

NFDW Bylaws (Excerpt)

Amended at Annual Meeting, June 4-7, 2025



BYLAWS OF THE NATIONAL FEDERATION OF DEMOCRATIC WOMEN



ARTICLE I: NAME

The organization shall be known as The National Federation of Democratic Women (NFDW).

ARTICLE II: OBJECTIVES

The objective of the organization shall be to unite women of the Democratic Party, to promote the cause of the Democratic Party, and to encourage full participation of women in every level of the Democratic Party Structure.

ARTICLE III: MEMBERSHIP

Sec. 1. The National Federation of Democratic Women shall be made up of Full Member States, Provisional Member States, Club, and Individual and Associate members.

Club membership and Individual membership shall be granted from only those states that are not members of the NFDW.

Associate members are men and any others who wish to affiliate at the national level. Associates and men from member states are not eligible for office at the national level.







<u>August 24–27, 2025 Democratic National Committee (DNC) Meeting</u> The DNC met in Minneapolis, Minnesota August 24-27, 2025 at a welcome members reception at the State Fair, which included a tour of the fair. The first General Session was held Monday 9/25/25. We heard from elected speakers from the Minnesota Governor, Senators, and state elected representatives. We also elected Chairs-at-large members and standing committee members. Credentials committee gave a report which was not approved. Caucuses and Councils met Monday and Tuesday and elected their respective officers. We had a great Black Caucus meeting, and I was happy to introduce our new NFDW President in our meeting. I was reelected Black Caucus Chair, and Joanne was re-elected Vice Chair of the Women's Caucus with no oppositions. Rules/Bylaws and Finance Committees also met to take up reforms the Chairman submitted and other party business for membership to approve. Due to the tragic shooting event in Minneapolis, the full DNC meeting on Wednesday was cut short. A motion was made to approve the full report of the resolution and rules/bylaws. The motion passed. The next meeting will be held in Los Angeles, California from December 11-13, 2025. DNC is launching September 15-22, 2025 as Voter Registration Week of Action. If you can register voters, connect with your state party.

DNC Summer Meeting, August 24 - 27, 2025 Report

The DNC summer 2025 meeting was held in Minneapolis, Minnesota, August 24-27, 2025. A welcome reception was held Sunday evening at the Minnesota State Fair. DNC members and guests were treated to a light reception of Minnesota's corn dogs, fried cheese curds, French fries, and mini cinnamon donuts (my favorite!). Special guest speakers included Governor Tim Walz, Senator Amy Klobuchar, and DNC Chair Ken Martin and everyone had time to walk around and experience the fair. The Minnesota State Fair is known to be one of the largest State Fairs in the country! Monday's general session was devoted to the election and ratification of Standing Committee members and the At Large members recommended by Chair Martin. Monday's session featured speakers Senator Amy Klobuchar, Governor Tim Walz and Texas House Democratic Caucus Chair Gene Wu -- who received a hero's welcome as the leader of the Texas redistricting standoff. The various caucuses and councils met on Monday and Tuesday to conduct business. The Tuesday sessions were devoted to the election of Chairs and Executive Board members of the Caucuses. I was honored to be reelected as one of two Vice Chairs of the Women's Caucus unanimously and Alicia Andrews of Oklahoma was elected as Chair of the Women's Caucus following the departure of longtime Chair Lottie Shackelford as Chair. Virgie Rollins was again elected as the Chair of the Black Caucus. A motion was made at the Women's Caucus meeting by Virgie Rollins to give the title of "DNC Women's Caucus Chair Emeritus" to Ms. Lottie for her years of service and devotion to the

I have enjoyed working with her and am pleased that she will still be active in an advisory role. Thank You, Ms. Lottie Shackelford! Due to the tragic events in Minneapolis, Wednesday's general session was cut short. Before adjourning the meeting, the DNC voted to approve the reports of the Resolutions Committee and the Rules and Bylaws Committee. Members were encouraged to focus their energy on Voter Participation events and activities during the week of September 15-19, designated as a week of action for "Voter Participation Week." The next general meeting of the DNC will be held in Los Angeles, December 11-13, 2025. I am so grateful to have served as one of the two elected representatives for the DNC for the past number of years and to have been re-elected to serve on the DNC at last year's NFDW Convention. 


EASTERN REGION





Cranfill followed with reading of the DWCK Purpose. Speakers included:

John Steffen, Executive Director, Kentucky Registry of Election Finance, sharing specifics on financial reporting requirements for KREF pertaining to Contributing Organizations and Permanent Committees as well as resources for candidate reporting requirements; Robin Gabbard, Democratic Woman's Club of Pike County & Mountain Association, presenting on crowd source fundraising; Allison Wiseman, President, Kentucky Young Democrats, informing on club development across the state, the need for supporting young democrats in our communities, and the value young democrats bring to the process and future of the party; Billie Berry, Democratic Woman's Club of Shelby-Henry Counties, sharing her involvement with Voices for Justice and her journey to become more politically involved; and Havanna Scarberry, Pike County, was introduced by Pike County Club President Cathy Bartley. Convention, Community, and Civic Engagement: The Women of the TFDW Are Busy!

TENNESSEE:

ONLY CHANCE to FLIP a RED SEAT BLUE in the COUNTRY

When Congressman Mark Green announced his retirement in June, Tennessee became the only chance this year to flip a Republican seat anywhere in the country. Green represented Congressional District 7, which includes Nashville, and his term expires January 2027. On October 7th, State Representative Aftyn Behn won the Democratic Primary and will face Republican Matt Van Epps in a Special Election on December 2, 2025. Behn is leading the charge against the GOP's "Big Bad Bill" that slashes health care and raises costs for working families. The Davidson County Democratic Women are knocking on doors and building the voter turnout for Aftyn.

The next election for governor of Tennessee will happen on November 3, 2026 when Governor Bill Lee's term expires. Two Democratic Women from Memphis are candidates, Carnita Atwater and Jerri Green. There has never been a woman governor of Tennessee and the last Democratic governor served from 2003-2011. The Tennessee Federation of Democratic Women will be busy phone banking, writing postcards, and knocking on doors after the Primary Election on August 6, 2026.

TFDW added three clubs in 2025 and our current membership is above 1,000. During our fall board meeting, it was empowering to hear what TFDW chapters are doing across the state. Activities include educating members on current issues that impact women and families, hosting training sessions for candidates and those thinking about running for office, communicating with legislators and showing up for important days on Capitol Hill, building community partnerships, and engaging in peaceful protests. Tennessee had a record-breaking turnout for the second "No Kings" rally, an estimated total of 43,697. Many of the rallies were led by Democratic Women committed to democracy and protecting our First Amendment Rights, voters rights, due process, and reproductive freedom. She Votes, She Leads, She Changes the World. The Power of Women!

Keynote Speaker, Author Courtney Balestier led us through a workshop on Sparking Generational Connections Through Traditional Appalachian Skills. She offered a fascinating look at how we can connect the generations through sharing of spaces and activities. We enjoyed a laugh-filled evening, La Famiglia Democratica! to benefit our political committee, FAD PAC. Chair Belinda Biafore and Secretary of Development Tina Caputo led a successful auction and drawings for prizes. We enjoyed live music, and several candidates practiced their 2-minute stump speeches. The Business Meeting took place Saturday morning with officers and committee chairs offering reports on their year of work. Election of officers for the 2026-2027 cycle were held. 

The National Federation of Democratic Women's Western Regional Meeting on September 13, 2025, brought together state presidents, party leaders, and activists to focus on women's leadership and political engagement. Western Regional Director, Gini Ballou, hosted the meeting, which included a welcome from NFDW President Lovie West followed by speakers who discussed candidate recruitment, rural and Native outreach, voting rights, pay equity, and immigrant support. Former Nevada State Senator Pat Spearman delivered a powerful message, declaring that "DEI stands for Definitely Earned It," underscoring the strength and perseverance of women leaders.

Utah's Susan Merrill highlighted new opportunities for competitive races with fair redistricting maps and outlined plans for candidate training and rural-focused messaging. Arizona's Amber Faith discussed outreach to Native communities and young voters, while other leaders from California, Idaho, New Mexico and beyond shared legislative wins and strategies for advancing women's leadership.

Looking ahead, Utah Democrats are concentrating on grassroots organizing and candidate preparation, and Arizona Democratic Women will host major events, including their annual "Women for the Future" fundraiser and reservation outreach. Regional leaders also expressed interest in future in-person meetings in Hawaii or Salt Lake City. The gathering reinforced the collective power of Democratic women to lead, organize, and fight for fairness in their communities.

Luncheon: On September 13th, the WDC luncheon covered Utah's changes in Mail in Ballots with Salt Lake County Clerk Lannie Chapman, and an update on the Utah's Fight for Fair Maps. Utah's Legislature must redraw Utah's Congressional maps using voter-approved reform standards. The Legislature was required to propose new maps by September 24, with a special session expected October 6 for final approval. Meanwhile, GOP leadership is advancing bills to limit judicial review and redefine how partisan fairness is judged, creating tension over how "fair maps" will be enforced. 98 people attended the luncheon.



Fundraiser: On August 17th, partnering with the Salt Lake Acting Company (SLAC), Utah's Premier Professional Contemporary Theatre, the WDC of Utah raised \$6,500 to support Candidates in the 2026 election cycle. The SLAC's Summer Show: "The Secret Lives of the Real Wives in the Salt Lake Hive" was a great Hit! with over 100 people attending.




