From Our Pastor

Dear Parishioners of Saint Liborius Parish, and Saint Boniface Church,

Be Vigilant!

“Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival.” The vigilant disciple is the one doing the Master’s will when he returns. We remain vigilant first by recognizing the Master’s will which requires a strong life of prayer and listening to the Lord. We follow the Lord’s will by acting upon His commands, looking away from ourselves and following the Lord’s command of love of God and neighbor.

Divine Mercy

Some of you have asked about the image of Divine Mercy that was hanging in the church. Since this belonged to Fr. Greg Skowron, he took this with him when he departed the parish. Eventually, we will replace it with an image that belongs to the parish, that befits the dignity of a place of worship and large enough. Since the parish has a smaller image of Divine Mercy, we will place this in the church until which time we can purchase a larger image.

Cardinal’s Visit and Dinner August 21st

As I mentioned in a previous letter to the parish, Peter Cardinal Okpaleke and his secretary, Fr. Lawrence, are living in our parish until August 22nd. The situation in their home country of Nigeria is quite dire. They live in threat of violence each day. In fact, just last week, Fr. Lawrence was attacked and he suffered a bullet wound to his foot. To help many of their citizens who have been displaced from their homes, they are raising money to build a home for children and the elderly. **The Cardinal will be speaking at our parish on Sunday the 17th of August** and we will all have an opportunity to support them. There will be a second collection taken up that weekend.

On August 21st, there will be a dinner with the Cardinal at Scrementi’s Restaurant here in Steger. Tickets cost \$75 per person and may be obtained at the parish office or you may purchase a ticket after Masses on the 16th and 17th of August. Thank you to the Knights of Columbus for their support. The proceeds from the dinner will go to support the construction of the home for the elderly and children in Nigeria. It is not often that we have a Cardinal at our parish so I hope that you will support his effort to assist our brothers and sisters in Nigeria.

Q. and A. – Easy Reference Guide to the New Pastor

Since we are all experiencing a new reality here at Saint Liborius and I have been hearing rumors second or third hand, I thought some information might be helpful. Although Saint Liborius has experienced less change than the other two parishes in our new Saint Liborius (Saint Mary closing and Saint Boniface losing one of their Sunday Masses), the new Saint Liborius has experienced some. We now have the territory of 3 parishes and 4 towns. We have experienced the transition of some long-time staff members including the departure of Fr Greg. Mother Teresa Academy has become the sole responsibility of Saint Liborius. We have two new priests who live here at the rectory at Saint Liborius. We have experienced the increase in our Mass and confession schedules, e.g., now having Mass on Saturday morning and confessions on Friday and Saturday morning. In September, we will begin a Mass in Spanish at Saint Boniface and we now offer the Eucharist four times during the week at Saint Boniface instead of 3. The list goes on...

That thing is new...Nope!

Sometimes when there is a transition in a parish, some start to notice things that have always been the case but they perceive them as new. For example, some people thought the image of Divine Mercy had been moved from the main church into the confessional. The reality is that the image of Divine Mercy in the confessional was put there long before the most recent transition. Sometimes we perceive as a “new” policy, something done simply out of ignorance, e.g., since it is not standard practice in the Catholic Church to pray the prayer to Saint Michael on Sundays, I did not know that, at Saint Liborius, you had been in the habit of doing so.

Please reach out

Some of you will reach out directly which gives me the opportunity to address questions; however, more often than not, I must hear things second or third hand. This slows down my ability to address the issue. Please feel free to email me at fathermilota@outlook.com or phone the parish office and I will be glad to address any questions you might have.

We all know that we like to talk to others rather than the one with whom we have the issue, but this can be damaging to our parish community. We need to build up the community and not tear it down. Prudence and charity in our speech is the responsibility of each one of us.

To assist in this regard, I thought I would put to paper an easy reference “question and answer” key addressing some of the questions that have come to me over the last four weeks since my arrival and respond so that I might allay some fears:

Q.: Why did the new priest remove the image of Divine Mercy from the church?

A.: The new pastor did not remove the image of Divine Mercy from the church. The former pastor/administrator took the image with him when he departed the parish, because it belonged to him. Since we have a smaller image which is high quality, the new pastor, aka Fr. Milota, has placed this image in the church so that those with a devotion to Divine Mercy may be able to look at this image and feel contentment. Our intention is to purchase a larger image of equal quality, since any image in the church should be high quality.

Q.: We, at Saint Liborius, don’t want to be “red-headed step-children.”

A.: First of all, let’s not run down red-heads. My mother was a red-head and I loved her dearly. Although this is a statement and not a question, it reflects an insecurity which is unfounded and unhelpful. It may be true that the situation at Saint Liborius has changed given the fact that we encompass the territory of three parishes; however, the reality is that you have two priests and a parish staff committed to the welfare of your parish and who are present to the entire community including Saint Liborius.

Regarding the open staff positions, it should be noted that, although all were informed of the open staff positions and given an equal opportunity to apply, no Saint Liborius parishioner applied for any of the open positions except one. This one person was offered the open position for which they applied and then turned it down.

My friends, we, including your two priests, are experiencing a great deal of change in our lives and statements like the “red-headed stepchild” comment do not advance the well-being of our parish.

Q.: Is Fr. Milota living in the rectory at Saint Liborius? Is Fr. Frank living in the rectory at Saint Liborius?

A.: Yes. Although I am not certain the reason this is a matter of concern, both priests reside full-time at the rectory except one day a week which is the day they visit with their families. Monday is Fr. Milota’s family day and Wednesday is Fr. Frank’s family day.

Q.: Why did we not have rosary before Mass?

A.: Because no parishioner stepped up to lead it. If you would like to lead the rosary, please contact the front office. As you read this, I am looking you in the eye, wondering why you did not lead the rosary! In general, I have not yet learned how to bi-locate (be in two places at once). I have been trying for years but with no luck so I was in the confessional. I can’t tell you what was said there, but it was good.

Q.: Why did Father take down the big wooden cross in front of church?

A.: The cross is typically put up during Lent (February or March) and taken down after Holy Week. This year it was taken down the week of April 21st. Even though I was not assigned to Saint Liborius at that time and did not even know there was a wooden cross put up during Lent, I sneaked to Saint Liborius in the middle of the night and took it down and stored it in the breezeway between the church and the rectory. Oh...wait...no, that was Allen, even though I did not know who Allen was back then.

Q.: Why did Father change this or that thing?

A.: It is highly likely that Father did not know this or that thing was a change or the thing really is not a change but we just noticed something we had never noticed before. If you notice something that may be different, this may not be because there was a change in policy. My suggestion is that you ask Father, kindly and charitably, about it. For example, typically and according to the instruction given by Pope Leo XIII when he invited the universal Church to pray the prayer to Saint Michael, he instructed that this be offered at low Masses on ferial days (weekday Masses). Hence, I did not know that Saint Liborius had been praying the prayer on Sundays. Having received some inquiries in this regard, we now pray the Saint Michael prayer on Sundays.

Please know of my prayers for all of you and may Almighty God bless you and keep you.

Sacraments

Sacrament of Baptism

All parents asking for their children to be baptized must attend a Baptismal Prep class. Classes are held on the third Thursday of every month at 6:30 p.m. @ St. Liborius in the Church, with a reminder notice in the parish bulletin. If a child has already been baptized here no need to attend class again.

Please register for the class by calling the St. Liborius Parish Office at 708-754-1363. Godparents are also encouraged to attend the class. Baptisms are celebrated on Sundays immediately following the 10:30am Mass. Families and attendees of the Baptism are encouraged to attend Mass as the Baptisms will commence immediately after Mass.

Sacrament of Marriage

Marriage preparation must begin a minimum of six months prior to the actual wedding date. Contact the parish office -St. Liborius (708-754-1363) or St. Boniface (708-534-9682) to begin the process.

Anointing of the Sick

Anointing of the Sick is the sacrament that is received by those who are ill or suffering. By the sacred anointing and the prayer of the priest, the whole Church commends those who are sick to Christ.

Due to the Privacy Act, hospitals can no longer inform us when a parishioner is admitted to the hospital. A close relative needs to call either Parish Office-St. Liborius (708-754-1363) or St. Boniface (708-534-9682) to request an anointing.

Spiritual Adoption Prayer Campaign



The Daughters of St. Liborius started our annual Spiritual Adoption Prayer Campaign.

We hope that all parishioners will also offer a prayer for the unborn each day ending on Mother's Day May 10, 2026.

Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen encouraged people to spiritually adopt an unborn child and thereby combat the abortion mentality and general anti-life sentiment in our world today. It is said that although the identity of the child you pray for will be unknown to you during your earthly life, there is every hope that you will be united with that child forever in Heaven. Archbishop Fulton Sheen wrote the following daily prayer to spiritually adopt an unborn child, and we ask that you, too, will offer his prayer:

Jesus, Mary, Joseph, I love you very much. I beg you to spare the life of the unborn child that I have spiritually adopted who is in danger of abortion. Amen.

What's the timeline for fetal development?

The fetus will change a lot throughout a typical pregnancy. This time is divided into three stages, called trimesters. Each trimester is a set of about three months. Your healthcare provider will probably talk to you about fetal development in terms of weeks. You will see distinct changes in the fetus, and yourself, during each trimester. Traditionally, we think of a pregnancy as a nine-month process. However, this isn't always the case. A full-term pregnancy is 40 weeks, or 280 days. Depending on what months you are pregnant during (some are shorter and some longer) and what week you deliver, you could be pregnant for either nine months or 10 months. This is completely normal and healthy.

First trimester

The first trimester will span from conception to 12 weeks. This is generally the first three months of pregnancy. During this trimester, the fertilized egg will change from a small grouping of cells to a fetus that is starting to have a baby's features.

By the end of the third month, the fetus is fully formed. All the organs and limbs

Connections for Saint Liborius and Saint Boniface

We are glad to be able to publicize the various activities in the parish in the bulletin and Flocknote emails; however, we do need your help to make this happen. We now have a combined bulletin for Saint Liborius parish and Saint Boniface church and we would ask some simple procedures be followed to ensure the most effective communication about parish events.

Bulletin

Because the parish bulletin is published on Tuesday of each week and must be send to the publisher on Monday, anyone wishing to have their item in the bulletin must submit it to the parish office or connections email (connections@stliborius.org) no later than the end of day on Thursday of the prior week. This is a standard request in parishes around the world so there is nothing unique or extraordinary about this requirement, and this helps us to address the needs of all in the parish.

Content Policy for the parish bulletin: the parish bulletin is a combined bulletin and has limited space. Hence, we must have some guidelines on content especially as activity at the parish increases. If you have an announcement for the bulletin, we will include it no more than 2 times. Once again, this requires some thought on your part as to when you wish to place your announcement, but this is not an uncommon requirement for a parish bulletin.

Flocknote/Email

Because people often complain about getting too many emails and a flood of emails tends to get ignored, we will, with a rare exception, send only one email per week.

Pulpit Announcements

Since the office is not open on Fridays, any announcement to be made for the weekend must be submitted to Kathy Short (office@stliborius.org) in the parish office no later than the end of day Wednesday of that week. We are glad to assist and facilitate activities here at the parish, but we do need your help in planning ahead and giving the parish office some due consideration.

Typically, the priest is attempting to celebrate the holy sacrifice of the Mass or hearaing confessions prior to Mass which is not the appropriate venue by which to make such submittals.

Prayers for the Sick and Deceased

Our Lord asks us to exercise the work of mercy of praying for the sick and the dead. Although it has been the policy of not including the names of the sick and deceased in the prayers of the faithful, we will begin doing. If you would like the name of your loved one included in the prayers of the faithful, you may do so by submitting the name to the parish office (office@stliborius.org) no later than the end of the day Wednesday. This name will be included in the prayers for **one** weekend and then printed in the parish bulletin for the period of one month. **If you would like this name included in the prayer list in the bulletin longer than a month, please contact the parish office to request this.** We will be happy to include them longer than one month; however, the list in the bulletin becomes excessively long and some continue to be included who no longer require our prayers.

Please be aware that any prayer request received after noon on Thursday will have to be included in the prayers the following week.

Funeral Information

We are happy to send out a Flocknote message encouraging our parishioners to pray for a parishioner who has died. We will, automatically, send out a message for those funerals occurring here at the parish. Similarly, if you have experienced the death of a family member but the funeral is not occurring here at Saint Liborius or Saint Boniface, please send an email to Kathy Short at (office@stliborius.org) or Jessica Payne at (connections@stliborius.org) and we will be glad to send an announcement to the parish via email.
