With the support of this event grant, BVNA, as well as our friends at Da Vinci Art Alliance, Wash Square West Civic, friends of the South Street Mini Station, and the South Street Headhouse District, took part in the program, bringing neighbors together, improving neighborhood vibrancy and safety.

These memorable events not only reactivated our cherished community spaces but also supported local artists and businesses, improved public safety through increased foot traffic, and helped us fulfill our mission of fostering community bonds.





There were magical sunset concerts with swing dancing at Bardascino Park, a kid-friendly fall festival in Cianfrani Park, a celebration of the "Our Market" art and storytelling project on S 9th, Street and the second annual MINAS concert at local slow fashion brand Lobo Mau. We also continued the tradition of the annual National Night Out against crime—where we were able to distribute not only information about city programs, but this year also gave away personal safety items like porch lights and window locks. Neighbors also launched a new BVLicious meetup for members of the LGBTQ+ community and allies in Bella Vista. topping 160 in attendance. EMPTY TREE PITS CALLING FOR TREES

This past August, sixteen volunteers with Bella Vista Tree Tenders surveyed the neighborhood to find out how many dead trees, empty tree pits, and empty pits with stumps there are in Bella Vista. The results are rather astounding: 39 dead (or nearly dead) trees, 71 empty tree pits (plus an additional 16 pits that had been covered over in concrete), and yet another 11 empty pits with stumps.

Bella Vista Tree Tenders want to help homeowners convert at least some of those 71 empty pits into pits with trees! Current city regulations regarding where trees can be planted on the sidewalk are strict regarding the placement of a tree in relation to other trees, utility poles, or corners. Taking into account that some of the existing empty pits are no longer suitable for a tree and that some people might not want a tree, that still leaves

a sizable number of empty pits in our neighborhood where a tree could be planted, benefitting the environment and our neighborhood overall.

If you are a property owner or homeowner with an empty pit in front of your house and you'd like to get a tree, there are three ways to do it: through TreePhilly, through PHS, or by hiring an arborist yourself. The TreePhilly website lists the three options: https://treephilly.org/street-trees/. To get a tree for free, you can apply either through TreePhilly or through the PHS Tree Program (this is the program that supports Tree Tender groups citywide). You cannot apply to both. With either of these programs, you cannot choose the species, but you can indicate your preferences.

If you are a property owner with a pit that has a stump, you are responsible for getting that stump and roots out before you can get a tree either through TreePhilly or the PHS Tree program. There are contractors who remove stumps at a reasonable cost. Contact cmpuppin@ aol.com for more information.

If you are a property owner with a dead tree in front of your house, you can submit a request form for removal. https://www.phila.gov/services/trees-parks-the-environment/tree-related-services/report-a-dead-tree/. The city has a backlog of dead tree work, so removal could take up to a year.

MORE BEAUTY IN BELLA VISTA AT PALUMBO PARK

The Palumbo Park community is celebrating the arrival of a permanent sculpture, Bonsai, to the park.

By sculptor David Tothero, Bonsai is a six by six feet metal plantlike structure finished in Italian yellow. The piece is a beautiful and strong artistic and architectural enhancement of the park which aligns itself with the arts, being in the 700 Catherine Street neighborhood block consortium with Fleisher Art Memorial and the Da Vinci Art Alliance (DVAA).

The artist, originally from Lancaster County, has lived in Bella Vista since 1972. "Bella Vista always felt like a small town where everyone knew everyone, just like the small town I grew up in," he said. A graduate of York Academy of Arts, Tothero attended classes at Fleisher Art Memorial for the past several decades and was an instructor there for over 35 years, conducting a private figure drawing class. Mainly using metal in his work, Tothero began as a graphic artist and taught design at Moore College of Art & Design. He completed graphic designs for the Philadelphia Museum of Art and was an exhibition designer for the Weitzman National Museum of American Jewish History. In the early 1990s, Tothero began working in steel, creating large welded sculptures.

Neighbors and Friends of Palumbo Park (FOPP) coordinated with Tothero and installed the sculpture on September 9. There was a dedication in the park on October 7 at 10 a.m.

"Thank you for accepting my sculpture, Bonsai, for your beautiful park.

As more and more land becomes developed, the need for open space grows, and gardens like Palumbo Park become hidden gems for people and birds."

It was a busy summer at Palumbo Park.

The Friends group (FOPP) is installing a free library in the park, very kindly donated by Philly AIDS Thrift. Young students at

THE NEBINGER PTA IS BUSY THIS SCHOOL YEAR AND WE HAVE EXCITING NEWS TO SHARE

We are launching a Playground Revitalization Program to update our beloved schoolyard. It is used for everything from free community events to gym class, and while we love our outdoor space, we want to make it more accessible and functional for all ages. As a K-8 school, we serve a wide age spectrum, and there isn't a ton of equipment for our older kids. Our Student Advisory Council has formed a committee of experts to transform our playground into something spectacular for kids of all ages. We are currently looking for donors for the multiyear project and cannot wait to share status updates as we go. Our awesome schoolyard is about to get even more awesome! Connecting with Government Leaders-Our PTA President met with State Representative Ben Waxman in October to discuss Nebinger and ways his office could connect us with resources. There are state funds available for reading-readiness and social-emotional learning programs. He invited our middle schoolers to tour the state capitol building later this year. (We know our Social Studies teacher and Student Council will be thrilled!) It is important for us to stay connected to our government representatives at both state and city levels for so many reasons. In October, the Nebinger PTA facilitated a campaign to get the crosswalks repainted on Carpenter Street, after the paving project. After an email and phone campaign to the Streets Department and Councilmember Mark Squilla, our crosswalks were repainted the next day. Big thanks to those who picked up the phone, and to Councilmember Squilla's office for taking our concerns seriously.

Electrical Upgrades are coming! If you've walked down 6th Street, you may have noticed that our 6th Street Garden became more of a mud-pit this past summer. Nebinger is undergoing a yearlong electrical upgrade. Don't worry, we will replant the garden in the spring. So far, window AC units have been installed. We are *thrilled* our school was chosen for the capital improvement project. Anyone who has been inside Nebinger will attest to how gorgeous it is. They simply don't make buildings the way they

used to! Since there have been upgrades in technology since 1924, we are grateful for electrical improvements in 2024.

Teacher Classroom Supply Lottery. Funding programs at the school is at the heart of our mission as a PTA and what better way to do that than to directly fund upgrades to classrooms? Launched this year, any Nebinger teacher can enter to win \$200 worth of classroom supplies. Our October winner, 2nd grade teacher, Ms. Smith, used her funds to buy chapter books for her classroom library. Our November winner, 1st grade teacher, Ms. Walker, will purchase STEM kits for her classroom.

BELLA VISTA BUILDINGS WE LOVE

SOUTH PHILADELPHIA STATE BANK AT 915 SOUTH 11TH STREET, BUILT 1919

The neighborhood we now call Bella Vista was home to thousands of Italian immigrants from the 2nd half of the 19th century to the middle of the 20th century. This was Philadelphia's "Little Italy", the 2nd largest in America, with a population 2nd only to New York City. Not speaking the language and being immersed in entirely new cultural and social systems, these immigrants had a very difficult time negotiating

their housing, legal, and financial needs. That support was often provided by building associations such as the Societa' di Unione e Fratellanza Italiana (The Union and Italian Brotherhood Society), which was housed in Columbus Hall, 744 - 746 S. 8th Street, a building listed on the Philadelphia Register of Historic Places. There were also many banks, some officially chartered by the state and others that were unofficial and sometimes took advantage of their customers.

Despite the fact that their wages were the lowest out of 23 immigrant groups, it is amazing how much was saved by Italian immigrants. Italians earned about \$1.50 to \$2.00 a day at the beginning of the 20th century. However, they only needed 50 cents to live. They sent the rest home to their families in Italy to invest in land, to pay old debts, or to allow them someday to return to enjoy the fruits of their work. As early as 1893, there were 25 banks in Bella Vista. Many Italian banks prospered until the stock market crash of 1929 when almost all of these banks fell. Bankers wrote letters, transmitted money to Italy, and acted as lawyers, realtors, employment agents, and travel agents selling tickets back to Italy.

The South Philadelphia State Bank was designed by the Philadelphia architectural firm of MacKenzie and Wiley. The firm designed at least 5 commercial and residential buildings in the Philadelphia area. It was built in 1919 by contractor Frank Lucci of 1603 Ellsworth Street. The photo on the right was taken in 2012.

In 1923 alterations were made to the building,

designed by architect Max A. Bernhardt (1896-1947), who designed over 50 residential, commercial, and industrial buildings in the Philadelphia area. He studied architecture at the University of Pennsylvania, receiving his B.S. in

Architecture in 1917 and his M.S. in 1918. During the 1930s, Bernhardt served as an architect for the Department of Banking of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.



In 1924 scandal struck the South Philadelphia State Bank when a shortage of at least \$16,000.00 was discovered from the bank's holdings. An arrest warrant was issued for Edward A. Fichera, the Vice President and Treasurer of the bank. Fichera disappeared shortly after accepting a \$3,000.00 cash deposit on a Friday afternoon. The vast majority of the bank's 4,500 depositors were working men and women of moderate means. For many of them, their entire life savings

were gone. As word spread, scores of them stormed the bank demanding their money. As the crowd grew to the proportions of a mob, riot police from the 7th Street and Carpenter Street station arrived to hold back the milling crowd.


