RONALD LANDVATTER GIFT

[Ronald Landvatter](#) passed away on March 25th in Milwaukee. Ronald was the son of Wilmer and Veronica Landvatter, the last family to use the Saxonia House as a residence. The Landvatters purchased the house from Art Crass in 1947. They farmed the land. When Ron took over, he and his son farmed it into the 1970s. We learned that in lieu of flowers, donations were directed to the Friends of Saxonia House, "for the preservation of a historical landmark, his childhood home." KLESSIGS AND LUTZES OF MANITOWOC COUNTY: A TOUR JULY 12

Ernst Klessig arrived in America from Saxony in 1844 and built the Saxonia House in 1855.

Ernst's brother Fredrick August Klessig arrived in America from Saxony in 1848 and established the *Saxon Homestead Farm* in Manitowoc County. Gottlieb and Fredericka Lutze arrived in America from Saxony in 1849 and built the *Lutze housebarn* in 1850 just a over a mile north on Old Saxon Trail now S. Union Rd. NORWEGIAN LOG HOME UPDATE



The 174-year-old Bailey Norwegian Log home and the 170-year-old Klessig Saxonian House have a lot in common. They were both built by immigrants

who left family and friends back home in Europe due to cultural, economic and/or political reasons looking for better opportunities in what was still the frontier of Wisconsin. Both share a heritage steeped in the Romantic Art Era as well. These are all

important aspects of their history and art that will be represented in the Bailey Log home.

The focus on the log home in the spring and summer of 2024 was to tag and record each timber, disassemble it and stage them for the trip to the Saxonia House site. The Friends of Saxonia House are very fortunate to have Alan Pape direct the whole process, with his lifetime experience in finding, relocating and restoring pioneer log homes both for Old World Wisconsin and in his personal business covering Wisconsin and upper Michigan. His supervision and direction were critical in leading our small army of volunteers. In the fall the timbers were moved 80 miles to the site and covered by tarps through the winter.

We are now ready to excavate and lay a new foundation followed by its reassembly and restoration. New timbers are on site ready to replace the old ones that have rotted beyond use.
