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Stat Zero: The EMS Crisis York County Can't Ignore Anymore

YORK, S.C. - In northeastern York County, the River Hills/ Lake Wylie EMS system is facing challenges and needs community support. It is running short on funding and may be at risk — not for lack of heart, but for lack of help.

For 44 years, this nonprofit lifeline has served its community without any county or state support. Now, amid a national paramedic shortage, rising emergency call volumes, a population of close to 306,558 in York County alone, and a complete absence of public funding, their ability to save lives

is on its own lifeline.

Mary Cobb, the vice president of River Hills/ Lake Wylie EMS and one of the system's most

impassioned voices, doesn't sugarcoat the reality: "We hit stat zero most days," she says — the code meaning no ambulance is available to respond to 911 calls. Lives



hang in the balance while bureaucracy stalls.

Despite having a loyal squad of about 20, low pay and little benefits beyond paid time off, holiday pay and

incentive shifts, they remain dedicated. Yet they struggle to staff one truck full time. Many potential hires walk away after learning of the poor pay and limited benefits, while others burn out from the emotional and physical toll.

With no funding from the county, River Hills/Lake Wylie, Piedmont and Atrium Fort Mill EMS all face the same grim truth: without structural change, patients will suffer — or worse.

When a River Hills/ Lake Wylie ambulance is out of service due to staffing shortages, other units like Piedmont EMS or Atrium Fort Mill EMS respond when available. But this means there's one less ambulance in the entire system, which further strains

Ella Nighbor Breaks 59-Year Drought with State Title

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Clover High School's Ella Nighbor won the 1,600-meter run at the SCHSL 5A Division I State Championships on Saturday, May 17, ending a 59-year drought for the school in the event.

Nighbor's victory at Spring Valley High School marked Clover's first state champion in the 1,600 since Algie Sims claimed the title in 1966. Her time was the fastest recorded across all state divisions this season.

The junior dedicated her performance to her cousin,

The competition includes five judged areas: private interview, which counts for 30 percent of the score; on-stage question, worth 10 percent; evening gown, which makes up 20 percent; talent, also 20 percent; and fitness, which counts for the remaining 20 percent. These categories are designed to evaluate each contestant's communication skills, confidence, presentation, and overall stage presence.

Miss South Carolina Teen is the largest scholarship fundraiser for young women in South Carolina. The winner receives more than \$60,000 in scholarships, which can be used toward future education. The program emphasizes four key values: service, style, success,

CHS hosts third annual softball game to fight Cystic Fibrosis

CLOVER, S.C. - For the third consecutive year, the Clover High School community has rallied around two local families in their fight against cystic fibrosis, hosting a fundraising softball game that combines athletics with advocacy for a cure.

The annual event, which features both junior varsity and varsity games, brings together the school and broader community to support two families whose children battle CF daily. Both families have parents who work for the local school system and have joined forces to fundraise for cystic fibrosis research through this softball game, which serves as one of their key annual efforts.

"Our inspiration came from my playing for Coach Hall in 2002-2003," said Samantha McCarter, one of the organizing parents, explaining the long-standing connection that sparked the fundraiser. "We have stayed connected over the years. When I had my son, Jase, we started our journey with fundraising for a cure for

cystic fibrosis."

The collaboration between the two families grew naturally from shared experience. "I also met Leanna Baker on our journey with CF. Her son, Riley, also deals with CF each day. We wanted to collaborate together to raise funds for a cure," the organizer added.

Organizing the fundraiser requires extensive planning and community involvement. The event date is strategically selected to coincide with local team games, maximizing attendance potential. McCarter and Baker solicit donations from community businesses for raffle prizes, which are combined into themed baskets for the drawing held during the game.

The fundraiser has faced challenges, including weather-related delays this year that forced organizers to reschedule the event twice. Promotion efforts include social media campaigns and outreach to both Griggs Road Elementary School and Clover High School.

A highlight of each year's event is when the boys throw out the first pitch of the varsity game, health permitting. "Jase loves getting to throw out the first pitch. He is excited each year!" McCarter shared.

The event raises funds through T-shirt sales and raffle ticket purchases. The prize drawing held during the game. All proceeds support the families' broader fundraising efforts aimed at finding a cure for CF.

Cystic fibrosis is a progressive, genetic disorder that primarily affects the lungs and digestive system, though it can damage other organs including the liver and reproductive system. The condition results from mutations in the CFTR gene, which produces a faulty protein that normally helps move salt and water in and out of cells.

Without functional CFTR protein, thick, sticky mucus builds up, especially in the lungs and pancreas, causing severe health problems.
Common symptoms include

persistent coughing, frequent lung infections, poor weight gain despite good appetite, and salty-tasting skin.

CF affects approximately 40,000 people in the United States and 105,000 globally.. Contrary to common misconceptions, CF affects all races and ethnicities and is not just a childhood disease — 59.4 percent of people with CF are adults, representing major progress from decades past.

The median predicted survival age has dramatically improved to 65 years for those born between 2020-2024, compared to the 1950s when most children with CF didn't reach elementary school age.

The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, established in 1955, has funded research leading to more than a dozen FDA-approved treatments, including breakthrough medications like Trikafta, Kalvdeco and Orkambi. The foundation has committed \$500 million by 2025 toward its Path to a Cure initiative, focusing on gene therapies and treatments to restore or fix the defective CFTR gene. When every unit in the county is already tied up on calls, the system hits stat zero and in those moments, services have to come from other counties and North Carolina.

A broken model

Unlike all other counties in South Carolina and many areas across the United States, York County does not fund or operate its EMS system. Instead, it relies on nonprofit squads and hospital-affiliated services to provide lifesaving care. This model places enormous pressure on underfunded organizations like River Hills/Lake Wylie EMS which survive entirely off donations and billing revenue alone.

According to Cobb, York County can change how financing is allocated to help fund services across the county. She stresses that the system they've maintained for decades is unsustainable and unstable.

Atrium Health's presence: Help, not hostile takeover

In April, Atrium Health received a permit for interfacility transports — meaning they can transfer patients between hospitals, but not respond to 911 calls. Some originally questioned whether this might signal a larger takeover of local EMS services.

However, others see Atrium's involvement differently.

Atrium has already stepped in to support Fort Mill EMS, another nonprofit agency in York County, by funding its 911 operations and ensuring it can continue serving the community. For some view Atrium's role as a critical lifeline — one that's helping keep Fort Mill EMS alive in York County when no one else would.

What needs to change

York County must act, whether that means funding nonprofit providers, centralizing EMS services or creating new partnerships.

One thing is certain: the current system is not sustainable.

As Cobb puts it, "We have the passion. We have the people. What we need is the support."



Lake Wylie waterline extension project to continue after May County Council meetings

YORK, S.C. - York County Council met on May 5 and May 19. Decisions impacting the Clover and Lake Wylie areas are summarized below.

Water infrastructure advances for Lake Wylie

The most relevant development for District 2 residents came during the May 19 meeting, when Council confirmed that the Stateline Waterline Extension project in Lake Wylie will proceed, despite complications with federal grant funding. While Council rescinded agreements with the Affordable Communities Group after the company withdrew from the Community Development Block Grant application, officials shared that Lake Wylie residents will still receive connections to York County's reliable municipal water supply system.

On May 5, the Council improved regional water management by joining the Catawba-Wateree Water Management Group, which coordinates efforts across the river basin that directly impacts Lake Wylie's water resources and recreational opportunities.

Recreation funding changes effect district services

A major policy shift occurred on May 19 when Council approved the second reading of an ordinance abolishing the York County Recreation Tax District, effective December 31, 2025. This follows the May 5 first reading approval and will fundamentally change how recreational services are funded county-wide, including facilities and programs serving District 2 communities in Clover and Lake Wylie. The elimination of this special tax district comes amid ongoing discussions about recreation funding mechanisms and partnerships with municipalities.

Budget approval brings infrastructure investment

The Council approved the FY 2026 county budget on second reading during the May 19 meeting, following first reading approval on May 5. The budget emphasizes fiscal responsibility and balance while investing in long-term improvements. Significant

expenditures include nearly \$4.8 million for a new Coroner's facility and over \$2.5 million in vehicle fleet replacements across county departments.

Major transportation projects move forward

During the May 5 meeting, the Council approved over \$8 million in design contracts for voterapproved Pennies 5 infrastructure projects. The largest contract of \$5.47 million went to HDR **Engineering for Fort Mill** Parkway widening, while additional contracts totaled \$1.98 million for the **Neely Road Corridor** project and \$1.1 million for the White Street Corridor project.

Environmental and public safety concerns

The Silfab Solar controversy dominated public input during the May 19 meeting, with nine Fort Mill residents voicing unanimous opposition to the company's proposed operations. Council members Debi Cloninger and Tom Audette requested formal discussion of the

matter at the June 16 meeting, acknowledging community environmental concerns that may affect District 2 residents.

On May 5, Council approved \$120,000 for calcium nitrate purchases to address wastewater odor and corrosion issues, responding to complaints from the former Blue Granite service territory.

Technology and personnel updates

Both meetings included technology improvements, with May 5 bringing approval for a \$533,730 cybersecurity backup system and Sheriff's Office forensic software upgrades totaling \$71,922.

The May 19 meeting added \$287,688 in additional forensic software licenses and \$469,451 for new patrol vehicles and equipment.

The Council also modernized employment benefits on May 19 by expanding parental leave provisions and establishing formal bereavement leave policies for county employees.


