The idea of The Hills/Lake Wylie Lions Club members, Phil Weiss, Sherri Ciurlik, and Richard Lewis, had the idea of a newspaper written by Clover High School students that not only covers school events, but the Clover/ Lake Wylie area at large. The Lions Club is a global service organization whose members work together to support their communities and help those in need. Their their commitment to making a positive impact through volunteer efforts

through volunteer efforts and charitable activities. The Roaring Eagle was originally going to be an online paper, but after a conversation with a committee formed of interested Lions, Clover School District administrators, and CHS teachers, the decision was made to offer the news both online and in print. The Lions were willing to support this effort through

mentorship and funding. Dr. Kelly Clark agreed to lead the students through an elective class called "Newspaper Production". Although she

The Lions' idea came from a discussion about the lack of local news in the area. The community had been without a newspaper for over a decade. With the inception of The Roaring Eagle, residents stay informed, and CHS students gain valuable realworld journalism experience.

In the early months of The Roaring Eagle, we faced significant challenges: limited columns, a small editorial team, scarce materials, and a tight budget. Producing the newspaper was initially tough. Still,

thanks to a grant we secured from the Clover Leaders for Educational Advancement Foundation (Clover LEAF), we were able to purchase Sony cameras, which have greatly improved the quality of our photographs. Also, the support from our 26 business sponsors,

19 individual sponsors, and the advertisers in our paper has been instrumental. Their contributions have made it

> possible for us to secure the resources needed to produce a high-quality publication.

Despite our initial growing pains, the first year has brought exciting growth. We introduced the "Dog of the Month" column and the "Newcomer" column, a unique feature for families

new to our area, offering them insights into local activities, restaurants, and town events.

In addition to receiving a grant in the inaugural year, the South Carolina chapter of the National School Public Relations Association awarded a prestigious Medallion Award to The Roaring Eagle. This award honors outstanding

The future of Clover's historic mill: A community at a crossroads

BY **EMILY BELK,** CHS SENIOR Clover, SC — On Main Street, the once-thriving American Thread Company Mill—also known as the Clover Mill—has stood empty for over a decade. Once a bustling hub of Clover's textile industry, the mill is now a shadow of its former self, awaiting a new chapter.

The American Thread Mill was a cornerstone of the local economy, providing jobs and a sense of purpose for many Clover residents. However, since its closure in 2007, the building has fallen into severe disrepair. Broken windows, overgrown vegetation, and wildlife have transformed the site into their home, making it another abandoned relic of the past.

Local reporter John Marks wrote an article for the Rock Hill Herald about the mill in 2019. He interviewed Laurin McCarley, a Clover resident whose grandmother used to work there. For Laurin, the mill's current state is a painful reminder of what's been lost. According to the article, the mill is an "eyesore monstrosity", and can "be classified as a nuisance".

Todd Blanton, a former town councilman who was also interviewed for the Marks article, shares McCarlev's frustration. Blanton fought for and supported the clean-up of the property because it's currently just a shell. What once was a main employer of the town has just become a shell. However, Blanton would like to see this building that played such a role in Clover's history become a modern facility that supports the town's growth in some way. Despite the mill's dilapidated state, there are efforts underway to breathe new life into the site. In 2018, the Catawba Regional Council of Governments secured a brownfield grant from the U.S. **Environmental Protection** Agency to study the site and explore redevelopment options. A 2019 community workshop generated ideas ranging from converting the mill into apartments or shops to creating a

park. However, significant challenges remain, including environmental concerns and the high costs of redevelopment.

Repurposing former mill sites is not just a challenge for Clover but also for many towns and cities nearby that once relied on the textile industry. In Fort Mill, the old Springs mill, which once employed much of the town's population, has been transformed into Elisha Park, Similarly, in Rock Hill, an entire downtown area is being revitalized with University Center, now home to apartments, restaurants, and retail spaces.

The Clover Mill is currently owned by JA Benfield Plumbing of Charlotte, but the company has remained silent about its plans, leaving the community in the dark about the mill's future. Attempts to contact the current owner were unsuccessful.

However, a glimpse of what might be in store comes from K2 Development Company, also based in Charlotte, whose website indicates plans for a mixeduse development. According to K2, the mill is "Under Contract" and slated for "Upcoming Rezoning," with potential plans to include townhomes, retail, and office space. The situation with the American Thread Mill highlights a broader issue for Clover: how to preserve its historic sites while making room for modern development. The mill is a symbol of the town's rich industrial past and its potential for renewal, but the path forward will require significant investment and community support.

As Clover continues to grow, the community's involvement in the fate of the mill will be crucial. The American Thread Mill stands as a reminder of Clover's heritage, and with the right vision, it could once again become a vibrant part of the town's future.

We're inviting everyone to discover the incredible resources and opportunities available at your local library by signing up for a library card. Each September, Library Card Sign-Up Month reminds students and families that libraries offer more than iust books. In support of its mission, York County Library (YCL) offers a variety of innovative programming that promotes literacy in all its forms. From STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) programs and family story times, virtual homework help, genealogy, book clubs and festivals, libraries transform lives through education.

Library cards, which are free to all York County residents, can be used at all York County Library locations (Main Library -Rock Hill, Clover, Fort Mill, Lake Wylie and York) and the Bookmobile, as well as all SCLENDS libraries. Did you know that a Library card is your access to YCL's Virtual Library? Visit YCL's Virtual Library for free online back-to-school resources, including testprep and career tools, skillbuilding materials, eBooks, multimedia, and even live homework from real tutors. Here are just a few great resources to help jumpstart your school year:

Brainfuse offers free online homework help, engaging games, practice tests, and endless learning opportunities—wherever you are. With just an internet connection and your library card, access live tutoring from any device. Live tutors are available daily from 2:00–11:00 p.m.

LearningExpress Library is a collection of testpreparation tools, skillbuilding materials, and other career and life skills resources. Provided by Discus.

Mango Languages is an online language-learning system for over 60 world languages, with lessons that use conversational and grammar goals, cultural notes, intuitive pronunciation, recordable speech, and audio from native speakers.

Other Resources for Online Libraries

While your library card provides access to both physical and digital resources through the YCL's Virtual Library, there are other online platforms available for your access to reading and listening.

For example, Epic is no longer pre-loaded on

students' school iPads, but it can be downloaded from Self Service. If you don't know how to get Epic on your student's device, you can reach out to your child's school for instructions. If you or your student would like to use a different online library that is free there are other options. These include Libby, Hoopla, and Biblioboard library.

Among these libraries, Hoopla is the only other library app besides Epic that can be downloaded on your students' school iPad. In order to read and listen to books on Hoopla you have to have a library card. Most young students may not have a library card, so they can use their parents' or use another library app that does not require this.

Libby can be downloaded on personal devices. For example, Libby requires a library card but allows readers and listeners to read and listen to books without fees or payments. This is the same for hoopla. Libby also allows students to place holds on the books and audiobooks they want to read or listen to. Then it will send out a notification when books are due and when holds are ready. This is a great way for students to learn responsibility without fees on late books.

Biblioboard Library is actually a website that does not require an account. All a reader has to do is search on Biblioboard the book they

Biblioboard also allows readers to see how far into the book they are. Although there are not a lot of newer book options on Biblioboard, there are older documents that could be used for research.

Feedback shows Clover students favor Intercession but miss extended summer

Clover, SC - Last school year, the Clover School District introduced a new academic calendar incorporating two designated intercession periods, one in October and another in February. These intercessions are week-long periods during which students can receive additional academic support, such as tutoring, make-up work, and/or projects, to help them enhance their learning. Additionally, they offer students and teachers a much-needed break from the regular school routine.

This reporter wrote about the district's first intercession last October, capturing a range of emotions from the community. While reactions were mixed, the overall response was positive. Parents appreciated the opportunity for their children to catch up or get ahead, while some teachers enjoyed the break to recharge and plan for the upcoming weeks.

Since this is a new school year and everyone has gotten a chance to get used to the intercession model, this reporter sent out a poll to

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select CHS students, asking their opinions on it now.

The majority of respondents expressed that they liked the intercession, with others saying that it was okay, but it was not their favorite. One student shared, "I like having the break, but I'd prefer a longer summer vacation." Another commented, "I enjoyed having a break between quarters." A common theme in their feedback was a desire for a longer summer break. Based on the responses, there is still a range of

emotions. Overall, students liked the intercession periods, but they still wanted longer summer breaks.

One notable aspect of the feedback was the appreciation for the flexibility the intercession provided. Students who fell behind in their coursework found the time invaluable for catching up.

However, not all feedback was entirely positive. Some students felt that the intercession periods disrupted the flow of the

school year.

Another interesting point was the impact on extracurricular activities. Games and practices continued as scheduled because other districts were in school. On the other hand, students involved in academic activities found the intercession a perfect time to focus on their projects.

In conclusion, the intercession periods introduced by the Clover School District have brought a mixed bag of responses. While many students and teachers appreciate the break and the opportunity for additional support, there is a clear desire for adjustments, particularly regarding the length of the summer vacation. The district may need to consider these varied opinions as they plan future academic calendars, ensuring a balance between academic support and the continuity of the school year. The intercession model, though still in its early stages, shows promise in providing flexible learning opportunities while also highlighting areas for improvement.

Clover School District moves forward on construction and renovations

Clover, SC - The Clover School District (CSD) is making significant progress on its long-awaited expansion plans, a major development for the growing community. The journey towards these construction milestones began in 2021 with an ambitious vision to meet the increasing educational demands of the district.

Initially, CSD proposed a \$197 million bond request to the voters of York County. Unfortunately, the bond failed in September 2021. CSD revised the initial plan and launched an information campaign to increase awareness of the need for expansion. Persistence and determination paid off when voters approved a revised \$156 million bond in November of 2022, marking a significant victory for the district.

The approved bond financed several vital projects, including constructing a second high school, a third middle school, and an eighth elementary school. The new facilities will be named Lake Wylie High School, Roosevelt Middle School, and Liberty Hill Elementary. Additionally, the bond provided funds for much-needed renovations at Clover High School and Bethany Elementary School, ensuring that existing facilities could be updated and improved.

One of the most significant recent developments in this expansion effort was the awarding of a \$47 million contract to Edcon Contractors on August 14th.

This contract is designated for the construction of Liberty Hill Elementary School. The district considered four bids with a variety of options to add to the base cost. The breakdown of these bids can be found in the table below.





York County, SC – The York County Council convened on August 19, 2024, to discuss various agenda items, including significant decisions impacting the Lake Wylie area, Clover, and District 2. Here's a breakdown of the essential outcomes from the meeting.

Appearances and Celebrations

Kristin Kunde, Executive Director of 4-H, and Adrian Dover, Incoming President of the York County 4-H program, recognized Lily Moss, 24-25 State Secretary, and Evie Martell, Scribe, for their accomplishments in the 4-H program. They also thanked Council members Tommy Adkins and Chairwoman Christi Cox for their support and invited all Council members to the fall livestock show on September 6th.

The council recognized the achievements of the Clover High School Girls Soccer team, celebrating their recent state championship victory.

Marie McFadden of Keep York County Beautiful reported 375 volunteer hours valued at over \$12,558 and \$10,000 in grants for 2024, highlighting the board's ongoing efforts in waste reduction, recycling, litter prevention, and beautification in York County.

Public Comments

The only issue raised during the public forum was the concern over animal overpopulation. Five residents advocated for a spay/neuter resolution to address the growing pet population in the area.

Zoning Matters and Development

A significant portion of the meeting focused on various zoning matters. Notable decisions impacting District 2 are below:

The council approved a rezoning request for a large parcel of land located in the Lake Wylie area. The decision allows for the development of residential homes while preserving green spaces and implementing deed restrictions to maintain the area's natural beauty. Five community members spoke in favor of the rezoning, emphasizing the importance of green spaces. No one spoke against the request. The parcel in question is Legacy Point, in the Concord Road area. The request changed the land from RMX-10 to RUD, with deed restrictions and green space requirements.

A request to rezone a 0.38-acre parcel from Residential Single Family (RSF-30) to Office and Institutional (OI) was denied. This parcel, located at 6213 Oakridge Road, is situated in District 2 and was expected to accommodate small businesses or office spaces.

Enhancing Public Education

The council approved a resolution directing the York County Planning Commission to conduct studies related to public education facilities necessary for K-12 education within the Fort Mill School District. The goal of this resolution is to provide an updated capital improvements plan and an updated impact fee ordinance in accordance with South Carolina Impact Fee Act

Economic Development Initiatives

Additionally, the meeting covered various financial decisions, including the authorization to apply for two economic development grants, totaling \$200,000, with no local match required. These funds are aimed at supporting Project Granite and Project Tough.

Improving Public Safety

The council also approved several public safety agreements, including a Fire Services Intergovernmental Agreement to improve fire protection services in the York Fire District. This initiative will enhance safety measures for residents, ensuring quicker response times in emergencies.

Consent Agenda Highlights

As part of the consent agenda, the council addressed multiple items, including the approval of annual insurance coverage and various contracts related to public safety and infrastructure improvements. These decisions are essential for maintaining the county's operational budget and ensuring that services are delivered effectively to residents.

Other Community Comments

DeQuanta McKnight, owner of City Girl Garden and Urban Farm 803, thanked the council for discretionary funds and provided an update on projects involving local 4-H students.

Conclusion

Overall, the York County Council meeting showcased active community engagement and a commitment to addressing local concerns. The decisions made during this meeting are set to have lasting impacts on the residents of York District 2.
