

From Our Pastor

Dear Parishioners of Saint Liborius parish and Saint Boniface church,

The dignity of a human life

"A great prayer for life is urgently needed, a prayer which will rise up throughout the world. Through special initiatives and in daily prayer, may an impassioned plea rise to God, the Creator and lover of life, from every Christian community, from every group and association, from every family and from the heart of every believer." Pope Saint John Paul II

Oh for the good ole days when I knew everything...

Although there was never a point in my life in which I did not practice my faith (a practicing Catholic is one who has not yet perfected it), there were certainly a great many teachings of the Catholic Church which I did not understand. Now, as I am old, I think I have a fairly decent grasp of my Catholic faith; however, there are a great many things about life and people which escape me. When I was a newly ordained priest, I knew everything. Now that I am old, I know very little. I am guessing some parents may experience something similar with their own kiddos as they grow up. When we are young, we may think our parents out of touch...then, something happens, we grow up.

There is, however, one truth from which I have never deviated during the course of my life. Oh...I may not have always put this belief into action every moment of my life, but I have always understood it to be the case. It's a simple teaching with which few would argue: "Every human being deserves respect."

Why?

As Catholics and Christians, this truth comes directly from the scripture: "Every human being is created in the image and likeness of God." Simple. Right? We readily concede that my little 2-year-old niece is cute as a button and definitely created in the image of God. Even grandpa who is 93...he's created in the image of God even though he can be ornery when its time for the doctor appointment. We recognize this with one's spouse...one's children...even when they drive the car into a tree.

And, yet, we still have a hard time accepting that an unborn baby has this same dignity and worth...this little baby is also created in the image and likeness of God. Poor babies and rich babies...babies of every color and nationality...all are Godlike.

Even though our physiology text books teach us that human life begins at conception, somehow we convince ourselves that it is ok to take the life of someone we cannot see.

Oh, we have great witnesses to whom we listen in most every other context but whom we ignore in this one case: For example, on February 3, 1994, at a National Prayer Breakfast, sponsored by the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives, in Washington, DC, Mother Teresa challenged the audience on such topics as family life and abortion. She said, "Please don't kill the child. I want the child. Give the child to me."

My friends, we are not helping a young mom in a crisis pregnancy by counseling her to take her child's life. This is a great example of offering a simplistic solution to a complex and difficult problem. What a Christian does when we love someone is take their hand and walk with them so they don't face the struggle alone. No shame. No rebuke. Real...concrete love. The last thing a Christian should do is tie up an even heavier burden for them to carry all the while telling them, everything is ok...this will solve your "problem."


Sacrament of Marriage





Daughters of St. Liborius Spiritual Adoption Prayer Campaign

The Daughters of St. Liborius started our annual Spiritual Adoption Prayer Campaign. We hope that all parishioners will also offer a prayer for the unborn each day ending on Mother's Day May 10, 2026.

Jesus, Mary, Joseph, I love you very much. I beg you to spare the life of the unborn child that I have spiritually adopted who is in danger of abortion. Amen.

What's the timeline for fetal development?

The fetus will change a lot throughout a typical pregnancy. This time is divided into three stages, called trimesters. Each trimester is a set of about three months.

A full-term pregnancy is 40 weeks, or 280 days. Depending on what months you are pregnant during (some are shorter and some longer) and what week you deliver, you could be pregnant for either nine months or 10 months. This is completely normal and healthy. Now, that we've completed the first trimester we are going into the second trimester.

Second trimester

This middle section of pregnancy is often thought of as the best part of the experience. By this time, any morning sickness is probably gone and the discomfort of early pregnancy has faded. The fetus will start to develop facial features during this month. You may also start to feel movement as the fetus flips and turns in the uterus. During this trimester, many people find out whether their baby will be designated male or female at birth. This is typically done during an anatomy scan (an ultrasound that checks physical development) around 20 weeks.

"And I feel one thing I want to share with you all, the greatest destroyer of peace today is the cry of the innocent unborn child. For if a mother can murder her own child in her own womb, what is left for you and for me to kill each other? Even in the scripture it is written: Even if mother could forget her child – I will not forget you – I have carved you in the palm of my hand. Even if mother could forget, but today millions of unborn children are being killed. And we say nothing. "


