

Leadership Topics A Comparison of Dialogue & Debate

Real dialogue is a collaborative, non-competitive activity in which people seek both increased understanding & common ground. It embraces complexity and flexibility, finding space for diverse viewpoints. In contrast, debate may be contentious, high voltage; it often values the ability to prevail over an opponent.

Dialoque

Talking with others

Collaborative – 2 or more sides working together towards common understanding

Listening to other views in order to understand, find meaning, reach accommodation or agreement

Enlarges, broadens, influences (maybe towards change), participant point(s) of view

Can complicate positions and issues

Is flexible in nature

Stresses the ability to synthesize

Strives for multiplicity of perspective

Calls for a temporary suspension of individual beliefs

Everyone is part of the problem in dialogue

Affirms the idea of people learning from and with each other (in collaboration)

Remains open-minded – an open 'system'

Debate

Talking at others

Oppositional – 2 sides opposing each other in an attempt to prove each other wrong

Listening to the other side in order to finds flaws and areas of difference & disagreement

Affirms participant point(s) of view

Aims to simplify positions and issues

Is rigid in nature

Stresses the ability to analyse

Strives for singularity in perspective

Calls for investing wholeheartedly in individual beliefs

One person, position, solution or viewpoint, wins over the other

Affirms the idea of people individually (or a lobby) in competition with each other

Insists on a final answer
