROMA workplans and our strategic planning efforts.

RESULTS & SUPPORTING DATA

This section of the 2023 Comprehensive Community Needs Assessment reports the results and analysis of the surveys, interviews and supporting data.

HARCATUS Low-Income Household Survey Results and Analysis:

Low-income households were asked to respond to questions regarding education, health, nutrition, and social services as well as questions regarding HARCATUS as an agency. Analysis of the information is shown in the following tables.

Top ten education needs identified by low-income households were money management, computer training, affordable higher education, job market information, parenting education, Kindergarten readiness, child nutrition education, affordable childhood education, child oral, hearing and vision education, and safe child care opportunities. *Interesting to note: Post-Secondary Training ranked eighth on the stakeholders/key sector representatives survey but third on the low-income household survey. Additional feedback from one low-income respondent helps to clarify, "We have had difficulty with affording, understanding the processes involved, and getting started with college. We parent never attended and we and our adult children want to try and haven't found the help needed to navigate everything. It's just so complicated."

The top ten ranked health related needs with low-income households were disability services, preventative care, counseling services, dental care, medical care, safer neighborhoods, access to hygiene items, vision care, safe drinking water, substance abuse treatment, prenatal care and medical insurance. *One respondent added

the need for, "More dental care available for Medicaid clients." Another respondent added, "Dental care is too expensive and dental insurance barely covers anything."

The three nutrition related needs identified by low-income households were fresh fruits/vegetables, protein items and adequate amount of food. *Respondents stated the following, "Over the time with COVID we got extra food help. That is gone now, and we are learning how to eat on half the money again." **One respondent's situation is, "... most months, I run out of most food about 3 weeks into the month. Fresh fruits and vegs have become somewhat more affordable in the summer months at the farm markets. But our local stores are not up to par, especially if you live outside Dover or New Phila."

Top ten social service-related needs by low-income households were assistance with monthly bills, making a living wage, opportunity to volunteer, cleaning supplies, assistance with online applications, finding employment, high-speed internet at home, before/after school youth programs, cell phone coverage at home, and affordable housing. *One respondent stated, "I have been able to stay cool and warm thanks to HEAP", and another stated, "I am grateful to have access to our local HARCATUS. I did not think I would ever need it again, but this winter I became ill and was able to keep my heat on because of HEAP/PIPP". **Regarding access to internet a respondent stated, "I'd like to afford internet."

Perception Towards HARCATUS Services:

When considering resource accessibility, it should be noted that there were a large number of respondents on the low-income household survey that answered "not applicable" regarding the programs HARCATUS offers. This could mean that HARCATUS internal referral process needs to be reviewed to confirm that low-income households are aware of all the services they might qualify for. Of those that responded that they are "currently using" or "have used" HARCATUS services in the past, 97% rated HARCATUS as "fair" or "excellent". This high approval rate corresponds with the Customer Satisfaction Data that was collected, reviewed and analyzed in

June 2023 as part of HARCATUS annual review of customer satisfaction. Customer satisfaction data was collected by each program utilizing its own survey and distribution schedule ranging from point of service (e.g., HWAP) to annually (e.g., RSVP).

- 100% of respondents indicated RSVP volunteering increased their feelings of self-worth;
- 85% of respondents in the Child & Adult Care Food Program reported being "Very Satisfied" with: quality of training received and assistance provided by staff;
- 91% of Home Delivered Meals respondents were "Satisfied" or "Very Satisfied" with program overall;
- 82% of Congregate respondents would "Likely"/ "Very Likely" recommend program to others (Remaining 18% were "Neutral");
- 95% of parents/caregivers would recommend Head Start to others;
- 87% of Head Start parents surveyed saw a need for infant and toddler care in their community;
- 95% of Community Services clients reported being "Satisfied" (15%) or "Very Satisfied" (80%) with the quality of service;
- 100% of HWAP participants reported staff clearly explained the services and answered their questions;
- 96% of Electric Partnership Program clients were satisfied with the product (s) they received;
- All youth involved in the Youth Employment Services (YES) program indicated that the staff explained the program before enrollment and that the description of the service was accurate. Transportation was listed as the most used supportive service.

The top ten ranked health related needs with stakeholders/key sector representatives were mental health, substance abuse services, doctors willing to accept Medicaid, dental care/dental insurance, medical insurance, disability services, medication, eye care/vision insurance, chronic health conditions, and healthy weight management. Disability services and mental health needs ranked in the top ten for both low-income households and stakeholders/key sector representatives. However, substance abuse treatment ranked second by stakeholders, ranked eighth in the other survey and medical insurance ranked fifth with stakeholders/key sector representatives and came in at the bottom as tenth by low-income clients.

Top ten nutrition related needs identified by stakeholders/key sector representatives were nutritious food options, meal planning skills, access to fresh fruits and vegetables, adequate food, meal delivery services, weight management, assistance with applying for WIC and/or SNAP, community garden, and nutritious recipes. Two of those were chosen as top concerns for low-income individuals as well: "Have fresh fruits/vegetables" was first and "have adequate amounts of food" was third. Of note, "have protein items" was second for low-income concerns for never having enough for their household which supports the not having an adequate amount of food that respondents chose as a top concern.

Top ten social service-related needs by stakeholders/key sector representatives were affordable housing, child care, employment that pays a living wage, public transportation, health insurance, after school programs for teens/youths, counseling for healthy relationships, support groups for single parents, job placement, utility bill assistance, and programs to reduce energy costs/consumption. Employment that pays a living wage was a key social service need in both stakeholders/key sector representatives and low-income household rankings. Nevertheless, this community resource need area showed in analysis the most variation between stakeholders/key sector representatives and low-income households, see table below:

One hundred percent of those surveyed would recommend HARCATUS services to others. One hundred percent agree that the community benefits from programs offered by HARCATUS. Sixty-one percent feel that members of the community are aware of HARCATUS programs and services. From those numbers it can be determined that HARCATUS is making a difference in the community but would benefit by ensuring all communities in the service area are aware of the services it provides and know their support is imperative to the operation of HARCATUS.

Stakeholder/Key Sector Representative Identified Needs and Resources:

Community Resources Identified as Strengths: The top five community resources identified as strengths by stakeholder/key sector representatives include - parks and playgrounds (37.5%), early education pre-k (29.2%), clothing (28%), volunteer opportunities (28%), and post-secondary education (25%). The community resources identified to round out the top 10 strengths – senior services (22.7%), tax preparation assistance (22.7%), early education 0-3 (20.8%), disability services, recreational opportunities, and hospitals/urgent care centers (19.2%).

<u>Community Resources Identified as Needing Improvement:</u> The top five community resources identified by stakeholder/key sector representatives as needing improvement include - public transportation (90.5%),

homeless services (84.6%), home daycare providers (82.6%), child care (70.8%) and literacy education for English language learners (70%). The community resources identified to round out the top 10 needing improvement - housing (69.6%), services that support the inclusion of fathers (66.7%), health insurance (64%), high speed internet (63.6%), and life coaching (61.5%).



When comparing 2021 and 2022 priorities in both table and the chart above, there is very little change:


- Parenting skills remained at the top;
- Money Management 2nd and Communication Skills 3rd swapped positions

Parenting skills, money management and communication skills have been in the top 3 education needs for the past 10 years. The education response priorities in 2021 shuffled slightly from previous years. Understandably, parents of preschoolers have consistently ranked parenting skills in the top 3 education concerns. Parents of young children need to understand child development in order to parent their children.

When comparing 2021 versus 2022 priorities (rankings) in both the above table and chart, there are many Similarities as well as a new addition to the top five:

- Emotional Support for Self or Child was 1st for 2021 and 2022;
- Accessible and Affordable Health Care moved up from 3rd to 2nd in 2022;
- Dental Care/Insurance had a big jump from 7th in 2021 to 3rd in 2022;
- Affordable Medication was 4th for 2021 and 2022;
- Maintaining a Healthy Weight dropped from 2nd to 5th in 2022.


There are some changes to the priorities from the previous needs assessment, Emotional Support for Self or Child remains in number 1. Maintaining a Healthy Weight dropped from 2nd to 5th and Dental Care/Insurance climbed from 7th to 3rd. In 2022, needs relating to mental health, accessing and affording health care and dental care/insurance were top priorities for parents. Emotional Support for Self and Child (ranked 1st) is a need that creates important challenges for Head Start families. With the lack of mental health providers in the state and in our service area it is difficult for parents to find the help they need. As outlined in the OACAA State of Poverty 2023 report; COVID has impacted individuals and family's mental health and the industry at large. Ohio is suffering from a shortage of mental health workers; in both Harrison and Carroll Counties there are limited or no mental health providers registered with Medicaid.

Although substance abuse continues to be a challenge in the area, substance abuse rankings slid from 3rd in 2020 to 5th in 2021 and 6th in 2022 in the Head Start Family Interviews and was ranked 8th as an identified need in the Low-Income Household Survey.

When comparing 2021 versus 2022 priorities (ranking) in the table above, there is little change:


- Meal Planning has ranked as the top need since 2018;
- Nutritious recipes and nutritious food options have swapped places for 2nd and 3rd position;
- Access to fresh fruits/vegetables remains in 4th;
- With overweight/underweight remaining in 5th position

Nutrition Needs of Head Start families have remained largely unchanged since Nutrition questions were added to the Community Assessment in 2016. Families still struggle with Meal Planning, Finding Nutritious Food Options, and utilizing Nutritious Recipes. With families struggling to find access to fresh fruits and vegetables as well as nutritious food options it is easy to see why there is a struggle reaching a healthy weight for these children. Although WIC offers services in all areas of nutrition, surprisingly, access to WIC continues to rank 8th.

When comparing 2021 and 2022 Social Service priorities (rankings) in the chart above, there is minor shuffling in rankings of Social Service Needs:

- Remaining number 1 for the past 10 years is affordable housing;
- Affordable, Accessible Child Care and Center for Teens/Youth before & after School remained 2nd and 3rd again this year;
- Unemployment fell from 6th to 10th;
- Assistance with Energy rose from 6th to 5th.

Per the OACAA Community Action Distribution of Home Relief Funds 2020-2023 report it is important to note that 60% of surveyed recipients reported that without assistance from Home Relief funds, they would be homeless. An important note is that Home Relief funds created a \$270 million dollar impact in supporting positive interaction between parents/caregivers and their children and a \$54 million dollar impact in preventing an increase in the use of the foster care system.

In April 2023 Ohio Public Utilities Commission released a News Bureau: Rising energy prices in 2023, outlining that for most customers on the default plan, the average price of electricity would increase 58-88%. This ranking by Head Start Family Interviews will continue to need to be monitored.

Early Childhood Learning Aids and Practices:

When comparing the 2021 and 2022 survey results, no major differences are noted. Full data is provided in the table below.

The section below provides comparative analysis between the HARCATUS Head Start data collected in 2022 and data collected previously, as well as supporting data from other reputable sources.

Data regarding education, health, nutrition, and social service needs of Head Start eligible children and their families 1302.11(b)(ii):

To determine what services are needed to strengthen families, data was collected from multiple sources. <u>First</u>: Existing research data was reviewed for poverty level households, families using Public Assistance, and all families with young children.

Second: Other social service agencies were surveyed to identify issues around community services.

<u>Third</u>: HARCATUS Head Start families were surveyed to identify needs and issues around community services.

Service Area Poverty Data by gender, age and race/ethnicity, Standard 3.2:

Poverty Rate Change in the HARCATUS report area from 2010 to 2020 shows a decrease by 3.62%. Harrison County poverty rate in 2020 is 13.7% which is still higher than Ohio rate of 12.6% and United States rate of 11.9%

Poverty - Population Below 185% FPL:

In the report area 29.07% or 38,458 individuals for whom poverty status is determined are living in households with income below 185% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). This indicator is relevant because a CSBG rate change from 200% FPL to 125% FPL will impact a large portion of the report area. There is one section in Tuscarawas County were over 43% is below 185%, with several sections in all 3 counties with over 27.1% of the population below 185%.

Poverty - Population Below 100% FPL:

Within the report area 13.25% or 17,533 individuals for whom poverty status is determined are living in households with income below the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). This indicator is relevant because poverty creates barriers to access including health services, healthy food, and other necessities that contribute to poor health status.

Poverty – Population by Gender:

Of all the male population within the report area (66,984), the proportion living in households with income below the federal poverty level is 11.80% or 7,784 males. Of all the females (67,530), 14.80% or 9,749 in the report area live in households with income below the FPL. In Ohio, 14.55% of females are in this category. Only Tuscarawas County in our service area is below this rate at 14.30% with Harrison County being 16.13% and Carroll County at 15.35%. The percentage of males in Harrison County is also about the Ohio rate of 12.11%. The United States has a rate of 11.44% of males and 13.79% of females.

For children age 0-17 the data shows that 19.88% of males and 18.48% of females live in a status of poverty compared to the state average of 18.70% males and 18.52% females. In Carroll County the rate of both male and female children living in poverty is over 20.50%.

<u>Poverty – Population by Ethnicity/Race:</u>

Of all the Hispanic population within the report area (X), the proportion living in households with income below the federal poverty level is 34.47% or 1,172. This is 11.39% higher than the state of Ohio and 16.76% higher than the United States.

With regards to race the report area shows that "White", "Native American or Alaska Native", and "Asian" have a percentage of individuals living in households with income below the federal poverty level higher than the state average. "Black or African American" have a percentage of individuals living in households with income below the federal poverty level higher than the United State average, but less than the states.

Poverty – Households in Poverty:

The number of households in poverty in the report area is above both the State of Ohio and the United States percentages. In 2021, it is estimated that there were 7,366 households, or 13.5%, living in poverty in the report area; with Ohio at 13.2% and the United States at 12.4%. Only Carroll County had a lower percentage than the state at 12.8%.

Seniors in Poverty:

According to the American Community Survey (ACS) 5-year data, an average of 10.0% of people lived in a state of poverty during the survey calendar year. The poverty rate for people age 65 and up living in the report area is less than the national average of 9.6%, but higher than the state average of 8.5% with Harrison County at 13.0%, Carroll County at 6.1% and Tuscarawas County at 10.7%. In the report area of the individuals age 65 and up, 7.72% or 927 males live in poverty and 11.92% or 1,667 females and 1,090 of those females reside in Tuscarawas County. By race, the individuals age 65 and up in the report area that live in poverty identify as "Black or African American" at a percentage of 46.17%, "Asian" 45.95%, "White" 9.40%, and "multiple race" 7.58%.

Children in Poverty:

Poverty poses the greatest threat to a child's well-being as it often deprives them of the goods and services necessary for healthy living. Poverty is also discriminatory. Age is one of the single greatest predictors of those most likely to be considered poor. According to the American Community Survey 2017-2021 estimates that there were 689,126 children (144,327 of which were under the age of 5) in Ohio living in poverty. There were 5,629 children in poverty in the HARCATUS service area, with 1,920 of those being under the age of 5. The racial divide remains a major factor despite tireless efforts to improve conditions in impoverished communities.

Historically, poverty has had a stronghold on households headed by a single parent. Carroll County had 53.6%, Harrison County had 48% while Tuscarawas had the lowest at 44.3% of female-headed households living in poverty. In 2017-2021, it was estimated that 9.9% of all households within the reporting area were living in poverty, compared to the national average of 8.9%. Of the households living in poverty nationally, female headed households represented 52.2% of all households in poverty, compared to 10.8% and 37% of households headed by males and married couples, respectively.

Early Childhood Health:

Child health and well-being is another contributor to a child's success in school according to the Ohio Department of Education. Substantial disparities in children's health are often associated with race and socioeconomic status. Every child deserves quality health care through plans that adequately support the essentials

for healthy lifestyles. Historically, this country has created disparities regarding the access to and quality of health care coverage. The "haves" and "have nots" is a phenomenon largely defined by race, age, and income. Several health risk factors have been found to adversely affect a child's development and school readiness. These risk factors can be separated into four general health areas; primary medical and preventive care, community health, dental health and mental health.

Primary Medical and Preventive Care:

Medicaid is the state's primary funding source for healthcare. In Harrison County 56.6% of children are enrolled in a public health care program; 53.5% in Carroll and 47.8% in Tuscarawas.

HEALTHCHEK:

Healthchek is Ohio's Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT) program for Medicaideligible children and teens (birth through age 20). If a potential health problem is found, further diagnosis and treatment are covered.

The Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic and Treatment (EPSDT) benefit provides comprehensive and preventive health care services for children under age 21 who are enrolled in Medicaid. EPSDT is key to ensuring that children and adolescents receive appropriate preventive, dental, mental health, developmental, and specialty services.

Early: Assessing and identifying problems early.

<u>Periodic</u>: Checking children's health at periodic, age-appropriate intervals.

<u>Screening</u>: Providing physical, mental, developmental, dental, hearing, vision, and other screening tests to detect potential problems.

Diagnosis: Performing diagnostic tests to follow up when a risk is identified, and

<u>Treatment</u>: Control, correct or reduce health problems found.

HARCATUS Head Start noted that in order to have a complete child Healthchek, all required components are needed. Physicians do not always complete lead and hemoglobin screenings as required. Some physicians refer to the hospital or another lab and parents do not keep these appointments. Some parents do not like the child to have a blood draw as opposed to a finger stick.

Early Childhood Oral Health:

Good oral health is crucial to a child's growth and development. Children need a healthy mouth to be able to eat healthy foods, learn to talk, do well in school and have a good self-image. Oral health isn't optional. It is critical to our general health and well-being. Oral health enables us to eat properly, work productively, go to school ready to focus on learning, feel good about our appearance and enjoy life. The mouth is the gateway to the rest of the body, providing clues about overall health. It is sometimes the first place where signs and symptoms of other serious diseases are noticed. Unfortunately, oral health care is too often viewed by some as an "extra", sought or provided only after other health care considered more important is secured. Following is a report from the Ohio Department of Health on Oral Health Disparities among children in Appalachia Ohio. Carroll County is considered one of the counties where children have the poorest oral health. All three counties served by HARCATUS Head Start are located in the area identified as having a high percentage of children with a history of tooth decay. Findings of the 2019 Ohio Medicaid Assessment Survey show that, regardless of income, getting dental care remains the most common unmet health care need among children. Common challenges included a lack of nearby providers and providers who accepted patients from one MCO but not from others. Driving distances were also cited as an issue. Investing in prevention and education, medical/dental collaboration, and making sure each child has a dental home by age one will go a long way to ensure that our youngest children get off to a good oral health start.

7 of the 11 counties where children have the poorest oral health are in Appalachia.

Early Childhood Nutrition:

While the percentage of families with food insecurity, eat less or are unable to afford nutritious meals, has dropped from 2020, all three counties in our service area continue to be above the percentage for Ohio. The table below shows the percentage of food insecure children, by county.

Child Obesity

Obesity has reached epidemic levels in Ohio, like much of the nation. Children who are obese are at increased risk for many health problems including high blood pressure, high cholesterol, type 2 diabetes, sleep apnea, asthma, and joint problems. Children who have obesity are more likely to become adults with obesity. Most children spend time in care outside of their home, making Early Care and Education (ECE) settings and schools some of the best places to reach children with obesity prevention efforts.

Annually, an additional \$2.9 billion is spent on health care to treat the preventable diseases associated with childhood obesity. Without significant policy, systems, and environmental changes, those costs are expected to double by 2030.

The Ohio Department of Health conducted a statewide Body Mass Index (BMI) screening survey of preschoolaged children (3-5 years) in 2016-2017. Over 3,000 children at 82 early care and education centers were screened. Sites were chosen to be representative of the state as a whole.

In the 2017-2020 study by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, obesity was prevalent in 12.7% of children 2-5 years of age. Childhood obesity is also more common among certain populations:

• 26.2% among Hispanic children

- 16.6% among non-Hispanic White children
- 24.8% among non-Hispanic Black children
- 9.0% among non-Hispanic Asian children

When it comes to the socioeconomic status of these children, those in the higher income group have a lower prevalence of obesity versus the children in the lowest income group who have the highest prevalence of obesity.

The table below shows the number of children enrolled in the HARCATUS Head Start program with asthma, diabetes, overweight, underweight, healthy weight and obese for the past three school years:

There were 190 children at a healthy weight (for child's age & sex) during the 2022-2023 school year and 47 children were identified as obese (BMI at or above 95th percentile for child's age and sex).

The Ohio Head Start BMI Surveillance project was developed and conducted by the Ohio Department of Health (ODH). Accurate data collection and analysis on rates of overweight and obesity among children (3-5 years of age) was needed to inform state and local efforts to develop, target, fund and evaluate policies and programs that impact childhood obesity. The data collection was done through direct measure by trained health professionals using medical grade equipment.

Reported in the 2022 HARCATUS Head Start Community Assessment Update Parent Survey results that contributing factors were as follows:

- Identified weight control as number five in the area of health needs.
- Children getting 1-2 hours of screen time per day was 54%.
- Children getting 3-5 hours of screen time per day was 39%.
- Children getting 6+ hours of screen time per day was 6%. Children getting no screen time per day was 1%.

Women, Infants, and Children Program:

WIC is the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children. WIC helps income eligible pregnant and breastfeeding women, women who recently had a baby, infants and children up to five years of age who are at health risk due to inadequate nutrition. The program improves pregnancy outcomes by providing or referring to support services necessary for full-term pregnancies; reduces infant mortality by reducing the incidence of low birth weight (infants under 5 ½ pounds are at greater risk of breathing problems, brain injuries and physical abnormalities) and provides infants and children with a healthy start in life by improving poor or inadequate diets.

WIC provides nutrition education, breastfeeding education and support; supplemental, highly nutritious foods such as milk, eggs, cheese, juice, cereal, beans, peanut butter and iron-fortified infant formula; referral to prenatal and pediatric health care and other maternal and child health and human service programs (examples: Head Start, Medicaid and Food Stamps)

Early Childhood Mental Health:

Mental health problems can have a serious effect on social functioning, adaptation and success in school. Health professionals once thought that brain disorders such as bipolar disorder, anxiety disorders, or even depression occurred after childhood but now, it is widely held that these brain disorders can begin in early childhood. According to the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), emotional and behavioral disorders affect 10-15 percent of children globally. One particular childhood-onset mental disorder that is widely studied, treated, and diagnosed is ADHD, attention deficit/hyperactivity disorder, and the NIMH cites that 3-5 percent of children globally suffer from this disorder. www.kidsmentalhealth.org

In many cases, children with chronic mental health care needs are not able to access services. Head Start and other community agencies play a role in expanding efforts to help families identify mental health needs and access needed services.

HARCATUS Head Start will report in the 2023 PIR that 14 children were referred for mental health services outside of the Head Start program.

Housing:

According to the U.S. Census, there were a total of 61,622 housing units in the service area for 2021, this is a decrease of -342 (or -0.55%) since 2012 compared to a 2.51% increase statewide.

There were 15,325 renter-occupied households in the HARCATUS service area as reported in the Community Action Partnership Report. The percentage of rental households in our service area where 30% or more of the household income is spent on rental costs is 38.13%. While 18.84% are severely cost-burdened spending 50% or more of the household income on rental costs according to the U.S. Census Bureau American Community Survey (ACS) 2017-2021.

According to the "America's Children: Key National Indicators of Well Being 2021", inadequate, crowded, or too costly housing can pose serious problems to children's physical, psychological, and material well-being. Housing cost burdens, especially at high levels, are a risk factor for negative outcomes for children, including homelessness, overcrowding, poor nutrition, frequent moving, and lack of supervision while parents are at work. The percentage of households with children that report that they are living in physically inadequate, crowded, or costly housing provides insight into how commonly a child's well-being may be affected by their family's housing.

Improving family housing or buying a home is one of the more common needs and/or goals identified in the HARCATUS Head Start surveys. Many Head Start families do not own a home and are left to securing housing through rental. Housing problems could be taken into account when considering the child mobility rates within the HARCATUS Head Start Program. Twelve percent of children withdrawing from the program in the 2023 school year, cited "moved" as the most frequent reason for withdrawal.

Birth Counts:

In 2021, 3,664,292 births were registered in the United States, up 1% from 2020. The number of births rose in Ohio for the first time in at least six years although at a slower rate than past years. While there may be many factors to the lack of births one answer could be that Ohio has relatively low numbers of young, working adults who are having children. Also, the people migrating from Ohio typically tend to be young adults that paired with the fact that Ohio actually had more deaths than births due to the aging population in Ohio.

Teen Births:

According to the US Census Bureau, American Community Survey, 2017-2021 5-year estimates, there was an average of 8.83 births for every 1,000 teens (age 15-19) in the service area. This is below the state average of 12.22 and the national average of 10.20 births. Of the 4,077 females ages 15 to 19 in our service area, there were 36 births to teen mothers.

Child Safety and Placement:

No child should be subjected to any form of abuse or neglect. Such behavior is unacceptable and may have damaging and lasting effects on a child's physical, mental and emotional development. Child abuse and neglect is defined as any act upon a child which results in death, serious physical or emotional harm, or sexual abuse or exploitation.

Ohio law requires Children Services to begin investigations/assessment on new reports within 24 hours, including a comprehensive assessment of safety and risk. As shown in the Table below, new reports of child abuse and neglect totaled 128 in Harrison County, 158 Carroll and 400 in Tuscarawas County.

Once it has been determined that a home is unsafe the child may be placed into a safer living arrangement. There are six types of placements, licensed foster home, kinship home, group home, residential facility, adoptive placement and Independent Living/other.

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP/Food Stamps):

Food insecurity, or the lack of consistent access to enough food for an active, healthy life, is a major issue in the HARCATUS service area. According to Feeding America 11.8% of the Ohio population is food insecure, increasing to 14.8% of children in Ohio. Comparatively, the overall food insecurity rate for Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas Counties was 13.7%, 12.9%, and 12.1% respectively, increasing to 15.3%, 15.3%, and 12.9% of children in the same counties. SNAP is one program designed to help low-income individuals fulfill this basic need.

The Ohio Food Assistance Program (federally known as Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, SNAP) is designed to raise nutritional levels, to expand buying power, and to safeguard the health and well-being of individuals in low-income households in Ohio. A household may consist of an individual or a group of individuals who live together and usually purchase, prepare, and eat their food together (www.benefits.gov).

The number of households receiving food assistance during 2017-2021 in Ohio was 587,542. Harrison was 12.86%, Carroll was 12.63% and Tuscarawas was 13.69%. All three counties in the HARCATUS service area were higher than the state average of 12.36%. The average assistance statewide per person in 2020 was \$188.41 per month with an average monthly benefit per household of \$371.82.

Graduation Rate:

Graduation rates in Harrison (88.4%), Carroll (89.7%) and Tuscarawas (88.4%) Counties fall below the Ohio graduation rate of 87.2%, as reported by census.gov. The same report shows that 29.7% of Ohioans hold a Bachelor's degree or higher compared to 12.3%, 14.1%, and 18.4%, in Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas Counties, respectively.

Ohio Works First:

Ohio Works First (OWF) is the financial-assistance portion of the state's Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) program, which provides cash benefits to needy families for up to 36 months. There were 73,703 recipients of the Ohio Works First (OWF/TANF) cash assistance program in November 2022. Of the 73,703 recipients, 92% were children. The state's average payment amount for OWF was \$352 per month for one person in 2022. Statewide, caregivers receive \$302 per month for the first child, and an increase of \$110 for and additional sibling or child.

Unemployment Rate:

The Ohio unemployment rate is 3.6%. Tuscarawas has an unemployment rate of 4.0% while Harrison and Carroll Counties have slightly higher unemployment rates of 5.3% and 4.2%, respectively.

<u>Deaths of Despair (Suicide + Drug/Alcohol Poisoning):</u>

Within the HARCATUS service area, there were 330 deaths of despair from 2016-2020 (5 years). This represents an age-adjusted death rate of 48.2 per every 100,000 total population. This indicator is relevant because death of despair is an indicator of poor mental health. In Harrison County the age-adjusted death rate was over the other two counties at 52.4. In Ohio there were 39,179 deaths in that same period and in the United States the total was 806,246.

Resource and Gap Assessment

HARCATUS's service area includes Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas Counties. The three-county region is considered to be part of Appalachian Ohio. Appalachian Ohio is a bioregion and political unit in the southeastern part of the U.S. state of Ohio, characterized by the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains. Appalachian Ohio is a region like no other in Ohio. The history and culture are rooted in the vastness of the area, where a mile or more may separate neighbors and the nearest town can be an hour drive away.

The Tri-County region is 1,364.35 square miles and is located approximately 20 miles north of Interstate I-70. Interstate I-77 runs north-south through Tuscarawas County, generally following the Tuscarawas River through predominately agricultural, light industry, and mining areas. Carroll and Harrison Counties are further east into the Ohio Appalachian region and their topography is hillier and communities are more isolated.

Harrison County's county seat is Cadiz. The county is named for General William Henry Harrison, who was later President of the United States. It is located in the 6th Congressional District.

Carroll County lies upon an ancient trail, known as the great Trail, connecting the forks of the Ohio River with Lake Erie and the inland plains. The county seat is Carrollton and it is also located in the 6th Congressional District.

Tuscarawas County is located in the 7th and 8th Congressional Districts. Dover and New Philadelphia are two major areas of population concentration. These adjacent cities are located along the Tuscarawas River. The county seat of Tuscarawas County is New Philadelphia.

One daily newspaper, and several small, weekly newspapers are available in all counties. The major nearby media markets include Akron/Canton to the north, Steubenville/Wheeling to the east and Athens in the south. Broadband Internet access has been identified as a major barrier to future economic development of the area. The Tri-County area is home to 132,297 individuals 17,553, or 13.25% of whom, on average, were living in poverty during the 2017-2021 period. 5629, or 19.9% of children ages 0-17, and 2,594, or 10.0% of seniors age 65+ and older, lived in poverty during that same time period (US Census Bureau, ACS. 2017-2021).

Data from the US Department of Labor in December 2022 showed unemployment rates of 5.3%, 4.2% and 4.0% for Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas Counties, respectively. These rates are higher than the reported national rate of 3.3% for the same time period; however, the area's unemployment rates overall grew from 3.6% in December 2021 to 4.2% in December 2022 an overall rate increase of 0.6%.

Harrison County workers earn less than their counterparts in Carroll and Tuscarawas Counties. More than 10.95% of workers in Harrison County, 12.55% of workers in Carroll County and 6.88% of workers in Tuscarawas County travel more than an hour to work. The state average is 5.17% with the National average being 9.06%.

Data from the American Community Survey 2017 -2021 shows that the percentage of residents in the HARCATUS service area without a high school diploma or GED is slightly lower than the 11.13% for the United States and more than 2.54% higher than the rate for the State of Ohio. There is a combined rate of 46.7% of residents in the HARCATUS service area with no post-secondary education compared to 32.6% for Ohio and 26.5% for the United States. According to the same survey, 51.4% of veterans in the HARCATUS service area have no post-secondary education. Only 7.8%, 8.6%, and 12.2% of Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas County residents, respectively, hold a Bachelor's degree, compared to the national percentage of 20.6%.

The American Community Survey 2017-2021 indicated that the median age of housing units in the area is 51 years, 48 years, and 52 years, respectively, for Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas Counties. HUD 2020 reported residential vacancy rates for the service area at 2.4%, which is below the State of Ohio rate of 3.7% and higher than the National rate of 2.2%. The number of homes without plumbing decreased from 2013-2021 in both Harrison and Tuscarawas Counties, but increased in Carroll County from .29% to .53% which is higher than Ohio .33% and the U.S. at .38%. The number of homes in our service area without kitchen facilities is higher than the state and US average with Carroll at 3.46%, Harrison at 6.68% and Tuscarawas at 3.49%.

The percentage of uninsured residents in Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas Counties was 9.38%, 9.44%, and 11.53%, respectively. This is compared to the Ohio rate of 9.07% and the national rate of 12.84% according to the American Community Survey Small Health Insurance Estimates 2017-2021. The centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services reported that 30,924 individuals in the service area, of which 4,157 were disabled, received Medicare.

According to the American Community Survey 2017-2021, the percentage of households receiving SNAP was 12.86%, 12.63%, and 13.69% for Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas Counties, respectively. 7,321 households received SNAP, in the Tri-County area, 3,671 of those households were below the poverty level while 3,650 households were above the poverty level. Of note, 3,695 households living below the poverty level are not receiving SNAP benefits. The American Community Survey 2017-2021 shows 43.6% of students in the HARCATUS service area were eligible for free or reduce lunches from 2019-2021.

Proposed Service Area 1302.11(a):

HARCATUS Tri-County Community Action Organization, Inc. provides Head Start services to 263 federally funded children and their families in three Ohio counties, Harrison, Carroll, and Tuscarawas. HARCATUS has served as the grantee for the Head Start program since its inception in the 1960s.

Overview of Community Linkages:

The HARCATUS Head Start Program Staff serve on the following committees in order to enhance program quality, promote public relations, have a better understanding of community resources, network with other early childhood and social service professionals, create joint endeavors, and provide better services to the families and children served in the community.

Distressed Communities Index:

HARCATUS Head Start serves an at-risk population in multiple locations. These locations have been identified as in need of closing the achievement gap for children living in poverty. HARCATUS Head Start recognizes the need to reverse this achievement trend and has explored the Distressed Communities Index (DCI) provided by the Economic Innovation Group in order to demonstrate that the proposed area is the area of greatest need. The Distressed Communities Index is a tool for measuring the vitality of U.S. communities. The 2020 report examined place-based disparities in the American economic experience and assesses the relationship between them and a host of other important factors, such as health outcomes, public assistance spending, demographics, and educational attainment.

The analysis groups zip codes into quintiles of well-being. The best-performing quintile, or top one-fifth of zip codes, is considered "prosperous." The second-best quintile is considered "comfortable," the third "mid-tier," the fourth "at risk," and the fifth, or worst-performing, "distressed." The following chart reflects, 3 of HARCATUS Head Start's sites are located in Distressed Communities, two At-Risk, two in Mid-Tier communities and one in a Prosperous community. With further examination, we found many of the surrounding communities served by these center locations were ranked "Distressed" or "At-Risk."


Young Children Needing Early Childhood Services 1302.11(b)(i):

Head Start eligibility is based on family income at or below the poverty level guidelines. Children in foster care, children experiencing homelessness and children from families receiving public assistance (TANF, SSI or SNAP) are categorically eligible for Head Start.

Geographic Location of Head Start Eligible Children and Families 1302.11(a):

HARCATUS Head Start currently offers program options that include ½ day, duration, and home based. HARCATUS Early Head Start currently offers home based. HARCATUS Head Start operates eight self-directed sites, with ten classrooms. According to the Population in Poverty Status, HARCATUS Region by Township the program sites are distributed effectively in the three counties, by offering a self-directed site option or a home-based option.

HARCATUS Head Start Family and Child Demographics:

Demographics and the number and distribution of eligible Head Start children are provided in the methodology section of this report. Comparing the 2022 demographics to those of 2021, the majority were similar. However, there was an 11% decrease in 2022 in families with two parents. 2022 demographics also showed a 6% increase in households with 1 member employed.

Racial and ethnic diversity has grown dramatically in the United States in the last three decades. This increased diversity appeared first among children and later in the older population. The population is projected to become even more diverse in the decades to come. In HARCATUS, just as in the United States, the percentage of children who are Hispanic has increased faster than that of any other racial or ethnic group. In the United States, the Hispanic group grew from 9% of the child population in 1980 to 26% in 2022. In 2022, fewer than half of all children are projected to be White, non-Hispanic. By 2050, 31% of U.S. children are projected to be Hispanic, up from 26% in 2022, and 39% are projected to be White, non-Hispanic, down from 49% in 2022. (www.childstats.gov/americaschildren).

Availability of Early Childhood Education 1302.11(2):

HARCATUS Head Start does not have the capacity to serve every eligible child in the service area. This section looks at other child development and child care programs that are serving Head Start eligible children, including publicly funded State and local preschool programs, and the approximate number of Head Start eligible children served by them.

Reported by Public Children Services Association of Ohio, by age four, 85% of a child's core brain structure is fully developed. The demand for quality preschool continues to rise as more parents with young children increase their awareness of the value of high-quality early childhood education.

The primary resources for early childhood education for low-income families in the Tri-County area are; Head Start, public preschool, County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Ohio's Child Care Assistance (assistance programs administered by the county Department of Jobs and Family Services), and private preschool.

COAD Early Care and Education division provides free assistance to families looking for child care. According to the COAD database summary below, from June 01, 2022 through June 09, 2023 COAD received 2 calls for assistance from Harrison County residents, 4 calls from Carroll County and 23 calls from Tuscarawas County. The most requested assistance was for toddler and preschool care, ages 1-5.

An estimated total of 2,115 pre-school units are available to families in the three counties. This is a decrease of 184 available pre-school units in the Tri-County area from our 2020 Community Assessment. An increase of 69 for Harrison, and a decrease of 20 and 233 for Carroll and Tuscarawas Counties, respectively.

Approximate number of HARCATUS Head Start eligible children served by other preschools:

To develop an estimate of the number of eligible Head Start children served by other preschool options the following steps were applied.

Step 1: The total number of Head Start enrollment was subtracted from the county total available units.

Step 2: The County Child poverty rate was applied to the remainder of available units to determine the total estimated number of children served by other preschool options.

Approximate number of homeless children and youth:

According to the US Department of Education 2019-2020 the definition of homelessness is defined as lacking a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. Those who are homeless may be sharing the housing of other persons, living in motels, hotels, or camping grounds, in emergency transitional shelters, or may be unsheltered. The data below is based on school-district summaries where three or more homeless children are counted. In the report area, of all the 9,524 students enrolled in reported districts during the school year 2019-2020, there were 293 or 3.08% homeless students, which is higher than the statewide rate of 2.11%

Children with disabilities, characteristics, needs & resources 1302.11(b)(i)(c):

To support planning for disability services for the HARCATUS Head Start program this section develops several estimates of the number of children with disabilities and describes the resources available to meet their needs. Head Start Performance Standards, 1302.14 (b) mandates that 10% of enrollment must be made available to children, who, because of a disabling condition or conditions, need special education and related services. HARCATUS Head Start identifies children with potential special needs through physical examinations, results of screenings prior to enrollment, Help Me Grow screenings, teacher observations, Head Start screenings and parent reports. When a child is suspected of having a special need or disability, the child is referred to the Local Education Agency (LEA) or appropriate health care professional. Once the child is diagnosed with a disability, the Head Start staff work with the parent(s) and the LEA and/or health care professionals to develop an Individualized Education Plan in which treatment and/or therapy are prescribed. HARCATUS Head Start has formal agreements with fourteen Local Education Agencies.

Estimates of disabilities in those 4 years of age and younger:

To estimate the number of children with disabilities in the service area, information from the Ohio Department of Education and Ohio Department of Health is considered, along with the actual enrollment of HARCATUS Head Start.

HARCATUS Head Start had 16% (41) children enrolled with an Individual Education Program (IEP) written by their Local Education Agency in the 2022 school year. The disability that Head Start children tend to be most diagnosed with is speech and language delays. However, reported by key informants, there appears to be an increasing number of children with social emotional and/or behavior issues.

The Early Childhood Advisory Council, sponsored research by Community Research Partners to create state wide supply and demand profiles for each county of the early learning and development programs. The report includes preschool special education enrollment in Harrison County of 50 children, 106 in Carroll and 268 in Tuscarawas County. Relevant services 1302.11(b)(i)(c):

In this section, the resources available for providing services to children with disabilities are examined. In each county, the Local Education Agency is the primary provider of services to children who are ages 3 to 5. Though the school districts are the primary provider of services to children with disabilities, other community resources should also be considered to meet the needs of children and their families.

Help Me Grow (HMG) is Ohio's birth to three program that provides state and federal funds to county Family and Children First Councils to provide home visitation services for expectant parents, newborns, infants and toddlers up to age three. HMG serves two populations: families with infants and toddlers with or at risk for developmental delays or disabilities and families who are at risk due to certain criteria, including teen pregnancy, a history of abuse and neglect, and other factors. HMG is a voluntary program and is designed to support the child and the child's family with the goal of enhancing the child's development. The Ohio Department of Health, Bureau of Early Intervention Services is the lead agency administering HMG in Ohio and at the local level. HMG is administered through 88 county offices.

Ohio's HMG program is designed to promote the health, learning, and the development of children up to age 3. It offers welcome home visits to parents of newborns, health screenings, developmental information, and early intervention to identify developmental delays. Participation in HMG is entirely voluntary. Services are based on the needs and desires of each family. Services include: providing information and referral to families; child find and outreach activities; conducting a home visit of newborn and mother; and service coordination, family support and other ongoing services for children under age three at risk for, or with a developmental delay or disability.

Another option for parents is enrollment in the County's Developmental Disabilities (DD) Programs. Twenty-four children with disabilities are enrolled in the Harrison County Developmental Disability Preschool Program, thirty in Carroll, and sixteen in Tuscarawas County. A total of seventy children with disabilities are enrolled in DD programs in the tri-county area.

Other agencies providing services to children with disabilities and their families are in the non-profit and private sectors. Examples are: Springvale Health Centers located in Carroll and Tuscarawas Counties which provides comprehensive behavioral healthcare and accepts Medicaid; Akron Children's Hospital in Akron which provides a wide range of services and accepts Medicaid; and Ohio Guide Stone's Personal and Family Counseling Service offers family counseling and mental health services.

Head Start Performance Standard 1302.62 requires Head Start staff to refer parents to groups of parents of children with similar disabilities who can provide helpful peer support; requires Head Start staff to build confidence, skill and knowledge in accessing resources, and in advocating to meet the special needs of children. HARCATUS Head Start should work to assure that parents have peer support from parent groups and have the advocacy resources they need. Sometimes these supports and resources are needed to assure that children with disabilities get the services they need to be successful in school.



Population, Density (Persons per Sq Mile) by Tract, ACS 2017-21





















Population, Hispanic or Latino, Percent by Tract, ACS 2017-21





Veterans, Percent of Total Population by Tract, ACS 2017-21







Non US Citizen Population, Percent by Tract, ACS 2017-21











































Households Living Below the Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2017-21








Percentage of Students Eligible for Free or Reduced Price School

Students Eligible for Free or Reduced-Price Lunch, NCES CCD 2020-21













Child Poverty Rate (ACS) Ages 0-4











Average Work Commute Time (Minutes), Average by Tract, ACS 2017-21







Population with No High School Diploma (Age 25+), Percent by Tract, ACS 2017-21
















































FCC Fabric Locations, 25/3+ MBPS, Percent by County, FCC 2022























Hospitalizations - Emergency Room Visits

This indicator reports the number and rate of emergency room (ER) visits among Medicare beneficiaries age 65 and older. This indicator is relevant because emergency room visits are "high intensity" services that can burden on both health care systems and patients. High rates of emergency room visits "may indicate poor care management, inadequate access to care or poor patient choices, resulting in ED visits that could be prevented".

In the latest reporting period there were 30,185 Medicare beneficiaries in the report area. Beneficiaries had 8,980 emergency room visits, and the rate of visits per 1,000 beneficiaries was 642.1. The ER visit rate in the report area was higher than the state rate of 584.0 during the same time period.






















Deaths of Despair, Age-Adjusted Rate (Per 100,000 Pop.), Yearly Trend










COVID-19 Cases, Rate, Daily Trends

COVID-19 Cases, Total, Daily Trends





COVID-19 Deaths, Rate, Daily Trends


The chart below displays local, state, and national trends in the cumulative rate of COVID-19 deaths per 100,000 total population.

APPENDIX E: 2023-2024 HEAD START COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT UPDATE

HARCATUS HEAD START

COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT UPDATE

In August 2023, the beginning of the 2023-24 school year, 280 parents were interviewed by Family Advocates using a written questionnaire which was similar to previous years' surveys.

The "average" family was composed of two parents (163, 58%). In the households, 61% had at least one working parent. The "typical" family had 1-2 children (48%) and was not new to the Head Start Program (62%). These percentages are similar to previous years. 50% of current Head Start families received a High School Diploma or GED. 23% of families responded that they had attended some college or had received a college degree.




FAMILY/COMMUNITY NEEDS

LITERACY

Nearly half, 49.64% or 139 families began the school year with at least one family member having a library card. 33% of families visit the library on at least a monthly basis. 47% of families never visit the library. Library use is a practice which should be encouraged both for the children's readership, as well as the programs that are offered by libraries for everyone in the family. The HARCATUS three county service area is saturated with 17 libraries.

Added to the August 2023 Community Assessment Parent Update were questions about the families' participation in the Dolly Parton Imagination Library. In August 2023, 71% of families were enrolled in the DPIL program and 68% were receiving age appropriate children's books on a monthly basis.

Other important literacy data to take note of is as follows:

- 59% of families own 31 or more child age-appropriate books
- 21% of families own less than 10 child age-appropriate books
- 58% of families read to their children 4 or more days per week
- 9% of families rarely and 7% never read to their children
- 40% of families read for 15 minutes or less when reading and 8% spend no time

A majority of parents (66%) limit their children's screen time (TV/Video Games/Electronic Media) to 1-2 hours per day.
