
Jesus Trendy is Here!

- One large-toothed comb, remove packaging
- One heavy-duty metal nail clippers, remove packaging



Gifts and Memorials committee was notified to address the current church pew cushions. Over time, the cushions have become dirty, showing advanced wear and are beyond repair. As the committee considered replacing the cushions, they realized that the pews themselves needed refinishing and refurbishing as much of the finish is worn and some of the pews are dry and cracking.

At this point, Wood refinishers were researched and we found one company, Wood Renovators, Waupaca, Wisconsin who was both qualified and willing to quote on refinishing the existing pews. Once the quote was secured, the idea of complete replacement of the pews was suggested. At this point, it was advisable to form a committee to oversee and move the ideas forward. Volunteer committee members were John Tessmann, Keith Laugen, Paula Laugen, Kari Curran, Cyndy Hall, Lisa Stefanski and Pastor Dave. The committee was also informed that a benefactor, a current member of the congregation, had stepped forward to fund all the costs associated with pew and chair replacement, including the necessary new flooring.

In September of 2025 the committee contacted T.H. Stemper Co. from Milwaukee, Wisconsin to provide a quote on a complete pew replacement. The quote was provided by Joe Stemper in late September, including detailed description of pew construction. As the new pew quote was very close to the same as refinishing the existing pews, the committee decided the new pews was the right choice as the refinishing option would prove to be logistically troublesome with a very lengthy timeline.


The committee met with the Church council in October to inform of the progress thus far as well as seek approval to move forward. The council approved moving forward however suggesting that the committee obtain a competitive quote from another pew company.

In October 2025, the committee met with Arnold and Holly Bracy of Bracy Associates who represented New Holland Church Furniture Company of New Holland, Pennsylvania. The committee was shown manufacturing processes and pew construction details. Bracy Associates provided the committee with a comprehensive quotation on October 31, 2025. The committee met in early November and ultimately chose to move forward with New Holland as the construction, warranty and customer service was clearly superior. After reviewing all the pew options and selecting all the variables (colors, fabrics, etc.) the contract with New Holland was signed in late December 2025.

The committee will now be busy finding a new home for the existing pews and coordinating the new floor installation and finally the new pew installation in late June of 2026.

Missions

From the Missions Ministry Committee, lots of news this month.

First, Rev Cathy Daharsh, Sr Advisor to Lutheran World Relief, spoke with Gloria Dei members on January 29th.

This was really unprecedented that a representative from LWR visited locally. She showed a power point presentation of different projects around the world, including testimonials from individuals. It was a good presentation of the scope of LWR, as it included water projects, education programs and agricultural projects as well as the Kits that congregations make up. She was very thankful for the work we do and emphasized that the Kits are very important. LWR serves across faith traditions, nationally & internationally.

Second, Executive Director of Family Promise of the Great River, Jesse

Todd, and his wife visited Gloria Dei in January. He spoke to our

congregation at the worship services and explained about the program, which is administered differently than when Gloria Dei first partnered with Family Promise. Now Family Promise owns a big home in Sparta, which has offices and a day center downstairs, and offers bedrooms for 5 families upstairs. Jesse explained that Family Promise provides eviction prevention services, diversion (helping families in temporary shelter situations avoid entry into a homeless shelter), shelter itself, and stabilization by offering 1 to 2 years of continued stabilizing case management.. Families who enter the FP shelter have 90 days to complete the shelter program and enter stable housing. On average, over 82% find

housing in under 60 days of staying in the shelter. In 2025, 96

families were served, which is great, but there were 165 applications for services that the staff was unable to process. The mission of Family Promise is to help homeless and low-income families achieve sustainable independence through a community-based response. The video that Jesse showed was very touching. Regarding the success of the program, in Jesse's words "The community showed up, God showed up, and we're really blessed."

Besides donating money, people can donate time to Family Promise. They try to schedule people to provide dinner for the residents on 3 nights a

week, or ask people to come spend time with the families at meal time.

They want the families to feel connected to the community, so this is a huge part. Or, you may have a skill that would be valuable to share with families. Gloria Dei currently has \$4,841 in a dedicated fund for Family Promise hosting. Our Committee authorized our treasurer to disburse \$2,800 of that fund directly to Family Promise, immediately.

The remaining \$2,041 will be available in 2026 for our congregation members who would like to provide a meal for the Family Promise house residents. Please contact Colleen Bolchen (bolchens@mwt.net, text 608-350-8178, call 608-562-5289) or Pastor Dave, if you are interested in this opportunity.

Third, our Giving Jar recipient in March is Chosen People Ministries, and their team will be at Gloria Dei on March 8th to offer both worship services. Chosen People Ministries is an evangelical organization dedicated to sharing the gospel with Jewish people and supporting Messianic Jewish communities worldwide. It was founded in 1894 and its mission is to pray for, evangelize, disciple, and serve Jewish people everywhere, and to help fellow believers do the same. The organization operates in over 20 countries. The Ministry provides various services including Bible studies, spiritual counseling, and practical help for Jewish believers who may feel isolated in traditional churches.

There are lots of opportunities to serve our Lord! Just look around!



MESSAGE *for all* CONGREGANTS

I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. (Galatians 2:20)

There she goes again! My daughter is rushing around the house in desperate need of her phone charger.

You can imagine the progression: She closed the extra apps and dimmed the screen — yet it's dead again. The battery is simply worn out.

Does life feel like that sometimes? We plug into all kinds of things — wherever we can get a “charge”. It works for a while. Then it fades. And plugging into a Christian church isn't even considered. It just sounds boring.

But is the only reason I go to church to feel better?

The short answer is “I can't guarantee that.” The more theological answer is, “Church is about connecting to God and to each other. When you connect with God, you're not just recharged — you are re-made. Paul states plainly in his letter to the Galatians: “I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me.” Jesus has become Paul's power source – his heartbeat. Most of the time, that changes your mood for the better. Because your deepest problem is not boredom but separation from God.

Christian scholar and writer, C. S. Lewis wrote something amazing: “It would seem that our desires are not too strong, but too weak. We are half-hearted creatures, fooling about with drink and sex and ambition when infinite joy is offered us, like an ignorant child who wants to go on making mud pies in a slum because he cannot imagine what is meant by the offer of a holiday at the sea.”^[1]

I don't know about you, but I'm all about moving out of the slum to enjoy a holiday someplace else. What does that look like – to plug into “infinite joy”?

Follow Jesus and allow Him to remake you.

During Lent, we are exploring this “remaking” through the eyes of Barabbas.

- Embrace the fact that you are made in the image of God.
- Deal with your feelings of guilt and estrangement. Jesus went to the cross that you can know that you are decisively forgiven and belong to Him.
- Lastly, embrace the future. Your purpose doesn't end with a tombstone; it extends into eternity. Raise your family with the freedom that comes from knowing our future is not decay but renewal.

Jesus does not merely recharge a fading battery. He replaces it with a new source of life rooted in communion with God, sustained by grace, and destined for glory.

Blessed Lent everyone! Let us all Keep and Live the Faith!

March brings us all the way into the season of Lent—a time to slow down, take a breath, and let God do some real work in us. As we journey through Lent, we are reminded that this is not simply a time to give something up, but a time to go deeper—deeper into prayer, deeper into repentance, and deeper into our dependence on God. Lent leads us toward the joy of Easter, but it does so by first calling us to pause, reflect, and prepare our hearts for the miracle of the resurrection. Lent is not meant to be rushed. It's a season for spiritual renewal, for honest reflection, and for letting our faith grow in deeper ways.


Spiritual renewal rarely happens by accident.

It grows through intentional practices—setting aside time for prayer, engaging Scripture thoughtfully, and allowing God to shape us through spiritual discipline. These practices do not earn us God's love; rather, they open us to receive it more fully. Lent is an invitation to slow down and listen, to examine our lives honestly, and to ask where God is calling us to grow.

This is a time to be intentional about prayer and to lean into spiritual disciplines that help us reconnect with God. Not because we have to, but because we need to. Lent gives us space to look at our lives, our hearts, and our choices, and to ask God to shape us more into who He's calling us to be.

During Lent this year, we are studying the story of Barabbas—a man whose life was forever changed by Jesus' sacrifice. He's easy to overlook with just those few verses of Scripture, but his story hits close to home. Barabbas was truly guilty and deserving of punishment, yet he walked free while Jesus took his place.

A Season to reset our hearts



When we really sit with it, his story is uncomfortable, and that is precisely why it matters. When we look closely, Barabbas begins to look a lot like us—people who have made our own choices, gone our own way, and still received grace we didn't earn. Looking at Barabbas helps us face what our sin cost Jesus, but it also shows us just how deep God's love really is. Jesus willingly took the cross so that we could walk free. Lent gives us time to wrestle with that truth, not to be overwhelmed by guilt, but to be transformed by grace; not to shame us, but to draw us closer to Him.

My hope is that this season helps us slow down, pray more honestly, and open our hearts to renewal. And when Easter comes, may we celebrate it with fresh gratitude, changed hearts, and a deeper understanding of the grace we've been given.

May this March be a season where God meets you in meaningful ways and prepares your heart for the wonder of the resurrection.
