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
Acting in Christian Love

As you all know, we pray every Sunday for our enemies and those we find hard to love. But it can't stop there – we have to carry that care and concern for everyone into the rest of the week too.

Regardless of where your political heart lies, your Christian heart must remain stronger. For we follow Jesus, who taught us to love our neighbors as ourselves. And all of this plays into us living out our mission statement, which is that “We are an inclusive congregation of disciples who follow Jesus in hope, love, joy, and peace.”

And yet, we are living in a political climate of polarization and demonization of people who don't share the same point of view. In fact, it has gotten to the point that it seems as though there are only two extremes, and you feel compelled to choose one or the other. And that leads to an us-or-them mentality, with people on both sides lobbing verbal grenades – or worse – at people on the other side. But a better practice, taught as a mediation strategy, is to get everyone on the same side of the table. This means finding something that we can all agree on and using that as a starting point to explore what else we might be able to come to terms on.

This tends to work well, for the truth is that there is still a lot of gray area in between the two extremes, and many people are still trying to figure out how best to live there. So, there may not be as much actual disagreement as we are projecting there to be.

Of course, there will still be those on the fringes – those whose views are so extreme that finding common ground can be difficult at best – but that does not mean that we are free to engage in the same kinds of destructive speech and behavior that we see from some of them. Instead, we need to re-learn how to disagree with one another while still loving – or at least being cordial to and respectful of – those whose views we oppose.

As Christians we are called to speak truth to power, but we are to speak that truth in love. This means that we will not engage in hate-speech, labeling, or expressing a wish for something bad to happen to those we disagree with.

We are blessed to have a growing congregation and visitors on a regular basis. But the truth is that, if we want that trend to continue, we must always project our love for one another and our welcome to everyone in our community in all that we say and do. For we may not be able to change the big things that are going on in our nation and the world, but we can change our community for the better, one little loving step at a time.

create new denominations – their intent was to point out where they saw that the Roman Catholic Church had strayed from the teachings of the Bible and help to bring them back into proper practice. This, of course, was not well received by the Pope, and it did end up with Martin Luther being labeled a heretic and excommunicated in January of 1521 – and the protestant church was born. Of course, there was never just one united protestant church because each of the reformers had their own followers, so different denominations were formed – and new denominations are still being formed today.

All of this is important church history, but it is equally important to look at where the church is today and where it may be headed, because the thing is that reformation – even The Reformation – is never a one-and-done kind of a thing. We need to constantly be paying attention and reforming as the Holy Spirit leads us to better understandings of our faith and how we are to live out that faith in the world. This clearly fits in with the Explore Your Faith theme that we announced on Rally Day. The beautiful truth is that, as Brennan Manning put it, “through no merit of ours, but by his mercy, we have been restored to a right relationship with God through the life, death, and resurrection of His

beloved Son.” Taking this seriously and then exploring what it truly means for us is a powerful starting point for our own personal reformations. Once we start down that path – whether through attending Bible studies or personal times of devotion and prayer – not only will our faith grow, but we will be better able to share that faith with others. And that is how a church grows.

But church growth takes even more than that – it takes some reformation as well. For following Jesus means that we have to step out of our comfort zones and into new territory. I know that sounds risky – and sometimes it is – but when we take those steps, we not only share what we believe, but we learn from others as well. And that learning can help us to see what we may need to change to become an even more relevant church for our community. This is not to say that we are to become wishy-washy about our beliefs, but updating some of our language and practices may make it easier for those who have never been to church to feel like they could belong here too.



- The solar update is on hold until we get an estimate on a generator for the Social Hall and kitchen.

- 2026 Budget Prep will begin in October and the new budget prepared by December.
- It was approved to order two waterproof envelopes and one fireproof container for the red membership record books and other important documents.



Backpack Buddies demonstrate service in action

This fall the Backpack Buddies (BPB) volunteers at Redeemer are serving an increased number of students. At Hubert Elementary the numbers have risen from 15 to 24, and at Coastal Middle School from 10 to 11. Each week we purchase food, pack, and transport backpacks filled with weekend food for students. Our volunteers are also beginning to plan the Thanksgiving and Christmas meals that we send to these families: turkey, cornbread stuffing, string beans, and other traditional foods.

Two things to consider:

1. This year, Backpack Buddies is requesting donations of money only. This way allows us to purchase food from the food bank to avoid inconsistencies in the size and amount.
2. BPB welcomes volunteers who have the ability to lift and carry, and those who have vehicles large enough to transport the food we purchase and pack. You can learn, one-on-one, from any volunteer. Contact Sandi Brassard or Kathi Bernat to learn more about the program.

A Christian Steward Sacrifices

The greatest sacrifice of all times is found in John 3:16, “For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.” This is truly an incredible sacrifice. Jesus is the atoning sacrifice for our sins and for the sins of the entire world. By sending Jesus into the world and by sacrificing his life, God demonstrated his love for us.

The sacrifice of a Christian steward is the surrendering of something of value to fulfill God’s will. Personal sacrifices occur in numerous ways. Stewardship is not just the sacrifice of money, but also the sacrifice of time, talents, and energy. A Christian steward shares financial resources with those less fortunate, dedicates time to volunteer their services, uses talents to serve the church or other charitable needs, and any act that comforts, assists, or supports others in accordance with our commitment to serve God’s world. These sacrifices are part of our stewardship journey.

The sacrifice should not be made by a Christian steward for the purpose of receiving recognition, but rather should be made freely and willingly without any subsequent consideration. Based on the teachings of Jesus, Christian stewards should give thanks to God and sacrifice with gratitude for their many blessings. Sacrifices of money, time, talent, and energy are appreciated.
